Graduating seniors received scholarships last Tuesday night, at a ceremony in M.O. Campbell Center. 251 seniors received financial help toward their future college education. Awards were

made by the Aldine Eduction Foundation (AEF) to 126 students, totalling \$412,000 and Aldine Scholarship Fund (ASF) to 125 students, totalling \$125,000. A total of 939 applications had been re-

ceived, and a large committee of volunteers evaluated them to arrive at the recipients.

The program was attended by the students, their parents and families, and Aldine faculty and ad-

ministrators. Emcee for the evening was AEF Director Michele McGovern.
Welcoming remarks were made by Bill Ginder, the Star College-North Harris college.
Superintendent Dr. Wanda Bamberg, retiring from office at the end of the






# 2 MacArthur High School seniors receive Prestigious Scholarships for Academic Excellence

Beach on May 4. The Nationals remains the oldest, largest and finest all-service drill and ceremony competition. More than 180,000 cadets, instructors and parents have attended the NHSDTC competition for over the

last 35 years. To reach the Nationals competition, schools must qualify by successfully placing at a designated regional drill meet. The Red Tails Armed Team and Flying Falcons Unarmed

Team both qualified by their overall first-place finish at the Cypress Fairbanks ISD competition.

"I applaud our cadet's commitment to seeking excellence. Out of the 179 school days, our cadets practice well over 150 not including weekends. More than winning, they understand and value the concept that hard work works," said drill team instructor Master Sergeant Anthony Bullock.

## Four Aldine Child Care Centers complete intensive program

HOUSTON (May 9, 2018) - Four child care centers in Houston's Aldine neighborhood completed Collaborative for Children's College Bound from Birth program and celebrated with a recognition ceremony in May. All Stars Daycare & Preschool, Alpha Academy 1, Alpha Academy 2, and Young and Gifted Learning Center are the four centers which completed the voluntary, threeyear intensive quality improvement program.

Over the course of the three years, center directors and their classroom teachers received coaching, mentoring and professional development resulting in improved quality. Highlights of the program include: • Center directors re-

- ceived more than 375 hours of coaching and mentoring, and more than 426 hours of professional development.
- All four center directors earned their National Director Credential through Aim4Excellence, an intensive nine-module, 144-hour credentialing program.
- Classroom teachers at the four centers received more than 1,304 hours of professional development, and more than 847 hours of on-site coaching and mentoring.
- Thirteen teachers earned their Child Development Associate (CDA) credential, an intensive and highly-regarded na-

tional credential for early childhood educators.

- Centers provided 19 parenting education sessions to families at the child care centers, and reached 369 families through family activity and resource nights.
- Each participating center opened a Parent Library on-site to make parent resources and books for parents and children available to families at the cen-

Program success is measured on nationally recognized rating scales, including the Program Administration Scale, the Infant/Toddler Environment Rating Scale and the Early Childhood Environment Rating Scale. The Aldine centers achieved remarkable improvement on all scales in just three years. All scores are out of a seven-point scale. Highlights include:

- Staff Orientation scores on the Program Administration Scale improved from 1.8 to 6.0.
- Staff Development scores on the Program Administration Scale improved from 3.5 to 5.0. • Internal Communica-
- tions scores on the Program Administration Scale improved from 1.0 to 4.25. • Parental Involvement

scores on the Program Ad-

ministration Scale im-

proved from 3.5 to 5.3. • Infant/Toddler Environment Rating Scale averages improved from 3.4

• Early Childhood Environment Rating Scale averages improved from 3.4 to 4.3.

At the recognition ceremony on May 5. Collaborative for Children vice president of programs Ray Mondragon offered his congratulations to the centers for their hard work and achievements. "Today we celebrate the commitment to high quality early childhood that is now the hallmark of each of these centers," he said. "We celebrate the availability of quality care not only to the current families at these centers, but to future families in Aldine who deserve the very best in early childhood education for their children," Mondragon said.

The College Bound from Birth program in Aldine was Collaborative for Children's first replication of the project since its pilot effort in Sunnyside/South Park from 2008-2016. Incorporating learnings from the Sunnyside pilot, Collaborative for Children modified the program model from eight years to three and streamlined program components. Collaborative for Children currently operates the College Bound from Birth program in the three additional neighborhoods of Third Ward, Greater Northside, and Gulfton/ Sharpstown, with plans to expand the program to more child care centers across Houston by 2020.

