# County Attorney Vince Ryan hosts symposium to address environmental disasters



County Attorney Vince Ryan welcomes the participants at the "Environmental Disasters in Harris County" symposium on Oct. 10.

At a conference hosted by County Attorney Vince Ryan last week, experts described the environmental challenges facing Harris County when storms like Hurricane Harvey strike the Texas coast, the home of hundreds of chemical companies and oil refineries.

The symposium titled "Environmental Disasters in Harris County," held on Oct. 10 featured scientists, lawyers, and other experts who discussed what government and industry were doing and could do to prevent the loss to life and property from flooding and severe weather events.

"Our office is willing to take the lead in protecting our community with respect to the environment," said County Attorney Ryan. "This symposium was a great effort to keep all parties focused, engaged, and up-to-date with the latest information and efforts by our office and

other agencies."
Attorney Charles Irvine, lead counsel in a lawsuit against the Army Corps of Engineers, for flood damage to hundreds of homes located upstream of the Barker and Addicks Reservoirs in west Harris County, said the Corps knew that torrential rain storms

regularly occurred in Harris County and that the areas upstream from the dams would flood. He described the devastating impact of flooding to homeowners.

Jim Blackburn, Co-Director of the SSPEED Center, Rice University, showed the catastrophic impact of a Hurricane Iketype storm moving up the Ship Channel. He said it would be one of the worst environmental disasters ever to occur in the United States, jeopardizing over 200 chemical plants, shut



Goffney, a three-time graduate of Sam Houston, entered the field of educa-tion as a language arts teacher in her hometown of Coldspring. She was pro-moted to assistant princi-pal, principal and served as the district's superintendent. In Lufkin ISD, she served for nearly six years as superintendent before being named to the helm of Aldine ISD in June 2018.

# Lone Star College-North Harris Up Close: Ovi Galvan

HOUSTON (Oct. 14, 2019) – Looking at Lone Star College-North Harris up close reveals more than ,100 employees fulfilling the college's mission at LSC-North Harris and LSC-East Aldine Center. Their collective experience and dedication make the college a standout in high-er education. One of those employees is Ovi Galvan.

As Dean of Student Services at Lone Star College-North Harris, Galvan is responsible for a variety of departments and teams. Galvan's purview includes: advising, career planning and academic transfer, counseling services, diversity initiatives, financial aid, Student Life, Student Success Institute, TRIO and veteran's services.

Why Galvan is successful as Dean of Student Services and how he came to the role, is based in part on his background and personal experience.

Galvan was born in Harlingen, Texas. He has no siblings. Their small family moved to New Orleans a month after his birth and returned to Texas five years later for his father's job. They settled in the Heights area, and he has lived in the community

Galvan has a large extended family and is very close to them. He lives just 10 minutes away from his parents' home. However, growing up as an only child, he was eager to meet people and make friends at school. Galvan quickly got involved in many groups and activities.

"I loved being involved in Student Council and Student Government, and I was also a member of the French Club, Chess Club, Civics Club, Marksmanship Team, Honor Society, Yearbook and JROTC," said Galvan. "I really en-joyed JROTC and spent several summers during my high school years traintions throughout Texas." His involvement in

JROTC proved fortuitous. His JROTC instructor recognized his interest and encouraged Galvan to get involved in the Mayor's Youth Council, the Chief of Police's Advisory Council, and other community organizations.

"Retired U.S. Major Army Ranger Robert Savage was very influential in my early high school years," said Galvan. "He was the one that suggested I attend Texas A&M. I liked the idea and wound up joining the Corps of adets there."

After Texas A&M, Gal-

van pursued a master's in political science at the University of Saint Thomas Nearing completion of his studies, he heard Lone Star College-CyFair needed a Political Science instructor.
The start of the term

was just a week away, so he needed to move fast. He applied for the position, was interviewed, won the job, and became Lone Star College-CyFair's newest "Poli Sci" instructor, all in less than 10 days. "My entry into higher ed started off fast, but I found I love the field, and I've never left," said Galvan.

