Joe V's Supermarket coming to East Aldine

Major addition to Town Center

The East Aldine Management District voted last Tuesday night to enter into a contract with HEB Grocery Company, LP to purchase 7153 acres of land in the new Town Center for a Joe V's supermarket.

HEB plans to build a store of about 55,000 square feet, offering a complete line of food, and with three additional in-store vendors. Joe V's is known for its fresh produce, qual-

ity meats, and low prices.

HEB agreed to pay East Aldine Management District a sum of \$1,312,027.20 for the land. The contract calls for the firm to start construction within three years, but officials expect the store to open earlier.

In addition to the store, there will be dedicated parking for 356 cars. Additional sites are set aside for smaller retail shops next to the grocery store, and an free-standing pad site.

Area residents have been asking for a large market since the Kroger's on Aldine Mail Route closed earlier this year.

Tax increase asked to fix flooding

Community engagement meeting explores NE projects

On a night when flooding was actually a concern at the Northeast Community Center, last Wednesday, Matt Zee, Director of Operations of the Harris County Flood Control District and County Commissioner Jack Cagle gave keynote addresses to welcome the public to an open meeting related to asking for a bond to fund a plan to fix flooding, and to discuss public concerns and hear suggestions.

Precinct 2 County Commissioner Jack Morman hosted the event with staff

and county departments offering reading material, drinking water and cookies. "This is my second meeting in my district and my fourth overall on this subject," said Morman, Pct. 2 commissioner for the Aldine area.

According to Cagle, Commissioner for the northern most portion of the county, the \$2.5 billion dollar bond is the first comprehensive plan to address flooding through all of the county's flood plains and watersheds from top to bottom.

Cagle said "The number one reason I am excited about this bond is that for the first time, we are taking an intergrated approach. We have a lot of neighborhoods wondering what is happening for me in my section, which is important. There is this very important concept that I have

ating from high water put inside a water proof container or plastic bag your prescription drugs, a printed list of all relatives, doctors and insurance agents phone numbers, cell phone and cell phone charger, credit cards and check-book, important family documents (birth certificates, insurance/ bank account information, etc.)," Guinn said.

Harris County Flood Control Precinct 2 Coordinator Jeremy Ratcliff and Communications Officers Robert Lazaro said Commissioners Court plans to

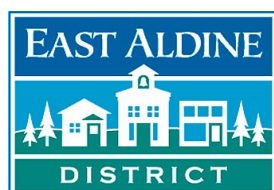

been taught, that water flows downhill. These projects are about dealing with water up the hill to detain it and manage it, as best can be done. We are working with these projects in the middle of the hill, where we can spread it out so it doesn't flood homes and move fairly efficiently through. And trying to do projects at the bottom of the hill because if water doesn't clear there it is like a plug at the bottom of a bathtub. At the bottom of the hill we want to take out the plug and at the top we want an umbrella. So, this countywide approach is to try to make sure that we are taking care of the water at the top, middle and bottom of the hill. Most of the time, Commissioner Morman's area, where we are, is the bottom of the hill. So, where would you like to deal with the water, up in the north or where you are? Or, all along the path, that is the best thing about this bond is that it is an integrated approach. Now, one of the things that I have tried to do with waterways in my area is create charts to understand the flows of water," he said holding up a

chart. " I have eleven waterways in my area, there are 22 watersheds in Harris County. These are the countywide projects that the bond will fund to handle flooding." He went on to show on a chart where funding would go specifically to account for about \$1.6 billion of the bond that begins in his area of Precinct and about \$1.99 billion would be spent related to Precinct 2. Then Commissioner Morman amplified, " I remind Commissioner Cagle and my other colleagues it doesn't matter where rain falls in Harris County, just because there isn't a project with the name of their neighborhood, the bond benefits those downstream. We still need input from everyone that lives here to benefit all neighborhoods. A large part of the bond is to be met with federal dollars and of course you have to meet the federal standards to receive federal dollars. The feds use a cost benefit analysis ratio and it has to meet a certain ratio to get those federal dollars. There are a lot of projects in Precinct 2 that don't meet

