FEMA hiring workers for recovery jobs

AUSTIN – In partnership with the State of Texas, FEMA is hiring workers across the state for administrative, logistical and technical jobs related to hurricane recovery. Those hired will join the recovery team – local, state and federal workers, voluntary agencies and community organizations – already in place. Through temporary local employees, FEMA gains valuable community insights, provides jobs and puts Texans to work helping Texans. Jobs posted recently pay between \$14 and \$34 per hour. Some of the jobs include: administrative support assistant, civil engineer, communications specialist, construction cost estimator, courier, crisis counselor, customer service specialist, environmental specialist, floodplain management specialist, graphics specialist, hazard mitigation outreach specialist, historic preservation specialist, registered nurse and voluntary agency liaison, among others. The first step is to register at WorkinTexas.com, the Texas Workforce Commission's website, where application instructions are posted. FEMA will announce more jobs soon.

HISD approves extended school day

September 14, 2017 – At its first regular board meeting since Hurricane Harvey forced a delayed start to the school year, the Houston Independent School District Board of Education approved an extended school day to make up instructional time. The Texas Education Agency approved waivers that exempt students from making up the first nine days the storm took away. However, students at 12 schools starting later will have to make up lost time beyond those days.

“There is no perfect solution,” said Superintendent Richard Carranza. “And as we talked about over the course of this weather event, flexibility will be key. But we are also making sure the extra time is not just seat time.” The board approved an additional 25 minutes of instructional time at the four schools: Bellaire High, Northside High, Key Middle, and Robinson Elementary. Eight schools will have an additional 55 minutes of instructional time: Liberty High, Forest Brook

Middle, Mitchell Elementary, Braeburn Elementary, R.P. Harris Elementary, Hilliard Elementary, Kolter Elementary, and Scarborough Elementary. The extended day will begin on each school's first day, and go through the first semester. They will return to their regular schedules for the spring semester. Trustees also approved the renaming of the HISD Food Services Support Facility the Hexser T. Hollister. *See EXTENDED, page 2*

Other sports affected by Harvey are also re-started their season. Varsity volleyball resumed Sept. 8 and cross country and team tennis resumed Sept. 12.

Aerial mosquito spraying scheduled

HOUSTON – September 13, 2017 – The rain left behind by Hurricane Harvey has created large areas in Harris County where mosquitoes can lay their eggs. To address increasing numbers of mosquitoes and the risk they pose to the recovery effort and public health, the U.S. Air Force Reserve's 910th Airlift Wing flying modified C-130 cargo planes staged out of Kelly Air Force Base in San Antonio will be conducting an aerial spray operation beginning Thursday evening, Sep-

tember 14 and may take more than one day. The plan is to spray approximately 600,000 acres by air, weather permitting. (Click here to see map for the proposed spray areas.) Harris County is working with our partners at the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) and the U.S. Air Force Reserve to conduct the aerial spray operation. The coordinated approach supplements the on-going countywide ground treatment to better protect the health of Harris County residents. According to Dr. Umair A. Shah, executive director of Harris County Public Health (HCPH), “The goal is to reduce the effects mos-

quitos cause.”

Aldine ISD will offer evening meals again this year to students at all middle and high schools beginning September 11. These schools offer educational and enrichment programs for students after school which enable the At Risk Evening Meal Program to be provided by the Child Nutrition Services Department. There is no cost to the students for the evening meal. The program will operate Monday through Thursday each week during the school year.

Students will receive a variety of meals including an entrée, fresh fruits and vegetables, and a grain/bread along with milk as menu choices. Meals are planned by the Child Nutrition Dietitian and meet all required menu standards of the United States Department of Agriculture.

quitoes are having on recovery efforts and the possibility of a future increase in mosquito-borne disease."

The insecticide, Dibrom (EPA-approved), is routinely used for aerial spray operations to combat mosquito-borne disease and will be used during the spray operation in Harris County. Dibrom is considered safe for the environment and is applied by licensed applicators, according to the label instructions.

For residents concerned about exposure during the aerial spray operation, HCPH recommends individuals stay indoors during the evening aerial application in the treated areas, as a precaution. As an extra precaution, beekeepers may wish to cover their colonies to prevent bees from exiting during treatment.

