Houston went wild last Wednesday night, when the Houston Astros defeated the Los Angeles Dodgers in the 7th and final game of the World Series, winning 5-1.

To fully enjoy the victory, the city shut down on Friday and held a parade through the city streets, culminating in a presentation and speeches of accolades on the steps of Houston City Hall. Police Chief Art Acevedo estimated that over 500,000, and perhaps as many as 1 million persons lined the streets as the Astros team, riding fire trucks, went down the parade route. The Houston ISD school district cancelled all classes on Friday, and students went to the parade.

(Harris County, TX) – The Harris County Citizen Corps Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program has reached a milestone of 30,000 trained members with the graduation of its latest students from the East Aldine District and Humble. The final exercise and graduation will take place on Monday, October 30th at 7 p.m. at the Harris County Fire and Sheriff's Training Academy, 2318 Atascocita Road in Humble, Texas.

The East Aldine District class is made up of 42 students from Benjamin O. Davis High School, ages 16 to 18. These students are also members of the Health Occupations Students of America and are avid volunteers in their community. The Humble class is composed of 21 students, mostly teachers, a nurse, a mother and son.

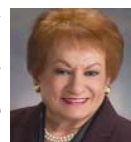

Aldine ISD students attend Career and Technical Education Expo

Gearing up for the next school year, the Career and Technical Education (CTE) Department recently hosted a CTE Expo at the M.O. Campbell Educational Center to show students what the District has to offer.

Several technical clubs and classes from across the District had booths and demonstrations for middle school students. The Expo showcased the District's CTE class options to encourage enrollment for the following school year. Everything from cooking to nursing was up for display providing information to students about their topics.

Ben Ibarra attended the event. As the principal of Dr. Archie L. Blanson CTE High School set to open in fall 2018, he and his staff shared information about the campus programs and how to apply for admission.

"I think it (Expo) went really well," said Ibarra. "These are the kinds of classes that prepare students for actual work after high school."

Middle school students talked to campus representatives including current CTE students from the various high schools. CTE students also provided presentations. There were also students from extracurricular clubs present. The event gave middle school students a strong sampling of the different career preparation opportunities they can experience in high school.

Classes like automotive, animation, welding and robotics were some of the student favorite booths at the expo. Some of the programs offer real-time job experience. Classes and clubs like FCCLA, DECA, JROTC and many others also held booths and demonstrations for students.

"A lot of the programs are gearing students toward certification," said Franklin Higgins, director CTE. "If they get fully certified, they're on top of the list of potential hires for businesses."

Eighth graders combed the expo searching for that program that sparked their interest. The annual expo, Higgins added, showcases what the schools have to offer students aside from traditional classes and activities.

"We hope the students gain a lot of knowledge," said Higgins. "The expo can lead toward classes students want to take and help them discover the kind of career they want."

According to Higgins, CTE can be an integral part of every student's education so they can graduate from high school globally competitive for work as well as prepare them for post-secondary education.

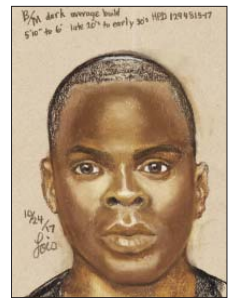

The Harris County Flood Control District has compiled a preliminary list of \$74 million in priority repairs for Harris County's bayous, creeks and other drainage infrastructure in the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey, according to a recently completed county-wide assessment that is expected to eventually top \$100 million. The Flood Control District has verified approximately 500 additional repair projects totaling more than 150 channel miles across Harris County's 22 watersheds. This map shows active and future projects.

Rep. Green on Ryan-McConnell Tax Plan: middle-class families will be hurt, wealthy will win

WASHINGTON, DC — Congressman Gene Green released the following statement on the release of the Ryan-McConnell tax plan:

"From what I've read so far, it's clear that the president and the Republican majority want to cut tax deductions for middle-class families to pay for tax cuts for the wealthy and corporations.

It's alarming that the plan will eliminate the deduction for personal casualty losses, which will be a big blow for many hurricane Harvey victims whose homes were damaged after one of the largest disasters in Texas' history. It's even more alarming that taxes for the smallest earners will increase from 10 per-

cent to 12 percent while the tax brackets for high earners stay the same. And for those who graduated college and are paying off their student loans debt, the tax plan will eliminate the student loan interest deduction.

