Garcia details plans for Pct. 2 improvements

Speaking last week at a North Channel Chamber luncheon, Harris County Pct. 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia covered a wide range of topics related to his concepts of improving conditions for all the resi

Garcia said that his fo-

cus at all times is on Precinct 2, and what he can do to better conditions there. He said a fundamental change in how the precinct is run is his emphasis on spending county money to hire companies and workers that are located in the precinct. He introduced his

purchasing director, Jose Jimenez, saying he was they key to implementing the new plan.

Garcia reflected on his first seven months in office, and how it seemed like an unending string of catastrophes. He noted that his term started the first week with an ExxonMobil fire in the refinery in Baytown, and currently was ending the period the same way with the same disaster. He noted that the refineries in Precinct 2 have a history of violations of air and water polution, and vowed that the county would implement new pro-

cedures to minimize these. Because of the large number of petrochemical plants in his district, he said that environmental concerns and safety would be a primary concern that he would focus on

Garcia noted that his precinct has the lowest household income in the county, and related to that is the lowest home ownership percentage. He noted how important this is, related to other problems of educational achievement and crime rates





Fatal shooting on Northline Drive

Houston police are investigating the fatal shooting of a man and the wounding of a woman at 7313 Northline Drive about 2:50 p.m. on Saturday (Aug. 3).

The male victim, Michael Lee, Jr., 28, was pronounced dead at the scene. The female victim, Regen Hayward-Orange, 35, was transported to an area hospital in critical condition

HPD Homicide Division Detectives L. Patterson and M. Arrington reported:

Officers responded to a shooting call at an apartment complex at the above address. Witnesses stated a black male suspect wearing a white or gray hooded coat, with a black or white shirt covering his face, started shooting in the breezeway before entering an apartment and shooting Mr. Lee multiple times and Ms. Hayward-Orange one time in the abdomen.

The suspect fled on foot through the courtyard. Paramedics pronounced Lee deceased at the scene and transported Ms. Hayward-Orange to the hospital.

City of Houston workshops will focus on I-45 alternatives

The City of Houston will recommend changes to TxDOT based on these discussions.

The TX Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is proposing a major \$7–10 billion expansion of I-45 and the City of Houston is planning workshops for community engagement.

Under the directive of Mayor Sylvester Turner, the Planning and Development Department will lead workshops on the North Houston Highway Improvement Project (NHHIP) and host I-45 community workshops to ensure TxDOT designs a project with positive impacts for the community, the City of Houston, and the greater region.

Join the City of Houston, in partnership with a technical team from Huitt-Zollars and UH Community Design Resource Center, at these roundtable discussions about housing, traffic, flooding and drainage, air quality, and other issues.

County and city officials, HISD School board members, and leaders of the affected communities were in attendance, including Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo, City Councilman Dwight Boykins, and Gallery Furniture Owner Mattress Mack.

Earlier this week, advocates for inner city residents rallied, demanding more input and alternatives to the current plan.

With the project going through, some 300 businesses employing 24,000 people and 1,400 homes will be affected.

He said a priority is to raise the level of educational achievement, and as a start he has partnered with HCDE, the Harris County Department of Education, to provide free SAT college preparation for about 200 motivated students that need help to pass the college entrance tests. This is a four week course for high school students, and if successful will be repeated for more. Garcia noted that passing the SAT will open more educational opportunities, and result in more job and career choices and opportunities

Garcia told the students, "Go on to succeed, but come back to Precinct 2 and Give Back."

Garcia said that healthcare was a major concern, and noted that he had started the first "food pantry" at a Clinic in the district, to provide more healthy food to clients. He noted that other factors affecting access to good healthcare included transportation, which is being provided.

Noting that his precinct has the highest rate of cancer in Texas, probably due to proximity to refineries and other poluting sources, he was putting an accent on providing park space of a high quality, knowing that it affects our health. He is also working with a local healthcare company and the City of Houston to provide more park space.

A significant new type of park, known as an "inclusive" park designed for users with special needs as well as the general public, has been designated for development at James Drive Park in Northeast Houston. When finished, he sees it as a prototype for extension to other parks, in part or in whole through the county.

Another major concern, for Garcia as well as many residents of the precinct, is extreme flooding and the prospect of continued high water in the future. Garcia noted that although the voters approved \$2.5 Billion in drainage improvements last year, nevertheless it would be spread through the whole county, and would only be a partial solution to the problem.

He said that more planning and expenditures would be required to solve the flooding problem, and he and his staff were working on a comprehensive engineering analysis of the infrastructure of the precinct, to see where improvements would be the most effective use of the money. This will result in a Master Plan for work in the future.

Garcia noted that in this budget year, \$30 million will be spent on flood improvement projects in the North Shore area.

