



2 Aldine ISD student-athletes are named Wendy's High School Heisman 2018 National Finalists

From an applicant pool of nearly 42,000 high school scholar-athletes graduating with the class of 2019, 10 students have been named National Finalists in the 25th year of Wendy's annual scholarship competition. Two of those students — Myracle Lettries and Jashon Palm-

er — are from Aldine ISD. Wendy's High School Heisman was created by Wendy's founder Dave Thomas in 1994. Dave dropped out of high school when he was 15 years old to work full-time and went on to become one of the most successful entrepreneurs in history. While this nontraditional path led to his prosperity, it worried Dave that others would fol-low in his footsteps and expect to achieve similar fame and wealth by not finishing high school or attending college. At 61 years old Dave enrolled at Coconut Creek High School in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., and received his General Equivalency Diploma. Inspired by this moment and with a desire to celebrate the outstanding achieve-ments of youth in America, he launched Wendy's High School Heisman.

To be considered, athletes have to maintain a GPA of 3.0 or better as well as be proven leaders and role models within their school and community Applicants must also perform in at least one of the 47 school sponsored sports recognized by the International Olympic Committee in the Summer and Winter Olympic Games or the National Federation of State High School Associations.

The NFL recently announced the 32 nominees for the Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year Award presented by Nationwide. One of the nominees is Michael Thomas, an Aldine ISD graduate. The former Nimitz High School football star currently plays for the New York Gi-

Considered one of the NFL's most prestigious awards, the honor has more to do with what players do off the field rather than on the field. The Walter Payton Man of the Year Award goes to the player who does the most for his community.

Each NFL team gets one nominee, and the winner is selected at the NFL Honors awards show at the end

Current players who have won the award include J.J. Watt (2017), Eli

Manning and Larry Fitzgerald (2016 co-win-ners), Thomas Davis (2014) and Drew Brees (2006). The previous winners wore a patch of Payton shrouded in a cloak.

for the community work he and is wife have done in every community he has played for including Miami and New York. However, Thomas never forgot where he came from. For the past four years, Thomas has held his summer Mike T Camp in Aldine The focus of the camp isn't just on football skills. Tho mas' real goal is to push education "to make a real change in people's lives." In 2018, Thomas provided the first Mike T Camp \$10,000 academic scholarship.

Thomas stated in a cent interview that if he

were named the winner, the award would not be for him. It would be for his family, the NFL, the Giants organization, everyone he has helped and his

teammates.
"It's a humbling experience to be nominated by my peers," said Thomas. "This is a special honor considering the caliber of recipients who have won the award in past years."

All the finalists will be recognized for their important work during the weekend leading up to Super Bowl LIII.

The 2018 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year will be announced during NFL Honors. This will be a twohour prime time awards special to air nationally on Feb. 2, the eve of Super Bowl LIII, on CBS. NFL Honors will be at Fox Theatre in Atlanta

- Funding full-day prekindergarten for eligible four-year-olds

On a local scale, AISD is pushing for more awareness about the importance and impact early childhood education has on students. AISD, which currently of-fers free full-day PK for eligible four-year-olds, launched in October a pi-

lot program for 3-year-olds. Goffney, a strong supporter of prekindergarten programs, hopes business and community partners will support the effort to have the state fund fullday PreK for all eligible four-year-olds.

"We must ensure we are helping these students develop the skills they need to be reading at third-grade level before they enter third grade," said Goffney. "I hope business and community partners realize that early childhood education matters for

the kind of future individuals will have. It is also an investment in the kind of future we as a community will have."

The community showed its commitment to invest in students when voters overwhelmingly passed the 2015 Bond Referendum. Patrick Mouton, executive director of facilities, planning and construction, shared information about completed projects, which included technology upgrades, rentechnology upgrades, ren-ovations and expansions. However, the biggest projects came to fruition when the District opened six new campuses in August 2018, and two new schools that replaced the older campuses.

Before closing the luncheon, Goffney thanked partners for their support of the District, students and staff members.

