

Recovery-Harvey is for homeowners outside Houston to apply for home repair, reconstruction or reimbursement.

The new Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo indicated that the county is giving out about \$200 Million in this program, "Harvey was an especially difficult disaster because it got to the core of people's lives because it reached into their homes, in their

housing. People's homes

are anchors for them and their families. When people lost their homes and were forced to leave and live somewhere else, they were still forced to watch and wait until they could rebuild and return. That destroys and disrupts the rest of their lives and the fabric of our community."

"For the first time we are making a massive investment in housing around Harvey," said Hidalgo, indicating that the program was to be the largest investment a region has made in the area of housing repair.

of housing repair.

"It helps us build a stronger community and a more resilient community in all of Harris County." the Judge concluded.

Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia asked folks to get in touch with their representatives, "I will ask you to do one thing. Whenever you get hold of your members of Congress or representatives, any one of them, let them know it is unconscionable that in an area like Harris County, where we know Mother Nature so well, she visits us on a regular basis, we are no strangers to flooding. But, we don't have to reinvent the wheel over and over, since the government ought to have a good plan in place."



Aldine ISD students take part METRO bus shelter design project

Eight teams from three Aldine ISD high schools have been selected to participate in METRO's bus

shelter design project. Six teams from Blanson CTE High School and one team each from Eisenhow-er High School and Nimitz High School are taking part in the project.

The eight teams will present their bus shelter designs at METRO on April 23 at METRO headquarters. The overall win-ner will be announced by METRO President and CEO Tom Lambert on May 4 at the district's Day of Design event, which will be held at the M.O. Campbell Educational Center.

Aldine ISD was the only school district in Houston to participate in this project. The eight teams researched and designed potential bus shelters. The teams used 3-D printers to present their designs. In addition, the teams had to submit a one to two-page analysis and description of their projects, provide a half-page description of what materials would be needed to construct the shelter and the teams had to provide a budget of how much the materials and labor would cost to build their respective shelters.

Additionally, the teams had to provide information on the aesthetics of their projects, such as how their shelters would protect passengers from the elements, while still being appealing to the eye.

Fifty teams competed at the district level before the eight were chosen to par-

ticipate in the project.

Houston wins **Smart Cities North** America Award

Aldine ISD is honored to be a part of the initiative with the City of Houston and Microsoft that won

and Microsoft that won IDC's Smart Cities North America challenge. After receiving more than 4,100 votes from the public and scoring by an international panel of judges, IDC Government Insights recently announced the winners of the second an-nual IDC Smart Cities North America Awards (SCNAA).

The awards recognize the progress North American communities have made in executing Smart Cities projects, as well as provide a forum for sharing best practices to help accelerate Smart City development in the region Winners were named in 12 categories with a tie in both Transportation Infrastructure and Urban Planning and Land Use.

The City of Houston, a fi-nalist in two categories (Smart Building and Transportation), won the

Smart Buildings Award. Aldine ISD's Role Aldine ISD is taking part in the Smart Buildings initiative. AISD was the only district selected by Microsoft to take part in es-tablishing an advanced, unified communication platform to improve school safety. The new technology will ensure first responders like the Aldine ISD Police Department, Aldine fire stations. Houston police

and fire departments and other entities as well as neighboring school districts will be better informed of the types and the severity of the emergencies.

Microsoft selected Aldi-ne ISD because it already had the infrastructure in place to incorporate the software company's intelli-gence capabilities to take connected devices and ap-plications a step further in the world of IoT (Internet of Things). AISD has been ahead of campus security and smart building models for several years now. The District allocated funds local and federal — toward technology infrastructure that includes upgrades and secure building access. Some of the funds for technology infrastructure were approved by voters in past bond referendums.

"Student and staff safety is a top priority. The partnership with the City of Houston and Microsoft will take our efforts to the next level," said Superintendent of Schools Dr. LaTonva M.

Goffney.

