Sylvia Garcia wins big; Bates defeats Coffey

House leader Pelosi fires up Democrats

SENATOR SYLVIA GARCIA WINS BIG, **AVOIDS PRIMARY** RUNOFF

U.S. House of Representatives leader Nancy Pelosi fires up Harris County **Democrats**

Election Day - March 6, 2018 Senator Sylvia Garcia crushed 6 opposing candidates vying for the 29th Congressional District seat being vacated by retir-

ing Congressman Gene Green.

Garica's win came after a recent visit to Houston by Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi of California. Pelosi is the Democratic Leader of the U.S. House of Representatives for the 114th Congress. From 2007 to 2011, Pelosi served as Speaker of the House, the first woman to do so in American history.

Pelosi spoke at the Harris County Democratic





AISD reunited with a piece of its history

If a bell could talk, it would have quite a story to tell.

The bell in question is one that hung in the bell tower in one of the first schools in the history of Aldine, the 1910 two-room frame schoolhouse that was located on Aldine Bender (FM 525) just east of what today is the Hardy Toll Road.

In 1934, the building, along with the bell, was moved to the northeast corner of Aldine Westfield Road and Aldine Bender Road where Lane School is located today. On November 19, 1948, a fire erupted in the gym (the cause was faulty electrical wiring). The gym, band hall, along with the two-room schoolhouse, burned to the ground and the bell and its tower fell with the building.

The bell was placed in the basement of the S.M.N Mars building. The bell ultimately came into the possession of O.V. "Shorty" Calvert, who was a descendant of an early Aldine family who attended the early Aldine school. Calvert Elementary School is named after Mr. Calvert.

In 1981, Edgar Reeves, who was a 1952 graduate of Aldine High School and whose family were some of the first residents of Aldine, learned that Shorty was going to sell the bell. Mr. Reeves asked him not to sell it outside of the Aldine community because he wanted the bell to remain in the Aldine community. Mr. Reeves said he upped the price a "bit" and became owner of the bell.

In 1986, the bell was used in Aldine ISD's 50th anniversary celebration at Thorne Stadium. Mr. Reeves kept the bell in his

insurance office until his retirement in 1994 and then moved it to the family home in Uvalde County, where the family enjoyed ringing it on special occasions.

When Mr. Reeves and his wife Carolyn learned the district was planning to open a Heritage Museum to celebrate Aldine ISD's rich history, they knew where the bell should be placed.

"I never thought the bell should belong to me or any individual," Mr. Reeves said. "It belongs to the Aldine community. I purchased it to be certain it would not be lost to Aldine. When I learned of the Aldine Heritage Museum and that it had the full support of Dr. (Wanda) Bamberg, I just knew the Museum would be the perfect home for the bell. It will be protected and visible to the public."

Mr. Reeves, whose fam-

ily has donated a variety of other items to the Museum, remembers hearing his father, uncles and several others who grew up in Aldine talk about ringing the bell. One of those men was Carol Teague, who later became superintendent of the Harris County Department of Education. Mr. Teague told him the rope that was used to pull the bell would often come off the wheel of the bell, disabling it. Because Mr. Teague was small and could easily climb the tower, his teacher would send him up to enable the bell to ring again.

"For some 36 years, Carolyn and I, our sons and grandchildren, have enjoyed providing a safe home for the bell," Mr. Reeves said.

And now, thanks to the Reeves family, other generations will have the chance to see some of Aldine's first history for years to come!

HISD Superintendent Richard Carranza Accepts New Role

March 5, 2018 – Houston Independent School District Superintendent Richard Carranza on Monday announced his decision to end his tenure as the leader of Texas' largest school district.

Carranza assumed his role as superintendent with unanimous Board of Education approval in August 2016, promising to improve student academic achievement, provide student support through wraparound services, and create a system of equity for the district's 284 schools.

"It has been an honor and privilege to have served the students of the Houston Independent School District and bring a voice to communities that have historically been underserved," Carranza said. "It is with a heavy heart that I announce my depar-

ture as I embark on this new journey. I am looking forward to the opportunity of serving the 1.1 million students in New York City. I am forever grateful to the people of Houston for allowing me to be a part of this great city."

