County Commissioner Ellis applauds 5th Circuit ruling on bail case

Harris County Commissioner Rodney Ellis applauded a federal appeals court that ruled Wednesday the county's wealth-based bail policy violates the Constitution because it jails misdemeanor defendants simply because they cannot pay money bail.

A three-judge panel of

the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals largely ruled against Harris County in an appeal that the county brought in O'Donnell v. Harris County. In an opinion drafted by Judge Edith Brown Clement, the appellate court held, "We are satisfied that the court had sufficient evidence to conclude that Harris County's use of secured bail violated equal protection." The



Investigation into fatal crash at West Little York

Houston police are investigating a fatal crash at 4300 West Little York Road about 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, February 14.

According to HPD Vehicular Crimes Division Sergeant F. Briones and Officer D. Rodriguez, the victim was operating an orange Suzuki GSX 1300 motorcycle westbound on

West Little York Road. The driver of a red Toyota Rav4 was traveling southbound on Arbor Oak Lane, failed to yield right-of-way leaving a stop sign at the intersection of West Little York and was struck by the motorcycle. The victim died at the scene. The female driver of the Toyota,

showed no immediate signs of intoxication.

No charges have been filed at this time, as the investigation is continuing.

The identity of the male victim, 40, is pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Foren-

Two charged in fatal shooting at Crosstimbers

Charges have been filed against two women arrested in the fatal shooting of a man at 525 Crosstimbers about 1 p.m. on December 17, 2017

Kaila Alexine Nelson, 23, is charged with capital murder and Dinesha Renee Jackson, 23, is charged with aggravated robbery with a deadly weapon.

in the killing of Dequan Donte Anderson, 20, who was pronounced dead at Lyndon B. Johnson General Hospital.

According to Houston Police Officials Mr Anderson got into his car at his place of employment and was taking a money bag from the store to the bank when he was approached by an unknown suspect. The suspect opened Anderson's car door and tried to grab the money bag. The

suspect then pulled out a pistol and fired multiple rounds into the vehicle striking Anderson multiple times. Anderson attempted to drive away and crashed his car into a nearby median. He was trans-ported to LBJ Hospital where he later died from his wounds.

Multiple witnesses stated the suspect ran north on Oxford and got into a dark blue Dodge Avenger. which then fled the scene.

Further investigation led to the identities of Nelson and Jackson as suspects in this case. Nelson was identified as the shooter and was arrested in Marietta, Georgia, on February 7. She confessed to her role in the incident.

On February 14, investigators arrested Jackson in Houston. Jackson con fessed to her role in the robbery/shooting.

and directed U.S. District Judge Lee Rosenthal to craft a narrower injunction. However, the appeals court judges held that the county must follow Judge Rosenthal's injunctive pro-cedures until she crafts new procedures that more directly address the constitutional violations.

"With this decision, the conservative 5th Circuit is telling Harris County that it's unconstitutional to have two justice systems: one for the rich and one for the poor," Commissioner Ellis said. "Yet Harris County has already spent more than \$5 million defending a morally and legally indefensible bail system that violates the Constitution and punishes people simply because they are poor. The ruling is a significant victory for justice and offers further proof that it is time for this lawsuit and enact meaningful reforms that treat all people equally and fairly under the law."

tered a preliminary injunction against Harris County last April after finding that the county treats indigent misdemeanor defendants

unequally solely because they cannot afford money bail. She further found that Harris County's pretrial detention procedures for misdemeanor cases lack due process because defendants are not informed of the significance of being able to afford money bail. Her preliminary injunction required Sheriff Gonzalez to release indigent misdemeanor defendants within 24 hours of arrest if they could not afford to post a money bond.

