School districts deal with threats, including Aldine

HARRIS COUNTY – Following the school shooting in Santa Fe last week, authorities report that there has been an increase in threats recorded across many

schools in the county.

At least seven school districts in the area have had to deal with threats, by searching for senders, sending additional police, and hardening security features. Districts with problems included Clear Creek and Huffman, where students had guns, Cleveland where a student had a gun replica, and YES Prep West, Crosby, La Marque, and Aldine where threats were recorded.

The Harris County District Attorney's office has reported that they filed charges against 24 students since last week's shooting at Santa Fe. Most of these were against kids whose ages were from 12 to 16, but

some were as young as 10.

Run-off election sets slate for November, Cantu wins position

The May 22nd Run-off election only turned out about 1.5% of the eligible voters, but the results were significant for several rac-

es of local interest.
For Harris County School Trustee at Large, Richard Cantu won his race against Josh Wallen-stein. Although it was a nail-biter, with the lead changing all night, nevertheless when all the votes were counted, Cantu had 50.25% or 26,014 votes, and Wallenstein had 49.75% or 25,780 votes. Cantu will go on to chal-lenge the Republican candidate in the general election in November.

MacArthur dance instructor and students explore the Immigrant Experience in 'Tortillas y lágrimas'

Why do people leave their homeland? What hardships do immigrants endure or experience? How do families handle the separation? How do you navigate a new language and culture without forgetting your roots and heritage?
These are some of the

questions that choreogra-pher Elisa de la Rosa asked herself and her col-laborators when they began to work on Tortillas v lágrimas (Tortillas and Tears). The multimedia project ran April 6 and 7 at Teatro Bilingüe de Hous-

ton.

De la Rosa's family has its own immigrant story. In the 1950s, her grandparents left Mexico for Texas. They were not fleeing persecution or seeking asylum; they came to have a better life for herself and her children. Their journey involved hardships as they made their way to their new home.

Contemplating this sto-ry is what planted the seed for de la Rosa's ambitious performance piece. Torti-llas y lágrimas is a dance concert that is inspired by her research about Mexicans and Mexican Americans in the United States.

Joining her on the journey to bring the dance concert to fruition were students from MacArthur Ninth Grade School and MacArthur High School. The young dancers form part of the De La Rosa Dance Company. De la Rosa is the company's artistic director and choreographer. She is also the dance educator at the

ninth grade campus.
She also collaborated with filmmaker Kassandra Sánchez-Alvarado to merge dance improvisation with digital media. The duo previously worked together. De la Rosas' Inmigrante includes a dance film documenting the pro-cess of migrating across the Rio Grande made with Sánchez-Alvarado. The film was shown at the Midtown Arts & Theater Center Houston or the MATCH on October 3, 2017. Inmigrante centers on the sacrifices made by Mexican immigrants. The film was incorporated into Tortillas y lágrimas.

Tortillas y lágrimas was de la Rosa's thesis presentation. De la Rosa will soon graduate with a master of fine arts in dance from Montclair State University in New Jersey. Professor and dance director Lor-raine Katterhenry re-viewed Tortillas y lágrimas. The hour-long performance included 12 dances scenes. It proved to

Click It or Ticket Mobilization...

What's free, takes just seconds, and prevents one of the leading causes of death?

Taking those few seconds to buckle your seat belt is the most crucial step you can take to protect yourself in a crash. Those few seconds can save your life and save your friends and family from having to go through a needless tragedv. Fortunately, most Texans now buckle up, but some groups of motorists continue not taking the message to heart by not consistently using their seat belts. The demographic of motorist most likely to be unrestrained are men and young adults, especially pickup truck drivers and their passengers. In 2016, the use of seat belts in passenger vehicles saved an estimated 14,668 lives of occupants ages 5 and older. Sadly, in 2016, there were 10,428 unbuckled passenger vehicle occu-pants killed in crashes in

the United States. In Texas, among teens ages 13-to-15 years old, 62 percent of passenger vehicle occupants who were killed in traffic crashes were not using restraints in 2016. Nationally, among young adults 18-to-34 years old killed in crashes in 2016, more than half (57 percent) were completely unrestrained — one of the highest percentages for all age groups. And, men make up the majority of those killed in motor vehi-cle traffic crashes. In 2016, 65 percent of the 23,714 passenger vehicle occupants who were killed were men. It comes as no sur-

prise that men wear their seat belts at a lower rate than women do — 52 percent of men in fatal crashes were unrestrained, compared to 40 percent of

women.

Buckling up is not just important during the day time. Between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. is when more crashes and fatalities happen. Crash stats from the Texas Department of Transportation show that the majority (57 percent) of fa-tal crashes in Texas happen at night. In 2017, of all Texas crashes in which people died and weren't wearing a seat belt, 57 percent of those happened at night as well. It is important to wear your seat belt, day and night, to be protected in the event of a

Unbuckled passengers are also dangerous to others in the vehicle. In the event of a crash, the unbuckled passenger become a large projectile flying around the vehicle who can injure or kill other occu-pants in the vehicle — including those who are buckled up!