It's estimated that the GOP plan will save the bottom 80 percent of earners between \$50 and \$450 in taxes per year, but that it saves each person in the top 1 percent of earners an average of \$129,000 a year. For people at the very top, the tax cuts are enormous. It's also not clear to me where the money to pay for these tax cuts will come from, and how we will continue to pay for infrastructure and social services when we add so much to the deficit with this plan.



Overall, I am not confident my constituents will be better off with this plan. There's more to learn about the details of this bill, but once we receive a score from the Congressional Budget Office we'll know more about the impacts of this bill."

State Sales Tax Revenue totaled nearly \$2.5 billion in October

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said today that state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.46 billion in October, 6.9 percent more than in October 2016.

"Sales tax revenue growth was led by receipts from the mining and manufacturing sectors," Hegar said. "Most of the other economic sectors, such as wholesale trade, retail trade, services and restaurants, also grew moderately compared to last year. In addition, Hurricane Harvey does not appear to

have had a significant net effect on state sales tax revenue."

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in October 2017 was up 5.2 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections. Motor vehicle sales and rental taxes, motor fuel taxes and oil and natural gas production taxes also are large revenue sources for the state.

In October 2017, Texas collected the following revenue from those taxes:

- motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$450.1 million, up 13.7 percent from October 2016. Those collections were boosted by the purchase of vehicles to replace cars damaged by Hurricane Harvey;
- motor fuel taxes — \$311.1 million, up 4.2 percent from October 2016; and
- oil and natural gas production taxes — \$288.6 million, up 28.9 percent from October 2016.

What the power of the Supreme Court means to you

(NAPSI)—From health care to civil rights, from abortion to marriage, the Supreme Court and its nine appointed members affect every major area of American life. Now, an insightful new book by best-selling author and Senior U.S. District Judge Ted Stewart explains just why that happened. The book shows the evolution of the Court's vastly expanded interpretation of law and illustrates the power of judicial review to make sweeping, often unforeseen changes in American society, decades Safter decisions are handed down.

Told through seven pivotal cases, it weaves the historical narrative into the legal basis for each decision and examines the far-reaching effects. Stewart explores such intriguing issues as the Court's role in sanctioning racism, why a nation founded by devout men and women banned religion from the public arena, and why justices can raise taxes, manage school districts and generally work their will.

Each chapter presents an easy-to-read brief on the case and explains what the decisions mean and how the Court ruling, often a 5-4 split, had long-term impact. For example, in *Lochner v. New York*, a widely accepted turn-of-the-20th-century New York State law limited excessive overtime for bakery workers. That law was overturned by the Court based on the due process clause of the Constitution. The very same

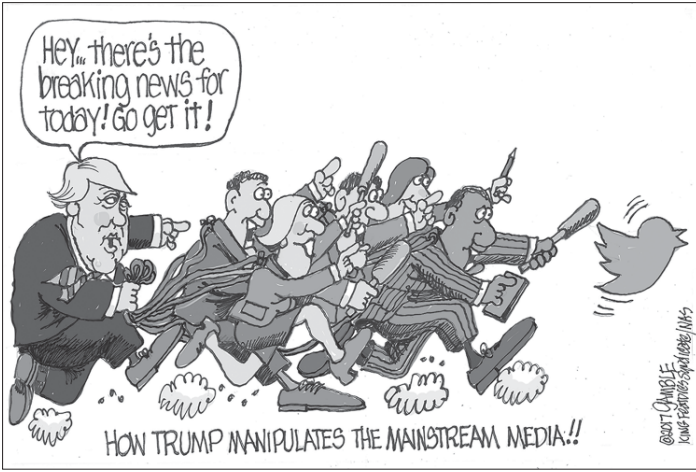
precedents, Stewart points out, were used by the Court 70 years later and expanded to a new right to privacy in *Roe v. Wade*, making abortion legal in the nation.

A thought-provoking and easily accessible read, "Supreme Power: 7 Pivotal Supreme Court Decisions That Had a Major Impact on America" (Shadow Mountain) also examines how the Court became so supreme and unexpectedly influential in American society and considers whether this was the intent of our Founding Fathers.

In an endorsement of the book, Jason Chaffetz said, "As a former congressman and Chairman of the Oversight and Government Reform Committee, I saw again and again how the balance of power has been tilted much too far toward the judicial. This important book addresses the imbalance with powerful examples that are easily understood and very informative. Everyone should read it."

With such issues as voting rights, free speech, religious freedom, immigration, taxes and search and seizure coming before the Court, the ideas the book provides can be more important to understand than ever.

