

World class BMX Bike Park opens in North Houston

 $NORTH\,HOUSTON-A$ ribbon cutting was held last Friday, August 16 for a huge new World Class Bike Park and BMX track. This \$25 million dollar project was funded by the North Houston Development Corporation, and is expected to be a major attraction for bike enthusiasts and fans.

The ribbon cutting was unusual, with the participants arriving at the line mounted on bikes. Includ-ed were Mayor Sylvester Turner, Pct. 1 Commissioner Rodney Ellis, Councilman Jerry Davis, NHDC executive director Sally Bradford, HCH Sports Authority CEO Janis Burke, Rockstar Energy VP Paul Tarney, and WCMX President Gretchen Bailey.

The new bike park occupies 20 acres of the 30 acre recreation site, which also includes the largest skate park in America, and Dylan Park, designed for children with all types of abilities.

The development includes 11 attractions: a BMX track, BMX Super Cross trails, Pump Track, Dirt Jump Track, Streetriding Plaza, Multi-skills trails, Bike Skills area, Tot Track, Bowl Riding Performance Pavilion, and Bay-Trail Walking



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

Keep an eye out for children and school buses

Now that school is back in session, this is a great time to remind drivers that they will be sharing the road with students and school buses

School bus drivers do everything they can to keep children safe, but evervone must make an effort to drive safely around school buses. Parents and children walking to school should be alert at all times, and only cross the street at intersections and designated crosswalks.

BUS SAFETY TIPS

•Yellow flashing lights mean drivers should slow down because the bus is about to make a stop.
•Red flashing lights

mean the bus has stopped. All drivers must stop for buses while the red lights are flashing and the Stop sign is out. It is against the state law to pass a school bus with the red flashing lights on, loading, or unloading children. If a road-way is divided, the opposite direction roadway may proceed with caution. Traffic behind the school

bus traveling in the same direction MUST stop.

• The area 15 feet around a school bus is where children are in danger of being hit. Drivers should stop far enough back to allow children the necessary space to safely enter or exit a bus. Never pass a stopped bus on the right that is loading or un-loading. It is illegal and

•Students should stay at a safe distance away from the roadway while waiting for the bus and no horseplay. Students should stay alert while waiting for the bus.

•Students should wait until the bus stops, and the driver signals that it is safe to load the bus or cross the

•Students should respect the rights of others while riding the bus. They should cooperate with the driver and remain in their

Aldine Independent School District officially kicked off the new school year with a Welcome Back Convocation held on August 8. The celebration gave Superintendent Dr. LaTonya M. Goffney a chance to celebrate district achievements and points of pride with every single district employee. It also served as her first opportunity to share with all stakeholders the district's new strategic plan, A New Way Forward. The plan state's the district's vision and outlines the mission of providing a rigorous and enriching educational ex-perience that prepares evry student for success in college, career, and life. "A strategic plan has

been in the works for the last few years. The strategic design committee was meeting before I arrived. Rather than start over, we capitalized on their momentum. We finalized a plan that outlines where we are going as a district," said Goffney. Goffney, who is begin-

ning her second year, also used feedback from her looking, listening, and learning tour to shape this comprehensive five-year

"One of our top priorities is providing students access to highly-rated schools where they will have countless opportunities to thrive," said Goffney. "In addition to aligning our work, we are focused on continuous improvement, which includes monitoring implementation and reviewing programs along the way.

She also added that the plan is not designed to sit on a shelf. Instead, the plan is designed to be a dynamic document.

The goals, measure ments, and specific tasks to implement the priorities will come to fruition over the next five years and will be introduced and communicated broadly," Goffney said. "Our strategic plan will change and evolve as we define strategies and actions that support our commitment to ensuring all students graduate from Aldine ISD with more than a high school diploma.'