Aldine ISD was selected as one of 14 school district finalists across Texas for the second cohort of a 5-year leadership program by The Holdsworth Center objective to the content of the cont Chairman Charles Butt.

The nonprofit works with districts to train administrative leaders in each district, while also establishing systems for identifying and selecting future high-level district

AISD submitted an application to The Holdsworth Center to compete for a spot in the cohort. The Center has surveyed the districts to determine their willingness and ability to change as well as their level of commitment to the

The next step in the proess for final consideration

is a visit to AISD by The Holdsworth Center's exec utive team. A decision will be made in April 2019 on the six chosen districts that will take part in the second round of training with The Holdsworth Cen-

ter.
Aldine ISD would be among the largest Hold-sworth Center partici-pants if selected. The District has a student population of nearly 67,000 (2018 Snapshot) and is ranked ninth in the state.

"Aldine ISD is incredibly honored to be among the finalists," shared Su-perintendent LaTonya M. Goffney. "We look forward to the visit in the spring to show the ways in which we are leading.

"Everyone in Aldine is committed to continuously improving as a team and as leaders to ensure every student and staff member is supported to thrive to their full potential."

We believe leaders have a direct impact on student achievement," said Board President Steve Mead. "Pursuing this (The Holdsworth Center Leadership program) is an opportunity for AISD to be able to enhance the way in which the District grows and develops its own leaders.

"This is a priority as we seek to build a legacy of equity and excellence." The Holdsworth Center

is in its second year working with seven Texas school districts that pilot-

ed the initiative.
The Center dedicates about \$4 million in services and benefits to each district, including on-the-ground staff mem-

Social Security Matters

Ask Rusty – Maximizing Spousal Benefits

Dear Rusty: My husband turns 68 next year, and I will be turning 66. He plans on continuing to work and retiring at age 70 to maximize his monthly Social Security benefits. I am retiring next year due to a spinal injury. Since my monthly maximum is based on his, we are trying to figure out when mine should be activated to earn the highest benefit amount. Do I need to wait until he reaches age 70 to maximize mine, or can I activate it next year at the lesser amount and would Social Security adjust it to the higher rate when he activates his? Signed: Timing is Everything

Dear Timing: Your eventual spousal benefit from your husband's Social Security record will be based upon his full retirement age benefit amount, not on the increased benefit he will get by waiting until he is age 70 to claim. Thus, you don't gain anything by waiting past your full retirement age and until he claims his at 70 to start your own benefits. If you will be 66 next year, I assume your year of birth is 1953, which means your full retirement age (FRA) is 66. That means at age 66 you will get 100% of the benefit you have earned from a lifetime of working. By starting your benefits at age 66, your husband can then file a "restricted application for spousal benefits only" and collect 50% of the amount you are collecting, while allowing his own Social Security retirement benefit to continue to grow (it's already growing, but without him getting a spousal benefit from your record)

He can do this because he was born before the January 2. 1954 cutoff date after which that option was eliminated. By filing the restricted application after you start

your benefits, your husband can collect a spousal benefit from vou while he is still earning delayed retirement credits (DRCs) for himself, which will mean his benefit at age 70 will be 32% more than it would have been at his FRA of 66. Then, when your husband claims his own benefit at age 70, you should apply for your spousal benefit, which will be 50% of his FRA benefit amount (you get that if it is more than you are getting from your own work record). And in the intervening months between when you apply at age 66 and when he claims his own benefits at age 70, your husband will have collected about 2 years worth of spousal benefits from your work record.

One final word of caution: should you decide to claim your own Social Security benefit before you reach your full retirement age next year, your eventual spousal benefit will be somewhat reduced. In his new role, Whitley will act as Texas' chief elections officer, as protocol officer for state and international affairs and will serve as liaison for the governor on Mexico and border affairs. Whitley's appointment fills the vacancy left by outgoing Secretary of State Rolando Pablos, who served in the post for two years.