He discussed other problems including pervasive homelessness that results in some living on the streets and under highway overpasses. He thought that instead of incarcerating these persons, intervention to provide counseling, good, and housing would be required. He noted that the Harris County Jail is the largest psychiatric facility in the county, and could be useful to deal with this homeless problem, and slow down the return of these people to life on the streets.

He said that many people were suffering from trauma caused by the string of natural disasters, and needed access to psychiatric resources to help them cope.

Another area that Garcia is addressing is affordable housing, and he said that he is working on a new approach with the Harris County Appraisal District, where the Precinct would take delinquent or foreclosed properties and make a land trust, for building new homes in a partner

Bail Reform gets us closer to a system that works for everyone

A person is guilty until proven innocent or wealthy. This is how our old outdated justice system has been working in Harris County for far too long. There have been incidents that an individual may stay in jail for months. Most are jailed not because they are violent criminals or guilty, but because they cannot afford to pay a bond. This system is far from just and fair because it penalizes the poor This may be a single mother who was arrested for failing to pay a traffic ticket, loses her job, misses payments for her mortgage and as a result, loses her home. She is now homeless. Or it could be a young man who was wrongfully accused but spent 6 months in jail before someone took a closer look at his case. We have to fix this. We can do better. We must do better.

enforcement has shown me where government fails and where we could improve. Not everyone who goes to jail is guilty. Not everyone who is arrested is a criminal. I have seen the wasted human capital that sits behind bars that could otherwise be contributing to our economy. Instead, they are in jail awaiting trial, being supported by our tax dollars. Some families are being torn apart, parents losing custody of their children. The poorer you are, the more likely you are to miss a court date: You cannot afford childcare, you cannot afford to miss work, and you cannot afford a car to get to the courthouse. If we are going to keep people out of jail for being poor, we need to have a criminal justice system that works for everyone.

My career in law

The old outdated system of holding people in jail until they can pay bail – or keeping them until trial if they cannot – does not make the public safer; in fact, studies have shown it increases crime. A 2013 study by the Laura and

tion found that people who were detained after arrest were more likely to commit more crimes. In fact, the longer a person was detained, the more likely they are to commit a crime after disposition of their current offense. As the former Sheriff, I witnessed how this unconstitutional cash bail system helped to create the most overcrowded jail in our recent history that depended on lucrative contracts with private jails to house thousands of inmates, while still requiring the taxpayers to pay millions more in overtime to keep the jail compliant with state jail standards. I had no problem holding onto the most violent and dangerous, but the great majority had made mistakes that posed no direct threat to anyone but themselves. When our criminal justice system can deal with people proportionate to their mistakes then we not only become fair and just but safer because the first time/nonviolent offenders will have fewer opportunities to learn from the worst in jails.

The impact goes far beyond the person who is incarcerated. Children with an incarcerated parent are more likely to experience higher rates of poverty, food insecurity, homelessness, and physical health problems. They are also twice as likely as their peers without a parent in prison to develop behavioral or mental health problems, including increased aggression, depression, anxiety and migrate toward gang involvement. They are also more likely to associate with delinquent peers, get into fights, skip school, have trouble concentrating, and perform poorly in school. This system is far from just, makes us less safe and negatively impacts our children. We have to do better.

The settlement announced this week is the first step Harris

County takes at fixing this broken system. The decree applies only to individuals charged with misdemeanors except for cases of family violence, bond violations, and repeat DWI. These are crimes where a person is more likely to re-offend and will receive a magistrate hearing within 48 hours to determine what kind of bond they may be released under Those individuals outside of these exceptions will be released on a personal recognizance bond, which means the person commits to making their court dates. Under the consent. decree, they will be ensured the opportunity to be able to be represented by counsel at these proceedings.

Freedom should never be for sale, and it is time we take our seat as a national leader in civil rights reform. I know the best way to keep our communities safe is having a multi-tiered approach that allows our District Attorney and law enforcement officers to focus on the most dangerous while enhancing a criminal justice system that promotes fairness for all. Let us be committed to our constitution that proclaims a person is innocent until proven guilty

Abbott, Patrick react after 20 die in deadly shooting

AUSTIN — After a gunman was arrested in the killing of 20 people and wounding 26 others at a popular shopping venue in El Paso on Aug. 3, Gov. Greg Abbott and Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick offered thoughts and prayers.

Abbott ordered flags lowered in memory of those who lost their lives and said flags should remain at halfstaff through sunset on Aug. 8.

The suspect, 21-yearold Patrick Crusius of Allen, Texas, surrendered after waves of first responders arrived on scene.

Crusius was charged with capital murder. He remains in custody in El Paso.

Lawmaker to take new post

Rep. John Zerwas, R-Richmond, last week announced his retirement from the state House of Representatives, effective Sept. 30.