## Police investigate Two brothers shot at W. Little York

The fatal shooting of one man and the wounding of another at 3230 West Little York about 8:45 p.m. on Wednesda, May 9, is being referred to a Harris County grand jury.

The deceased victim is identified as Marlo Brown, 48. His brother, Tayo Olu Brown, 37, suffered a gunshot wound and was transported to Memorial Hermann Hospital to be treated for his injuries.

According to Houston Police Officials, Marlo and Tayo Brown got into an argument which led to a confrontation with a pistol. As the brothers fought over the gun, both suffered gunshot wounds. HFD paramedics responded to the scene and pronounced Marlo deceased. Tayo was transported to the hospital after sustaining a gunshot wound to the face.

## DPS reminds Texans to prepare for hurricane season now

AUSTIN - With the hurricane season less than one month away, the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) urges all Texans to use Hurricane Preparedness Week to learn how to protect themselves and their families from hurricanes and tropical storms. Hurricane season starts June 1 and continues through Nov. 30.

"Hurricane season is unpredictable, and as we saw last year with Hurricane Harvey, these powerful storms can cause dangerous conditions and leave behind major devastation," said Texas Gov. Greg Abbott, who proclaimed this week as Hurricane Preparedness Week in Texas. "By preparing ahead of time, we can help ensure our state is ready when natural disasters strike. I encourage all of my fellow Texans to plan now in advance of hurricane season, and to closely monitor any weather warnings and evacuation orders in the coming months."

All Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico coastal areas are subject to hurricanes and tropical storms. It is possible for a storm to severely impact our state, even prior to or without making direct landfall in Texas. Hurricanes can cause catastrophic damage to coastlines, and winds can vary from 74 to 157 miles per hour (or higher). In addition, hurricanes and tropical storms can also spawn tornadoes, create dangerous coastal water conditions, including storm surges, and cause extensive flooding damage. Also, the rainfall associated with a tropical system can have an extremely wide reach, so monitoring changing weather conditions during hurricane season is critically important for all Texans.

"As Texans know all too well, the damage caused by a hurricane can be catastrophic, and the impact these storms have on our lives does not go away when the storm warning expires," said DPS Director Steven Mc-Craw. "Our neighbors along the coast are still recovering from Hurricane Harvey. Hurricane Preparedness Week offers an impor-

tant reminder for everyone to be diligent, and by taking a few simple steps — like developing a hurricane plan and assembling an emergency disaster kit — we can ensure we are ready when a storm hits. It can mean the difference between life and death."

Here are several measures residents can take now to prepare for potential storms:

- Assemble an emergency kit that includes essential documents, supplies and provisions.
- Review hurricane evacuation maps, and select a route for you and your family.
- Plan how all family members and pets will evacuate safely.
- Consider any special needs for individuals with disabilities or the elderly.
- Stay informed about changing weather conditions in and around your area.
- Follow the instructions of local officials if a storm develops.

Residents are also encouraged to review their property's flood risk and current insurance coverage, and to consider whether a separate flood policy should be part of their home protection plan. ## Paxton leads multi-state lawsuit challenging DACA program

AUSTIN — Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on May 1 filed a lawsuit against the federal government to end the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals pro-

The attorneys general of Alabama, Arkan-Louisiana, sas. Nebraska, South Carolina and West Virginia joined Paxton in the lawsuit.

Paxton and the other attorneys general urged the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Texas to declare DACA unlawful and to stop the federal government from issuing or renewing any DACA permits in the future.

Paxton noted the suit does not ask the federal government to remove any alien currently covered by DACA, nor does it ask the Trump admin-เเลเเอท to rescind DACA permits that have already been issued.

"Our lawsuit is about the rule of law, not the wisdom of any particular immigration policy," Paxton said. "Texas has argued for years that the federal executive branch lacks the power to unilaterally grant unlawfully present aliens lawful presence and work authorization. Left intact, DACA sets a dangerous precedent by giving the executive branch sweeping authority to ignore the laws enacted by Congress and change our nation's immigration laws to suit a president's own policy preferences."

