

First allocation of funds available for voluntary home buyouts due to Hurricane Harvey flooding

- Since Hurricane Harvey made landfall in August 2017, the Harris County Flood Control District has been working with its many local, state, and federal partners to address the flood risk reduction needs of the county. This includes responding to and addressing volunteers for the Flood Control District Home Buyout Program by maintaining a Home Buyout Hotline, collecting information from thousands of home buyout volunteers, reviewing and identifying properties that meet the Flood Control District Home Buyout eligibility criteria, and submitting



The map below indicates where these approximately 169 homes are located within Harris County.

grant applications for funding to support home buyouts in response to Hurricane Harvey.

Home buyouts are used by the Flood Control District to reduce flood damages in areas hopelessly deep in the floodplain where structural projects to reduce flooding are not cost effective and/or beneficial. Since the Flood Control District's voluntary buyout program began in 1985, more than 2,075 structures have been purchased with Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) grants



and more than 960 properties (with and without structures) have been pur chased with local Flood Control District funds.

As announced by the Texas Division of Emergency Management, Harris County will receive its first allocation of FEMA Hazard Mitigation Grant Program (HMGP) funds in response to Hurricane Harvey. Twenty-five million six hundred thousand dollars are estimated to be received out of the total \$163.5 million that the Flood Control District requested for home buyouts through HMGP. The Flood Control District will be able to purchase approximately 169 homes with \$8.6 million required local matching funds and the \$25.6 million in HMGP funds. Additional funding allocations from the same grant application are expected later this year.

In April 2018, the Flood Control District submitted a grant application to Texas Division of Emergency Management and FEMA to request funding through the HMGP. This grant application included approximately 1,000 homes for potential home buyout (totaling approximately \$163.5 million in federal funding requests to the State). To utilize the new $HGMP\ funding, the\ Harris$ County Commissioners Court must first authorize a local funding match of \$54.5 million, or 25 percent of the total amount needed (approximately \$218 million total) to support purchasing the proposed 1.000 homes

The 1,000 homes were included in the grant application because they meet the Flood Control District's Home Buyout

from a bayou, creek, or smaller tributary that feeds into the bayou sys-

The home is located in a mapped floodplain and/ or subject to repetitive flooding caused by out-ofbank bayou flooding.

A home buyout must be the most beneficial solution to a home's flooding problem (as opposed to a structural solution, such as a channel conveyance improvement or stormwater detention basin).

The home is strategically located for potential or future flood damage reduction projects and/or floodplain preservation.

The home is located in

a community that has expressed general support for buyouts.

The first funding allocation of \$25.6 million will support the purchase of approximately 169 homes dispersed throughout the county. These homes were initially selected because they meet the Flood Control District Home Buyout Program eligibility criteria, and these homes were prioritized because they have been designated as "substantially damaged" by building code officials at the Harris County Engineering Department or the City of Houston's Public Works & Engineering Department. Once a property has received a 'substantially damaged' designation, homeowners have limited options to bring homes back into compliance with current floodplain regulations, as a "substantially damaged"

to repair the home is assumed to be equal to or more than 50 percent of the market value of the home itself.

The remaining funds requested by the Flood Control District in the April 2018 grant application are still under review by the Texas Division of Emergency Management for future authorization, and subsequent funding authorized by the Texas Division of Emergency Management will be used to purchase additional homes that were included in the April 2018 HMGP applica-

"I recognize the determination of the residents of this county, and we are continuously working on our residents' behalf to secure every avenue of federal, state, and even local funding available to move people out of harm's way before the next storm or flooding event. This is just the first allotment of FEMA funding for home buyouts, and we are looking forward to the ability to do more work for our residents," said County

Judge Emmett.
The Flood Control District's Home Buyout Program is ongoing, and home owners may volunteer to be considered for the program at any time. The Flood Control District is continually reevaluating and reassessing the needs for home buyouts across the county as additional funding becomes available.

