## October is National Bullying **Prevention Month**

Bullying is unwanted, involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The action is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time.

District leaders believe that bullying, hazing, harassment, and intimidation significantly reduce a student's ability to achieve. They believe that all students have the right to a safe, caring, and respectful learning environment. That is why the district is committed to providing resources and education about the dangers of bullying.

Bullying behavior is experienced through a variety of methods such as verbal, social, physical, and cyberbullying (e.g., text messaging, social media). One way students can help prevent bullying is by reporting it.

According to Twiana Collier, a lot of students don't report bullying because they may think someone has already noticed, or they fear they will be stigmatized for reporting the problem. Collier advises students to reach out to campus principals,

campus counselors. Collier is the director of guidance. counseling, and student support services.
"We want students to

know that we are providing them a safe place where they can talk about things that are happening at school and outside of the school," Collier said. "Students need to know that they're being heard and that there's going to be a response to this."

Reporting Bullying The district investigates

all reports of bullying. Students, parents/legal guardians, or witnesses should immediately report such incidents to the school principal or assistant principal. Individuals can also submit reports of bullying to the assistant superintendent who oversees the campus. When an incident occurs, the following steps are taken to address the matter:

• A report is generated that outlines the incident and the parties involved.

• The designated site administrator conducts a

thorough investigation. · Parents of both the victim and perpetrator are

 $\bullet$  Disciplinary action, if necessary, is taken and enforced by the site adminis-

• The victim and the perpetrator will be provided counseling if needed.

Students can also contact Crime Stoppers, (713) 222-TIPS or (713) 222-8477, to anonymously report bullying, abuse, bomb threats, cyber crimes, dis-crimination, drugs, health concerns, suspicious behavior, vandalism, fighting, and weapons. Additionally, individuals can contact the Aldine ISD Police Department (281) 442-4923.

## **Houston Airport System becomes first** in nation to formally join federal campaign against human trafficking

Turner and Houston Airport System (HAS) Director Mario Diaz signed a memorandum of understanding Oct. 8, 2019, with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) and the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT), forging a public outreach campaign to combat human trafficking through a program called Blue Lightning Initiative (BLI).

BLI is an element of the DHS Blue Campaign led by DOT and DHS Component Agency, U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP). BLI trains personnel to combat human trafficking within the commercial aviation industry.

HAS is the first airport

system in the country to become a formal BLI part-

"Under Secretary (Elaine) Chao's leadership, the DOT is empowering transportation organizations, employees and the traveling public with the knowledge to recognize and report suspected instances of human trafficking. This BLI partnership is an impressive step forward, one that highlights the dedica-tion of this community in taking a stand to end human trafficking. It will make a difference in many lives," said David Short, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Aviation and Interna-tional Affairs.

"DHS is proud to announce a BLI partnership with the Houston Airport System. Airport employees will play a vital role in combating human trafficking in Houston through identifying possible victims and reporting these suspicions to law enforcement. We look forward to continuing this important relationship and further efforts to combat human trafficking in our country" said Kaitlin Seale, Program Manager DHS Blue Campaign. "The City of Houston

and the Houston Airport System fully support the anti-human trafficking goals of the BLI. This agreement affirms and recognizes our goal to completely eradicate all forms of human trafficking," May-or Turner said. "We will do everything in our power to work with the federal govrnment in ending these heinous crimes."

"The Houston Airport System remains committed to helping our federal part-ners in their efforts to comhat human trafficking The practice of human trafficking is a scourge to humanity, and it must end," Diaz said.

Prior to Super Bowl LI in Houston in February 2017, HAS promoted awareness and education

among volunteers and staff on how to identify possible human trafficking victims. "Since then," Diaz said, "we have taken a highly visible and proactive stance to show that human trafficking is not acceptable at Houston's airports."

In addition to the BLI campaign, HAS's related efforts include training in coordination with U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) and an art initiative to increase awareness of human trafficking. HAS also added an anti-trafficking statement to its fly2houston.com web-

All modes of transportation can be unwitting conduits for human trafficking; thus, with proper awareness and training, employees in the transportation industry can be key assets in identifying and reporting suspicious behavior. The new partnership with HAS, one of the largest airport systems in the world, will further discourage human trafficking activity and all HAS employees will be trained to detect the signs of labor and sex trafficking. When such suspicions are triggered, employees have been instructed to follow the BLI reporting protocol and expeditiously report tips to the DHS Tip Line number at 1-866-347-2423.

used for METRO street improvements, mobility projects, and other facili-ties. Funds for this work would come from the existing Sales Tax, and there would not be any additional taxes required. Projects included in this proposal are a new MetroRapid Bus System, more HOV lanes, and extension of the MetroRail system.

### CONSTITUTIONAL **AMENDMENTS**

Texans will vote on 10 Constitutional Amendments on November 5th. The issues addressed include a state income tax, creating a flood infrastructure fund, and funding for the Cancer Research and Prevention Institute of Texas. The League of Women Voters of Texas (LWVTX) conducts research on each amendment to provide fair and unbiased information to

Texas voters. "The Texas Constitution is among the longest in the country. Since it was adopted in 1876, 498 amendments have been approved ments have been approved by Texas voters. You decide which of the 10 proposed amendments will become part of the Texas Constitution," says LWVTX president Grace Chimene.