"David has been an invaluable member of my administration for over a decade, both in my time as attorney general and during the entirety of my first term as governor," Abbott said. "He has a keen understanding of the election process, and has served as a top advisor for international relations within the Office of the Governor. I am confident that in his new role as secretary of state, David will continue to safeguard the integrity of our elections and maintain Texas' standing on the international stage.

Whitley most recently served as Abbott's deputy chief of staff. He served earlier as appointments director. He began working for then-Texas Attorney General Abbott in 2004, serving in various roles including assistant deputy attorney general. He is a member of the State Bar of Texas and volunteers in the UT Law Mentorship Program. A native of Alice, Whitley received finance and law degrees from The University of Texas at Austin.

Texas Attorney Gener al Ken Paxton praised the governor's appointment of Whitley, saying, "I'm confident David will make it a priority to preserve and protect the integrity of our election system in Texas.

DPS stop study is

released
The Texas Department of Public Safety on Dec. 13 announced the release of a comprehensive analysis of traffic stop data by race and ethnicity of drivers.

The study, which includes traffic stop data by race and ethnicity from 2017, concludes that DPS' internal controls "align with documented best

The study was request-ed by DPS and was conducted by the University of North Texas. It recommended no changes to the department's current practices, policies and protocols.

Nevertheless, the DPS announced the launch of a new system that tracks the agency's traffic-stop data related to the race and ethnicity of drivers. The new system will be used by the DPS "to identify trends and outliers that could indicate performance issues, including the potential for racial profiling," according to the

DPS Director Steven McCraw said, "We are pleased with the findings of the UNT analysis, yet we continue to look for ways to enhance the way we protect and serve Texans. This new internal control program will do just that.

Agency head updates budget

J. Bruce Bugg Jr., chair of the Texas Transportation Commission on Dec 14 posted an update on what taxpayers are getting for their transporta- termine the placement of tion dollars.

"Transportation touches the lives of every Texan, every day, and there's no time to wait as we deliver on our commitment to keep Texas moving forward," Bugg said.

The commission and the agency it oversees the Texas Department of Transportation — have spent more than \$24 billion toward relieving road congestion in the state's major metropolitan areas as part of the \$75.4 billion Unified Transportation Program over the next 10 years, Bugg said.

Since 2015, more than 1,300 lane miles have been added to state roads and more than 2,600 nontolled road projects worth \$11 billion have been com-

Also, a priority for the commission and TxDOT is addressing safety and roadway improvements in the energy sector. So, over the next decade, the commission has directed \$3.4 billion to make repairs and improve roads in the energy-rich Permian Basin, Bugg added.

sioner George P. Bush on Dec. 15 announced his support of the levee proposed by the Coastal Texas Study on or along the beach. He called the study "an important step in the effort to reduce the risk along the Texas coast from dangerous storm surges and other threats.

I support locating the barrier on or along the beach, however, data and engineering studies must still be done before we can de the levee. We are listening. Texans look to hold onto No. 2 seed in finale against Jags: 'Bama, OU, ND and Clemson look to advance to CFP title game

column was written before the Bowl Games, but the general information is useful for review of game results.

As the New Year approaches we say good-bye to the 2018 football season as the bowl season winds up with the College Football Playoff semifinals on Dec. 29, and a host of other big-time bowl games ring in the New Year

The NFL winds up its regular season on the final weekend of December with a number of teams still jockeying for playoff position, including the Texans, who could possibly sew up one of the top two seeds in the AFC and earn a firstround bye. Not too shabby for a team that lost its first three games The Texans hope New England (two weeks ago they lost their second straight game when they fell at Pittsburgh to move to the third seed in the AFC behind Houston). It should be noted the Pats played Buffalo last week and closed the season with a home game against the Jets, while the Texans had to play against a rejuvenated Philadelphia team in Philly last week and close at home against Jacksonville

Still, there's a good chance the Texans could win out to finish 12-4, quite an accomplishment for Bill O'Brien's team that was left for

dead three weeks into the season.
Other key games this weekend have the Cowboys, who looked woeful two weeks ago in their 23-0 loss at Indianapolis visiting the Giants, Cleveland faces Baltimore as both teams are still alive in the AFC playoff picture, and the Steelers host the Bengals looking to wrap up the AFC North title. Two weeks ago, the Steelers gutted out a 17-10 win at home against the Patriots to end their three-game losing streak and keep them atop in the AFC North

Indianapolis visits Tennessee in an important game for both teams who have to hope the Texans stumble down the stretch. If the Texans lose their final two games (highly unlikely) and either of these two teams wins their final two, the winner could earn the division title.