Here are some of the

myths about seat belts:

• Vehicle type: There seems to be a misconception among those who drive and ride in pickup trucks that their large vehicles will protect them better than other vehicles would in a crash The numbers say otherwise. Nationally, 61 percent of pickup truck occupants who were killed in 2016 were not buckled up. That's compared to 42 percent of passenger car occupants who were not wearing seat

belts when they were killed. Regardless of vehi-cle type, seat belt use is the single most effective way to stay alive in a crash.

 Seating position: Too many people wrongly believe they are safe in the back seat unrestrained. Forty-seven percent of all front-seat passenger vehi-cle occupants killed in crashes in 2016 were un-restrained, but 57 percent of those killed in back seats were unrestrained.

• Rural versus urban locations: People who live in rural areas might believe that their crash expo-sure is lower, but in 2016, there were 13,732 passen-ger vehicle fatalities in rural locations, compared to 9,366 fatalities in urban locations. Out of those fatalities, 49 percent of those killed in the rural locations were not wearing their seat belts, compared to 46

percent in urban locations.
Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service Family and Community Health Agent, Alexis Cordova, from Liberty County, reminds drivers that this year's "Click It or Ticket" Campaign is scheduled for May 21 – June 3, which in-cludes Memorial Day weekend. During this time extra law enforcement will be on the road day and night enforcing the seat belt and child restraint laws in an effort to save lives. Those officers are not out to write tickets, but instead want to help prevent the needless tragedy of motor vehicle accidents.

Remember: Buckle up day and night and save your life — not just during "Click It or Ticket," but every day of the year!

next shooter is going to be. In Aldine, channel 26 Fox new's Randy Wallace reported that a student, Warnesha Crawford, hadd received a threatening text from a fellow student that she claimed had been bullying her. She identified the student to school authorities, but her mother claimed they did not take the appropriate action, and the sender was still in

Aldine ISD officials is

sued a statement saving they were aware of the sit-uation and were handling it according to the "student code of conduct." Fox26 said they were attempting to determine where the texts originated. The AISD statement said "Aldine ISD Police are conducting an on-going investigation re-lated to this incident." Reportedly the Police have confiscated the cell phone of the sender.

Aldine ISD also said they had installed metal detectors in all intermediate, junior and senior high schools entrances. Schools also have secure vestibules, he said. Other security mea-

sures that have been implemented at other campuses include the banning of backpacks, and a ban on trench coats and other heavy clothing that could potentially conceal

Recommendations from Governor Abbott include the use of metal detectors at school entrances.

Bonding Against Adversity focused to imporve family life

Bonding Against Adversity has been presenting parenting programs in Aldine since 2010. These programs are focused in improving the family life and the wellness of the children and all the other family members. Last Tuesday we have finished with great success a series of six sessions of parenting programs at Hambrick Middle School. These included: Discipline Without Punishment, Stress Man-agement for Parents and Children, Cultural Diversity and Children, Building Positive Self-Esteem, and Building Positive Families Based on the Needs and Behavior of Their Children. We fin-ished the programs with a general review of the most important factors that parents need to consider to support the positive development of their children. These programs were presented in English and Spanish and the materials were prepared exclusively for Bonding Against Adversity by Mrs. Martha R. Mallory to support our mission to educate and help the families of the community. Mrs. Mallory has more than 21 years of experience educating and helping families in the area of Klein I.S.D.

Now, as a retired educator, she is sharing her experience with the families of Aldine I.S.D. of the programs the fami-lies had the opportunity to give their testimony and share their experiences about how these programs have helped or improved the relationships between family members and chil-dren and parents. Following are some of their comments:

• Some parents said: "We thought that attending a two-hour program was too long. However, after the first presentation, we realized that the time went by too fast and the information was so helpful that we wanted to stay for a longer period of time."

• Other parents said:

"After Huracan Harvey, life changed for us and for all the families and we had no support or guidance. These programs have helped us to handle better the problems that we are facing."

• Mrs. Rodriguez said:

"We believe that the fami-ly is very important but we do not have anybody to help us solve our problems. When we came to the first program, our family had a big problem with one of our children. During the program the educator talked about the importance of unconditional love and that we should love our children for who they are and not for what they do or according to their behavior. My husband and I

During the last session attended all the sessions to learn more.

Some mothers said "We liked the educational games that we learned, especially the "Bingo". Now we use it in our home with great results.