More than 70 cities/ counties were represented, underscoring the over-whelming success and efficiency of Smart City projects implemented across the country. Winners will be honored at the Smart Cities New York con-

Melbin Barahona's team entered the playoffs as the fourth seed out of District 16-6A, but went all the way to the Region II Finals before falling to College Park, 2-1, one game short of the Class 6A state tournament.

The Mustangs opened the playoffs by upsetting traditional area soccer nower The Woodlands 1-0 then battled Cy-Lakes to a 0-0 draw and advanced to the third round with a 5-4shootout victory. Aldine then defeated Langham Creek 2-1 to advance to the Region II Tournament, where they defeated Garland Sachse 3-0 to advance to the finals against Col-

Barahona said the win over The Woodlands gave his team the confidence it needed to take on all com-

"First was the hard work my kids put into it," he said, when asked what sparked the deep playoff run. "After they started to believe and became in-spired, we were hungry for more and we knew anything was possible. We became a more consistent team in the playoffs and made fewer mistakes."

He also said the support the team received from their fans was a big factor

in their playoff run.

Property Tax growth limit passes Senate

(Austin) The Senate approved a measure Monday aimed at reining in property tax rate growth, one that Lt. Governor Dan Patrick called "the biggest tax relief and reform bill we've ever passed". Under current law, jurisdictions can increase property tax rates as much as eight percent before taxpayers can petition for an election to approve or deny the rate hike. This "rollback" rate, implemented in the face of significant inflation in the late 1970s, is much too high and prices people out of their homes due to skyrocketing tax bills, according to Houston Senator Paul Betten court. "Taxpayers can't take it any more," he said. "It's a growth curve that's by any measure two or three times faster than their ability to pay." His bill would move that rollback rate to 3.5 percent for most taxing entities and 2.5 percent for property taxes levied by local school districts Additionally, rollback elections would be triggered automatically when rate increases exceed these limits and would be placed on the November ballot.

The bill also includes a number of reforms intended to increase transparency and give property owners more information about who is taxing them and for how much, and how those rates have changed over time. It also makes changes to the appraisal protest process, intended to level the playing field between appraisal review boards and property owners. Additionally. small taxing entities with less than \$15 million in annual collections would remain at the eight percent rollback rate initially, but taxpayers in those jurisdictions would get a chance to vote to opt in to the lower rollback rates on the uniform election date in May of 2020. "With the attention on many, many appraisal reforms as well, I believe that this is a balanced package," said Betten-court. "It looks at the needs of rural Texas, as well as urban. More importantly, it looks at

the needs of taxpayers all across the state.

This bill was a major priority for state leader-"We made a promship. ise, the Governor, the Speaker and I, when the session started that we're going to focus on property tax reform [and] relief to you," Patrick said in a video statement released upon passage of the measure. "[Monday], was the first bill to pass as part of that package." It now heads to the House for consideration, and Patrick said that with new leadership in that chamber, he believes the bill has a good chance of reaching the governor's desk this session.

Also this week, the Senate approved the

remaining two bills in a four-bill package from Conroe Senator Brandon Creighton that would prohibit certain municipal regulations on private businesses. "These bills protect the pro-business climate, something often referred to as the 'Texas miracle'," he said when offering the first of these bills before the Senate last week. "Other states struggle; Texas remains number one in job creation and unemployment is at a record low." Creighton went on to say that local ordinances mandating employee benefits and other practices undermine the predictability and freemarket principles that have created this econom ic prosperity.

The bills passed last week would prohibit local ordinances mandating paid sick leave for employees of private businesses and those that set requirements for paid time-off. The bills passed Wednesday would disallow cities from regulating scheduling practices and overtime pay policies, as well as from passing ordinances that prohibit employers from inquiring about past criminal history on applications. These measures will now head to the House for further consideration.

The Senate will reconvene Tuesday, April 23 at 11 a.m.