The bail lawsuit was brought in May 2016 by Maranda Lynn $O'Donnell, who \, spent \, more$ than two days in jail because she could not afford \$2,500 bond after being arrested on charges of driving with an invalid license. Her lawsuit was merged with another lawsuit filed by two misdemeanor defendants Harris County to settle Loetha Shanta McGruder and Robert Ryan Ford, who were locked up when they could not afford money bail. Last year, Com-Judge Rosenthal en- missioner Ellis filed an amicus brief in Judge Rosenthal's court that discussed Harris County's history of discriminatory treatment of poor defen-

dants of color and that agreed with the O'Donnell plaintiffs' assertions that the bail scheme is unconstitutional.

In addition to Judge Clement, the three-judge panel that ruled on the county's appeal also con-sisted of Edward Prado and Catharina Haynes. The county now can seek permission for rehearing of its appeal by that panel or to have its appeal heard by all the judges on the 5th Circuit. It also can seek permission to have the 5th-Circuit's decision reviewed by the U.S. Supreme Court.

Judge Rosenthal stated in her April order that she would schedule a trial on the merits of the lawsuit, but also warned that the plaintiffs have a great like-lihood of winning that trial. The trial is expected to be scheduled soon.

Commissioner Ellis stated, "With regard to the remedy. I am confident that once additional evidence has been presented, the federal courts will implement a bail system in Harris County that's protects the constitutional rights of everyone.3

Rep. Gene Green opposes Bill to undermine Americans with Disabilities Act

WASHINGTON, DC - February 15, 2018 - Representatives Gene Green (TX-29), issued the following statement after voting against legislation that would weaken the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA):

"I am deeply disappointed that my Republican colleagues voted today to roll back basic rights for disabled Americans. taking a major step backwards as a country. Ensuring basic accommodations for all Americans, including Americans with disabilities, ought to be a biparti-

san issue. Despite being aimed at the very small number of abusive ADA suits brought by lawyers rather than disabled persons, this bill makes no attempt to distinguish between legitimate ADA suits and suits brought by non-disabled, repeat complainants. All it does is remove any incentive for businesses to proactively comply with ADA access requirements, and weaken the access standard under the ADA while having no effect on lawsuits that seek damages under state, not federal,

Reasons why hiring older employees is a smart decision

In the 2015 movie The Intern, Robert DeNiro starred as a 70year-old widower who returns to the workforce as an underappreciated and seemingly out-of-step intern working for a young boss played by Anne Hathaway.

Initially, Hathaway's character can't quite relate to this baby boomer who ditched retirement out of boredom, but by the film's finale she comes to appreciate his skills and experience.

In real life you're unlikely to encounter many septuagenarian interns, but it's not unusual for people to re-enter the labor market or launch new careers when they are well into what was once considered retirement age.

And that can be good for businesses that are willing to take advantage of all those decades of hard-earned experience, says Andrew Simon, a partner in Simon Associate Management Consultants (www.simonassociates.net) who himself is in his

"Starting a new career after 60 is not for everyone," Simon says. "But it can be rewarding for those with energy and commitment levels that are high, and who are willing to learn new skills and keep up with the constantly evolving technology.'

The question is whether businesses will balk at hiring workers who, in many cases, are old enough to be the parents of the people supervising them. Sure there are downsides, Simon says, but the upsides can be tremendous when it's the right fit for the right person.

He says a few things businesses should keep in mind as they weigh whether to hire older workers include:

• Experience counts.

Baby boomers come to the table with a whole set of experiences, including 30 or 40 years of interpersonal people skills that make them more adept at dealing with unique situations or different types of people. "On the flip side," Simon says, some of them could lack the technical skills that we take for granted in today's workforce So, be careful what you are asking them to do.

- Self-motivation. The odds are older employees will be self-motivated. "If these potential workers would like to join an organization or start a new career after 60, they probably like the idea of work," Simon says. "They need to do something every day. Perhaps they view their job as intellectually stimulating." You do need to make sure of their motivation, though, he says. If they're just working for a paycheck, that might not cut it.
- Different age groups have their own behaviors. Baby boomers often have a very different set of values than millennials. "Different things motivate them," Simon says. "The culture of an organization is very important and can be tricky. You want to make sure these older workers have an opportunity to thrive in your new environment." While it's best to avoid stereotyping the generations too much, in general baby boomers tend to be productive, loyal to the company, willing to put in long hours to get the job done and prefer to have conversations in person.

