Texas Sales Tax Holiday is Aug. 10-12

AUSTIN July 25, 2018 – Whether you're in need of book bags, blackboard chalk or bell-bottom pants, Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar is reminding shoppers they can save money on those and certain other items during the state's sales tax holiday. This year, the sales tax holiday is scheduled for Friday, Saturday and Sunday, Aug. 10-12.

The law exempts most clothing, footwear, school



supplies and backpacks priced below \$100 from sales tax, saving shoppers about \$8 on every \$100 they spend during the weekend.

"As Texas families begin the process of replacing their beach bags with book bags, Texas' sales tax holiday is the perfect opportunity to save some money on the supplies families need before the school bell rings," Hegar said. "As a dad to three young chil-

dren, I know how these expenses can add up."

Lists of apparel and school supplies that may be purchased tax-free can be found on the Comptroller's website at TexasTaxHoliday.org.

This year, shoppers will save an estimated \$90.3 million in state and local sales taxes during the sales tax holiday.

Texas' tax holiday weekend has been an annual event since 1999.

Aldine ISD kids wrapped up Summer 2018 STEAM Camp

Aldine ISD held its Summer 2018 STEAM Camp (click here to learn more) from Monday, July 23 to Thursday, July 26. “The kids have been really engaged,” said Olivia Boatner, director of magnet schools. “They take it seriously and are thinking about the activities.” The fourth through sixth graders attend the camp from 7:45 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. every day of the camp held at Houston Academy. They worked with AISD educators as well as Carver HS students and took part in interactive and hands-on activities.

Topics ranged from robotics and coding to visual and performing arts. This year, students also experienced the “Shark Tank.” The budding entrepreneurs got to apply their skills through building on a business idea, making it concrete, with the final step to pitch their idea. “We want the kids to start thinking about an interest that could lead to a career,” Boatner said. “These are the formative years when they are deciding what they want to do.” Students that take part in the annual camp experience a dozen different sessions. Topics range

from robotics and coding to visual and performing arts. “This is a great opportunity for kids to experience,” said Dr. Michaelann Kelley, director of visual arts. Boatner, supervisor for the camp, developed its curriculum alongside Kelley, Amy Smith, program director of speech and debate; and Refugio Rodríguez, director of music education. They focused on choosing projects related to the STEAM subjects. Boatner added they are already working on ideas for next year’s camp.

Suspects charged in robbery at Family Dollar Store

Two suspects have been arrested in a robbery incident in which a HPD officer discharged his duty weapon, striking one of the suspects, at 4603 Tidwell Road, and Hirsch Road intersection about 8:50 p.m. on Thursday, July 26. The suspects, Deldrick Rashawn Spivey, 19 and Corey Young, 17, are both facing pending robbery charges. Photos of the suspects are not available at this time. According to investigations, officer W. Rocha and

his partner observed Spivey and Young enter the Family Dollar store wearing hoodies and masks, and attempt to rob the store’s cashiers at gunpoint. Spivey then exited the front door of the store and charged towards Officer Rocha. Officer Rocha fired his duty weapon, striking Spivey in the leg. Officer Rocha immediately rendered aid to Spivey and called for Houston Fire Department paramedics. Spivey was trans-

ported to Lyndon Baines Johnson General Hospital in stable condition. Meanwhile, Young hid behind the store after exiting from a rear door and was arrested a short time later. A handgun was located near Young. Officer W. Rocha, who discharged his duty weapon, was not injured in this incident. Officer Rocha is assigned to the Northeast Patrol Division and was sworn in as an HPD officer in May 2013.

Lake Conroe and Lake Houston temporary flood mitigation plan

Houston Water, San Jacinto River Authority & Coastal Water Authority release Joint Reservoir Operations Plan to lower water levels to prevent flooding

HOUSTON - Lake Houston and Lake Conroe were built as and remain important parts of the City's drinking water system. Over 4 million Houstonians and residents in the greater Houston region rely on water provided by the City of Houston. Hurricane Harvey deposited tremendous amounts of silt in the West Fork of the San Jacinto River. The silt physically changed the river's ability to safely pass water flows during storms and created need for a significant dredging project to restore the river's capacity. The City of Houston, in partnership with the Coastal Water Authority, operates Lake Houston.