those criteria, so we will be using a big chunk of the bond on local projects to benefit our low income families, our middle income families and our rich families. This is a project designed to benefit everyone. This is going to be one of the most important elections in the history of Harris County, in my opinion. And probably the most important in my life. So we need to get the word out." The bond election is to be held August 25 - the one year anniversary of Hurricane Harvey's landfall. Early voting is to begin August 8th. It is to address Harris County's most prevalent natural disaster. The total need in the county for flood risk reduction is about \$25 billion, the bond is to enable the H.C. Flood Control District to leverage the federal Harvey-related disaster funding that is on its way to Harris County. The cost to taxpayers would be spread over 10 to 15 years for an estimated 2-3 cents per \$100 valuation. An over-65 or disabled exemption and a home worth \$200,000 or less would not pay any additional taxes.

DPS urges Texans to take safety precautions this summer

AUSTIN – The Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) is reminding Texans to take extra precautions and stay safe as we officially kick off summer today, June 21. Rising temperatures and increased travel can create additional safety concerns over the summer, particularly with extreme temperatures increasing the risk of heat-related injuries or deaths. Despite rain that has cooled much of the state this week, heat indices have already hit 100 degrees and above in many parts of Texas, and will continue to do so throughout the summer. "Safety is always our first priority at DPS, and summertime presents our state with unique challenges," said DPS Director Steven McCraw. "School is out, families are traveling, and temperatures are on the rise. Everyone can do their part to prevent senseless tragedies this summer by staying hydrated in the heat and using extra caution, as well as obeying traffic laws while on the road." Rising summer temperatures create greater safety concerns, including the risk of heat exhaustion and heat stroke. If you start feeling ill, immediately move to a cooler area and slowly drink fluids. Be sure to stay hydrated throughout the day and, if possible, avoid outdoor ac-

tivity during the hottest parts of the afternoon. Warmer weather also places children and pets at greater risk of injury or death if left unattended in a vehicle. Temperatures inside a car can rise more than 20 degrees in only 10 minutes. Even with an outside temperature of 60 degrees, the temperature inside a car can reach 110 degrees, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. Leaving windows partially rolled down does not help. Children and pets should never be left unattended in a vehicle. (For additional information, visit the DPS website.) Additionally, with school out for the summer, drivers should be aware of children playing near roadways and use caution while driving in neighborhoods, as well as near parks and playgrounds. As road travel increases this summer, DPS reminds everyone to stay vigilant and practice safe driving habits. DPS offers the following tips for enhancing safety on our roads throughout the summer:

- Eliminate distractions while driving, including the use of mobile devices. Texas law prohibits using a portable wireless device to read, write or send an electronic message unless the vehicle is stopped.
- Buckle up everyone in the vehicle – it's the law.
- Slow down or move over for police, fire, EMS and Texas Department of Transportation vehicles and tow trucks stopped on the side of the road with emergency lights activated – it's the law. Also, show the same courtesy to fellow drivers stopped along the road.
- Drive defensively, as increases in travel may present additional challenges.
- Don't drive fatigued – allow plenty of time to reach your destination.
- If you see a road hazard or if you observe anything suspicious, report it to the nearest law enforcement agency.
- Before your trip begins, make sure your vehicle is properly maintained and always double check to make sure all cargo is secure.
- Monitor weather and road conditions wherever you are traveling. In the event of inclement weather, use extra caution on roadways and be aware of your surroundings. For road conditions in Texas, visit <https://drivetexas.org>.

AISD Trustees approve budget, tax rate for 2018-19 school year

During the June 12 Board meeting, Aldine ISD Trustees approved the budget for the 2018-19 school year and also set the tax rate for the upcoming school year. The general operating budget will be \$573,354,736, which is a decrease of \$49,297,408 from the 2017-18 adopted budget. This represents an overall decrease of 7.9 percent. The reason for the decreased budget is due to a projected decrease in stu-

dent enrollment for the 2018-19 school year. The 2018-19 budget provides funding for all district operations, instructional programs and student activities. The proposed tax rate was set at \$1.435888 per \$100 valuation (.2825 cents for interest and sinking and \$1.15388 for Maintenance and Operations). The 2018-19 tax rate is 6.25 cents higher than the 2017-18 tax rate due to additional debt payments

that were approved by Aldine voters in November 2015 when they overwhelmingly passed the \$798 million bond referendum and to additional expenses the district incurred due to Hurricane Harvey. The 2018-19 tax rate will not be officially adopted until the district receives the certified tax roll from the Harris County Appraisal District in August.