Top officeholders join together in push for funding solution

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick and House Speak-er Dennis Bonnen on April 10 released a joint state ment promoting a twofold method for the 86th Texas Legislature to curb property tax increases across the

state. "Texans are fed up with skyrocketing property taxes. At the beginning of the legislative session, the governor, lieutenant governor and speaker laid out an agenda for property tax relief through the passage of Senate Bill 2 and House Bill 2 to limit property tax growth," the state's top of-ficeholders said.

SB 2 and HB 2, the not-yet-approved property tax reform bills, would reduce the revenue growth increment used for determina-tion of the rollback tax rate from 8.0 percent to 2.5 percent for taxing units other than small taxing units unless the voters in a small taxing unit election decide to opt-in to the proposed new voter-approved tax rate procedure. The goal of both pieces of legislation is to reduce tax revenues for local taxing units and increase costs to the state through revised formulas

for education funding.
Abbott, Patrick and
Bonnen also pushed lawmakers to pass legislation that would allow Texans to vote to offset local property tax revenue by increasing local sales taxes by a

"We are introducing a sales tax proposal to buy down property tax rates for all Texas homeowners and businesses, once Senate Bill 2 or House Bill 2 is agreed to and passed by both chambers," they said in the joint statement. "If the one-cent increase in the sales tax passes, it will result in billions of dollars in revenue to help drive down property taxes in the short and long term."

Senate and House members of both political parties have expressed reluctance to cede local control in their districts to tax revenue-generating proposals coming from Austin. Another dimension is that a club-like Senate tradition requires at least

three-fifths, or 19, of the body's 31 members to agree to bring a measure to the floor for debate.

Patrick, who presides er the Senate, reportedly last week was entertaining the possibility of breaking with precedent by allowing the tax reform proposal to come to the floor with only 16 votes. There could be enough agreement among the body's Republican members to fall in line with Patrick's wishes.

As the possibility of property tax caps and a sales tax tradeoff simmers in the Senate, passage is harder to predict in the majority-Republican but not-so-collegial House. Dif-ferences in the House and Senate versions of the tax reform bill would have to be reconciled in a conference committee before returning to the full bodies for final approval.

Sales tax holiday

The amount is 8.4 percent more than distributed for the month of April 2018. The allocations are based on sales made in that report tax monthly.

Illegal game room closed,

In the course of their investigation sheriff's deputies discovered illegal gambling including customers playing 34 eightliners at the unlicensed game room. Eight liners are slot machine-like devices and are legal only if they offer only non-cash prizes valued at less than \$5. Law enforcement officials say that illegal cash payouts are near universal in unpermitted game rooms throughout the state. Despite the arrest of the operators and repeat visits by law enforcement, the game room continued to operate in violation of the law, according to the

After County Attorney Ryan's Office filed suit the owners of the property agreed to evict the game room operators and close

the enterprise. Ryan's lawsuit claims that the defendants knowingly operated an illicit and unpermitted game room in violation of Harris County's Game Room Regulations. In addition, the suit says this game room is a common nuisance under state law. Ryan asked the court to order the detion of the unlicensed litter." game room to prevent continuing harm to the community. Because the game room operators have been evicted and ceased operations the court order is not necessary at this time.

The lawsuit contends that this game room is located in a residential neighborhood making it a public safety hazard for the people who live there.

"Besides illegal gambling, game rooms are associated with a wide variety of adverse second-ary effects," said County Attorney Ryan. "These include personal and property crimes, weapon offenses, illicit drug use and drug trafficking, negative impacts on surrounding prop-

"Simply put, defendants own, operate and maintain the property as a common nuisance," said County Attorney Rvan. "Evidence clearly shows that patrons go to the property for the sole purpose of illegal gambling. This illegal activity has recently led to a kidnapping and aggravated robbery.
"We will continue to find

ways to proactively use civil law to protect Harris County and its residents," said Ryan.