Lake Houston level reduced Governor's program temporarily due to storm

2018 - Houston City Council Member Dave Martin and Houston Mayor Svlvester Turner announced the daily pooling level of Lake Houston will be temporarily reduced from 42.5 feet to 41 feet, effective immediately.

Houston Public Works Director, Carol Haddock, directed the Coastal Water Authority to start lowering the level of Lake Houston in advance of the predicted storms. Council Member Martin has confirmed that all gates at Lake Houston are open and the level of Lake Houston would reach the desired 41 foot mark by last Friday evening. Authorities advised Lake Houston resisures to secure boats and other watercraft during this temporary reduction.

Once the lake is lowered

to 41 feet it is the City of Houston's plan to adjust the spillway gates to maintain a level of 41 feet temporarily due to the inclement weather. Currently, forecasts predict that local heavy rainfall is possible Sunday, June 17 to Tuesday, June 19. Rainfall amounts are estimated to be between 2 to 5 inches with isolated higher amounts possible over a 2 to 3 day period. Grounds throughout our area are dry and will be able to absorb the first few inches of rainfall without much runoff. Even with dry grounds

rainfall in a short period of time, which is why the temporary reduction of the level of Lake Houston is necessary.

This will address the immediate concerns of the Lake Houston Community, including Kingwood, Humble Atascocita and Huffman. This lower lake level will continue to be observed while the City works with area partners to address siltation and other coordination efforts with Lake Conroe. The City of Houston has been monitoring the weather, and will continue to monitor and evaluate water demand, weather patterns and other mitigation activ-

U.S. Army Corps Of Engineers allocates \$500 Million for Texas projects

AUSTIN - June 12, 2018 - The U.S. Army Corps Of Engineers (US-ACE) has announced more than \$509 million in funding for multiple projects in Texas, including flood mitigation and critical work for the Brays and Buffalo Bayous, as well as the Matagorda and Corpus Christi Ship Channels. The funding will also provide resources for extensive studies of the Texas coastline to help make the state more resilient to future storms. This funding allocation is in addition to the disaster relief funding for Texas previously announced by the USACE.

"With Hurricane Harvey's devastation still fresh in our minds, and the next hurricane season upon us, the State of Texas is urgently focused on making our infrastructure more

resilient to future storms, said Governor Abbott. "This funding is essential to those efforts and to help minimize the loss of human lives and damage to infrastructure and propertv. I thank the USACE. Texas congressional delegation and the Office of Management and Budget for recognizing the critical importance of these projects, and I look for-

ward to their completion.' Other projects that the USACE announced they will allocate funding to in-

for School Safety

Gov. Greg Abbott has proposed 40 recommendations to improve school safety in the wake of the recent Santa Fe shooting. While his plan stopped short of the kinds of gun control policies implemented by Florida Gov. Rick Scott after the Parkland shooting, it prioritized recommendations from Abbott's recent three-day

summit. Although several recommendations focused on making schools safer by strengthening security and increasing law enforcement presence, what is critical is that the proposal included a resounding call for improving mental health assessments and services.

Steps in this direction would include providing mental health evaluations that identify students at risk of harming others or themselves, increasing mental health training, improving mental health crisis response, and most notably the expansion of Texas Tech University's Telemedicine Wellness, İntervention, Triage and Referral Project, which seeks to identify junior and high school students who show a risk of committing violence.

The priority on mental health is vital. But let's be clear about what we mean by mental health so as to not stigmatize the person given the label. After all, many readers have experienced depression, anger, rage, mood swings and the like, but most people experiencing these issues or episodes do not commit school violence or violence

fying individuals who exhibit severe antisocial tendencies and providing them the services they need should be a high priority, and this should not be limited solely to teenagers. In fact, it goes much further back. As my own research in the Journal of Criminal Justice has shown, conduct disorder, mental illness and antisocial behavior in early childhood left unaddressed can have long-term adverse impacts on children, their families and society at