The League's Voters Guide is available online on the LWVTX website and Texas voters can review their ballot, make choices, and print out their choices from VOTE411.org. The printed Voters Guide can be found at many Texas public libraries. Texas vot-ers may take the printed Guide, VOTE411.org printed list, or their own notes into the polling booth. They may not use their phone in the

### polling place. Amendments to consider in this election:

-- Proposition 1 would amend the Texas Constitu-tion to allow a municipal judge to be elected in more than one jurisdiction.

-- Proposition 2 (SJR 79) would allow the Water Development Board to issue general obligation bonds for the Economically Distressed Areas Program (EDAP). The outstanding bonds could not exceed \$200 million. The bonds would be used to develop water supply and sewer projects in economically depressed areas of the state. The EDAP assists water infrastructure projects when the median income of a region is less than 75% of the state's median income.

Proposition 3 would

allow the Texas Legislature to give a temporary property tax exemption in

a disaster area. -- Proposition 4 would prohibit the Texas Legislature from establishing a

personal state income tax.
-- Proposition 5 would require the Legislature to allocate sales tax revenue from sporting goods sales to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Texas Historical Com-

-- Proposition 6 would authorize the Legislature to double the maximum bond amount for the Cancer Prevention and Re-search Institute of Texas to

\$6 billion.
-- Proposition 7 would double the amount of money that the General Land Office could distribute to the Available School Fund to \$600 million.

-- Proposition 8 would create a Flood Infrastructure Fund to assist in fi-nancing drainage, flood mitigation, and flood control products.

-- Proposition 9 would authorize the legislature to exempt precious metals held in a Texan precious metal depository to be exempted from property tax-

-- Proposition 10 would allow the transfer of a law enforcement animal to a qualified caretaker in certain circumstances.

### **VOTER ID INFORMATION**

In Texas, you are required to bring a valid form of ID with you to the polls. There are 7 forms of ID you can use: a Driver's License, a US passport, a US military photo ID, a Texas Personal Identification card, a photo US citizenship certificate, or a Texas Election Identifica-tion Certificate. If you do not have a photo ID or can-not reasonably obtain one, you may still vote upon signing a form and presenting an original copy of your Voter Registration Card, certified birth certificate, current utility bill, bank statement, government check, or paycheck with your name and address on it.

## Commissioner Adrian Garcia increases the Utilization of Certified Small Businesses

Commissioner Adrian Garcia is committed to encouraging and supporting small, minority, and women-owned businesses across Precinct 2, creating jobs and strengthening the economy as part of his overall efforts to promote

economic opportunity.
"I didn't want our MWBE efforts to be 'business-as-usual,' so I tasked my team to track payments to contractors, not just commitments," said Commissioner Garcia. "All too often, I've seen MWBE commitments left unfulfilled, and I believe the true measure of success for a MWBE program is in payments being released to certified firms."

Since becoming Commissioner, Precinct 2 has released \$16,949,297.20 to MWBE firms out of \$46,885,277.84 in contract payments to Certified Prime Contractors. Commissioner Garcia also tasked his Precinct 2 Purchasing Department to develop aggressive internal vendor outreach efforts on all contracts, including small purchases under \$50,000. The new efforts included training sessions for vendors, social media outreach campaigns, as well as cold-calling ven-dors within the different certified databases and to

## Get the flu shot in October

ton Health Department encourages everyone ages six months and older to protect themselves, their family and community from the flu by getting a flu shot before the end of Oc-

Flu outbreaks can occur as early as October and last as late as May.

"It may seem early but let me assure everyone that now is the ideal time to get a flu shot," said Dr. David Persse, local health authority for the Houston Health Department. "Although we can't predict exactly when the inevita-ble spike in Houston cases will occur, we know it will indeed occur. everyone should take the important step of getting a flu shot now'

People can visit their doctor, neighborhood pharmacy or local health department to get a flu shot. Many grocery stores also offer the vaccine.

The Houston Health Department offers flu shots at its health centers to uninsured and underinsured people on a sliding scale that ranges from free to \$15. To find the nearest health center, people can call 832-393-5427 or the City of Houston 311 Help and Info line. Health center locations and hours of operation are also avail-

HoustonHealth.org. In addition to vaccination, people can help stop the spread of the flu and other illness by:

Washing hands fre-- Covering coughs and

sneezes Staying home if sick and at least 24 hours after their fever is gone, except

to get medical care People at high risk for flu are voung children, pregnant women, people with chronic health conditions such as asthma, diabetes, heart disease, lung disease, and those age 65 and older. They also are at greater risk of severe complications if they get the

flu.