The first year of the plan will focus on building the tools, processes, and systems required to ensure the strategic plan becomes a reality. Specific focus will be placed on strengthening teaching and learning. Additionally, emphasis will be placed on professional development offerings that provide better systems of support for teachers and

Commissioner Rodney Ellis launch es Public Service Campaign to Promote Farmers Markets

Initiative Includes Double Up Houston Program that Allows SNAP Recipients to Purchase \$40 of Produce

Harris County Commissioner Rodney Ellis, Clear Channel Outdoor and Urban Harvest on Saturday, Aug. 17 launched a public service campaign, includ-ing 13 donated billboards, to promote the Double Up Houston program that allows families to use their SNAP benefits to bring home double the amount of fresh locally grown food from participating farmers

markets.
"Urban Harvest, Rebuild Texas and partners have created an innovative solution to one of Precinct One's biggest public health issues by opening farmers markets in areas designated as food deserts and doubling the impact of SNAP benefits," Commissioner Ellis said. "At Precinct One, we're committed to ensuring that every family has access to healthy, affordable food. This will make healthy, fresh foods even more affordable for the families who need it

The public service campaign was announced at the grand opening of the Northeast Community Farmers Market. The mar-ket will operate twice a month at Kashmere Gar-dens Elementary, 4901 Lockwood. It's the latest of 12 farmers markets and farm stands that participate in the Double Up Houston program, which is funded by Rebuild Texas Fund.

"This is the first time Double Up Houston has occurred," said Janna Roberson, Urban Harvest's executive director. "We launched in April. So we are very excited and it has taken a mountain of peo-ple to get this moving in our community."

Keith Downey, presi-

dent of the Kashmere Gar-dens Super Neighborhood Council No. 52, stressed that the market is "sustainable in our community" because it will be open twice a month.

"Why is it at a school?" he asked. "You can feed the mind and the body. You don't want to send a child to school without the proper nutrition.

percent of residents are food insecure, with over 637,000 low-income individuals receiving nutrition assistance. In Precinct One, 18 percent of households receive these benefits compared to 11 percent of households in the other three commissioners' precincts.

In addition to billboards Clear Channel Outdoor donated to Urban Harvest, the public service campaign includes targeted outreach in areas with high SNAP enrollment to let families know about the program and where to find a participating farmers market.

"Clear Channel Outdoor is proud to support the effort of Urban Harvest to provide healthy alternatives to the community,' said Lee Vela, vice president of public affairs for Clear Channel Outdoor-Houston. "These billboards will generate more than 8 million market impressions over the next month to make sure everyone knows about this pro-

Precinct One also provided residents free bus transportation to the farmers market on Saturday. Commissioner Ellis said Precinct One hopes to pi lot a program to provide transportation to farmers markets from its commu-

nity centers.
"I'm incredibly grateful for Clear Channel Outdoor for donating billboard space to promote this program, to HISD for hosting this garden and to Urban Harvest, Rebuild Texas and all the partners who are helping families access and afford the nutritious food they need to stay healthy and thrive," Commissioner Ellis said.

About a dozen partners. including Urban Harvest and Kashmere Gardens Elementary, have come to-gether on the project, including Houston Food Bank, Houston Health Department, Texas Hunger Initiative, Memorial Hermann Hospital and Fair Food Network.

Police looking for masked men who shot and killed a convenience store employee

Ask Rusty – How is my benefit Amount Determined?

Dear Rusty: I am 60 years old. I have worked full time since age 22. I am thinking about working part-time ages 62-65. When I start collecting my social security benefit sometime after age 65, will my monthly amount be based on only the last few years of my working? Can you please explain how my monthly amount will be determined? Signed: Planning My Future

Dear Planning: I admire that you're thinking ahead to your retirement years and I'm happy to clarify this for you. Your Social Security benefit, when you claim it, will be based upon the highest earning 35 years of your lifetime working career (not only the last few years). To determine your benefit, Social Security will take your entire record of lifetime earnings, adjust each year for inflation, and select the 35 years in which you had the highest earnings. After totaling those years they'll divide by 420 (the number of months in 35 years) to determine your "average indexed monthly earnings" (AIME). They then break your AIME into several parts (using what's known as "bend points") and then take a percentage of each part and add it up to arrive at what's called your "primary insurance amount" or "PIA." The "bend point" values change each year, but for 2019 they are \$926 and \$5583. To compute your benefit, the formula will take 90% of the first \$926 of your AIME; 32% of your AIME between \$926 and \$5583; and 15% of any amount of your AIME over \$5583. The product of those three computations are added together to arrive at your PIA.