The San Jacinto River Authority operates Lake Conroe. Together we have developed a temporary Joint Reservoir Operations Plan which will be in place until the US Army Corp of Engineers dredging project on the lower West Fork of the San Jacinto River is complete. The project is scheduled to begin this month and may take up to three years to complete. The lakes will be operated with two different strategies.

LAKE CONROE
Lake Conroe is located upstream from Lake Houston and pre-releases before a storm run the risk of pushing water into Lake Houston, which is not desirable. Therefore, the San Jacinto River Authority will conduct temporary seasonal lowering of Lake Conroe. Lake Conroe has a normal water level of 201 feet.
Apr 1 – May 31 Lake Conroe will be reduced and

maintained at 200 feet.
Aug 1 – Sep 30 Lake Conroe will be reduced and maintained at 199 feet.
After each temporary seasonal lowering, Lake Conroe will be restored to normal water level.

LAKE HOUSTON
Lake Houston, as the lowest lake on the river system, will be operated using a pre-release approach. Coastal Water Authority will conduct pre-storm releases from Lake Houston. Lake Houston has a normal pool elevation of 42.5 feet.
If the National Weather Service predicts greater than 3 inches of rain within the San Jacinto River basin in a 48-hour period, Coastal Water Authority will lower Lake Houston to 41.5 feet.

HCSO deputies arrest 3 in thwarted ATM heist

Harris County Sheriff's Office District 2 patrol deputies quick actions are credited in the arrest and charging of three men who were in the process of stealing an ATM from a local bank in north Harris County.

Ask Rusty – File Early and Invest vs Wait to File

Dear Rusty: I read your article entitled “Doing a Breakdown Analysis” and noted that the article was in response to a reader question about when to take Social Security Benefits. The writer commented “I’m in pretty good health and don't really need the money right now.” The breakeven analysis you suggested is a great help in determining whether to claim early or wait to take Social Security benefits; however, and in light of your reader's comment that “he did not need the money right now,” perhaps another element should be added to the breakeven analysis. That element is to roll the figures based on taking the money early and investing that money month after month for the 48 months in question. The end result should also help in determining an appropriate course of action. I was in the same position back in the mid 90's and made out far better by taking the money early and investing it. In any event, it's one more way to look at this issue. Signed: Faithful Reader

Dear Faithful: Thanks for your feedback. I certainly agree that there's more than one way to look at the question of when to take Social Security. And, yes, I'm quite familiar with the strategy of taking benefits early and investing them. But since I'm not a Financial Advisor and not qualified to give investment advice, I'm required to restrict my remarks to only the Social Security aspects relating to questions I'm asked. You might be interested to know, however, that many financial advisors today do not recommend taking Social Security benefits early, investing the money, and trying to earn more than the Social Security benefit growth they'll realize by waiting. Unlike the investment opportunities of the 90's, it's pretty hard these days to beat the 6.7% annual growth in one's Social Security benefit realized by waiting until full retirement age (FRA) to collect, as well as the 8% annual growth one realizes by waiting beyond full retirement age. And those higher benefits are paid for life, which is significant when considering that average life expectancy is now well into the 80's and living into the 90's is now relatively common. Another consideration when taking benefits earlier than one's full retirement age is that there is an annual earnings limit which, if exceeded, will result in Social Security withholding ben-

efits, so a person's intentions for continuing to work could have a financial impact and should be included as part of any financial analysis. And yet another is that Social Security benefits are taxable if certain income thresholds are exceeded, so taking benefits early when someone is still earning a large salary will increase their income tax liability. The point is, it's never an easy or clear-cut decision as to when to start Social Security, and many factors such as those mentioned above need to be evaluated. And the breakeven analysis, which compares cumulative benefits at different claim-ages, should only be one piece of the puzzle.

Security guard kills man at a sports bar in North Houston

The fatal shooting of a man that occurred at 11479 North Freeway (North Interstate Highway 45) about 11:30 p.m. on Friday, July 27 will be referred to a Harris County grand jury.
According to HPD, Benito Banda Deleon, 49, was inside a sports bar when he got into an argument with a woman. An on-duty security guard asked him to leave. Deleon and another unknown male left the bar, threatening to have additional people come to the business and harm the

security guard. This prompted the guard to ask for assistance from a second, armed security guard working at an adjacent nightclub.
While both guards were standing outside the sports bar, Delelon, the second unknown male and a third individual aggressively approached the guards. A fight ensued during which Deleon and the unknown male pushed the second guard to the ground, severely injuring his shoulder.
Fearing he or his part-

ner would either be further seriously injured or killed, the security guard drew his pistol and shot Deleon. The unknown male fled the scene.
The injured guard called 9-1-1 and performed CPR on Deleon until Houston Fire Department paramedics arrived and pronounced him deceased.