While Carranza leaves in the midst of HISD facing several challenges, we are confident in the ability to overcome those challenges with viable solutions.

"We the Board wish Carranza the best in his endeavors and appreciate the leadership he brought to this district," said President Rhonda Skillern-Jones. "We are committed to continuing the work he began and moving the district forward."

The Board met the first Thursday of this month to discuss next steps.

Texas Art Education Association names Aldine ISD teacher to leadership scholar cohort Program

The intense, transformative experience provides the tools, resources and training to advance art education.

The Texas Art Education Association (TAEA) recently announced the names of the 2018 Leadership Scholar Cohort. Among the four Scholars selected from throughout the state is Alyssa Wagner from Aldine ISD.

Potential Leaderships Scholars must have three years of experience in their art education field or profession. TAEA designed the cohort program to build leadership skills of aspiring leaders. The experience advances their skills by engaging with top leadership trainers and practitioners.

The program is ideally suited for those already in, or preparing to move into, a leadership role.

But that did not stop her from giving her students the best experience possible. Wagner met with Dr. Michaelann Kelley, the District's visual arts program director; read and experimented.

According to investigators, a man and his girlfriend were in a Ford F-150 when they stopped in a moving lane of traffic, possibly stalled, authorities

The man got out to check on the truck, and

soon after, a suspected drunk driver hit the back of his pickup truck causing it to spin out of control.

Authorities say the victim was pinned between his Ford F-150 and the barricade.The truck caught fire and the man died.

The victim's girlfriend, Shonta Scott, was transported to the hospital with serious injuries.

The suspected drunk driver was arrested and charged with DWI.



HCC partners with Stanford University on new virtual heart program



HOUSTON [March 8, 2018] - Imagine being able to perform virtual heart surgery without having to go through medical school. Now you can!

Using Stanford University's Virtual Heart Program and the new state-of-the-art virtual reality lab and studio now available at Houston Community College, students and faculty can transport themselves inside the human heart to see how it functions when experiencing abnormalities. They can even begin surgery to fix any problems they discover - all in a risk-free, virtual environment.

Stanford University is

partnering with HCC and 20 other institutions to test the virtual heart application. Co-developer Dr. David Axelrod describes the technology as "an educational virtual reality experience in congenital heart disease, intended for parents/patients and students/faculty.'

The Stanford Virtual Heart is the newest addition to HCC's library of unique, immersive applications accessible in the virtual reality lab and studio at HCC Central College. Students use the lab not only to explore material but to also create their own work. For example, a student in an art class can

design graphics in Adobe Illustrator or Photoshop and then maneuver through it in the virtual reality lab. Chemistry students are able to create and interact with molecules in three dimensions and architecture students can take a virtual stroll through the buildings they design. The lab offers endless opportunities for conceptualization, construction and design.

Party's (HCDP) annual fundraiser to a record crowd. Chairwoman Lillie Schechter of the HCDP said this year's event set a fund raising record and an attendance record with over 3,500 Democrat activists

Sylvia Garcia was born in Palito Blanco, Texas. She earned a bachelor's degree in social work and political science from Texas Woman's University and a J.D. from Thurgood Marshall School of Law at Texas Southern University. Garcia's career experience includes working as a social worker and a legal aid lawyer. She served as director and presiding judge of the Houston Municipal System. Garcia was elected city controller in Houston and the Harris County Commissioner's Court. She was elected Texas State Senate in

Congressman Green, who ran against Garcia for the seat in 1992, threw his support behind the senator in the crowded Democratic race in Congressional

District 29. "The reason I supported Sylvia is she's a legislator, and that's what a member of Congress should be. On the legislative side, its give and take. I have to compromise with my Democrats and obviously my Republican colleagues. She knows how to do that to be successful to represent this district in Washington," Green said.

"Tonight, women spoke," Sylvia Garcia said, in her

victory speech. "Tonight we voted and we voted loud and clear. And we said elections can't be bought, and what matters is people. So what matters is fighting on and someone being there willing to fight, willing to stand up, and willing to serve the people, and that's what I intend to do."

Abbott orders action to ensure safety at junior colleges

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott is calling for immediate action to ensure the safety of Texas' junior college campuses following a Feb. 14 mass shooting at a high school in Parkland, Florida.