Your PIA is the amount you will get at your full re-

"FRA," which for you (born in 1959) is 66 years and 10 $\,$ months. If you claim any earlier than your FRA, vour benefit will be reduced - about 29% less if claimed at 62. If you wait beyond your FRA the benefit will be more - 8% more for each year you delay, up to age 70 when maximum is reached. At age 70 your benefit will be about 25% more than it would be at your FRA. But a note of caution: any benefit estimates you have now from Social Security assume you'll keep earning at your current level until you reach your FRA, so if you work part-time starting at age 62 your benefit amounts will be less than those shown in the current

tirement age, or your

Finally, the above applies to your own individual SS retirement benefit from your own lifetime work record. If you are married, and your PIA is less than 50% of your husband's PIA, then you might also be eligible for a spousal boost from your husband. Or if you are the higher earner, your husband might be eligible for a spousal boost from you when you claim your Social Security benefit.

My parents live in a cabin high on a hill overlooking the lake, so you have to climb a lot of steps to get from the cabin down to the shore. My father built the steps down to the lake. In the middle of the climb, there is a bench where (my dad insists) there is a good place to admire the view. (It happens to also be a good place to rest on the way up but I'll let him stick to his

Almost every evening, my parents find their way down to the water's edge. They take a seat on the dock and watch the sun set across the lake. They listen to the loons call to one another across the water and watch the clouds turn pink as the sun disappears in the evening sky.

Then they do it all over again.

Because the cabin sits so far above the shore, when they climb back up the hill, the sun is no longer below the horizon but just beginning to set again—a second

So, my parents take a seat outside their cabin and watch the whole thing all over again—from a different perspective. I tell my parents I admire the life they have created for themselves They have this great cabin, fun friends and neighbors. they bike all summer, ski all winter and, at the end of every day, they get an extra


I'd like an extra sunset. By middle age, I thought I could already see the sun going down. I figured I knew, more or less how the story ended. It turns out I was

Today, I am doing things I never dreamt of doing fifteen years ago, things I nev er imagined I could do. But now, as I scramble up the hill in the end-of-the-day light, I realize how much ternoon how much is left to see. I'd feel a lot sillier if I were the only one panting up the hill, but I have a lot of company. All around me I see folks looking for that second sunset: picking up paintbrushes and pens and college degrees, trying on new haircuts and new beliefs. Sometimes it's a little embarrassing-but we don't

Like my parents, we're just grateful to get this extra sunset. We're so glad the sun hasn't gone down after all. We just needed a different perspective. We just needed to get to higher ground.

Governor takes action to prevent acts of terrorism

AUSTIN — Texas now boasts its own Domestic Terrorism Task Force, established by order of the governor in the wake of the deadly Aug. 3 shooting in El Paso

Twenty-two people were killed and 24 injured by a suspect firing a military-style assault rifle in a popular shopping venue.

Gov. Greg Abbott on Aug. 14 said the task force's job will be to analyze and provide advice on strategies to maximize law enforcement's ability to protect against acts of domestic terrorism. The first $% \left(t\right) =\left(t\right) \left(t\right)$ meeting is set for Aug.

"Our top priority is to keep Texans safe in their communities, he said, adding that "Texas is stronger when we come together in pursuit of a shared goal, and today's actions are vital steps in our ongoing fight against extremism and violence. We stand united against those who wish to bring harm to our state, and together we will build a safer future for every Texan.'

Meanwhile, Abbott directed the Texas Department of Public Safety to:


-Conduct a state $intelligence\ assessment$ on the domestic terrorism threat;

—Establish a Domestic Terrorism Section within the Texas Fusion enter to proactively seek, assess and monitor domestic terrorism and other mass casualty threats;

-Coordinate with the designated regional fusion centers in Texas to increase the detection and monitoring of domestic terrorism and other mass casualty threats;

-Establish Domestic Terrorism Teams comprised of DPS Special Agents to provide immediate direct support to the FBI Joint Terrorism Task Forces and increase the number of special agents to conduct domestic counterterrorism investigations;

—Increasing the number of DPS special agents and analysts in the Texas Anti-Gang Centers conducting investigations of criminal gangs affiliat-



ed with Neo Nazi and White Nationalist groups and networks espousing terrorist attacks

TEA RELEASES RATINGS

The Texas Education Agency on Aug. 9 released preliminary financial accountability ratings for more than 1.100 school districts and charters across the

According to the agency, 87 percent

earned the highest preliminary rating possible for 2018-2019. A school district or open-enrollment charter is assigned one of four possible letter grades — A, B, C or F — and a financial management rating of Superior, Above Standard Achievement, Meets Standard or Substandard Achievement.