Paxton asks high court to approve court-drawn House maps

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on Oct. 27 filed a brief urging the U.S. Supreme Court to reverse a lower court ruling that required nine of the state's 150 House districts to be redrawn.

In September, the U.S. Supreme Court temporarily stayed the federal district court's ruling. That allowed Texas to continue to use the existing maps while the redistricting case remains pending.

Candidate filings for the 2018 elections begin next month. Early primary voting begins in February.

"We're eager for the Supreme Court to review all the facts in this case, which are clearly on our side," Paxton said. "The portion of the House redistricting map invalidated by the lower court is the map the same court drew and approved in 2012 before the Legislature adopted it in 2013. It's been used in the last three election cycles in Texas, and there is no sound reason for that to change."

In a separate ruling, the Supreme Court also temporarily blocked a lower court ruling that invalidated two of Texas' 36 congressional seats. Paxton filed a brief on Oct. 17 asking the high court to reverse the district court's ruling in that case.

Speaker won't run again

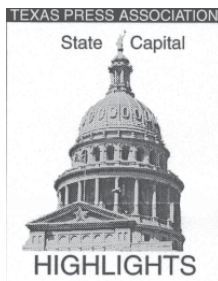
House Speaker Joe Straus, R-San Antonio, on Oct. 25 announced his decision not to seek re-election in November 2018.

Straus is almost halfway through his record fifth consecutive two-year term as speaker.

The chamber will elect a new leader in the next regular legislative session, which begins in January 2019. State Reps. John Zerwas, R-Richmond, and Phil King, R-Weatherford, are the first two members to declare their intentions to run for the leadership post. Zerwas is chair of the state budget-writing House Committee on Appropriations. King chairs the House Committee on Homeland Security and Public Safety.

Straus has been noted as a consensus builder, able to

for legislation addressing the issues.

Straus also created the Select Committee on Opioids and Substance Abuse in which lawmakers will study the prevalence and impact of substance abuse and substance use disorders in the state. Rep. Four Price, R-Amarillo, will serve as chair of the select committee and Rep. Joe Moody, D-El Paso, will serve as vice chair.

Update: Hurricane recovery

Since Hurricane Harvey hit Texas in late August, federal and state agencies, local governmental bodies, volunteers and private property owners have been hard at work to return to normal the many stricken areas of the Lone Star State.

As of Oct. 26, according to information posted by the state-run Commission to Rebuild Texas, \$5.83 billion in federal funds had been provided directly to Texans. That amount includes FEMA grants to households, National Flood Insurance Program claims payments and SBA disaster loans.

Also, some 882,935 individual assistance applications were received. FEMA's deadline to register for individual disaster assistance is Nov. 24 for the residents of 41 designated counties.

And, as of Oct. 27, some 51,416 individuals were taking advantage of FEMA's Transitional Sheltering Assistance. Some 145,737 individuals were counted as having visited Disaster Recovery Centers for assistance as of Oct. 26.

Youth vote is encouraged

Texas Secretary of State Rolando Pablos on Oct. 25 issued a proclamation designating the first Friday of the early voting period as Student Voting Day.

"The state of Texas is committed to ensuring that civic participation remains a cherished tradition among all Texans, particularly those of the youngest generation," Pablos said.

More than 800 Texas high schools committed to assisting their eligible students in registering to vote, an effort supported by secretary of state's 2017 High School Voter Registration Initiative.

Early voting ends Nov. 3 for the Nov. 7 Uniform Election. More information can be found at www.votetexas.gov/

"Indiana is a national leader when it comes to the way our programs operate and the number of students we're able to serve, but we've still got work to do making sure families know these programs are available to help their students," said Robert Enlow, the group's president and CEO. "Parents want options, and we need to do a better job letting them know those options are out there."

TCU, OU meet in elimination game in Big 12: Cowboys prepare for life without Ezekiel Elliott