The flu – caused by difa contagious disease that results in symptoms such as fever, headache, fatigue, cough, nasal congestion, sore throat and body aches. People with a combination of these symptoms need to see a medical provider

Most people recover in one to two weeks, but some develop complications such as pneumonia, bronchitis and sinus and ear infections. Flu also can make chronic medical conditi

antiviral medications that shorter and milder. Antiviral medications work best if started within 48 hours of the onset of symptoms.



## 2020-2021 estimate of state revenue

AUSTIN — State budget writers likely will have more funds to meet the needs of Texas in the near term, based on information released Oct. 10 by the comptroller's of-

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar said revenue available for general spending in 2020-21 is expected to total about \$121.76 billion, up 9.6 percent from the 2018-19 biennium. This revenue would support the \$118.86 billion in gener-al-purpose spending called for by the 86th Tex as Legislature and would result in a final balance available for certification of \$2.89 billion.

Before each regular legislative session, the comptroller issues a biennial revenue estimate that forecasts how much money will be available for spending in the state's next two-year budget cycle. After the session, the comptroller releases the certification revenue estimate providing the detailed basis by which the comptroller certified the budget. The certification estimate revises the biennial revenue estimate to reflect legislative activity and current economic information and takes into account final revenue numbers for the recently ended fiscal year.

"In fiscal 2019, the Texas economy continued to grow at rates among the highest in the nation," Hegar said. "We are projecting continued expansion of the Texas economy in this biennium. The most likely scenario is one of steady expansion at a pace below that of the 2018-19 biennium. Risks to the estimate, however, include ongoing uncertainty about trade and national economic policy, slowing global economic growth and volatility in energy prices resulting from instability and potential conflict in the Middle East.'

Hegar, who closely monitors the economy and state revenue, said he would keep the public informed of significant events as they arise.

## Hegar distributes

**revenue** Comptroller Hegar on Oct. 9 announced he would send cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts \$773.1 million in local sales tax allocations for the month of October.

The amount to be distributed is 5.1 percent more than the amount reported in October 2018. Allocations are based on sales made in August by businesses that report tax monthly.

### Texas wages look biggest

When compared with the other 49 states, Texas boasts the highest avwages after adjusting for cost of liv-

This is according to TexIndex, a tool on the Texas comptroller's website that lets users see how Texas and its diverse regions fit into the national picture.

The comptroller has a 50-state scorecard which now includes regional data in TexIndex, allowing a more detailed look at the state. Data range from information on the state's under-18 population and degreed professionals to home values and the state tax burden.

### Syphilis testing mandated

The Texas Department of State Health Services recently announced Texas public health officials are reminding health care professionals about a new law increasing syphilis testing during preg-

Texas law now mandates three syphilis tests: at the first prenatal exam, during the third trimester and at delivery. The new requirement took effect Sept. 1 and comes as the state has seen a sharp increase in the number of syphilis infections passed from mother to child.

Congenital syphilis cases reported to the Texas Department of State Health Services more than doubled last year amid an ongoing increase in syphilis among women of childbearing age and an enhanced public health effort to detect and track cases. There were 367 cases of congenital syphilis in Texas in 2018, up from 164 in 2017.

"Congenital syphilis can have devastating effects on a child, but it is preventable when treatment begins in time," said Dr. John Hellerstedt, DSHS commissioner. Testing in accordance with the new law will provide the best opportunity to treat the infection so the infant doesn't suffer permanent consequenc-

### Update: Vaping, lung issues

The Department of State Health Services on Oct. 8 reported Texas has identified 95 cases of severe lung disease in peo-ple who report "vaping" before developing symptoms. One of the patients died.

The agency said state health officials continue to gather information about 28 other possible cases to determine whether they are consistent with the symptoms and substance use seen in cases in Texas and 48 other states.



### VA Helping Victims of Domestic Abuse

If you're a veteran and are a victim of domestic violence, the Department of Veterans Affairs can help you with housing and support services if you need to flee. If you have children, this includes them. If you are a senior veteran. elder abuse is included in the definition of domestic vio-

lence.
The housing and services are provided by two programs, Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) and Grant and Per Diem. In

2017, public law 114-315 expanded eligibility for both programs to include situations such as fleeing dating violence, domestic violence. stalking and any situation that makes it unsafe for you to stay. The big eligibility hur-dle is that you don't have anywhere else to live.

If you have to get out immediately, you're eligible for SSVF rapid housing intervention, which is a program to help the homeless get quick-ly into permanent housing. SSVF has a new component called shallow subsidies, which is essentially a hand up. Rents are below market

level, but are not based on a percentage of your income.

Grant and Per Diem gives

grants to companies to provide services to homeless veterans, including transitional housing. The GPD program will help with services to get your life back on track, such as stable housing and gaining skills to increase your income.

Go online to www.va.gov/ homeless/gpd.asp www.va.gov/homeless/ssvf/ to gather information and make contacts. The second link, to SSVF, has information for the states that provide the rent subsidies. If your living situ-ation is volatile, gather your information now and keep it in a safe place that you can grab when you need it. Your purse or wallet is not a good

In a violent situation, make 911 your first call. When you can, when the sit-uation is safe, collect your saved information and go.