Ratings for 2018-2019 are based on annual financial reports provided to TEA by districts and charters for the 2018 fiscal year.

TEXAS' NOTES RATED HIGH

State Comptroller Glenn Hegar on Aug. 15 announced Texas repeated its high credit ratings for this year's Texas Tax and Revenue Anticipation Notes, short-term debt obligations to help the state manage its cash-flow needs for fiscal 2020

"Texas has once again received the highest short-term credit ratings on these one-year notes," Hegar said. "These high ratings, coupled with the maintenance of our AAA long-term ratings, help keep Texas' borrowing costs low and save taxpayer dollars as we manage our cash flow. Our creditworthiness reflects our conservative approach to financial management, an increasingly diverse economy and our broad and rising employment

Hegar added, however, that issues such as emerging trade tensions, the need to continue to address long-term obligations on the state's balance sheet and increased spending pressures continue to pose potential risks to the Lone Star State's future credit.

ECONOMY ADDS **JOBS IN JULY**

The Texas Workforce Commission on Aug. 16 announced that in the month of July the state's economy added 35,200 seasonally adjusted total non-farm positions.

Also, the unemployment rate held steady in July at 3.4 percent, matching the all-time record low set in June. The rate of 3.4 percent is the lowest recorded $unemployment\ rate$ since tracking began in

Holgorson era begins at UH with tough test against OU: Davis High welcomes new head coach in Scott Joseph

Labor Day weekend brings with it the beginning of the college and high school football seasons and the debuts of two new head coaches locally.

Scott Joseph will make his debut as Davis High School's new head coach when his Falcons take on College Park on Friday night in The Woodlands.

Joseph, the brother of Katy High head football coach Gary Joseph, has served as a head coach in Katy ISD at Seven Lakes and Morton Ranch high schools. He's also served as the defensive coordinator at Navarro College in Corsicana, Terry High School, Hightower High School, Cy Ranch High School and Baytown Lee. He's also served as an assistant coach at Anderson High School and John Tyler High School.

Joseph said he's excited about his new duties and is ready for a long tenure at Davis and in Aldine ISD.

"We want to establish a base for our program to take us into the next 10 years," he said. "We are not just building for this year, but we want to establish a program at Davis on all levels. We want to develop players, physically, mentally and socially. We want to make them better everyday and will always want more from them and the team."

Joseph inherits a team that finished 6-5 a year ago and returns four offensive and one defensive starter. They open against a College Park team that finished 6-4 a year ago.

At the University of Houston, Holgorson was lured away from the Big 12 and West Virginia by Rockets owner Tillman Fertitta and his deep pockets. The fiery Holgorson and his Cougars will face a tough debut when they travel to Norman, OK to face No. 4-ranked Oklahoma on Sunday in a nationally televised game on Labor Day Weekend.

Holgorson has a huge weapon returning in quarterback D'Erig King. King accounted for an astounding 50 touchdowns (36 passing, 14 rushing) last year before missing the final two games with a knee injury. King (2,982 passing yards, 674 rushing yards) is healthy and ready to go, which has to make the offensive-minded Holgorson happy.

The opening weekend of the 150th anniversary of the

college season has a smattering of decent games. No. 1-ranked Clemson, the defending national champs, open with an ACC game at home against Georgia Tech, while No. 2-ranked Alabama faces Duke in Atlanta at Mercedes-Benz Stadium.

The best couple of matchups might be Wisconsin visiting South Florida, UH visiting OU, Oregon facing Auburn at AT&T Stadium on Saturday and Notre Dame visiting Louisville on Monday

No. 10-ranked Texas and head coach Tom Herman face Louisiana Tech in Austin hoping to end its two-year losing streak in season openers (UT lost to Maryland in Herman's debut in 2017 and at Maryland last year).

