Mother of injured student sues Aldine company in bus crash

Rose Avalos was one of four Harris County women selected as a recipient of the "Women Making History" Award from the Texas Democratic Women (TDW) Harris County Metro Area organization.

Ms. Avalos was honored on April 21 at the eighth annual "Women Making History" Awards Luncheon, held at the IBEW Hall.

The award honors four hardworking women who

CHANNELVIEW, TX – The mother of a Channelview ISD student who was injured in the bus crash near Mobile, Alabama last month filed a \$1 million lawsuit against the driver and the bus company.

The mother claims the bus company, First Class Tours and the driver were negligent when the bus crashed into a ravine injuring most of the passengers and killing the bus driver.

Two buses, chartered from First Class Tours in

Aldine, were bringing the Falcon band students back from a vacation and performance at Disney World park in Florida.

It was the second bus that had the accident. Authorities said that the scene did not show any indication that the bus tried to stop or swerve. The path led through the grassy median and over an embankment and a drop of over 50

"Education alone isn't enough for our communities that are underprivileged and disadvantaged; its critical to recognize and address the healing powers and benefits of overcoming obstacles (past & present) so we can prepare our youth for the world that is waiting on them...My father taught me that communication simply means that we can speak; to communicate affectively means that you will not only be heard the same as an empty wagon, but people will actually listen to what you are trying to communicate to them!" Dotson said about her reason for starting the essay contests. Hambrick Middle School is not the only benefactor of Ms. Dotson's efforts through her non-profit organization as well as her own personal desire to make a difference. She supports many organizations, causes, and missions including At-Risk Teen Advisor, Forever Families Adoption Agency, Help for Haiti Missionary, World of Children, Plan International, Youth Civil Rights, and East Aldine District Sherriff's Department Summer Lunch Program. TxDOT urges drivers to look twice for motorcycles to decrease fatalities 501 motorcyclists died in 2017 in crashes on Texas roads

HOUSTON – As part of National Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month in May, the Texas Department of Transportation's "Share the Road: Look Twice for Motorcycles" campaign is urging drivers to watch carefully for motorcycles. Crashes killed 501 and seriously injured another 2,101 motorcyclists in Texas last year.

"Nobody wants to take a life in a crash or lose a loved one," said TxDOT **Executive Director James** Bass. "Motorcycles are small, they're hard to see, and it can be difficult to judge their speed and distance. That's why it's critical that drivers take extra precautions to look twice for motorcycles, especially at intersections.'

Intersections are par-

ticularly risky areas for serious crashes involving motorcycles. From 2010 to 2015,

25 percent of crashes involving motorcycles occurred when one vehicle turned left in front of an oncoming motorcycle, likely due to the driver not seeing theoncoming motorcycle.

Motorcycle crashes also are more severe than other types of crashes because motorcycles lack the protective and safety features of other vehicles.

To help everyone arrive safely at their destination, TxDOT's "Look Twice for Motorcycles" campaign urges drivers to:

• Look twice for motorcycles, especially at intersections.

• Always assume motor-

cycles are closer than they appear.

• Avoid turning in front of an oncoming motorcycle.

• Use turn signals and check blind spots before changing lanes.

• Avoid following a motorcycle too closely.

• Give motorcyclists a full lane.

• Obey posted speed limits

This year's "Look Twice for Motorcycles" campaign will conduct events around the state to coincide with National Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month and the start of the spring/ summer driving season. The stops will feature a virtual reality game designed to educate motorists to look twice for motorcycles.

Tuesdays and Wednesdays feature programming for elementary school children, and Thursdays offer fun and learning for teens. Suspect charged in fatal crash

Charges have been filed against a suspect arrested in the fatal crash that occurred at 1200 Crosstimbers at 12:15 p.m. on Saturday, April 21.

The suspect, Lakendra Nicholson, 35, is charged with intoxication manslaughter and two counts of intoxication assault.

According to HPD officials, Nicholson was driving erratically in her white Cadillac CTS eastbound on Crosstimbers, changed lanes in an unsafe manner and struck a grey Nissan Altima. The Cadillac then

struck a black Pontiac, pushing it into a utility pole and a gold Toyota Camry. The Toyota then struck a white commercial pickup truck. The driver of the pickup truck pulled into a nearby parking lot and then left the scene.