Residents can help control mosquitoes during the recovery effort by emptying standing water around their homes. To reduce the likelihood of being bitten by mosquitoes, residents are encouraged to use an EPA-registered mosquito repellent when outside. To keep mosquitoes out of the home, people should make sure their window and door screens fit tightly and are in good condition.

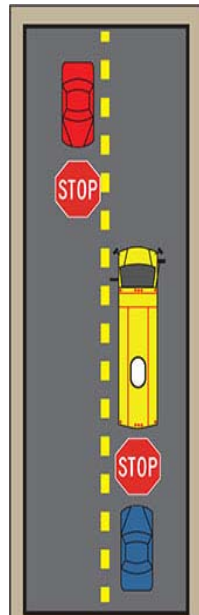

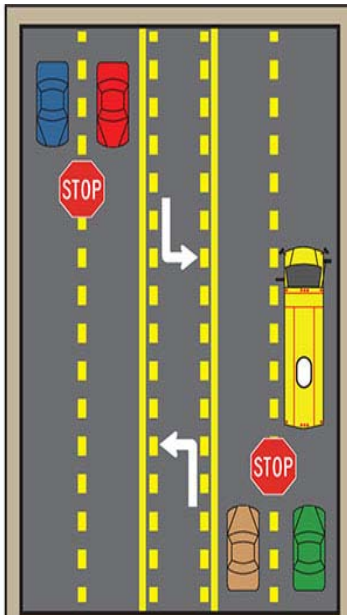

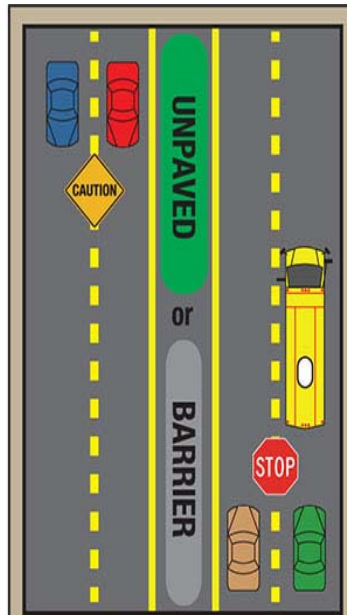

Rep. Jackson Lee calls for the formation of seniors' special program

Jackson Lee: "Because many seniors who live alone and on fixed incomes have been hit particularly hard, we must make a special effort to provide them with the assistance they need to find housing and recover."

Washington, DC - September 11, 2017 - Congresswoman Sheila Jackson Lee, a senior member of the House Committees on Judiciary and Homeland Security and

Ranking Member of the Judiciary Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, Homeland Security and Investigations, released the following statement calling for the formation of a Special Home Crisis Team to address the needs of seniors who are victims of Hurricane Harvey:

"During this time of tremendous devastation, many seniors have been hit particularly hard. Many of them live on fixed

incomes and alone, and have found it difficult to secure temporary housing including hotels.

"Therefore, I am calling for the formation of a 'disaster home crisis team' that will cleanout seniors' homes and get them on the road to recovery. We must make a special effort to provide these most vulnerable victims with the assistance they need in the aftermath of an unprecedented catastrophe."

Greenspoint Mall shooting leaves 3 injured

A shooting inside the Greenspoint Mall last Sunday left 3 people injured, one seriously.

Police report that about 5:45 pm a fight broke out in the food court of the mall, involving one of the men that was injured.

One of the people involved in the fight had a gun, and fired, striking another man in the buttocks. This victim was taken to Memorial Hermann The Woodlands Hospital for medical treatment. His condition was reported as serious but not life threatening.

Two others were injured in the fight and shooting, apparently grazed by bullet fragments. They were treated at the scene and released.



Authorities are still looking for the shooter, a black male with dreadlocks pulled into a bun. He is described as 5'7" or 5'8" tall. He may have been accompanied by a

woman, described as having red hair.

Bicyclist killed on Eastex

Houston police are investigating the fatal crash that occurred at 6900 Eastex Freeway (South U.S. Highway 59) at 6 a.m. on Saturday, September 9.