So, without further ado, let's take a look at this weekend's high school and college season debuts.

HIGH SCHOOL Eisenhower vs. Fort

Bend Marshall - Eric Jackson's Eagles face a tough test in their season opener on Thursday night at Thorne Stadium when they take on a Marshall team that finished 15-1 a year ago and reached the Class 5A state finals. Eisenhower returns eight offensive and four defensive starters from a team that finished 5-6 a year ago and reached the playoffs. The offense should be potent behind running back Seavan Guidry (1,038 yards rushing, 9 TDs), quarterback Christian Sims (1,120 yards passing, 13 TDs) and wide receiver Anthony Isom (500 receiving yards, 2 TDs). The defense will be led linebacker Damon Boswell, who accounted for 70 tackles and 10 sacks in 2018. My pick, Eisenhower 32, Marshall 31 Davis at College Park -

Davis at College Park — Scott Joseph makes his debut as the Falcons' head coach and takes on a College Park team that finished 6-4 a year ago. The Falcons return four offensive and four defensive starters. Davis will be led by running back DeMarcus Barlow (998 rushing yards, 14 TDs). Tyler Charles and Jah'Roll Stevens will battle for the quarterback job. College Park returns five offensive and eight defensive starters. My pick, Davis 23, College Park 20

MacArthur at Klein Forest – Wayne Crawford's Gen-



erals open the season on Friday night at Klein Forest. The Generals finished 2-8 a year ago and will face a Klein Forest team that finished 1-9 in $2018. \, \text{The Generals}$ will be led on offense by quarterback Eric Delgado (586 passing yards, 5 TDs), and wide receiver Taylor Eaton (348 receiving yards, 4 TDs). On defense, the Generals have one of the top defensive backs in the Houston area in Joshua Eaton (4 interceptions in 2018). Eaton will be heavily recruited and will be called on to lead early and often. He'll get help on defense from line-backer Bryan Razzo, who recorded 101 tackles last season. Klein Forest returns seven offensive and five defensive starters. My pick, MacArthur 20, Klein Forest

Aldine at Cy-Falls -Hank Semlers Mustangs take on Cy-Fall on Saturday night 9 in 2018 and will be without the services of running back Jacorey Howard who gradu ated and is now playing at Texas Southern University Howard rushed for more than 1,300 yards in 2018 and his production will be greatly missed. Aldine returns two offensive and one defensive starter and takes on a Cv Falls team that finished 9-3 a vear ago and returns four offensive and five defensive starters. The Mustangs will be led on offense by wide receiver Ja'Kobi Terry (277 receiving yards, 1 TD) and running back Jordy Benavidez (161 rushing yards, 1 TD). This will be a tough test for the Mustangs. My pick, Cy-Falls 23, Aldine 21

Nimitz at Channelview – Richard Slater's Cougars host Channelview on Saturday night at Thorne Stadium. The Cougars finished 4-6 a year ago and return four offensive and four defensive starters. The offense should be solid led by running back Jayvon Davis (1,811 rushing yards, 22 TDs) and quarterback Austin Remo (1,416 passing yards, 16 TDs). Channelview finished 4-7 in 2018

and returns six offensive and five defensive starters. Look for Nimitz to get off to a solid start in 2019 behind Davis and Remo. My pick, Nimitz 26, Channelview 18

Georgia Tech at Clem-

son – The defending national champions open the 2019 season with a conference game when they host Georgia Tech in each team ACC opener. Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney has built a power-house and has perhaps the country's top quarterback in true sophomore Trevor Lawrence (3,280 passing yards, 30 TDs). Lawrence started last year as a backup and is now firmly entrenched as the starter. He will battle Alabama's Tua Tagovaila for the Heisman Trophy, but he's not a one-man show in Clemson, which finished 15-0 a year ago en route to the national title. Clemson has a stud at running back in Travis Etienne (1,658 rushing yards, 24 TDs). The offense will have to carry the load vhile the defense matures. The Tigers lost five starters to the NFL, but there's plenty of talent left around to pick up the slack, it just might take a game or two for the young defenders to get their feet wet. Look for a big day from Lawrence and Etienne as they open the season with an easy win. My pick, Clemson 45, Georgia Tech 16