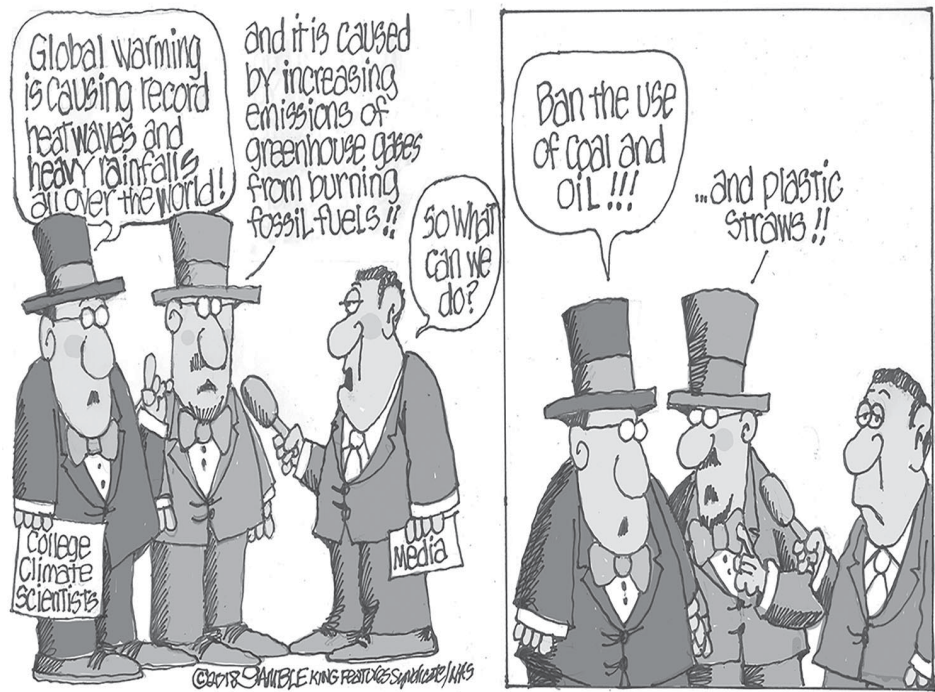

Select panel considers approaches to mass shooting prevention

AUSTIN — A special interim committee of state lawmakers met July 24 at the Texas Capitol to further explore what can be done to prevent mass shootings like the one that resulted in 10 deaths and 10 injuries in May at Santa Fe High School.

Testimony before a hearing of the Senate Select Committee on Violence in Schools & School Security centered on "red flag" laws, in which a law enforcement entity or family member could petition a judge who may then order that a potentially dangerous person temporarily be prohibited from purchasing or otherwise acquiring or possessing a firearm.

More than a dozen other states have enacted red flag laws. Such laws allow a petitioner to present evidence of previous behaviors that demonstrate a public safety risk, such as:

- Domestic violence;
- Harm to animals;
- Reckless use of firearms;
- Threats to self or others; or
- Drug abuse.

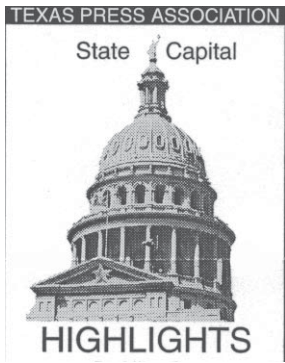
Under such laws, a person who is the subject of a red flag order has a right to legal counsel and may offer counter evidence and argument in their defense. But if the judge decides the person poses a risk to public safety, they could be compelled to surrender their firearms to authorities.

A report on the July 24 hearing and three previous hearings of the select panel will be released to the public in early August, said Committee Chairman Larry Taylor, R-Friendwood.

On May 30, Gov. Greg Abbott spoke positively about red flag laws in releasing a long list of recommendations for citizens and governmental bodies to take under the heading, "Preventing Threats in Advance." Since then he has not mentioned red flag laws, however, and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick said recently that neither he nor the governor favor that approach.

