State sales tax revenue totaled \$2.76 billion in May

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.76 billion in May, 10.2 percent more than in May 2017.

"Strong growth in sales tax revenue was apparent across all major economic sectors," Hegar said. "While the most rapid growth was in remittances from the construction and oil- and gas-related sectors, significant gains also came from information services, restaurants and retail trade."

Hegar also said state franchise tax revenue for

May was \$3.23 billion, 1.4 percent more than in May 2017. Year-to-date franchise tax revenue is up 11.3 percent. As anticipated in the Certification Revenue Estimate, lower refund activity early in the fiscal year contributed to higher than average net franchise tax collections.

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in May 2018 was up 10.4 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state bud-

get, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections.

Revenue from other major taxes on motor vehicle sales and rentals, motor fuel and oil and natural gas production also rose in May 2018:

• motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$424 million, up 11.7 percent from May 2017;

• motor fuel taxes — \$309.9 million, up 1.8 percent from May 2017; and

• oil and natural gas production taxes — \$416.5 million, up 56 percent from May 2017.

Investigation into fatal crash at Tidwell

Houston police are investigating a fatal crash at 1100 Tidwell about 6:25 a.m. last Wednesday, June 6

According to HPD Vehicular Crimes Division Sergeant G. Hall and Officer M. Tamez, the driver of a black Chrysler Pacifica was westbound on Tidwell and stopped at a traffic light in the left turn lane.

Just as the vehicle began to turn with the green light, the victim ran in front of the Chrysler and was struck. The victim was transported by Houston Fire Department paramedics to Lyndon B. Johnson General Hospital where she was pronounced deceased. The driver of the Chrysler, who remained at

the scene, was questioned and released.

A preliminary investigation determined the victim was at fault for failing to yield the right-of-way to

the vehicle.

The identity of the female victim is pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences

DPS launches iWatchTexas Mobile App

AUSTIN – June 8, 2018 The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) today announced the launch of the new iWatchTexas mobile application (app), which the public can use to report suspicious activities or behaviors that may indicate ongoing or future criminal or terrorist activity. The iWatch Texas program was created as a partnership between communities and law enforcement, and utilizes citizen-sourced tips related to criminal activity. DPS developed the new iWatchTexas mobile app at the direction of Governor Greg Abbott to make it easier for the public to report suspicious activity in Texas, including criminal, tersafety-related threats

"The new iWatchTexas mobile app is one of several solutions that Texas is implementing immediately to identify and report those who may pose a threat to our schools and to our communities," said Governor Abbott, "Our law enforcement officers often rely on vigilant Texans to help keep communities safe, and this new tool will give everyone the ability to quickly and easily communicate with authorities and help prevent future trage-

The app is now avail-

able for iPhone users on the Apple App Store (iWatchTexas) and for Android users on Google Play (iWatchTexas).

"Amid the growing threats to public safety by malicious actors, we want to remind the public that they can be law enforcement's greatest resource to combat those intent on harming others, including innocent schoolchildren and administrators," said DPS Director Steven Mc-Craw. "By launching this new mobile app at the direction of Gov. Abbott, we are providing an additional and easy way for the public to report any illegal or suspicious behavior, which may ultimately help save lives.

The public can report suspicious behaviors through the iWatch Texas program via the new mobile app, online at www.iwatchtx.orgor by calling 1-844-643-2251. A report usually takes fewer than five minutes to complete, and once submitted, each report is reviewed by law enforcement analysts. All reports are confidential (providing contact information, which is optional, will allow for follow-up questions).

Preparations for crime, terrorist attacks and threats to school safety may often be seen but not reported. When in doubt, speak up. Here are some examples of behaviors and activities to report:

- Comments made regarding killing or harming
- Strangers asking questions about building security features and procedures.
- Briefcase, suitcase, backpack or package is left behind.
- Cars or trucks are left in no-parking zones at important buildings.
- Chemical smells or fumes that are unusual for the location.