According to officials, the driver of a white Dodge Caravan was traveling

south on Eastex Freeway when the victim, on a bicycle, attempted to cross the freeway, and was struck by the Dodge. Additional unknown vehicles also struck the victim. The driver of the Dodge, who remained at the scene, was

questioned and released.

The identity of the male victim is pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences.

The investigation is continuing.

Eastex crash at Greens Road leaves 1 fatality

Houston police are investigating a fatal crash at 16000 Eastex Freeway (North U.S. Highway 59) about 1 a.m. on September 14.

HPD Vehicular Crimes Division Sergeant E. Fendia and Officer D. Henley said the male victim, 40, was driving a brown Ford

F-150 pickup truck when he stopped with the hazard warning lights. An 18-wheeler, whose driver did not see the pickup truck in a poorly lit area of the freeway, struck the pickup truck from behind. The victim was pronounced dead at the scene.

The driver of the 18-

wheeler was not injured nor did he show visible signs of intoxication. He consented to a blood draw with results pending.

The identity of the deceased victim is pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences. The investigation is continuing.

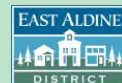
Due to Hurricane Harvey, the City has decided that they will not be picking up Heavy Trash and Recycled Items until further notice.

Lt. Governor Patrick affirms commitment to school districts impacted by Hurricane Harvey

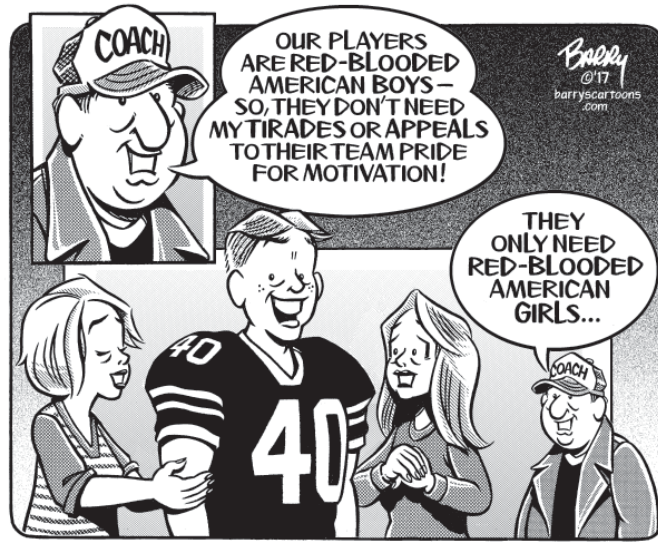
HOUSTON - September 13, 2017 - Over the last two days Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick has met with nearly 45 superintendents from Region IV to discuss the impact of Hurricane Harvey and subsequent flooding on their districts. On Tuesday, the lieutenant governor told school leaders that he has informed Education Commissioner Mike Morath that he supports increasing funding for those schools that gain students because of displacement following the storm and holding funding at current levels for schools that lose students because of displacement following the storm. Regarding facilities, the lieutenant governor informed the school leaders that between their own insurance and FEMA reimbursements, 90 percent of damage to school buildings, including contents such as books,

computers and other assets, should be covered. "Hurricane Harvey has impacted 272 schools districts and nearly one out five students in Texas. These school districts need certainty regarding state funding and as a state we need to step up to protect these students. "I am proud that Gov. Abbott and I stood firm and did not raid the Rainy Day Fund during the regular or special legislative session because it is certainly raining now. In terms of our schools, between storm related damage costs and the expected decline in local property tax revenues due to decreased values, the state will almost certainly need to tap that resource as we did in 2011 and in other past sessions. This is what the Rainy Day Fund is for and I am committed to using it wisely."