Zerwas, a physician

for more than 30 years and past president of the American Society of Anesthesiologists, was first elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 2007. He is the 29th most senior lawmaker in the 150-member lower chamber.

Zerwas currently serves as chair of the budget-writing House Appropriations Committee, and served in the same capacity in the 2017 Texas Legislature. He earlier served as chair of the House Committee on Higher Education.

On Aug. 1, the University of Texas System announced the appointment of Zerwas as executive vice chancellor for health affairs, effective Oct. 1.

Kevin Eltife, chairman of the UT System Board of Regents and a former state senator, said Zerwas "comes to the UT System with a very high regard among colleagues in the medical, business and legislative arenas."

More than twothirds of the UT System's annual budget is dedicated to health care, education and research, and UT institutions produce almost two-thirds of the state's health professionals, according to the UT System



news release.

Mitigation contracts issued

Eleven contracts totaling nearly \$14.6 million in the Texas Volkswagen Environmental Mitigation Trust settlement have been issued, mainly to school districts, the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality announced Aug. 1.

The settlement is a result of litigation over emissions-control defeat devices that were found to have been installed on vehicles manufactured by Volkswagen and its subsidiaries. Some 590,000 vehicles are affected, according to the TCEQ.

Entities that have applied for funds from the trust will use the money to replace aging diesel school buses, shuttle buses or transit buses with new models.

Alert system is launched

The Texas Department of Public Safety on July 30 announced the implementation of CLEAR Alert, the Coordinated Law Enforcement Adult Rescue Alert.

The new alert system is designed to assist law enforcement in locating and rescuing missing adults who may have been kidnapped, abducted or who are in immediate danger of injury or death, and to aid in locating potential suspects.

Rep. Greg Bonnen, R-Friendswood, authored HB 1769 creating the CLEAR Alert and Sen. Larry Taylor, R-Friendswood, sponsored the legislation in the Senate. It was signed into law by Gov. Greg Abbott in May and takes effect on Sept. 1.

The system, to be managed by the DPS, will be operated in the same manner as AMBER, Silver, Blue and Endangered Missing Persons alerts.

Revenue total is reported

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Aug. 2 announced state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.86 billion in July, an amount 4.3 percent more than the amount reported for the month of July 2018.

"State sales tax revenue growth in July was moderate, with services and restaurant sectors leading the growth," Hegar said. "Tax receipts from the construction, wholesale and retail trade sectors also grew modestly, while receipts from the oil- and gas-mining sector remained about the same as a year ago."

Update: Measles cases

State health officials on July 29 confirmed that 21 cases of measles have been diagnosed in Texas so far this year.

The Department of State Health Services urged health care providers to consider measles when diagnosing patients because early identification, along with immunization, are keys to preventing the spread of measles.

A contagious respiratory illness, measles is a rash that begins as flat, red spots on the face and spreads down the neck and trunk to the rest of the body. Other symptoms include high fever over 101 degrees, cough, runny nose and red, watery eyes.

RUOK? program expands with CASA

Now includes Senior Hispanic community

Harris County Precinct 3 Constable Sherman Eagleton is on the move again. Constable Eagleton has a heart for people and is fervent about putting the community first. Upon taking office in in January 2017, he created a program called RUOK?. The purpose of RUOK is to focus on the well-being of elderly members of the community. If the senior answers the call and responds that all is well, they move on to the next individual. If, however, the senior does not respond after three calls, a deputy is dispatched to their location to check on their welfare.

CASA offers this service for seniors, or those with disabilities who have no family living in the area. When there is no response, it could indicate that individuals many have fallen, misplaced their phone, or may be injured. The CASA phone call maintains connection with the individual.

Ask Rusty – State pension may eliminate survivor benefit

Dear Rusty: Please validate or negate this dreadful information: My husband and I are recently retired and living on our combined retirement plans. I was told that when my husband dies, I will NOT be allowed to draw ANY of his hard-earned Social Security income. I cannot survive on my Louisiana teacher retirement alone. We were never informed of this until we had worked hard for 40 years & retired. Can you advise me on this dreadful turn of events. Signed: Bewildered in Louisiana

Dear Bewildered: Unfortunately, I don't have good news. If your teaching career and the associated pension were in the State of Louisiana, I'm afraid that any Social Security survivor benefit you might be eligible for from your husband will be impacted by the Government Pension Offset (GPO) - a provision of Social Security which applies to anyone with a pension from an employer who did not participate in the Social Security program. Louisiana is, unfortunately, one of 27 U.S. States whose employees may be affected by the GPO, because neither you nor the State of Louisiana contributed to the Social Security program while you were employed there. It's unfortu-nate you weren't made aware of this by your employer, but it's well documented in the State's "LASERS" information which you can view at this link: https:// www.lsuhsc.edu/administration/ hrm/benefits-retirementnonss.aspx