It's going to be an interesting November in the Big 12 and for Texas' two professional football teams. As the Big 12 season winds down, there are two key games this week-end that could determine who plays in the Big 12 title game on Dec. 2 at AT&T Stadium in Arlington. On Saturday, Oklahoma State travels to Ames, IA to face the surprise team of the league, the Iowa State Cyclones, while TCU visits Norman to take on Oklahoma. The winner of those two games remains alive in the hunt for a post in the Big 12 championship game, while the losers can make plans to play in the Texas Bowl or some other meaningless post-season bowl game. Iowa State has been a fun team to watch and is no fluke. Head coach Matt Campbell has led his team to a win at Oklahoma and ended TCU's undefeated season two weeks ago with a gritty 14-7 victory in Ames. The Cyclones will have their hands full with Mike Gundy's high-scoring Cowboys, but ISU has defied all of the experts thus far, so you never know. The Sooners know they can't afford another loss if they hope to play for the Big 12 title and they will have their hands full with a desperate TCU team that is in the same position. In the NFL, the Texans will play their second game without right tackle Duane Brown, who was traded to Seattle on Oct. 30. Houston only had Brown for one game, ironically against Seattle two weeks ago, after he returned to the team following a hold out as he sought a new contract. Rookie quarterback Deshaun Watson survived and thrived without him and should be OK going forward. Things might not be OK for the Cowboys as a judge in New York upheld the NFL's six-game suspension of star running back Ezekiel Elliott, who won't return until Dallas' Week 15 game at Oakland. Losing Elliott, who rushed for 413 yards and five touchdowns in his last three games, will be a big blow to the Dallas offense, but they still have quarterback Dak Prescott and decent backup running backs in Alfred Morris and Darren McFadden. Still, losing Elliott at this point of the season could put a crimp in the Cowboys' post-season plans. The District 16-6A season also concludes this weekend as Nimitz, MacArthur, Eisenhower and Davis battle for a playoff berth. Westfield and Spring are in the driver's seat, while Dekaney, MacArthur, Nimitz, Eisenhower and Davis battle for the third and fourth playoff spots in the final weekend of the season. Before we take a look at this week's schedule, let's review last week's record. A 9-3 week upped the season record to 64-45 (59%). Now, onto this week's game.

HIGH SCHOOL

MacArthur at Dekaney - Andy Garza's Generals picked up a key league win two weeks ago when they upended Davis, 21-14. That win kept their playoff hopes alive. They take on a Dekaney team that has turned its season around after a slow start. My pick, MacArthur 16, Dekaney 14 Spring vs. Nimitz - Richard Slater's Cougars won their first three league games then dropped two straight (they lost to Westfield and Eisenhower), which means they needed to win one of their final two games (they played Davis on Nov. 3) to secure a playoff spot. Spring is a quality opponent with one league loss heading into last weekend's games. Look for the Cougars to get their running game going against the Lions. My pick, Nimitz 24, Spring 21 Davis at Westfield - James Shower's Falcons dropped a tough one two weeks ago to MacArthur and probably need to win out to land a playoff spot. They face a stern test on Friday night when they face a Westfield team that is rolling. My pick, Westfield 30, Davis 24 Aline vs. Eisenhower - It's been a tough year for Hank Semler's Mustangs and they would like nothing more than to close out the season on a high note over the Eisenhower Eagles. Kerry Bamberg's team picked up a big win two weeks ago with their 16-13 victory over Nimitz to keep their playoff hopes alive. My pick, Eisenhower 26, Aline 14

NCAA

Notre Dame at Miami - Back in the day (the 80's) this was one of the nastiest rivalries in college football. The trash-talking Hurricanes were the kings of the college game and were not shy about letting others know about it. Miami would routinely route the Irish that was until Lou Holtz arrived and turned the Irish into one of the best programs from the late 1980's until the mid 1990's. Both programs had some rough times over the last 20 years but both have seen resurgence in their respective programs. Notre Dame should enter this game with one loss, while the Hurricanes hope to be undefeated (they played a tough Virginia Tech team last week). The winner of this game remains alive in the College Football Playoff (CFP) hunt, while the loser will be consoled with a New Year's Day bowl. The Irish are rolling behind quarterback Brandon Wim-bush (1,006 yards passing, 10 TDs; 529 yards rushing, 11 TDs) and tailback Josh Adams (1,169 yards rushing, 9 TDs). Two weeks ago in their 35-14 win over a very good North Carolina State team, Adams