FEMA awards \$51 million for Harris County property acquisition

AUSTIN, Texas – June 14, 2018 - The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has awarded more than \$51 million to the Harris County Flood Control District for the acquisition of 294 flood-prone homes damaged by Hurricane Harvey. Once the structures are removed, the land will be dedicated and maintained as open space to conserve natural floodplain functions. Previously, the Harris County Flood Control District was awarded more than \$25 million to acquire and remove 169 residential structures. These awards

are part of a larger project to acquire and remove 985 flood-prone properties in Harris County. The overall proposed federal share is \$163 million. The acquisition and removal of properties is a part of the Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP). The program requires a 25 percent non-federal match. The total cost of the project is \$217 million. FEMA has a long-term commitment to help Texas and its communities recover from Hurricane Harvey and to become more resilient.

HMGP provides funds to implement hazard mitigation measures following a presidentially declared disaster. Hazard mitigation actions reduce or eliminate the long term risks to people and property from natural hazards. Grants are designed to assist local communities, states, federally recognized tribes and territories with implementing mitigation measures during the recovery process. The goal is to reduce overall risk to the population and structures from future hazard events, while also reducing reliance on federal funding in future disasters.

Harris County Senior Justice Assessment Center celebrates first anniversary

In honor of World Elder Abuse Day on June 15, Harris County Attorney Vince Ryan is lauding the accomplishments and contributions of the Harris County Senior Justice Assessment Center (SJAC).

In its first year, the SJAC has compiled a successful record of serving senior victims of abuse, neglect and exploitation. The County Attorney's Office works collaboratively with several agencies and experts at the SJAC to help Harris County victims over the age of 65. The facility is the first of its kind in Texas.

"Many of our seniors are vulnerable to outrageous crimes, sometimes by their own family members or caregivers," County Attorney Ryan said. "They deserve our respect and assistance after years of working, raising families and helping our community."

The other agencies involved with SJAC are the Harris County Guardianship Program, the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services (Adult Protective Services), the Texas Attorney General's Office, the Better Business Bureau Education Foundation, the Harris County District Attorney's Office, the Harris County Sheriff's Office, the Harris Health System, the Houston Police Department, and UTHealth.

The agencies meet regularly—at least twice each month—to review referrals

from participating agencies and law enforcement. The SJAC teams discuss each client's needs and how they can be met. Other professionals, including a forensic nurse, a psychiatrist, forensic case managers, geriatric health specialists, mental health professionals and lawyers participate in the discussions and planning.

Since SJAC first began this collaboration April 1, 2017, through May 23, 2018, it has opened 133 cases. Thirty-nine have been closed and 94 are still active.

The most common type of elder abuse is financial exploitation, situations in which someone takes advantage of a senior's diminishing capacity. SJAC has handled over 100 of these cases since it opened. One case involved the forgery of a senior's signature to a deed resulting in the sale of the property to an unsuspecting third party. Through SJAC, the Houston Police Department's investigation led to the prosecution by the District Attorney of the forger who was ordered to pay the senior \$27,500 in restitution.

Another case involved a person employed at an assisted living facility who obtained identifying information and financial accounts for three seniors. The case was referred to the Department of Public Safety, whose investigation led to an arrest and prosecution for three felonies.

An SJAC forensic case manager contacted the seniors or their caregivers to educate them about how to prevent future exploitation and re-victimization.

A number of seniors are victims of physical abuse, sexual abuse or both. The SJAC helped prove a woman had been sexually assaulted at a senior facility during her stay there. The alleged perpetrator was identified and was found to have a history of committing assaults at similar facilities. He was convicted and sentenced to prison for life.