Governor Abbott requests federal funding for flood and water infrastructure projects

AUSTIN - September 9, 2017 - Governor Greg Abbott today sent a letter to Administrator Scott Pruitt of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) expressing his support for a request by the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) to streamline federal funding for flood and water infrastructure projects related to Hurricane Harvey. "Texas has faced an unprecedented natural disaster, and quick action, flexibility and innovation are essential to keeping Texas and our economy strong," said Governor Abbott. "The seamless collaboration between the State of Texas and our federal partners has been imperative to allow these communities to rebuild and recover following Harvey's devastation. I am hopeful that the EPA will continue its commitment to getting Texans the resources they need to address the urgent needs that will allow for the immediate resolution

to some of the most pressing water-related concerns." "The TWDB believes that the SRF funds can provide a critical financing bridge between the immediate need for cities to restore their water and wastewater systems and the delivery of federal disaster aid," said Chairman Bech Bruun. "We appreciate EPA's consideration of this request to allow us to put these funds to work on this recovery as expeditiously as possible. The TWDB administers EPA's state revolving funds, which communities affected by Harvey can use to help finance all phases of water and wastewater projects, including projects related to stormwater infrastructure. The funding will provide timely financing that allows hurricane- and flood-stricken areas of Texas to rapidly repair and rebuild these critical systems and to ensure the future protection of these communities."



Texas begins long march toward recovery from Hurricane Harvey

AUSTIN — As contaminated waters receded and mountains of debris from flooded homes and ruined belongings grew last week, a picture of post-hurricane Texas developed and the process of weighing impacts to lives, property and infrastructure began. Gov. Greg Abbott delivered a series of announcements and proclamations related to catastrophic flooding and wind damage brought by Hurricane Harvey to more than 50 Gulf Coast and inland counties in late August and early September. On Sept. 7, Abbott thanked Congress for passing a \$15.3 billion hurricane relief package and called the bipartisan action "an encouraging sign."

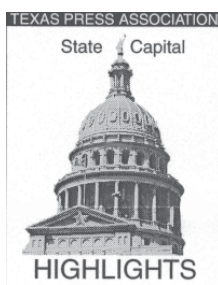
On Sept. 9, Abbott wrote to EPA Administrator Scott Pruitt, expressing support for a request by the Texas Water Development Board to streamline federal funding for flood and water infrastructure projects related to Hurricane Harvey. The board administers EPA's state revolving funds, which will be used to repair and rebuild water, wastewater and storm water systems in communities affected by Harvey. Also on Sept. 9, Abbott and Texas A&M University System Chancellor John Sharp, who heads the newly created Governor's Commission to Rebuild Texas, met with Beaumont officials along with leaders of many state agencies. It was the first stop in a three-city, five-day trip to discuss the devastation caused by Hurricane Harvey and get input on how the commission can assist in the rebuilding and recovery effort.

Mosquito spraying begins

The Texas Department of State Health Services on Sept. 6 announced the launch of FEMA-assisted mosquito control measures over the Hurricane Harvey-stricken counties of Refugio and Bee.

Areas of standing water may increase the number

of mosquitoes capable of spreading diseases such as the West Nile and Zika viruses, the DSHS said.

Paxton applauds ruling

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton praised a decision Sept. 5 by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the 5th Circuit to uphold the state's voter identification law that was blocked last month by a Corpus Christi federal district court.

A three-judge panel of the Fifth Circuit voted 2-1 to overturn an injunction granted by the lower court. The ruling, Paxton said, means that an interim court remedy is in place for 2017, preserving the requirement of an ID while allowing those without an accepted ID to vote by signing a sworn declaration stating that they have a reasonable impediment to obtaining one.

Furthermore, Senate Bill 5, a law passed by the Texas Legislature this year amending the voter ID law to comply with a prior 5th Circuit ruling, takes effect in 2018, Paxton said. Paxton echoed the U.S. Department of Justice, saying the new law "eradicates any discriminatory effect or intent" and expands voter identification options.

DACA decision pleases AG

Attorney General Paxton on Sept. 5 applauded President Donald Trump's decision to phase out within the next six months the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program cre-

ated by President Barack Obama in 2012.

DACA granted lawful presence and work permits to nearly 800,000 people who were brought to the U.S. as children by foreign nationals. President Trump left it to Congress to pass a law by March 5, 2018, that would allow affected individuals to continue residing in the U.S.