That first role, as adjunct government faculty member, was in 2009. From there, Galvan moved up to full-time faculty member and on to Student Activities Program Administrator, Academic Advisor Workforce Advisor and TRIO SSS Program Manager before assuming his current position as Dean of Student Services.
In addition to working

full-time, Galvan is steadily working on his doctorate. In the next two years he expects to complete the process and earn his doctorate in Educational Administration and Human Resource Development with an emphasis in Adult Education. In the mean-time, his job gives him

great satisfaction.
"I love the size of Lone Star College-North Harris and the variety that comes with that," said Galvan.

"The number of resources available to our students, variety of training and professional development available, and overall variety of day-to-day functions is amazing. I can spend my day working with students for leadership development, or meet with com-munity members, or present at various conferences, or many other things. Lone Star College-North Harris' size means great variety and options."

The variety of opportunities at Lone Star College-North Harris is a key to success Galvan likes to share with students. "Get involved in things. As many as you can, and as often as you can," Galvan said. "I understand that grades come first and that academic success is very important, but likewise, I have found that my involvement in Student Government, Study Abroad, Student Life and other extracurricular activities have not only opened doors for me, they have expanded my worldview and knowledge in a way that a textbook and classroom

alone cannot do." Galvan said, "Make friends, make connections. challenge yourself socially, engage and grow as a stu dent and as an individual."

His own history of involvement and building connections ultimately led Galvan to his current role. and this is the experience he brings every day to the students of Lone Star College-North Harris.

care. I determine whether il issue, and I connect them with the appropriate services," he explains

From day to day, Leal does everything from helping victims of domestic violence, to helping a new mother install a car seat. "In domestic situations, I take everything into consideration. I determine if they need a shelter, or other resources around the city," he explains. Leal works with the non-profit Safe Kids to provide parents with free car seats and installation. Individuals can simply stop by the storefront if they are in need

of help regarding car seats. Free movie nights, laser tag, or school presentations organized through the Community Relations Department of the Harris County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) are just some of the relationship-building activities that Leal, an Aldine ISD graduate, participates in with the youth of East Aldine. "The kids realize that we're not robots," he laughs. "We're human; we laugh, cry, and get scared just like they do."

Leal also helped seniors at Pilgrim's Place celebrate Grandparents' Day with din-ner, ice cream, games and prizes for the residents. He visits annually on Mother's Day as well as the HCSO honors mothers there who may not otherwise be given a

special Mother's Day.

Born in East Aldine, Leal is the youngest of six siblings. Leal attributes his personal values to his father, who made a lasting impact on his life. His father was only able to complete school through third grade, before becoming a mi-grant farm worker alongside his family at the age of ten. "That's how it was back then: you didn't finish school, you orked," says Leal.

After moving all around the United States, his father eventually moved to Houston

and started a family. But when gang activity became too much of a threat, he made the move to East Aldine for a better life and a safer envi-ronment for his children. It was then that he started work as a janitor in Aldine ISD.

"He always impressed upon us the importance of education, to do our very best. and to work for our commu-nity," remembers Leal. "He made sure that we spoke English; sometimes he didn't allow us to speak Spanish," he says. "My father was a diehard patriot." This strong influence led to Leal's siblings graduating from universities such as Baylor, UT, and Rice, and to both Leal and his brother becoming police officers in Houston.

As a child, Leal always wanted to become a police of-ficer. He attended Worsham Elementary, Aldine Junior High, and graduated from MacArthur High School. From there, he enlisted in the Army's XVIII Airborne Corps, while attending the Houston Police Academy. After returning from the 11-month liberation of Kuwait in Operation Desert Storm, Leal became a police officer alongside his brother, who also works in the Aldine area

Patrolling in Houston over the past 29 years has led Leal to intervene in numerous lifethreatening situations, one of which earned him a 100 Club award last year. The 100 Club is a non-profit which honors outstanding law enforcement officers among 18 counties surrounding Houston, in addition to providing financial support for families of officers and firefighters who have fallen in the line of duty or have been severely injured.