Wisconsin at South Florida - The Badgers travel to Florida to take on Charlie Strong's Bulls in what should be a competitive game. Wisconsin has one of the best running backs in the country in Jonathan Tyler (2,194 yards rushing, 16 TDs). Tyler will also be in the mix for the Heisman this year and will want to start the season with a big performance. The Badgers struggled down the stretch last year and that should serve as a wake up call heading into 2019. The Bulls finished 7-6 a year ago and will serve as a good test for

the Badgers in the season opener. Look for the Badgers to get a hard-earned road win as Tyler leads the way to the win. My pick, Wisconsin 24, South Florida 20

Duke vs. Alabama – I

pity Davis Cutliffe's Blue Devils, who will face an Ala-

bama team that will enter the

season in a foul mood after being routed in the national title game by Clemson 42-16. Nick Saban does not like to be embarrassed and I'm sure he reminded his charges all offseason of their poor performance in the title game. Duke lost a load of offense with the departure of quarterback Daniel Jones (2,674 yards, 22 TDs) to the NFL. Bama returns Tagovaila (3,966 passing yards, 43 TDs/5 rushing TDs) and three talented receivers in Jerry Jeudy (68 receptions, 1,315 yards, 14 TDs), Henry Ruggs, III (46 receptions, 741 yards, 11 TDs) and Jaylen Waddle (45 receptions, 848 yards, 4 TDs). The Crimson Tide will also be able to run the football and while they lost a load of talent on defense to the NFL, there is still plenty of talent on hand to carry on the tradition of outstanding play on that side of the ball. Look for Tua to come out firing against a suspect Duke defense. This one pick, Alabama 45, Duke 14

Oregon vs. Auburn -Perhaps the best game of opening weekend pits the high-scoring Oregon offense against a tough Auburn de-fense. The Ducks are led by quarterback Justin Hebert (3,151 passing yards, 27 TDs) who passed on the NFL draft to return for his senior sea-son. Hebert will be tested right out of the box by a fast and strong Auburn defense. That unit will have to carry the load for a young and in-experienced offense. Running back JaTarvious Whitlow (787 rushing yards, 6 TDs) will be called on to carry the load and run clock to keep Hebert off the field. Look for Hebert to be the difference maker in this one as the Ducks pick up a big opening season win. My pick, Oregon 23, Auburn 20

Louisiana Tech at Texas – Herman wants to open the season in impressive fashion, but his Horns had better not look past a Tech team that finished 8-5 a year ago and is usually a bowl contender. Surely, the last two opening-season losses to Maryland will serve as a wakeup call for

Texas. UT enters the season knowing Sam Ehlinger (3,292 passing yards, 25 TDs/482 rushing yards, 16 TDs) is firmly entrenched as the starter at QB. He has a bigplay receiver in Collin Johnson (68 receptions, 985 yards, 7 TDs), but the running game is once again a question mark. Herman is hoping sophomore Keaontay Ingram (708 yards, 3 TDs) takes control of the job, but he suffered a knee injury in camp and might not play in the opener. Offensively, the Sooners will be led by former Alabama QB Jalen Hurts (765 passing yards, 8 TDs), who transferred in the spring and went through spring drills to learn Lincoln Riley's offense. The Sooners lost a ton of talent on offense but there is plenty more wait-ing in the wings ready to make their marks on the program. This should be a high scoring game, but look for Hurts to make one more play than King does to open his OU career in grand fashion. My pick, Oklahoma 38, Hous-

Notre Dame at Louisville - The Labor Day football fest concludes on Monday night when the Fighting Irish travel to Louisville to face the Cardinal and their new head coach Scott Satterfield, who left Appalachian State to turn around the Louisville program. Brian Kelly's Irish finished 12-1 a year ago, but were trounced by Clemson in the CFP semi finals. ND returns Ian Book (2,628 passing vards, 19 TDs) at quarterback and will look for Tony Jones (392 rushing yards, 3 TDs) and Jafar Armstrong (383 rushing yards, 7 TDs) to lead the way on the ground. Look for the Cardinal to put forth a strong effort in Satterfield's debut, but ND should wear them down late to pull out the win. My pick, Notre Dame 26, Louisville 22



Excitement was in the air on First Day of School Aug. 20

There was a certain buzz in the air on Tuesday, Aug. 20 as Aldine ISD students began the 2019-2020 school year.