Hegar reports on taxes

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar last week released the total of state revenues collected during the fiscal year that began Sept. 1, 2016, and ended Aug. 31, 2017. Hegar also posted a state revenue report for the month of August.

Sales tax revenue for the year was \$28.9 billion, 0.3 percent ahead of the \$28.8 billion projected in the January biennial revenue estimate, and general revenue-related revenue was \$52.3 billion, or 1.2 percent ahead of the projection of \$51.7 billion. State sales tax revenue for the month of August totaled \$2.48 billion, 0.9 percent less than in August 2016, he said.

Also, Hegar reported that Texas' "all funds" tax collections for fiscal year 2017 came to \$49.6 billion, or 0.2 percent less than his \$49.7 billion projection, and all funds revenue totaled \$111.2 billion, or 1.4 percent less than his \$112.8 billion projection.

Revenue distribution set

Comptroller Hegar on Sept. 7 announced his office would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$668.3 million in local sales tax allocations for September, an amount 6.2 percent more than the Office of the Comptroller distributed in September 2016.

Allocations are based on sales made in July by businesses that report tax monthly.

County Attorney Vince Ryan advises homeowners to beware of contractor scams

Hurricane Harvey and its aftermath left more than 100,000 Houston-area homes flooded. Unfortunately, with every major disaster comes unscrupulous home repair contractors, many from outside of Texas, who prey upon desperate homeowners struggling to make repairs quickly and get back to their normal lives.

The Office of Harris County Attorney Vince Ryan offers the following tips to protect homeowners from contractor scams:

- Do NOT do business with a contractor from out of state or someone who is going "door to door." Try to do business with reputable local businesses only. Get referrals. Check with the Better Business Bureau and Internet complaint boards before hiring a contractor.
- Get a written estimate before you sign a contract. Try to get bids or estimates from 3 different contractors.
- Contact your insurance company before work begins to make sure all procedures under your policy are followed.
- Make sure the work to be done is specified and the price is agreed upon.
- Get a copy of the signed contract.
- Check if your mortgage requires that insurance proceeds be paid directly to your mortgage company subject to periodic inspections of the work. Contact your mortgage company before work begins.
- Do NOT assign your FEMA benefits or insurance proceeds directly to the contractor.
- Do NOT pay for the entire job upfront. If necessary, make only a down payment for the contractor to get started. Make only partial payments in proportion to the amount of work done as the job progresses. Pay only by credit card or check.
- Do NOT make a final payment until you have inspected the work and are satisfied.

Things don't get any easier for Texans with Patriots next up

So, how did that season opener go for you Texans fans? Ouch. To say Houston laid a huge egg two weeks ago in their season-opener against Jacksonville would be an understatement.

Optimism was running high for the home-town team after the Houston area and Southeast Texas suffered through the after effects of Hurricane Harvey. Houstonians were going to use the home opener to rally around their city and team, and then 29-7 happened, to of all teams the Jacksonville Jaguars, one of the worst teams in the NFL in 2016.

If that had happened against the Patriots, Raiders, Packers or Cowboys, it would be understandable, but to get stomped to the curb by a team that finished 3-13 a year ago makes it all the more embarrassing for Bill O'Brien's team.

Things don't get any easier this week when the Texans travel to Foxborough to take on the New England Patriots, who didn't exactly look like the defending Super Bowl champions in their 42-27 season-opening loss at home to Kansas City.

You can bet head coach Bill Belichick will have his team's problems fixed when the Texans arrive on Sunday. Let's hope the same is true of O'Brien's team. The offensive line was manhandled by the Jags and quarterback Tom Savage was a sitting duck. He was replaced by rookie Deshaun Watson at halftime. Watson did lead the Texans to their only touchdown in the game, but he spent most of his time evading the Jacksonville pass rush, which produced 10 sacks in the game.

Offensive tackle Duane Brown has all the bargaining power he needs to get a new contract after what transpired in the season opener. Texans fans must hope that general manager Rick Smith begins negotiating sooner, rather than later.

In other big games this weekend, the Cowboys visit Arizona on Monday Night Football, while Atlanta plays at Detroit and the Giants and Eagles meet in a key NFC East contest in the City of Brotherly Love.