The act of heroism that led to Leal receiving this award occurred in May of 2018. "I was on patrol, and got a call about a man trying to jump off the freeway," Leal re-

counts. "My partner and I pulled up, and the man was on the guard rail about 25 feet up in the air. As soon as he sees us he jumps off the guard rail, but we caught him mid-air, and we all almost fell

Meanwhile, onlookers gathered on the road under-neath the man, waiting to catch him if he fell. "He was fighting; he was determined to jump," Leal continues. "We pulled him back over the rail, and he went for my gun. At that point my knee ready messed up. We finally got him handcuffed, but he broke free and tried to jump over again. I really messed up my knee that time while stopping him."

Leal was also nominated in a separate occasion for the 100 Club award after running into a burning home, helping the family escape, and carry-ing out their college-aged son who had passed out from the toxic fumes. Officers chosen out of the many nominations were honored at this year's 65th Annual Heroes Award

Program and Banquet.
"When you're in these situations, you have to keep your emotions in control, rely on your training, and by the grace of God you come home at night," remarks Leal, "But after my knee injury, I realized it was time for me to transition into another role,' he says. And of course, East Aldine was the perfect fit.

"All policemen are social

service providers," Leal says.
"When I used to be on patrol, I was like a fireman putting out fires around the city. I saw people in crisis every day. But being in the storefront means I get to make a different kind of impact on people's lives." For Leal, that's the best part of the job.

# Lone Star College urges you to be prepared this flu season

HOUSTON (Oct. 21, 2019) - The 2019 flu season is officially underway and officials recommend vaccination as the best way to help prevent contracting seasonal flu

According to the Texas Department of State Health Services (TDSHS), the official flu reporting season begins in October and continues through May. In Texas, influenza activity usually peaks in

January or February. Since it takes about two weeks for immunity to develop after receiving the flu vaccine, TDSHS recommends getting flu vaccines before the end of October.

The flu can sometimes be mistaken for the com-mon cold," said Christina Hagerty, Ed.D., LSC-Cy-Fair dean, Public Service, Health & Behavioral Sciences. "Those who are considered high risk of flu complications, include individuals who are 65 years and older, young children and those with existing health conditions."

Flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that in-

fect the nose, throat and sometimes the lungs. It an cause mild to severe illness and at times can lead to death. Flu symptoms can occur suddenly and include fever, cough ing, sore throat, headaches

and fatigue.
"Another important step people can take to minimize the risk of getting the flu is frequent handwashing," said Hager-ty. "This is the number one revention strategy for the flu and other illnesses that are prevalent during flu season.

# Income Tax on Social Security vs. the Earnings Test

Dear Rusty: I retired from work this year (age 62) and I will receive my first social security benefits in September. Is there a special rule for the first year you retire that allows you to not pay taxes on your social security since you have earned no other income since you retired? Before I retired, I earned about \$50,000, which I know is more than the usual allowed income. Signed: Retired Senior

**Dear Retired Senior:** I'm afraid there is no such "first year" rule which exempts you from paying income tax on your Social Security benefits. When you file your Federal in come taxes with the IRS you will need to claim your Social Security (SS) benefits as part of your income, and whether it is taxable will depend upon whether your "modified adjusted gross income" (MAGI) for the year exceeds \$25,000 (if you file single) or \$32,000 (if you file married-filing jointly). "MAGI" includes your taxable in-come from all sources (your "adjusted gross income" from your Federal income tax return), plus any tax-exempt interest you may have received, plus half of your annual Social Security benefits. If your MAGI exceeds the above levels, then up to 50% of your Social Security of the second of your Security of the security of your Security of the security of the security of your Security of the security of th cial Security benefits will become a part of your taxable income; or if you exceed \$34,000 (filing single) or \$44,000 (filing married-jointly) then up to 85% of your annual SS benefits will become taxable. If you don't exceed those levels your SS benefits aren't taxable as income.