Seniors who are 80 or older are most likely to be victimized. Since SJAC has been in operation, 18 charges have been filed against individuals victimizing seniors with six convictions so far.

"Approximately ten percent of Harris County's population is age 65 or older," County Attorney Ryan said. "Many of them suffer from abuse and neglect but few cases are reported. We want to let our seniors and their caregivers know that there is a place where they can get help and justice."

Garcia-Mayorga was pronounced dead at the scene. The investigation is ongoing.

Legislators protest separation of children from Immigrant parents

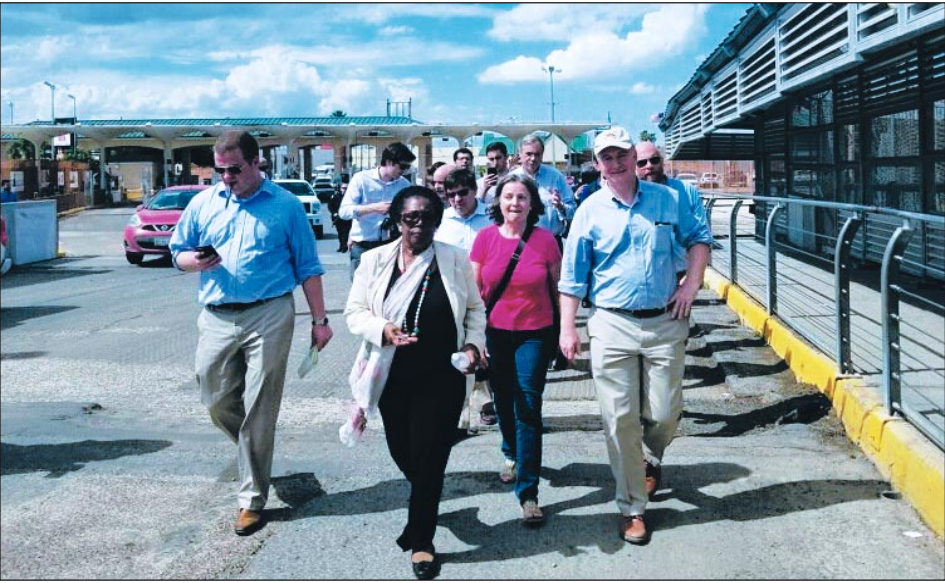

Rep. Ana Hernandez:
“We will not stand by and silently watch while families are being torn apart and children are detained in prison facilities. A baby jail for immigrant minors forcibly taken from their families has no place in Houston.”

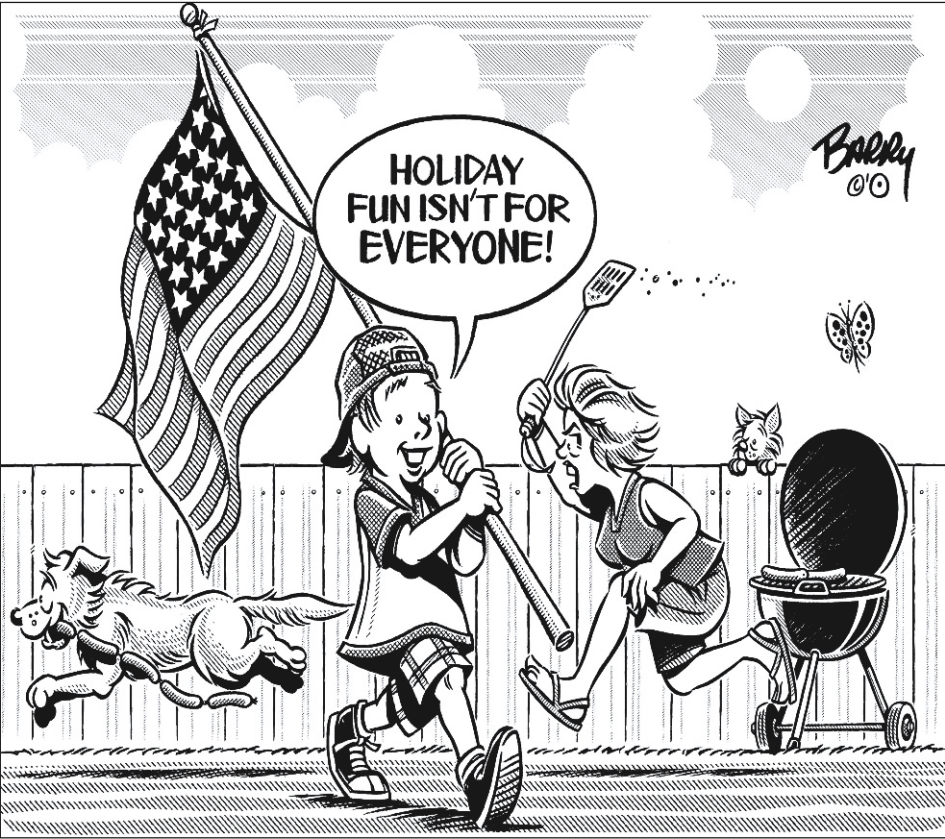
Last week it was discovered that federal authorities, in conjunction with contracted private partners, have signed a lease to open a baby jail to detain child immigrants just east of downtown Houston. State Senator Sylvia Garcia issued the following statement in reaction:

State Senator Sylvia Garcia:
"Now is the time to gather together to stop this baby jail before a single child seeking refuge is locked up in our city. The Trump administration has made it clear that it will rip children away from their parents despite legal and child development experts telling them that it is unnecessary and known to cause lifelong harm. No law requires this. Humanity demands compassion. We must say as a community with one voice that jailing children away from their parents is wrong, it should not happen anywhere, and we as Houstonians will not allow it to happen here. Not now. Not ever."

Congressman Gene Green:
“The inhumane practice of separating families at the border to deter families from immigrating to the United States must end,” said Green. “It is tragic to see the number of children who are forced to deal with anxiety and anguish after they are separated from their families and put into shelters where they do not know anyone and do not understand what is going on.”
“The arguments made by the Trump administration to defend this disgusting decision do not stand on any legal ground nor does it make sense. The separation of children from their families could end immediately with a decision by the Trump Administration. The faith community, immigrant organizations, Democrats and many Republicans have called on the President to immediately stop this practice. Family separation goes against everything our country stands for and is not how we welcome immigrants who risked everything to seek a better life.”



Senate panel conducts hearings on school violence, safety

AUSTIN — A panel of Texas Senate members on June 11 and 12 received input about ways to improve security on public school campuses.

Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, who presides over the Senate, formed the legislative body’s Select Committee on Violence in Schools and School Safety following the May shooting at Santa Fe High School in which a student shot and killed 10 people and injured 10 others.

The Senate district of Committee Chair Larry Taylor, R-Friendswood, includes Santa Fe Independent School District. Taylor underlined the complexity of the problem, saying, “This is a multi-faceted deal. There is no one solution. A metal detector is not the end-all.”

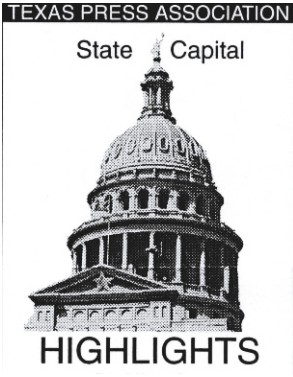
The committee heard ideas regarding enhanced control of campus access and improved safety measures such as security cameras. San Antonio ISD Police Chief Joe Curiel told the committee that police presence works as a deterrent and preventative measure, and that increasing positive interactions between officers and students can help students feel more comfortable communicating about actual and possible problems with officers.

Midway ISD School Resource Officer Jeff Foley told the committee, “While we need to do our best to keep these kids secure and keep them safe, we also don’t want them to feel like they’re in a prison.”

Christopher Huckabee of the Texas Society of Architects School Safety Workgroup talked about internal and external threats. He said school design is trending toward more compact structures that are built “up” rather than “out” so sections of a building can be locked down to contain a shooter.