While many eyes will be on the NFL this weekend, a lot more of them will be on the CFP playoffs which will take place on Saturday, Dec. 29. The first semifinal game will take place in Arlington in the Cotton Bowl as No. 2-ranked lemson takes on No. 3-ranked Notre Dame. The second semifinal game will be held at the Orange Bowl and will pit No. 1-ranked Alabama against No. 4-ranked Oklahoma and Heisman Trophy winner Kyler Murray. The winner of the two semifinal games will meet in the CFP National Title game on

Other bowl games with Texas ties has Jimbo Fisher's Texas A&M Aggies facing North Carolina State in the Taxslayer Bowl in Jacksonville, while Tom Herman's Texas Longhorns face a talented Georgia team in the Sugar Bowl in

Before we take a look at those games and a handful of others, let's review last week's record. A 5-4 week brought the season record to 110-70 (61%).

I want to wish all of you readers a very Merry Christmas and Happy New Year. Thank you for taking the time to read my ramblings and I hope to return again next year. Now, onto this week's game.

Cotton Bowl - Clemson vs.

Notre Dame: CFP semifinal number one pits Clemson's dominating defense against a balanced Notre Dame offense at AT&T Stadium in Arlington. Dabo Swiney's Tigers have three first round NFL picks on the defensive line and a pretty fair offense led by sophomore Trevor Lawrence (2,606 yards, 24 TDs) and running back Travis Etienne (1,463 yards, 21 TDs) If the Irish hope to pull off the upset, they must establish the running game behind tailback Dexter Williams (941 yards, 12 TDs) to open up the passing game for lan Book (2,468 yards, 19 TDs). Book has a stable of capable receivers and tight ends to throw to and I expect head coach Brian Kelley to have Book tossing the ball to all of those weapons to keep Clemson on its toes. ND's offensive line must give Book time to throw against that potent Clemson front seven, which will be a tall task. Defensively, the Irish need to get to Lawrence early to rattle him into a mistake or two, which could swing the game in ND's favor. This is Kelley's most athletic team on both sides of the ball and something tells me the luck of the Irish will prevail as ND shocks the Tigers. My pick. Notre Dame 30, Clemson 27

Orange Bowl - Alabama vs. Oklahoma: Two of college football's most storied programs go after it with a spot in the CFP title game at stake when No. 1-ranked Alabama takes on No. 4-ranked Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl. The OU offense will face its sternest test of the season when it takes on a 'Bama defense that is loaded with five-star talent. The Sooners have a load of talent on offense as well led by Heisman Trophy winner Kyler Murray (4,053 yards passing, 40 TDs; 892 yards rushing, 12 TDs). Murray has two capable backs to hand the ball to in Kennedy Brooks (1.021 vards 12 TDs) and Trey Sermon (925 yards, 12 TDs) and two explosive wide receivers in Marquis Brown (75 receptions, 1,318 yards, 10 TDs) and CeeDee Lamb (57



receptions, 1,049 yards, 10 TDs) Brown was injured in the Big 12 title game, but should be back for this game. Alabama has a few weapons itself on offense led by Heisman runner-up Tua Tagovailoa (3.353 vards, 37 TDs) Look for head coach Nick Saban to turn to his running game to chew clock and keep Murray off the field. Senior tailback Damien Harris (771 yards, 7 TDs) will be called on to lead the way on the ground and when Tua does throw, he has a in Jerry Jeudy (59 receptions 1,103 yards, 12 TDs) and Jaylen Waddle (41 receptions, 803 yards 7 TDs) and talented tight end Irv Smith Jr. (38 receptions, 648 vards, 7 TDs). Tua suffered an nkle injury in the SEC title game but has practiced with the team as they prepped for the Orange Bowl Should Tua be slowed by that injury, Saban has an insurance policy in former starter Jalen Hurts (755 yards passing, 8 TDs) who came off the bench to save the day for the Tide in the SEC title game. OU is going to be in this game, but in the end, it will be the Alabama defense that paves the way for Saban to go after national title No. 6 as the Crimson Tide's head coach (he also won one at LSU).