Aldine ISD Superintendent Dr. LaTonya M. Goffney started her second year with an early morning visit to the district's newest high school, Rose Avalos P-TECH School and joined a communitywide celebration to welcome students.

bration to welcome students.

"This was an exhilarating and exciting way to start the new school year," Dr. Goffney said about her early-morning visit to Avalos. "It was wonderful to see the community support and the excitement in the eyes of our students."

Avalos P-TECH School, named in honor of former MacArthur High School Principal and current Aldine ISD Trustee Rose Avalos, has an initial class of 124 students. The school is designed to offer smaller class sizes, a personalized learning environment and provide students with the opportunities to earn a high school diploma, an associate's degree or a two-year postsecondary industry certification through internships, and other job train-

ing programs. Avalos P-TECH is a partnership between Aldine ISD, BakerRipley and Lone Star College.

Goffney then paid a visit to Worsham Elementary, one of the district's two ACE (Accelerating Campus Excellence) Demonstration Schools.

In the spring of 2019, AISD adopted the ACE model, which uses strategic staffing and a "whole child" approach to bring the most accomplished educators to struggling schools. Several of the state's largest school districts have implemented the ACE model with notable success. The districts have seen dramatic academic outcomes in multiple schools with similar demographics as Aldine's.

Both Worsham and Goodman were featured on Channel 2 and Channel 11's morning newscasts. After her visit at Worsham, Goffney and

After her visit at Worsham, Goffney and other administrators visited Garcia-Leza EC/Pre-K/K School, which is one five campuses that will be immersed in an English/ Spanish two-way dual-language program during the 2019-20 school year. The dual-language program is also offered at Vines, Hinojosa, Magrill, and deSantiago and will focus on kindergarten students.

"We are excited about providing more academic offerings and choice for Aldine ISD families," Goffney said. "As we discussed options and ways to meet this goal, it became evident that a dual-language program was the perfect answer." Goffney spent the rest of her day vis-

iting campuses across the district including four schools that have new principals this year, MacArthur Ninth Grade School (Yul Everline), Goodman Elementary School (LaDon Ward), Griggs EC/Pre-K/K School (Tonya Porter-Brisker) and Lewis Middle School (Tonya Clark-Antwine). She made quick stops at Gray and Eckert Elementary. Her final stop of the day was to Nimitz High School.

several early childhood schools, which resulted in 111 of our youngest scholars getting a head start. It also meant opening the Dr. Archie L. Blanson Career & Technical Education High School. The campus offers a unique learning setting that allows students to receive a diploma while working on a workforce certificate that can lead to an immediate job or be built upon at a college or university after high school graduation.

This school year, Aldine ISD families will have access to several new programs that offer additional opportunities and choices.

Goodman Elementary School and Worsham Elementary School, our first Demonstration Schools, are under the helm of new leaders, La-Don Ward at Goodman, and Sandra Doria at Worsham. Under their leadership, and with strong support from district leadstudents and families will see a focus on instructional excellence, an extended school day, increased social and emotional assistance for stu dents, and parent and community partnerships to ensure rapid academic

improvement.

We are also launching Two-Way Dual-Language Immersion Programs at five primary schools across the district. Kindergarteners at de Santiago, García-Leza, Hinojosa, Magrill, and Vines will learn in both English and Spanish. Throughout the year, students will have access to rich content in both languages, celebrate and honor different cultures, and become true global citizens. These programs will grow each year until students can continue learning in two languages through high school.

Aldine ISD has partnered with EMERGE Fellowship, a Houston-based college-readiness program, to prepare high-performing high school students to attend and graduate from selective colleges and universities across the nation. Students participating in the program will receive SAT preparation, attend college admission and financial aid workshops, receive assistance with college applications and visit colleges and universi-

These programs are the beginning of a new way forward for Aldine ISD. We will continue to keep the community abreast of additional changes, programs, and initiatives. Each one is designed to ensure every student has access to a rigorous and enriching educational experience as we've outlined in our new strategic plan, A New Way Forward.