In the NCAA, Texas Tech pays a visit to the Houston Cougars, TCU and Oklahoma State do battle in Stillwater in an early-season showdown in the Big 12. The Aggies look to get off to a good start in the SEC when they take on Arkansas at AT&T Stadium in Arlington.

Before we take a look at what this weekend's schedule has to offer,

a note about the high school schedule. After missing the first two weeks of the season due to Hurricane Harvey, Aline ISD's five varsity programs began their seasons last weekend. They will begin District 16-6A play on the weekend of Sept. 29-30 and we will preview those games in next week's column.

A 5-6 week in Week 2 brought the season record to 11-7 (61%). Now, onto this weekend's games.

NCAA

Arkansas vs. Texas A&M - The Aggies and Razorbacks begin play in the SEC after lackluster openings to their respective seasons. The Aggies followed up their embarrassing loss at UCLA with a less than impressive 24-14 win two weeks ago at home against Nichols State. The Aggies continue to struggle at quarterback, so look for veteran Jake Hubenik to get the nod heading into conference play. He's the most experienced quarterback on the roster and is a better passer than freshman Kellen Mond. While the Aggies escaped with a win at home, the Razorbacks lost to TCU two weeks ago at home, 28-7. Arkansas also has issues at QB, so look for both teams to rely on their running games until things get sorted out under center. A&M has the better running game between these two teams, so look for the Ags to run to victory in Arlington on Saturday. My pick, Texas A&M 26, Arkansas 18

Texas Tech at Houston - Look for the Cougars to play with a chip on their shoulders when the Red Raiders of the Big 12 come calling on Saturday. The Big 12 was expected to expand to its original 12 teams last fall and the Cougars were to be one of the two teams under considering to join the league, but the conference decided to forgo expansion and once again left the Cougars high and dry. Major Applewhite's team will use that snub as motivation against Tech. The Cougs opened their season two weeks ago with a hard-fought 19-17 win at Arizona, while Tech had the week off. The Red Raiders do not fare well on the road, but they should have enough offense to keep this one close. Quarterback Nik Stroman threw for 364 yards and three touchdowns in the Red Raiders' 56-10 rout of Eastern Washington three weeks ago, but he will face a much better defense this



time around. My pick, Houston 34, Texas Tech 30

TCU at Oklahoma State - The Horned Frogs take a step up in competition when they take on an Oklahoma State team that has one of the most prolific offenses in the country. In their first two games, Mike Gundy's Cowboys have scored 104 points (they played at Pittsburgh in Week 3) behind the passing of quarterback Mason Rudolph (638 yards passing, 6 TDs) and the receiving of James Washington (8 receptions, 243 yards, 3 TDs). OSU will face a TCU defense that allowed just seven points in its first two games (they played long-time rival SMU in Week 3). Something has to give this week and I think it will be the TCU defense. OSU is so balanced on offense that defenses can't concentrate on only shutting down the pass. The Cowboys have a strong running game as well. Look for OSU to open Big 12 play with an impressive win over the Horned Frogs. My pick, Oklahoma State 41, TCU 23

Penn State at Iowa - Penn State is another team that is loaded on offense. They have an excellent quarterback in Trace McSorley (444 yards passing, 5 TDs) and perhaps the best running back in the country in Saquon Barkley (260 yards rushing, 3 TDs). The Nittany Lions face their first road test when they travel to Iowa City to take on a Hawkeyes team that won its first two games of the season. Two weeks ago, Iowa pulled out a 44-41 overtime thriller against in-state rival Iowa State. They face a much tougher task this week when a loaded Penn State team comes calling. Penn State wants to get off to a solid start in Big 10 play and they should accomplish that task this week. My pick, Penn State 31, Iowa 18