vs. North Carolina State: Jimbo Fisher's Aggies will be looking for their 10th win of the season when they face a solid NC State team in the Taxslaver Bowl in Jacksonville A 10-win season would be a solid first season for the Aggies and their new head coach and would carry a lot of momentum into the offseason. This game will feature two big-play quarterbacks in A&M's Kellen Mond (2,967 yards, 23 TDs) and NC State's Ryan Finley (3,789 yards, 24 TDs). The Aggies also can get it done on the ground thanks to speedy running back Travveon Williams (1.524 yards, 15 TDs). This should be a fun one to watch with plenty of scoring. The nod goes to the Aggies who played in the tougher league and are a bit better on defense than are the Wolfpack. My pick, Texas A&M 38, North Carolina State 34

Texas fans are now hoping Herman can deliver a victory against a top 10 team, which might easier said than done against a Georgia team that gave Alabama everything it wanted in the SEC title game Texas quarterback Sam Ehlinger (3,123 yards, 23 TDs; 418 yards rushing, 13 TDs) will face a good Georgia defense and will need help from his wide receivers to make plays down field. The Texas defense will have its hands full with Bulldog QB Jake Fromm (2,537 yards, 24 TDs) and speedy running back D'Andre Swift (1,037 yards, 10 TDs). Georgia has a lot of speed on offense and that might be the difference maker against a suspect UT defense. My pick, Georgia 31, Texas 23

Jacksonville at Houston: The Texans close out the 2018 season hosting a disappointing Jackson-ville team that might be making sweeping changes in the offseason. Houston might have to win this game to secure the AFC South title, so don't expect O'Brien to sit stars Deshaun Watson (3,592 yards, 23 TDs) and DeAndre Hopkins (94 receptions, 1,321 yards, 11 TDs). Those two came up with the game-winning play two weeks ago in the Texans 29-22 win over the Jets and Hopkins did suffer an ankle injury on the play. He should be good to go, but running back Lamar Miller ight not be after he sustained an ankle injury as well early in the game and did not return. Look for the Houston defense to tee off on Cody Kessler early to take the fight out of the Jags as the offense does just enough to pull out the victory. My pick, Houston 26, Jacksonville

Indianapolis at Tennessee: A huge game for both team's playoff chances meet in Nashville on Sunday afternoon. Two weeks ago, the Indy defense led the way to a 23-0 pasting of the Cowboys and will need to bring it again this week against Titans running back Derrick Henry (882 yards, 11 TDs) In wins over the Jags and Giants, Henry rushed for 408 yards and six touchdowns. The Titans defense will have its hands full trying to stop Indy QB Andrew Luck (3,951 yards, 34 TDs), running back Marlon Mack and speedy wide

I expect Carolina OB Cam Newton and running back Christian McCaffrey to put up bit numbers in this one to keep the Panthers in the game, but look for Brees and his load of offensive weapons to be too much for a beat-up Carolina defense. pick, New Orleans 33, Carolina 20 Los Angeles Chargers at Denver: Don't look now, but the Chargers might be playing for the No. 1 seed throughout the AFC playoffs when they visit a disappointing Denver team on Sunday. Two weeks ago, Phillip Rivers (3,951 yards, 31 TDs) and his teammates won at Kansas City, 29-28 when they came up with a two-point conversion with 4 seconds left in the game. 

team player. Last year, Howard played quarterback and had a nice season, but during seven-on-seven play last summer, Howard approached Semler with a request.