large. Effective, evidencebased strategies here include cognitive behavioral therapy and social-emotional programs that focus on learning to manage one's emotions and changing a child's decision-making patterns and priorities. These programs not only generate positive returns on investment in the individual's life, but my research in the journal Criminology & Public Policy shows that the public has a greater interest in spending money on early interventions than punish-

ing people as adults. At the same time, it is also important to bear in mind that simply because someone exhibits some of these characteristics does not mean that person will always react negatively. Conversely, the fact that someone does not exhibit any issues does not guarantee the person will never engage in an atrocious

act. In some school shootings, we read later that the signs were always there. but in other cases they were not. Great care must be taken to ensure that we do the best we can at predicting what humans might do. It is not always a simple answer with 100 percent accuracy.

The Governor and all of the constituents he brought to Austin should be commended for starting conversations about an issue that many of us wish were not even a topic of conversation. But it is.

Yes, we will have more conversations in the future. Yes, we will have more recommendations in the future. And yes, we will have some tangible actions in the future. Above all else, we need to remember what South African revolutionary and president Nelson Mandela once observed. "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." The students in Florida, Texas and many other states are leading the way. In that sense, when it is their turn to lead, we are in good stead.

been touched by and in-

volved in this work.

Then he spoke about the upcoming \$2.5 billion bond issue that will be on the ballot in a special election on August 25th. He explained that the date is the one year anniversary of the devastation when Hurricane Harvey hit the Texas coast, causing flooding throughout Harris Count and other parts of the

"Harvey changed a lot of lives, he said." He noted that 154,000 homes in Harris County and Houston flooded. The Hurricane dropped 51" of rain in a four day period. Many homes were destroyed or made unlivable, and there

were many deaths in the flood waters.
Emmett looked at the

history of floods in the Houston area. In 1936 downtown was inundated by water, and as a result 2 reservoirs were built in the 40s as protection. But Hurricane Harvey exceeded the 100 year flood, and perhaps the 500 year flood. Emmett talked about,

and distributed a brochure, outlining 16 steps that need to be taken to make the county "resilient" and able to withstand future floods.

These steps include revised flood maps and reg-ulations not allowing building in flood plains, a new third reservoir, completion of planned flood control projects, Lakes Houston and Conroe should be blood control facilities, underpasses that flood need to be signed, and blocked, buyout of homes at risk in the flood plain should be implemented, and existing reservoirs should be repaired and improved.

Emmett noted that the bond issue is necessary because the property tax is not enough to pay for this type of work. He thinks the county should receive part of the sales tax that the state collects.

Emmett also spoke

about the plans for renovating the Astrodome into a usable park-like county facility, with recreation areas built over a 1400 car parking structure.

Tell Congress newsprint tariffs threaten your paper... and you

Do you rely on your local newspaper to keep up with how your tax dollars are being spent? If so, tell your congressman you don't want a tariff to put the paper out of business.

A new study shows communities that lose their newspapers suffer an alarming increase in the cost of local government because there's no watchdog reporting on how your hard-earned money is spent.

A new "temporary' tariff on Canadian newsprint — the paper used to print 75 percent of American newspaper pages — poses a dire threat if it becomes permanent. Simply put, your hometown paper can't exist if it costs more to print than it earns in revenue. The accompanying article by David Chavern, president of the News Media Alliance, details this dangerous situation.

Under the arcane and almost unfathomable rules of U.S. trade policy, the newspaper industry isn't allowed to formally make its case to the administra-tion, which will decide soon whether to make the tariff permanent. Members of Congress. on the other hand, may submit official comments to be considered.

The Texas newspa-


per industry has urged our 36 House members and both members of the Senate to help fight the tariff. So far, only a handful have agreed to so. Signing on as cosponsors of HR 6031, a bill that would put the brakes on the tariff, are Reps. Bill Flores, R, Bryan; Rep. Louie Gohmert, R-Tyler, and Rep. Randy Weber, R-Friendswood. Providing letters of support for newspapers are Reps. Lamar Smith, R-San Antonio, and Mac Thornberry, R-Amaril-lo. Sen. John Cornyn has verbally stated that he opposes the tariff, and a spokesman for Rep. Roger Williams, R-Austin, said he plans a letter of support for newspapers.