MALC calls for actions

On July 26, the Trump administration failed to meet a federal court-ordered deadline to reunite all children under 5 years old who were separated from their families under President Trump's zero-tolerance directive.

Two days earlier, the Mexican American Legislative Caucus of the Texas Legislature recommended a list of actions for the state to take to provide impacted migrant families with appropriate care and to determine the role of the state in the reunification of children and families.

MALC organized a working group of advocates, including key personnel from state agencies and members of the Texas House and Capitol staff. Here are a few of the working group's recommendations:

- It is critical that the state reject any policy such as the licensing of family detention centers that may indefinitely prolong the detention of children;
- For children held in facilities longer than a few days, medical care standards must be improved with consultation from pediatricians. The standards should include mental and physical health evaluations, as well as follow-up appointments;

- Apply continued pressure for state oversight in cases of abuse and neglect within facilities;
- Require legal representation of separated parents;
- Continue to monitor the reunification process so that every child who has been separated from parents is reunited in a timely and cost-effective manner; and
- Require that the Legislative Budget Board conduct a cost analysis of the impact of the federal policies of zero-tolerance and family separation on the state, specifically on the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services and Texas Health and Human Services Commission.

Job growth continues

In its July report on the state's economy, the Texas Workforce Commission said Texas had experienced 24 consecutive months of employment growth.

Also, some 27,200 seasonally adjusted non-farm jobs were added in June, bringing the monthly unemployment rate down another tenth of a point to 4.0 percent.

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area recorded the month's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs, with a non-seasonally adjusted rate of 2.4 percent. It was followed by the Amarillo MSA, which had the second-lowest with a rate of 3.1 percent. Following were the Austin-Round Rock and Odessa MSAs, which both recorded 3.2 percent for June.

Longtime state rep dies

Former state Rep. Delwin Jones died in Lubbock on July 25. He was 94.

A farmer, investor and veteran of World War II, Jones first was elected to the Texas House in 1964 and served consecutive two-year terms until 1972. He returned to the House in 1989 as a Republican and served consecutive terms until 2011.

Among Jones's accomplishments were laws creating the Texas Tech Medical School, the Lubbock County Hospital District, the 137th District Court and many other entities.

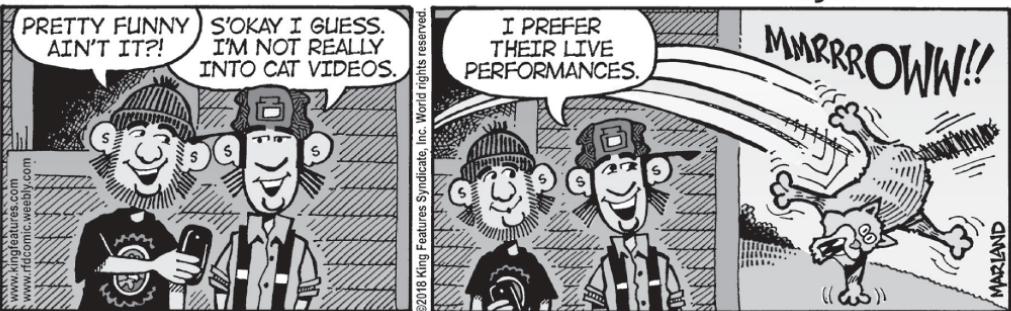

State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$2.74 Billion in July

(AUSTIN) — Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.74 billion in July, 6.9 percent more than in July 2017.

“Sales tax receipts from almost all major economic sectors were up compared with last year,” Hegar said. “The most notable increases were from oil and gas mining and manufacturing sectors, followed by wholesale trade, restaurants and services. Recent tax collections have also been boosted by a tax amnesty, including more than \$39 million in delinquent state sales tax revenue, most of which was processed in July.”

Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in July 2018 was up 10.2 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax revenue is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 58 percent of all tax collections.

Revenue from other major taxes on motor vehicle sales and rentals, motor fuels and oil and natural gas production also rose in July 2018:

- motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$437.1 million, up 13.6 percent from July 2017;
- motor fuel taxes — \$312.9 million, up 1.5 percent from July 2017;
- oil and natural gas production taxes — \$407.9 million, up 62.2 percent from July 2017.