Abbott's order came in a Feb. 28 letter to Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board Commissioner Raymund Paredes. He issued a similar order addressing the safety of all Texas schoolchildren a week earlier.

Abbott outlined steps to be taken by the Higher Education Coordinating Board.

"These are important first steps to ensuring that junior college districts are meeting all requirements and have the best information available to help keep their campuses safe," Abbott said. "Texas will continue to evaluate and improve our approach to ensure our students are safe."

A few among a longer list of Abbott's suggestions

 Catalog, share and distribute campus safety information;

— Ensure that all public junior college districts are in compliance with statutorily required school safety audits and multihazard emergency operations plans; and

— Work with the Texas School Safety Center, the Department of Public Safety and the governor's office to draft recommendations to the Texas Legislature on policy changes to keep students safe.

The Texas School Safety Center at Texas State University in San Marcos serves as a clearinghouse for the dissemination of safety and security information through research, training and technical assistance for K-12 schools and junior colleges.



partment of Justice is taking to combat the nation's opioid epidemic.

Sessions praised Paxton and the state attorneys general, saying, "Each of them has made combating opioid abuse a priority and has shown outstanding leadership."

Some 64,000 fatal drug overdoses were reported across the nation in 2016. Of those, 2,831 opioid-related deaths were recorded in Texas.

Paxton said his office would "continue to do everything it can to protect Texans from the opioid crisis."

In 2017, Paxton and a coalition of officials in 40 other states served investigative subpoenas and additional requests on eight companies that manufacture or distribute highly addictive painkillers. The goal is to collect enough information so that the multi-state coalition can evaluate whether manufacturers and distributors engaged in unlawful practices in the marketing, sale and distribution of opioids, Paxton said.

In other news, Paxton was joined by the attorneys general of 15 other states in a U.S. Supreme Court brief supporting President Trump's proposed travel ban preventing entry into the United States by citizens of a list of countries identified by the State Department as

locations of known terrorist organizations.

Sales tax revenue is up

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on March 2 announced state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.61 billion in February, an amount 8.6 percent greater than the amount reported in February 2017.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in February 2018 was up 10 percent compared to the same period a year ago, Hegar said. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections, he added.

"Increased sales tax collections were spurred by business spending," Hegar said. "Growth was especially notable in remittances from oil- and gas-related sectors as well as whole-sale trade. But collections from retail trade, the sector most reflective of consumer spending, declined slightly from year-ago levels."

DPS offers safety tips

The Texas Department of Public Safety on March 2 urged Texans to obey all traffic laws and use extra caution when driving during the spring break period, which stretches over the next few weeks.

State troopers and local law enforcement in the coastal areas of Texas will be enhancing enforcement efforts, watching for speeders, drunken drivers and seat-belt violators.

The DPS offered these safe travel tips:

— Don't drink and rive;

— Eliminate distractions while driving, including the use of mobile devices;

— Buckle up everyone in the vehicle;

— Slow down or move over for police, fire, EMS and Texas Department of Transportation vehicles and tow trucks stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated:

— Drive defensively;

All across the country there are veterans who might be ill and not know it. The reason: They don't have the results of their medical tests.

If you have medical tests done at a veterans' facility, before you leave, ask when the results will be ready. You'll likely be told, "Someone will call you." Get a name and write it down. Later if you start getting anxious because you haven't gotten a call, give it one more day ... then go on the hunt.

Leave messages for your care manager, if you have one, and your doctor. Give it another day. If you don't hear back, try again. Call the medical facility and ask for the lab. They're not likely to give you the results, but ask when the results were ready, and get that person's name. That's part of your ammo ... knowing that results were ready and when. Then call the care manager or doctor back and state that the results were ready at a certain time.

See how this works? Be proactive. Through all these steps, your name gets out there as someone who's hunting for test results. The same is true if you have a My HealtheVet account.

Once you get the results over the phone, ask that a copy be mailed to you (or print it from your online account), which you'll then put in your file at home. If you have a condition that is reg-

ty that you can make pals with someone in the lab who will just read the results to you. The bottom line is that you don't stop until you have the results. Stand up for yourself and guard your