rolled for 202 yards and one score. The Hurricane are led by quarterback Malik Rosier (2,071 yards passing, 17 TDs). They have five receivers with 207 yards receiving or more and 14 touchdowns. Look for ND's ground game to be the difference maker in this one as Brian Kelly's team keeps its CFP hopes alive. My pick, Notre Dame 26, Miami 23 Oklahoma State at Iowa State - The Cowboys take their high-scoring offense to Ames to face an Iowa State team that is this year's surprise team in the NCAA. Two weeks ago, Oklahoma State won at West Virginia, 50-39, as quarterback Mason Rudolph (2,866 yards passing, 22 TDs) and wide receiver James Washington (45 receptions, 1,005 yards, 8 TDs) led the way. OSU played without starting running back Justice Hill who was injured early in the game, but backup J.D. King filled in well as the Cowboys got out to a big lead then held on for the victory. Iowa State's defense was the star in its 14-7 win over TCU keeping the potent Horned Frog offense without a touchdown (TCU scored its only points on a kickoff return). ISU has had a great season and will go bowling, but I think the Cowboys have just too much firepower for the Cyclones to deal with come Saturday. My pick, Oklahoma State 34, Iowa State 26 TCU at Oklahoma - Speaking of TCU, Gary Patterson's team knows it can't lose another game if it hopes to play for the Big 12 title and they will face a stern test against an OU team that is in the same position. Look for TCU quarterback Kenny Hill (1,863 yards, 15 TDs) to play much better than he did against Iowa State. The Sooners have a pretty fair signal caller themselves in Baker Mayfield (2,628 yards, 23 TDs), who is also a Heisman Trophy candidate. Mayfield could secure a trip to New York with a big day against a very good TCU defense. Two weeks ago, the Sooners rolled to a 49-27 win over Texas Tech. TCU should have success against a suspect OU defense, but look for Mayfield to make one or two more plays down the stretch as the Sooners eek out a close win. My pick, Oklahoma 34, TCU 30 Georgia at Auburn - The No. 2-ranked Georgia Bulldogs face a tough test on the road against a

dangerous Auburn team, but thus far, Kirby Smart's team has been up to the task all season long. The Bulldogs are in control of their own destiny and are pretty much assured of winning the SEC East and landing a berth in the SEC title game on Dec. 2 in Atlanta. Georgia has been rolling behind a strong running game led by Nick Chubb (765 yards rushing, 9 TDs) and Sony Michel (629 yards rushing, 8 TDs). Their production has taken a lot of pressure off of true freshman quarterback Jake Fromm (1,263 yards passing, 13 TDs). Fromm will face a good Auburn defense, so he will be counting on Chubb and Michel to loosen things up so he can make plays down field. The Tigers are led by quarterback Jarrett Sidham (1,728 yards passing 8 TDs) and running back Kerryon Johnson (723 yards rushing, 14 TDs). This is the sort of test that Georgia needs if it hopes to knock off the king of the SEC, Alabama, in the SEC title game. My pick, Georgia 26, Auburn 23

NFL

Houston at Los Angeles Rams - Texans rookie quarterback Deshaun Watson takes his act to Hollywood to take on the surprising Rams and he hopes the critics like his work. Two weeks ago, the amazing first-year pro had another huge day when he threw for 402 yards and four touchdowns against a very good Seattle defense. The Texans lost a 41-38 heart breaker in Seattle, but Watson and wide receiver DeAndre Hopkins (8 receptions, 224 yards, 1 TD) certainly did their parts to pull off the upset. This week, the Texans face another tough WFC West team in the Rams, who won five of their first seven games and have been one of the surprise teams in 2017. Second year quarterback Jared Goff (1,719 yards passing, 9 TDs) has blossomed under first-year head coach Sean McVay's tutelage and running back Todd Gurley (627 yards rushing, 5 TDs; 27 receptions, 293 yards, 3 TDs) looks like he did two years ago when he burst on the scene as a rookie and rushed for more than 1,100 yards with 10 touchdowns. The Rams also have a stout de-

fense, but Watson has been tested against some of the best thus far and has come through with flying colors. Look for another big day from the rookie QB, but look for Gurley to be the difference maker in this one as the Rams look to keep pace with the Seahawks in the NFC West race. My pick, Los Angeles Rams 31, Houston 28