That's only seven members of a total Texas delegation of 38 who are fighting for Texas' newspapers. Perhaps the others don't think taxpayers care. It's time for them to hear from you, the voter. Call. Write. Tell them you oppose the tariff because you depend on your local newspaper to serve as a watchdog.

Urge them take up this fight...not on newspapers' behalf, but on yours. And tell them you'll be watching to see what they do.

Top officials join in briefing about hurricane preparedness

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on June 6 joined President Donald Trump President Donald Trump, Department of Homeland Security Secretary Kirstjen Nielsen, FEMA Administrator Brock Long, White House cabinet members and governors from across the country for a video teleconference briefing on hurricane prepared-

Along with Abbott in Austin were officials from various state agencies that oversee emergency response. The briefing was held to review lessons learned after the 2017 hurricane season. FEMA provided an overview of evacua-tion zones, clearance times, decision timelines, forecast uncertainty, responsible decision makers and public messaging.

Following the briefing, Abbott said Texas is getting resources ready and communication and response strategies together to protect families and property in the event of another hurricane. Abbott is encouraging Texans to prepare emergency supply kits, create communication plans, prepare homes for storms and heed warnings from local officials.

The 2018 Atlantic hurricane season began on June 1 and will end on Nov. 30.

Unit reaches milestone

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton on June 6 announced his office's Fugitive Appre-hension Unit achieved its 10,000th arrest.

The unit works jointly with the U.S. Marshals Lone Star Fugitive Task

"This major milestone is a testament to our Fugitive Apprehension vork and dedication. These courageous law enforcement officers have successfully arrested 10,000 fugitives and provided invaluable protection for Texans," Paxton said

The unit includes 22investigators, three criminal analysts, two administrative assistants and a five-person command staff who operate in regional offices in Austin, Houston and Arlington. The unit's mission is to locate and arrest violent fugitives and convicted child sex offenders who violate conditions of their



Allie Scott, LPC and Clinical Coordinator of Shield Bearer Counseling Centers states, "The issue is that we think it is our responsibility to handle it all on our own. We feel like we are the only ones going through whatever i is. We sometimes think if we seek help from a professional that means we are imperfect and failing."

Ms. Scott also shared that relief begins as soon as you reach out for help "Studies have confirmed what our clients tell us. that as soon as you call for help, you begin to feel better." A call to Shield Bearer is free and it usually results in a plan specific for you which may include counseling services or other services

Scott goes on to say, "If you know someone you might think needs help, don't wait to reach out. Simply ask them how they are doing and let them know that you want to be there for them if they need help."

WASHINGTON, DC - June 12, 2018 -Today, the House of Representatives overwhelmingly passed the bipartisan Comprehensive Opioid Recov ery Centers Act (H.R. 5327), a bill introduced by Reps. Gene Green (D-TX), Brett Guthrie (R-KY), Ben Ray Lujan (D-NM), and Larry Buschon, M.D. (R-IN).

The bipartisan legislation that passed today is a step forward for millions of Americans who suffer from opioid abuse and need comprehensive treatment at a one-stop shop," said Green. "Our legislation will require designated centers to provide wraparound services for Americans suffering from opioid addiction, including counseling, recovery housing, and job

training. It is our intention to use this new program to identify standards and best practices that can be deployed nationwide."

The Comprehensive Opioid Recovery Centers Act of 2018 would allow the Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS) to award grants to treatment facilities in order to establish or operate comprehensive centers that provide a full range of treatment services The hill requires evidencebased practices and data reporting to ensure accountability. allowing for treatments such as detoxification, the use of FDA-approved medications for substance abuse disorders, and a number of other