U.S. District Judge John D. Bates of the District of Columbia on April 24 ordered the Trump administration to accept DACA applications, but stayed the order for 90 days to give the Department of Homeland Security an opportunity to make its arguments contesting the legality of the DACA program.

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on May 2 announced that state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.7 billion in April.

The amount is 13.4 percent more than reported in April 2017.

April state sales tax collections grew significantly across all major economic sectors, Hegar said. "While the strongest growth was in remittances from oil and gas-related sectors, tax receipts from retail trade and restaurants

also grew briskly," Hegar added.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in April 2018 was up 9.8 percent compared to the same period a year ago.

Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections. Revenue from other major taxes on motor vehicle sales and rentals, motor fuel and oil and natural gas production also rose in April 2018.

#### Amnesty program starts

Comptroller Hegar on April 30 reminded Texans about the temporary tax amnesty program giving certain delinquent taxpayers a chance to make their accounts compliant with state tax law without incurring penalties and interest on tax due.

The Texas Tax Amnesty Program began May 1 and runs until June 29. The program applies to periods prior to Jan. 1, 2018, and only includes liabilities that have not been previously reported to the Comp-

troller. Passed by the Texas Legislature in 2017, Senate Bill 1 requires the Comptroller of Public Accounts to establish a tax amnesty program to encourage voluntary reporting by:

- Delinquent taxpayers who do not have a Texas Sales and Use Tax Permit or are not registered for a tax or fee administered by the Comptroller's office;

Taxpayers who have a permit but may have underreported or owe additional taxes or

#### **Engineers list projects**The U.S. Army Corps

of Engineers on May 1 released an initial list of projects to address highpriority needs in states recently impacted by natural disasters, including several in Texas in the aftermath of Hurricane Harvey.

According to the Corps of Engineers, an allocation of some \$360 million will be used to address 32 projects in 12 states. The funding is included in the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018, which was passed by Congress and signed into law by President Trump in February.

"As Texas continues on the road to recovery, our shipping channels and bayous are among the highest priorities for investment and repair," said Gov. Greg Abbott. "These projects and improvements will address concerns in a number of local communities affected by Harvey and help combat future flood events. I thank the Army Corps of Engineers for their commitment to these initial projects and look forward to expanding upon this list as Texas continues to recover and rebuild."

Among plans on the list of Texas repair projects are:

– Buffalo Bayou and tributaries;

Corpus Christi Ship Channel;

Galveston Harbor and Channel;

– Gulf Intracoastal Waterway;

- Houston Ship Channel;

– Matagorda Ship

Channel; Sabine Neches Wa-

terway; and — Wallisville Lake.

Gov. Abbott authorizes Harris County **Emergency** Special Election For Flood-Control **Projects** 

AUSTIN - Governor Greg Abbott today sent a letter approving a request by the Harris County Commissioners Court to hold an emergency special election for a bond referendum on Saturday, August

"As you know, I consider responding to matters concerning Hurricane Harvey to qualify as an emergency," writes Governor Abbott. "As this request for an emergency special election was duly passed by a unanimous vote of the Harris County Commissioners Court, I hereby grant approval as Governor of Texas for this emergency special election to be called for bonds to fund flood-related mitigation projects that respond to Hurricane Harvey."

The Governor's letter details the billions in federal funding sources currently available to Harris County for flood and hazard mitigation projects, including: funds for buyouts and elevations of flood prone properties; drainage and reservoir projects that reduce future flooding; other projects that lessen the frequency or severity of flooding; flood risk reduction projects such as dams, retention basins, levees, floodwalls, seawalls, jetties, sand dunes, and large-scale channeling of waterways; and countless other projects.

Importantly, the Governor points out that Congress "purposefully provided much of those matching dollars through Community Development Block Grant funds so that local governments would not need to match the federal grants." For example, funds are available today for Harris County to draw from the \$500 million in FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP); and Harris County may choose to use Community Development Block Grant-Disaster Recovery (CDBG–DR) funds for the HMGP cost-share match for eligible projects.

Additionally, Harris County and the City of Houston, together, have already been allocated \$2.27 billion in CDBG-DR funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.