Dallas at Atlanta - The Cowboys visit the Falcons in a key game for both teams. Both teams need this game to remain in the hunt in their respective division races and in the Wild Card hunt. Dak Prescott will have to put the team on his shoulders now that Ezekiel Elliott is out until Week 15. He has the talent to do so, but he will need help from his receiving corps and the offensive line. Atlanta, the defending NFC champs, have been up and down this season but picked up a big road win two weeks ago against the Jets. That win could be just what Dan Quinn's team needed to go on a late-season run. Atlanta quarterback Matt Ryan has been inconsistent thus far, but should have a big day against a young and inexperienced Dallas secondary. Look for Julio Jones to get untracked (one touchdown in his team's first seven games) in this one as the Falcons picked up a key November victory. My pick, Atlanta 34, Dallas 30 New England at Denver - The Patriots travel to Denver for a Sunday night encounter against a reeling Denver team. To say the Broncos have issues at quarterback would be an understatement. Two weeks ago in their 29-19 loss at Kansas City, quarterback Trevor Siemian threw three interceptions and was ineffective for a second straight week. There is talk that he will be replaced by Paxton Lynch, but that might not be enough if the offensive line doesn't improve. The Broncos will rely on their stout defense to slow Tom Brady (2,541 yards passing, 16 TDs), but if the offense does not pick up the slack, it's going to be a long night in the Mile High City. My pick, New England 26, Denver 17 Miami at Carolina - Week 10 concludes on Monday night with the Dolphins pay a visit to the Panthers in Charlotte. Two weeks ago, the Dolphins were embarrassed on national TV when they were pummeled 40-0 by Baltimore on Thursday Night Football. It could be another long night in prime time this week if the Miami offense plays like it did against the Ravens. If Jay Cutler is still sidelined with a rib injury, backup QB Matt Moore will again get the call, which will be just fine with the Carolina defense. Two weeks ago in their 17-3 win at Tampa Bay, the Panther defense forced three turnovers and recorded two sacks. Look

for another big night from the Panther defense in this one. Offensively, look for quarterback Cam Newton (1,841 yards passing, 10 TDs) to make plays with his arm and legs as he leads Carolina to a Monday night victory. My pick, Carolina 32, Miami 16

Management. It is an extensive eight-week emergency preparedness course taught by emergency management professionals and first responders. The training makes students proficient in safety basics they can use in their homes, schools, workplace and communities.

"The Harris County Citizen Corps CERT program is one of the best in the nation, leading the way through dedicated volunteers," added Judge Emmett. "These trained volunteers are, and will continue to be, essential partners in disaster preparedness, response and

recovery."

The CERT program teaches disaster preparedness and basic response skills in fire safety and suppression, search and rescue tactics, and disaster medical operations. CERT volunteers are trained to respond safely, responsibly, and effectively to emergency situations, but they can also support their communities during non-emergency events as well.

The Harris County Citizen Corps membership includes 30,000 trained volunteers involved in 274 Community Emergency Response Teams; 21,984 volunteers from 24 Volun-

teers in Police Service agencies; 4,165 volunteers from the Medical Reserve Corps; 6,137 volunteers from the 351 neighborhoods participating in the USAonWatch program; and 24 Fire Corps programs.

The CERT program's success is due in large part to its partnership with the City of Houston, first responders, non-profit agencies, community organizations and all its volunteers.

Houston police are investigating the shooting of a man that occurred at 18005 Eastex Freeway (North U.S. Highway 59) about 3:30 a.m. on November 2.

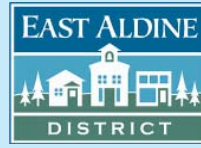

Report to the Community on the Town Center Construction Progress

On-site construction of three of the major projects in the East Aldine Town Center has commenced, as shown in these photos. They include the BakerRipley complex, the Harris County 9-1-1 Call Center, and an access road and utilities through the site. Future construction will include the Lone Star College and Aldine ISD Early College, the East Aldine offices, commercial and shopping facilities, and outdoor landscaping features.

The Aldine Town Center is intended to reflect the needs and character of the East Aldine community. Moreover, it is an economic development catalyst designed to enhance the skill sets and business opportunities of area residents and to introduce a new standard in local commercial development.

- Major features of the Town Center:
- Over \$100 million in public and private investment.
 - Roughly 300,000 sq/ft. of commercial and institutional space, including:
 - 100,000 sq/ft. of commercial retail and office space.
 - 80,000 sq/ft. Lone Star College East Aldine campus, including an early college high school.
 - 50,000 sq/ft. of facilities for BakerRipley, including an innovative "maker space" to assist in skill and business support for the East Aldine community.
 - Over 25,000 sq/ft. 9-1-1 call center for Harris County to replace the aging downtown facility.
 - 25,000 sq/ft. new facility for the East Aldine District
 - An amphitheater and community green for 1,500 people.
 - Stormwater detention that serves as a large scale passive green space.
 - Splashpads and children's play areas.
 - Roadway and trail access to Keith-Wiess Park.

The East Aldine District has taken a multi-faceted approach toward economic development that includes regular outreach to local businesses and pursuit of new business. As a major component of that effort, in 2013 the district purchased 61 acres along Aldine Mail Route for development of a commercial and institutional core for the community.