• Mrs. Sugg said: "Now all the members of our family eat dinner together every day and we talk and everyone shares about what happened during that day. Also, now I know how to praise and discipline my children."
• Several parents said:

"We are very grateful to Bonding Against Adversity because they have helped us to become more confident in ourselves and our children have now more opportunities to be involved in school and at church."

Harris County releases Hurricane Harvey "After Action Report"

 $(Houston,\ TX)$ - The Harris County Office of Homeland Security & Emergency Management (HCOHSEM) has released its Hurricane Harvey After Action Report (AAR) which reviews the county's overall response efforts. Some of the items listed are quick fixes, while others will require a major longterm investment of time

and money. "Planning and practice pay off, but real events show how ready we truly are," said Harris County Judge Ed Emmett. "Hurricane Harvey's test of our emergency response highlighted remarkable successes and areas for improvement. Applying those lessons will certain ly make us better prepared for the next disaster.'

The AAR was created with the input and collaboration of numerous local, state, federal, private and non-profits organizations. According to the report, the overall response and recovery efforts by HCOHSEM and its partners demon

strated professional and well-practiced levels of planning, coordination and collaboration.

Some of the major strengths that were listed as sustains include:

• Pre-positioning county, state, and federal assets enabled quick deployment

· Pairing civilians and resources with skilled professionals to assist with rescue operations

• Utilization of First Contact Program to provide immediate essentials

· Support from regional public safety information officers in the Regional Joint Information Center

The report also identified some primary areas for improvement includ-

 Developing a countywide Continuity Of Operations Plan

· Training non-traditional support personnel who may be involved in disaster response operations

• Transitioning from response to recovery operations in the Emergency Operations Center

• Working with the City of Houston to address the current Donations Management strategy

"The Harvey report represents a substantial effort by both the county and its partners, but it is only one of many tools we will use to better serve our residents," added Judge Emmett. "Many of the lessons outlined in the report are already in place, and the process for identifying the

next steps continues." Furthermore, Harris County also conducted an AAR on Regional Joint Information Center operations, and other county departments have conducted internal reviews as

While Harris County works to improve its response to future disasters, it continues to focus on the long road to recovery facing our most devastated communities.

Man charged in string of aggravated robberies

Harris County Sheriff's Office investigators with the Violent Crimes unit have filed 2 counts of aggravated robbery with a deadly weapon on a 20year-old male, after robbing several victims with a shotgun.

Investigators say that John Michael Medina,19, is responsible for at least four aggravated robberies in north east Harris county. The robberies all occurred on Sunday May 20,

Medina robbed a male as he was getting out of his vehicle in the 10800 block of Airline drive.

He pointed a shotgun at the male and demanded his wallet and jewelry. The complainant was able to give a good description of Medina's clothing and his gray colored four door sedan he was driving.

A short time later, a second complainant was robbed by Medina in the 10700 block of the North

That male was walking to his vehicle from a local electronics store and was approached by Medina. He pointed a shotgun at him and demanded his wallet and cell phone.

The second complainant's description of Medina's clothing matched that of the first robbery victim.

He was able to get the license plate of the gray colored sedan that Medina fled in.

Investigators and HCSO District 2 patrol deputies went to his home in the 700 block of Corvette Ct were they found the vehicle that he used during the robberies.

Medina was found sitting in another vehicle in the driveway of the residence.

During a search of the suspects' vehicle, several items belonging to various

They included a wallet and a distinctive gold necklace that one of the com-

plainants was wearing. The shotgun used was also recovered.

Investigators are interviewing other victims that Medina robbed, and will be presenting their cases the District Attorney's Office for additional charges.

He is currently being held in the Harris County Sheriff's Office Detention facility on a \$100,000

Gov. Greg Abbott ordered flags to half-staff until May 22 in memory of those who lost their lives in what he called "probably the worst disaster to strike this community."

During a news conference at the high school, Abbott said he plans to work with members of the Texas Legislature and with educators, parents and students across Texas "on swift solutions to prevent tragedies like this from ever happening again." He mentioned background checks and "strategies to keep guns out of the hands of those who pose an immediate danger to others." He also suggested more safety personnel and mental health intervention capabilities on school campus-

"In the fog of the aftermath of a catastrophe like this, the answers are not always immediate, but the answers will come by us working together,' Abbott said.

AG Paxton reminds Texans of May 31 deadline to claim Western Union refunds

Austin, TX. May 21, 2018 – Attorney General Ken Paxton today reminded Texans of the May 31 deadline to submit claims in a \$586 million settlement with Western Union affecting consumers who were deceived into sending payments to scam artists using the company's wire transfer service. As many as 39,000 Texans are eligible for refunds.

Texans who were tricked into sending funds via Western Union and qualify for refunds deserve justice, but many may not know about this opportunity," Attorney General Paxton said. "My office is reminding affected consumers that May 31 is the deadline to submit a claim so they can get back funds lost to wire transfer scams.