"Companies that pass on hiring older workers risk missing out on people who could become some of their most valuable employees," Simon says. "Age shouldn't be the issue. Instead, as with any hire, the issue is what skills and experiences each of these people can bring to the workforce.



Legislation passed by Congress includes hurricane relief funds

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Feb. 9 lauded Congress' passage of budget legislation that contains nearly \$90 billion in hurricane and wildfire disaster relief funding for Texas, Florida, California and Puerto Rico.

Hurricane Harvey pounded Texas from Aug. 25-31, resulting in disaster status for some 60 counties. The federal Office of Coastal Manage-ment has estimated the total cost of Harvey at \$125 billion. Cost estimates by various other organizations have reached as high as \$200

billion.

"The much-needed funding included in the bill for flood mitigation projects, housing and infrastructure repairs will provide a meaningful benefit to Texas. — Authorizes \$10 million for the Ready Reserve Fleet port facility in Beaumont damaged by Hurri-

cane Harvey. On Feb. 8, Texas' junior U.S. senator, Republican Ted Cruz, commented: "After much consideration, I will reluctantly vote for this legislation. This bill contains major victories; if hurricane relief and restoring vital defense spending were the only elements of this bill. I would be supporting it energetically and enthusiastically. Unfortunately, in addition to funding those critical priorities, this bill also unnecessarily balloons the deficit."

Comptroller to send

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Feb. 7 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special pur-pose taxing districts \$911.9 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of February.

The amount is 6.2 percent more than was distributed in February 2017. The allocations are based on sales made in December by businesses that report tax monthly; October, November and December sales by quarterly filers; and 2017 sales by businesses that report tax annually, Hegar said

AG seeks election

safeguards Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Feb. 5 sent a letter to state Sen. Bryan Hughes, R-Mineola, chair of the Senate Select Committee on Election Integrity, announcing a voter-fraud

initiative.

The letter mentions the Office of the Attorney General's "brief investiga-tive survey" of four coun-ties where "165 where unlawfully registered non-citizens had been removed from the voter rolls after casting 100 illegal votes in Texas elections in

the last two years." And, after stating that the Office of the Attorney General "is unable to determine the scope of non-citizens voting across Texas," Paxton refers to "the lack of safeguards in the voting system to detect ineligible voters." He suggests additional measures to address mail-in ballot fraud and the use of public funds for political activity

Accreditations are released

The Texas Education Agency on Feb. 9 released accreditation statuses for school districts and charter schools across the state.

These statuses are based on state academic accountability ratings, the Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas data reporting, special program effectiveness and compliance with statutory and regulatory requirements.

Statuses for the 2017-2018 school year for 1,201 Texas school districts and charter schools are as follows: Accredited (1,185); Accredited-Warned (9): Accredited-Probation (2); Not Accredited-Revoked (4); and Pending (1).

Does the CFTC over Bitcoin?

The CFTC's jurisdiction is implicated when a virtual currency is used in a derivatives contract, such as futures or options contracts. The CFTC's oversight over commodity cash markets is limited. The CFTC maintains general anti-fraud and manipulation enforcement authority over virtual currency cash markets as a commodity in interstate

What risks come with virtual currencies?

While virtual currencies may have potential benefits. purchasing virtual currencies on the cash marketspending dollars to purchase Bitcoin for your personal wallet for example—comes with a number of significant risks, including:

- Most cash markets are not regulated or supervised by a federal government agency.
- Platforms in the cash market may lack system safeguards, including customer protections
- Cash market manipula tion.
- Platforms selling from their own accounts and putting customers at a disadvantage.
- · Price volatility risks. · Cybersecurity risks.