NFL

Baltimore vs. Jacksonville - The Ravens and Jags travel to

London for the first of three games across the Pond this season. The Baltimore defense looked very good in their 20-0 road win in Week 1 at Cincinnati, as did the Jacksonville defense in its 29-7 win at Houston in Week 1. The Jags recorded 10 sacks, forced four turnovers and returned a Tom Savage fumble for a touchdown in their big win over the Texans. Joe Flacco returned at quarterback for the Ravens and had a so-so game throwing for 121 yards and a touchdown in Week 1. The Jags got a nice effort from rookie running back Leonard Fournette in their win over the Texans. The speedster from LSU rushed for 100 yards and scored a touchdown in Week 1. He will face a much tougher test in Week 3 against a Baltimore defense that looked like its old dominating self in Week 1. My pick, Baltimore 20, Jacksonville 17

Atlanta at Detroit - The defending NFC champs play their second road game in three weeks and take on a Detroit team that opened the season with a 35-23 win over at home against Arizona. The Falcons struggled at Chicago and needed a late goal line stand to eke past the pesky Bears, 23-17 in Week 1. Atlanta quarterback Matt Ryan will need to play a lot better than he did against the Bears when he faces a solid Detroit defense in the Motor City. Atlanta's defense will also have its hands full with Lions QB Matthew Stafford. After a slow start, Stafford rallied the Lions with four touchdown passes as Detroit pulled away for the win. Look for another big day from Stafford as the Lions pick up a big early-season victory. My pick, Detroit 24, Atlanta 20

Denver at Buffalo - The Broncos hit the road for the first time this season to play a Bills team that opened the season with a 21-12 win over the hapless Jets. Denver opened the season with a 24-21 victory on Monday Night Football against the Los Angeles Chargers as quarterback Trevor Siemian threw

two touchdown passes and ran for another. This will be a good road test for the Broncos. The Bills play tough at home and running back LeSean McCoy will give the Denver defense all it can handle, but look for the Denver defense to make a play or two late to pull out the win. My pick, Denver 23, Buffalo 19

Houston at New England - Just what the Texans need, a trip to New England that looked pedestrian in its season-opening loss to Kansas City. You can bet NE head coach Bill Belichick will have things worked out when the Texans arrive on Sunday. In the season-opening loss, the defense got little pressure on KC quarterback Alex Smith and he burned the NE defense for two long scoring passes. Look for the Patriots to get their linebackers more involved in the pass rush. If the Texans don't fix their offensive line problems, it's going to be another long day for the hometown team. And then there's Tom Brady to deal with as well. Look for Brady and the offense to play much better in their second home game as they roll through the Texans. My pick, New England 36, Houston 17

New York Giants at Philadelphia - The Giants and Eagles play in a key NFC East contest with the Giants knowing a second division loss three weeks into the season would be detrimental to their hopes of winning the division. The Giants offense struggled in Week 1 against the Cowboys and only mustered a field goal in their 19-3 loss in Arlington. Quarterback Eli Manning struggled without talented wide receiver Odell Beckham Jr. The offensive line had trouble protecting Manning and if that unit plays as poorly as it did in Week 1, the Eagles defense will have a field day against the immobile Manning. The Eagles opened the season with an impressive 30-17 win at Washington as second-year quarterback Carson Wentz threw for 307 yards and two touchdowns. Look for another big day from Wentz as the Eagles make things miserable for the Giants. My pick, Philadelphia 31, New York Giants 20

Seattle at Tennessee - Seattle hits the road for the second time in three weeks as they pay a visit to Tennessee. Neither team's offense played well in their season opener as the Seahawks produced only three field goals in their 17-9 loss at Green Bay. Seattle is another team that has issues in the offensive line. It's a

good thing they have a mobile quarterback in Russell Wilson. The Titans produced one touchdown in their 26-16 home loss to Oakland. The Titans need to get their running game going, and that won't be easy to do against a Seattle front seven that is one of the best in the NFL. Look for the Seattle defense to be the difference maker in this one as the Seahawks pick up a big road win. My pick, Seattle 23, Tennessee 16

Oakland at Washington - The Raiders also hit the road for the second time in three weeks as they take on the Redskins on Sunday Night Football. Oakland opened the season with a win at Tennessee as quarterback Derek Carr threw for 262 yards and two touchdowns. Washington quarterback Kirk Cousins struggled in his season debut against the Eagles, throwing one interception and losing a fumble that resulted in a Philly touchdown. The Redskins aren't a very good team at this point in the season, so look for the Raiders to continue their rough start to the 2017 season. My pick, Oakland 27, Washington 17