The male victim, 2, was transported to Memorial Hermann Greater Heights Hospital where he was pronounced dead. All other occupants of the Nissan, the Pontiac and the Toyota were transported to area hospitals for treatment of their injuries.

Mayor Turner backs one-year state waiver for Houston ISD

HOUSTON – April 25, 2018 - Mayor Sylvester Turner stands by the Houston Independent School District and encourages the board of trustees, community, and the Texas Education Agency to keep the students' best interests in mind as decisions are made about the future of 10 lowperforming schools.

Also, the mayor today encouraged HISD to hit the pause button on submitting a partnership plan to the state by the April 30 deadline and instead request a one-year waiver from the Texas Education Agency. A one-year extension would allow the district additional time to focus on improving the schools, stakeholders, and devise and execute strategies to move schools out of Improvement Required (IR) status.

"Considering Hurricane Harvey's impact on our students and campuses eight-months ago, this is not the time to add to the stress of students, parents, teachers and those served by HISD. I am committing myself to playing a leadership role to find and execute the best path forward. By working together, we can develop a viable model with the singular goal of moving any schools from IR to performing."

Mayor Turner plans to contact the Texas Education Commissioner Mike Morath and ask him to grant HISD the one-year waiver.

"HISD should not submit a partnership plan at this time. I would ask the community to recognize the difficult position and challenges the board of trustees faces in balancing its books after recapture, Hurricane Harvey, and the abrupt departure of former Superintendent Carranza. And lets' work collaboratively to do what is in the best interest of the student who need all of us."

Governor Abbott encourages Mayors and County Judges to take advantage of available Harvey relief funds

AUSTIN – April 26, 2018 - Governor Greg Abbott today sent a letter to Mayors, County Judges and Emergency Management officials in communities impacted by Hurricane Harvey, urging them to take immediate advantage of the \$500 million in funds from FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program that are available now. "The hazard mitigation funds available today can provide immediate relief and resiliency to your community.," writes Governor Abbott. "As of today, the Texas Department of Emergency Management has received only seven complete applications from the entire region impacted by Hurricane Harvey. That means hundreds of millions of dollars that are available to Texas communities today are not being put to use."


Governor announces extension of hurricanerelated sheltering assistance

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on April 17 announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency had granted Texas' request to extend the deadline for Hurricane Harvey survivors to apply for transitional sheltering assistance.

The deadline has been extended from April 23 to May 31. The transitional sheltering assistance program helps displaced individuals who are unable to return to their homes find short-term shelter in hotels or other temporary housing locations.

"With many Texas families still unable to return home after Harvey, we are committed to ensuring they have a place to stay as the recovery continues," Abbott said. "We will continue to do everything in our power to help Texans get back in their homes and get our communities rebuilt as quickly as possible. I thank our federal partners and FEMA for helping provide this important assistance for those in need.'

Included in the letter, the Governor reminds officials that local governments will not be obligated to pay the typical 25 percent local cost share for hazard mitigation grants. Instead, Congress provided that the cost availability of \$500 million of funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency's (FEMA) Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP). In four months, approximately \$600 million of additional hazard mitigation funds will become available.

These FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program funds are in addition to the more than \$10 billion in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds approved by Congress and awarded to Texas.

Hazard mitigation funds can be used in a number of ways, including: buyouts and elevations of flood prone properties; drainage and reservoir projects that eliminate future flooding; projects to lessen the frequency or severity of flooding; flood risk reduction projects (dams, retention basins, levees, floodwalls); large-scale channeling of waterways; and other projects.



The Parade Marshall this year was Mayor Sylvester Turner.





THE CHARTERED BUS, with 46 persons onboard, left the I-10 Roadway in Alabama, went through the median, and plunged over 50 feet down a Ravine, and then overturned.

Alabama state trooper John Malone indicated that the driver, Harry Caligone may have been "unresponsive" prior to the crash, leading to speculation that he actually died of a medical problem such as a heart attack.

However, family mem-

bers said that he had recently passed a physical exam and was healthy.

The accident happened at about 5:30 a.m. on March 13, while it was still dark. Authorities said that after the initial 9-1-1 calls, about a dozen fire and EMS departments responded from nearby cit-

ies, and about 5 helicopters were used to transport injured people. The bus held about 40 students, age 15-18, and six adults. Those injured were taken to 10 area hospitals, according to later reports.