However, I suspect you may be confusing income tax on your Social Security benefits with another rule - Social Security's "earnings test" which, if you have not yet reached your full retirement age, sets a limit on what you can earn without your benefit payments being affected. If you are collecting benefits before you have reached your full retire-

(\$17,640 for 2019) Social Security will withhold some of your benefits – \$1 for every \$2 you are over the limit. If that is what you're referring to then, yes, there is a special rule for the first year you are collecting Social Security. That special first year rule says that if you claim ben-efits mid-year and you have not yet reached your full retirement age, you'll be subject to a monthly earnings test for the re-mainder of that year, rather than the annual test. So, if your benefits start in September, provided you don't earn more than \$1470 in September or any month thereafter in 2019 vou won't lose any benefits. But if you do exceed that monthly limit, even by \$1, you won't be entitled to any SS benefits for that month. The monthly test is only in the calendar year you claim benefits - it goes away for you in 2020 and you'll be subject to the annual earnings test only for next year.

Please note that the earnings limits are considerably more if you are claiming in the year you will reach your full retirement age. If this were the year you will reach your full retirement age, the annual limit would be \$46,920 and the monthly limit would be \$3910 (these limits change annually). However, if you stay fully retired and don't re-turn to work you will not need to worry about the Social Security earnings test but, depending on your "MAGI," you may need to oay income taxes on your Social Security benefits.

# Terrorism prevention programs across Texas to receive funding

AUSTIN — Gov. Greg Abbott on Oct. 15 an-nounced \$61.2 million in Homeland Security Grant Program funding to sup port state and local efforts to prevent terrorism and prepare for threats that pose the greatest risk to the security of Texans.

The awards, released primarily to cities and counties across Texas, include 264 projects under the State Homeland Security Program and 136 projects through the Urban Area Security Initia-

"As governor, my top priority is keeping our communities safe," Abbott said in a news release. "These grants will ensure our communities have the re sources they need to counter terrorism state-wide and enhance security for all Texans. Our ongoing efforts to keep Texas safe would not be possible without our partnership with the federal government, and I thank them for their continued assistance."

Larger expenditures of grant monies would be applied as follows:

-\$24.3 million to provide equipment, training and exercise support for local, regional and statelevel response teams such as SWAT, bomb, HAZMAT and search and rescue, and for other law enforcement, fire and emergency medical services personnel that serve communities across

the state;
—\$13.4 million to support statewide planning and preparedness efforts that provide the founda-tion for effective homeland security capability development and implementa-

-\$8.3 million to sustain and enhance operational communications capabilities facilitating information sharing and coordination essential for and the successful response to

hazards; and -\$3.2 million to support state and regional fusion centers promoting ongoing intelligence and information sharing capabilities and analysis, production and exchange of tween federal, state and lo-

The September unemployment rate matches the all-time record low first set in June, the lowest recorded unemployment rate since series tracking began

Leading job growth in September was the profes-sional and business services sector, which added 9,600 jobs. The construction sector followed, adding 7,200 jobs. Education and health services added another 1,800 jobs.

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area recorded August's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs with a nonseasonally adjusted rate of 2.0 percent, followed by the Amarillo MSA at 2.5. The Austin-Round Rock, College Station-Bryan and Odessa MSAs each recorded the third-lowest rate at 2.6 percent.





# Suspect charged in fatal shooting on **Tidwell Road**

Charges have been filed against a suspect for his role in the fatal shooting of a man at 5724 Tidwell about 11 p.m. on Monday, October 21.

The suspect, Richard Christopher Russell, 25, is charged with murder.

According to officials, HPD patrol officers responded to a person down call on Tidwell and arrived to find Kenneth Hoskins, 58, lying on the sidewalk in front of a convenience store. Houston Fire Department paramedics arrived at the scene and pronounced him deceased.

Further investigation determined Hoskins and the suspect, Russell, got into an argument at the convenience store. Russell left the scene and walked to his next door business (5724 Tidwell Road). He then returned armed with a pistol and approached Hoskins, who was armed with a shotgun. A shoot-



ing then ensued, during which Hoskins was fatally struck. Russell, also wounded, fled and later went to a nearby hospital for treatment.

He currently remains hospitalized and in police custody.