• People requesting sensitive information, such as blueprints, security plans or VIP travel schedules, without a need to know.

 Purchasing supplies that could be used to make bombs or weapons, or purchasing uniforms without having the proper credentials.

• Taking photographs or videos of security features, such as cameras or checkpoints.

Note: The iWatch Texas program is not designed to report emergencies. If a situation requires an emergency response, call 911. As a reminder, false reporting to a law enforcement agency is a violation of total bus


The nonprofit Street Olympics mission is to implement and sustain programs that provide training, support and resources that lead to healthy and productive lives for youth.

Hurricane season officially underway, Texans urged to prepare now

AUSTIN - TheTexas Department of Public Safety (DPS) wants to remind all Texans that Hurricane Season officially started June 1st. and runs through Nov. 30. Right now is the time to put emergency plans in place, so that residents are prepared in the event of a disaster.

"With Hurricane season officially upon us and the devastation caused by Hurricane Harvey still very fresh in our minds, now is the time to take important steps to protect your family and your property, said Texas Governor Greg Abbott. "Texas is doing everything possible to get ready for this hurricane season and we are urging families to do the same. As we saw during Hurricane Harvey, lives can be saved when we all work together and have a plan."

All Atlantic and Gulf of Mexico coastal areas are subject to hurricanes and tropical storms. It is possible for a storm to severely impact our state, even prior to or without making direct landfall in Texas. Hurricanes can cause widespread damage. and winds can vary from 74 to 157 miles per hour (or higher). In addition, hurricanes and tropical storms can also spawn tornadoes, create dangerous coastal water conditions, including storm surges, and cause extensive flooding damage. Additionally, the rainfall associated with a tropical system wide reach, so monitoring changing weather conditions during hurricane season is critically important for all Texans.

"Because tropical systems can be extremely powerful and unpredictable, early preparation can mean the difference between life and death," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "As the 2018 hurricane season starts, we encourage

to prevent shootings at schools AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on May 30 joined state and local leaders in Dallas and San Marcos to unveil his School and Firearm Safety Action Plan.

- Strengthening existing campus security programs;

- Requiring that gun owners report to law enforcement within 10 days if their firearms are lost or stolen;
- Providing mental health evaluations that identify students at risk of harming others, and much more.

Abbott's announcement follows three roundtable discussions seeking input from victims, parents, educators, lawmakers. law enforcement entities and policy experts.

"This plan is a starting point, not an ending place," Abbott said. "It provides strategies that can be used before the next school year begins to keep our students safe when they return to school. This plan will make our schools safer and our communities

Abbott said he wants state Senate and House leaders to issue an interim charge to consider the merits of adopting a "red flag" law that would allow law enforcement, a family member, school empl ee or a district attorney to file a petition seeking the removal of firearms from a potentially dangerous person, but only after legal due process is followed.

Abbott's recommendations, if adopted, would require an estimated \$110 million in funding, according to the Gover-nor's Office.

Assistance is extended

Gov. Greg Abbott on May 25 announced that the Federal Emergency Management Agency granted his request to extend the deadline to June 30 for transitional sheltering assistance for Hurricane Harvey survivors.

The assistance helps displaced individuals who are unable to return to their homes find short-term shelter in hotels or other temporary housing.

Don't leave child in car

Temperatures across Texas have breached the 100-degree mark, and warmer weather puts a child at greater risk of injury or death if they are left unattended in a vehicle.

The Texas Department of Public Safety on May 24 posted a warning to alert Texans that children can die from heatstroke after being left in a vehicle or entering a vehicle unnoticed, and such negligence could lead to criminal charges.

"Children are needlessly dying every year because they are left unattended in vehicles. The public can do their part by notifying emergency personnel if they witness a child alone or in distress inside a vehicle, regardless of the weather conditions," said DPS Director Steve McCraw.