Texans who were a victim of a fraudinduced wire transfer using Western Union between January 1, 2004, and January 19, 2017, may file a claim online at http:// www.westemunionremission.com.

Last year, Attorney General Paxton announced a multistate settlement with Western Union over complaints by people who were tricked into using the company's wire transfer service to send money to third parties involved in various schemes to defraud consumers. Western Union agreed to establish an anti-fraud program to deter such criminal activity in the

The settlement is being administered by the U.S. Department of Justice's Victim Asset Recovery Program, which will be reviewing all claims submitted by consumers. The global settlement requiring Western Union to forfeit \$586 million dollars was entered with the Federal Trade Commission and Department of Justice. The multistate settlement included Texas, 49 other states and the District of Columbia.



Hundreds of family members, friends, past and present school board members, school administrators, parents and community members gathered on Sunday, May 20 to honor former Aldine ISD Trustee Rick Ogden at the dedication ceremony renaming Rayford Road Intermediate School Rick Ogden Elementary School.

Mr. Ogden served as a Trustee for 26 years. When he resigned in November of 2016, Mr. Ogden was one of the longest serving board members in the history of Aldine ISD.

He was appointed to the Board in August of 1990 to fill the unexpired term of Walter Stovall. He was elected to the Position 4 seat in January of 1991 and held the seat until he resigned from the Board in November of 2016.

Mr. Ogden was part of a team that was responsible for the district earning Unitary Status, which allowed Aldine students to be educated in schools closer to their homes. Other highlights included Aldine being named the winner of the H-E-B Excellence in Education Award for large school districts in 2008, winning the Broad Prize for Urban Education in 2009 and the H-E-B Excellence in Education Early

Childhood Award in 2015. He was also part of a team that saw the passage of a \$798 million bond referendum, the largest in the history of Aldine ISD, which provided for the construction of new schools, new facilities and the renovations of existing cam-

Mr. Ogden was well-respected by the many Board members he served with during his 26 year tenure. but he was also well-respected across the state as a member of the Texas Association of School Boards. Mr. Ogden earned the title Master Trustee, served as a TASB director and served as president of TASB. He held all offices in TASB and served as the manager of the TASB Risk Management Fund Board as well as a trainer for The Center for the Reform of School Systems. Today, Mr. Ogden con-

tinues to work with school boards in Texas and other states as a Governance Solutions Specialist.

A native Houstonian, Mr. Ogden and his wife Charlotte have 4 children, all of whom attended Aldine ISD schools. He and Charlotte owned and operated Ogden Manufacturing and he later served Houston Baptist University as assistant vice president for Church & Community Relations Director of Foundations & Denominational Relations and retired as Director of Special Projects for the Office of the President.

First, I thank God for this day and for the family he gave me," Mr. Ogden said. "I thank my beautiful wife, Charlotte, for her part in our journey as public servants - mine as an elected member of the Aldine School Board and other opportunities of service, and hers as the one who sacrificed time and for being loving, patient and willing to set her preferences aside in order that I could engage in my passion for school governance and public service."

Mr. Ogden said he enjoyed his years as a public servant and welcomed the call to serve as an advocate for education.

"I will always look back with great fondness and gentle reflection of my time in public service," he said. "In one of my numerous training opportunities, I remember hearing how public service is more than doing a job efficiently and honestly, it is doing a job with complete dedication to the people whom we

He closed his remarks thanking the current Board for honoring him by naming a school in his hon-

"Thank you, Board, for this high honor for which I am eternally grateful and humbled," Mr. Ogden said. "Your recognition of my years of volunteer and board service by naming this building in my honor will be reciprocated with continued service to Aldine – and in particular, this building that bears my name. I leave you with this passage from Philippians: "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you."

The dedication ceremony opened with the presentation of colors by the Teague Middle School LOTC. Student Tatiana Smith led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance and the Pledge to the Texas Flag. Dr. Mark Donaldson, son of former AISD Superintendent M.B. "Sonny" Donaldson, delivered the invocation, which was followed by a video high-lighting Mr. Ogden's years as a Trustee. The Rayford Road Choir, under the direction of Dana Gibson, performed a song, which was followed by a performance by the Rayford Dance Company, under the direction of Tamara Harper. Board President Steve

Professional TAEA members judge each student's artwork at the competition. They use a rating standard to award based on the quality of the work.

Students compete on three different experience levels depending on the student's grade level. All sixth grade students take part in Division I (White)

Seventh grade students compete in Division II (Red). All eighth grade students along with Pre-AP and IB students vie for honors in Division III $\,$ (Blue). Students receiving a Superior rating in each division receive an award.

A panel reviews all artwork receiving a Superi-or rating. A set percentage of artworks with Superior ratings re-ceived the coveted Platinum medal. TAEA will post images of these artworks on its website.