Dallas at Arizona - The Cowboys and Cardinals close out Week 3 on Monday Night Football which will be Dallas' second straight road game west (they played at Denver in Week 2). The Cowboys opened the season with a 19-3 win at home against the Giants as the defense led the way to the victory. Quarterback Dak Prescott appeared to be a bit too pumped up early as many of his passes missed their mark to Dallas receivers. He recovered nicely and finished the game with 268 yards passing and one touchdown. Running back Ezekiel Elliott helped the cause with 104 yards on the ground. There's no telling if Elliott will be on the field for this game because the NFL is pursuing its legal options after Elliott was granted a court injunction to play this season and not begin serving the league-mandated six-game suspension. We know the Cardinals will be without superstar running back David Johnson, who sustained a dislocated left wrist in the season opener at Detroit. Johnson could miss a number of weeks, which will put more pressure on quarterback Carson Palmer. Palmer had a rough opener, throwing three interceptions in the 35-23 loss to the Lions. The Cowboys have struggled at Arizona in the past, but look for them to pull this one out behind the legs and arm of Prescott. My pick, Dallas 24, Arizona 21

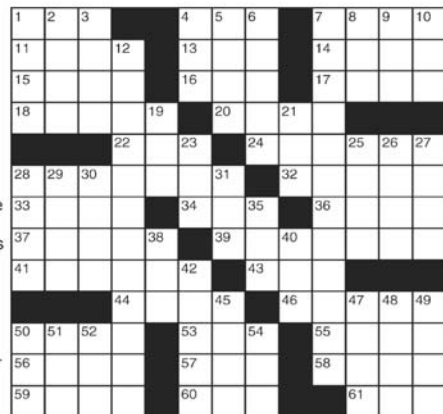

Crime Stoppers reward for looters of Sports store

Crime Stoppers and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) need information that leads to the identification and charging of suspect responsible for looting a sporting goods store in the 10300 block of North Freeway.

At approximately 6:35 am on August 27, 2017 a white male entered the sporting goods store during Hurricane Harvey while the store was closed. The suspect forced entry to the building with a vehicle. Once he was inside, the suspect stole 12 firearms as well as additional prop-

erty.

"We find it reprehensible that anyone would take advantage of a hurricane that is affecting thousands of lives by stealing firearms from a business. ATF is working tirelessly to find and hold the persons responsible for this crime accountable," said ATF Houston Field Division Special Agent in Charge Fred Milanowski.

The suspect is described as a white male 20-28 years of age, 5'7"-5'10" tall, 150-170 pounds, with a dark, short military-style fade haircut. The suspect

entered the store wearing black shorts, a black t-shirt, and black sneakers. He left the store wearing a black Adidas track suit with white stripes down the side that he stole from the store and put on over his existing clothes.

Crime Stoppers will pay up to \$11,000 for information leading to the charging and/or arrest of the suspect in this case.

Reward increased for looters of Pawn shop

Crime Stoppers and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives (ATF) need information that leads to the identification and charging of suspects responsible for looting a pawn/cash lending company located in the 7000 block of Tidwell Road.

Numerous individuals were seen on surveillance footage looting the business on August 27, 2017 during Hurricane Harvey while the store was closed. At 11:32 am two unknown black males gained access to the safe room and stole 84 firearms, including ri-

fles, shotguns, and pistols.

"To break into a business and steal firearms and other property during a natural disaster is unconscionable and ATF has our people on the ground working to hold those persons responsible for this crime accountable," said ATF Houston Field Division Special Agent in Charge Fred Milanowski.

Suspect #1 is described as a 17-25 years of age, 5'6" to 5'9" tall, 145-175 pounds, wearing shorts and sandals with a white t-shirt wrapped around his head.

Suspect #2 is described as 17-25 years of age, 5'11"-6'2" tall, wearing shorts, black sandals, multi colored beanie with long strings.

Crime Stoppers will pay up to \$15,000 for information leading to the charging and/or arrest of the suspect in this case.