Kim Vickers, director of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement, said that under current law, school marshals must be licensed to carry a handgun in the state, must be employees of the school, must complete an 80-hour training course and pass a psychological

evaluation. Vickers said schools may elect to use a less restrictive “guardianship program” that only requires that a school board to vote to allow specific teachers or staff to be armed, but there is no state oversight over those.

Texas School Safety Center Director Kathy Martinez-Prather said the Lone Star State has the largest on-campus police presence in the country. While more than 240 school districts have their own police departments, many more use school resource officers who are local police assigned to the school, she added.

Speaker orders studies

Texas House Speaker Joe Straus, in response to the Santa Fe High School shooting, charged a number of House committees to study issues related to school security and firearm safety and to make recommendations based on their findings by the month of August, when the new school year begins.

Straus said his instructions to committees reflect ideas recommended by Gov. Greg Abbott and suggestions offered by educators, behavioral health experts, law enforcement and others.

Fraud unit is recognized

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on June 12 announced that his office’s Medicaid Fraud Control Unit received the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Office of Inspector General’s award of

excellence in fighting fraud, waste and abuse.

Paxton said the unit was selected for the top award from 50 units nationwide because of its “highly effective collaboration with the Office of the Inspector General, the FBI and other federal partners.”

During fiscal year 2017, the unit obtained 108 indictments, 137 convictions and led the nation in recovering more than \$534 million, Paxton said.

“Medicaid fraud drives up the cost of health care for all of us and steals from taxpayer-funded programs that help Texans receive medical care,” added Paxton.

Proclamation is extended

Gov. Greg Abbott on June 8 extended his disaster proclamation for Texas counties impacted by Hurricane Harvey.

Abbott issued the original proclamation on Aug. 23, 2017, and has extended the proclamation every month since then.

The proclamation applies to the counties of Aransas, Austin, Bee, Brazoria, Calhoun, Chambers, Colorado, DeWitt, Fayette, Fort Bend, Galveston, Goliad, Gonzales, Harris, Jackson, Jefferson, Jim Wells, Karnes, Kleberg, Lavaca, Liberty, Live Oak, Matagorda, Nueces, Refugio, San Patricio, Victoria, Waller, Wharton and Wilson.

Also, Angelina, Atascosa, Bastrop, Bexar, Brazos, Burleson, Caldwell, Cameron, Comal, Grimes, Guadalupe, Hardin, Jasper, Kerr, Lee, Leon, Madison, Milam, Montgomery, Newton, Orange, Polk, Sabine, San Augustine, San Jacinto, Trinity, Tyler, Walker, Washington and Willacy.

The proclamation authorizes the use of all available resources of state government and of political subdivisions that are reasonably necessary to cope with the disaster.

call a bond election for August 25, 2018, for the Harris County Flood Control District. Voters will be asked to vote on what could be \$2.5 billion in bonds for flood risk reduction projects throughout the county. To learn more about the flood bonds visit, WWW.HCFCD.ORG/BOND-PROGRAM.

Judge Joe Stephens Justice of the Peace said, "East Houston has been impacted tremendously by Hurricane Harvey, not only have we lost property and life we have lost our only Hospital (East Houston Regional). In the past we have put our lives back together one piece of sheet-rock at a time with little to no governmental help. Unlike Kingwood, Bellaire, River Oaks and the more affluent areas of town where they could probably do a neighborhood fundraiser and fix their flooding problems we are a working class side of town. We need and deserve a comprehensive plan going forward for how the flooding and Bayous that run through this area (Greens,

Carpenter, and Huntington) will be remediated and mitigated to prevent future catastrophes like Allison and Harvey. My ultimate concern is that the east side gets help from the \$2.5 billion flood control bond program and we need a hospital immediately."

Houston City Councilman Robert Gallegos said, "Harris County Flood Control officials are hosting community meetings to seek input on projects that will be funded with the \$2.5 billion in bonds that voters will be asked to approve in August. Projects could include channel improvements, floodplain buyouts, and creation of more green-space and detention basins throughout the entire county.