The GPO will reduce your Social Security survivor benefit by 2/3rds of the amount of your LA State pension, and if 2/3rds of your LA pension is more than

your SS survivor's benefit, the Social Security survivor benefit will be eliminated. I know it's no solace, but ou are not alone in your dismay over this provision. In fact, a bill is active in Congress to eliminate the GPO (and a sister provision known as the Windfall Elimination Provision, or WEP), but that bill has made little headway despite having 195 Congressional co-sponsors. The bill I'm referring to is known as the "Social Security Fairness Act", which is House bill H.R. 1205 (there is a corresponding Senate bill S.915). You can examine it at https:// www.congress.gov/bill/115th-congress house-bill/1205, but I must let you know that very little progress has been made on this bill since it was introduced almost two years ago. For the record, the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC) has expressed support for the bill's passage, but to no avail in a Congress which is instead debating ways to resolve Social Security's larger financial issues which are nov projected to deplete the Trust Fund by 2035. I'm afraid the only sugges-tion I can offer for your personal situation is to contact your Congres sional Representatives and ask for their support and action on H.R. 1205 and S.915.

Burn Pits and Other Airborne Hazards —Were you deployed in Desert Storm and Desert Shield to a location where there were airborne environmental contaminants, such as burn pit smoke, sand, dust and particles, and oil-well fire smoke? Do you suffer from any breathing problems that haven't been diagnosed? Have you signed up for the Airborne Hazards and Open Burn Pit Registry?

That registry is to help the Department of Veterans Affairs (and you) be aware of health conditions that might be related to those burn pits and

other airborne hazards. As a first step, go online to the VA.gov website and search for Airborne Hazards and Open Burn Pit Registry. You'll see the list of countries, such as Iraq and Afghanistan, where service personnel were deployed

If you served on or after Aug. 2, 1990 in any of the listed countries, or in Afghanistan or Djibouti on or after Sept. 11, 2001, you may be eligible. If so, and if you sign up on the registry, you will get a free medical workup

So far, nearly 180,000 veterans have enrolled. Even if you have no physical symptoms, sign up anyway. If you're already signed up with VA health care, ask your primarycare provider to schedule an evaluation or call the environmental health coordinator at the closest VA facility.

If you enroll in the registry and it says you're not eligible, work to have it corrected, as some records might be missing or inaccurate. Request an eligibility review. If you have symptoms that medical providers haven't been able to diagnose, push for your in-person, multiple-day specialty exam at the War Related Illness and Injury Study Center in New Jersey. The VA recently opened the Airborne Hazards and Burn Pits Center of Excellence there to do research into these health





\$47 million to rebuild Lake Houston dam

Statement On FEMA Funds For Lake Hous-

HOUSTON, TX - On Friday, the Federal Emergency Management Agencv (FEMA) announced funding for the Lake Houston Dam Spillway Improvement Project. The project, which converts Lake Houston's dam to dam gates, was awarded a total of \$47,170,953 (\$35,378,214 in federal funds).

Congressman Dan Crenshaw released the fol-lowing statement in reannouncement:

"This is great news for the entire San Jacinto watershed. This money will fund the much-needed Lake Houston dam gates



Lake Houston Dam will soon have new gates to help control flooding on the San Jacinto River watershed area.

to better manage the flow of water. For a community that feels the burden of flooding too often, this is a huge win. I'm grateful to partner with City Council Member Dave Martin,

Governor Greg Abbott. Texas Department of Emergency Management Executive Director Chief Nim Kidd, and State Senator Brandon Creighton to make this a reality.

Background:

Funding for the City of Houston Lake Houston Dam Spillway Project is awarded directly to the State of Texas in full. Phase I funding will be re-

leased to the City of Houston from the State of Texas. Once those funds are released to the City of Houston the City will begin the process of permitting, engineering, design, and environmental assessment to increase the outflow capacity of the Lake Houston Spillway Dam. Once Phase I of the project is complete the City of Houston will renew the cost benefit analysis and submit to FEMA for their $review.\ Upon\ their\ review$ of the completed cost benefit analysis after Phase I completion, the additional funds provided to the state of Texas for this project will be released for comple-tion of Phase II construction. Once the funding is received by the City of Houston the two phases are expected to be completed within thirty-six months, with the possibility of extension if needed.

Along with the award of the Lake Houston Dam Spillway Improvement Project Hazard Mitigation Grant FEMA has also an $nounced \ three \ other \ grants$ impacting the area. Lonestar College's Kingwood Campus has been awarded two public assistance grants for Emergency Protective measures in the amounts of \$6,276,131 and \$2,502,914. Clear Creek Independent School District was also awarded a public assistance grant for Emergency Protective Measures in the amount of \$1,303,060. The funding for these three grants is authorized under Section 403 of the Robert T. Stafford Act.
