HOUSTON --- A man was sentenced to life in prison on Wednesday, Nov. 22 for a shooting that killed two and injured six people at the Haverstock Hills apartments more

than two year ago. Kenneth Jones was found guilty of capital murder in the March 26, 2017 shooting at the apartment complex. He was sentenced to life in prison without

His brother, Harvey Jones was also arrested in connection with the shooting. Last August, he pleaded guilty to aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and was sentenced

to 15 years in prison.
According to investigators, an argument between

two groups ended whe the Jones brothers arrived at the complex. Kenneth Jones



pulled out a riffle of the vehicle he was in and started shooting at the crowd.

Harvey Jones was arrested shortly after the shooting and Kenneth Jones was arrested in Florida two months later.

Imelda assistance fund announces first grants for services to flood victims

Locations Will be Open (Houston, TX) – Early

Voting for the December 14 Joint Runoff Election begins Wednesday, November 27, halts for Thanksgiving break, and resumes December 2-10. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., except Sunday, December 8, when they will open from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. On Election Day, December 14, the polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. The deadline to apply for a ballot by mail (received, not postmarked) is Dec. 3.

Harris County will open 33 polling locations during early voting, and 385 on Election Day. Registered voters can vote in the runoff election even if they did

More than 30 Voting not vote in November. A total of 389,494 people voted in the November 5th election out of the more $than\ 2.3\ million\ registered$

voters in Harris County. "We remind voters that they do not have to go to an assigned polling location in this election," said Harris County Clerk Dr. Diane Trautman. "With countywide polling, they can cast their ballots at any voting center near their home, work, school, or wherever they may be during Early Voting and on Election Day."

On the ballot are races for Houston mayor, city council members, Houston Independent School District, Houston Community College board members and City of Bellaire coun-

Texas has set January 28, 2020 as the runoff date for the House District 148 Special Election. Early voting for that election is January 20-24, 2020.

Social Security Matters

Ask Rusty – Can I *Increase My Benefit by* Withdrawing from Social Security?

Dear Rusty: I'm 67 Social Security for a couple of years now but I want to increase my benefit. Will you please explain what Social Security's Form SSA-521 is for? Would it benefit me as a retiree to be able to gain more on my monthly benefits? Where and how could I request or access this form? Signed: Seeking Answers

Dear Seeking: Social Security's Form SSA-521, Request for Withdrawal of Application, is used when someone has applied for Social Securi-ty benefits and later decides they do not want to collect their benefits after all. The form can be submitted within 12 months of the start-date of your benefits, and if approved will require that all benefits which have been paid to you, or on your behalf by Social ecurity - including Medicare premiums withheld taxes and any benefits (including those paid to your spouse or any other dependents on your record) - are fully reimbursed to the Social Security Administration It might be used, for example, by those who claim prior to their full retirement age, perhaps because they become unemployed and need the money, and then later become employed again. Or it might be used by someone who applies for benefits early but later simply change their mind and now wants to delay claiming to increase their benefit amount. This form is how someone can initiate the "do over option" that you some-times hear Social Securithines hear Social Security pundits speak of. It essentially "wipes the slate clean" with Social Security, but it cannot be used by someone who has been collecting benefits for more than one year and it cannot be used more than once in your lifetime.

From what you have told me, the Request for Withdrawal of Application Form SSA-521 will not work for you. Howev er, there is another way you can increase your Social Security benefit. Since you have already reached your full retirerequest that Social Security "suspend" your benefit payments so that vou can earn "delayed retirement credits

 $\left(DRCs\right) .$ If you suspend your benefits, you'll earn DRCs at the rate of 2/ 3rds of 1% per month you delay (8% per year of delay), and when you eventually restart your benefits the amount will be higher (how much higher depends upon the number of months your benefits have been suspended). You can earn DRCs up to age 70, so you should not wait beyond age 70 to restart your benefits. But beware, because there's a catch to suspending your benefits - your spouse, or any other dependent, cannot collect benefits based upon your work record while your benefits are suspended. And if your Medicare Part B premium is deducted from your Social Security payment, you'll need to make special arrangements to pay that Part B premium directly to Medicare.

If you decide to suspend and allow your benefit to grow, you will need to contact Social Security directly, either via the general number (800.774.1213) or by contacting your local office (find it at www.ssa.gov/locator). You may ask Social Security to suspend your benefits either verbally or in writing. So, if you have found that you don't need your Social Security benefit at this time and wish to allow it to grow, and you understand that anyone else collecting on your record cannot get benefits while you are not collecting, then suspending your benefits and restarting later would give you the higher benefit you are seeking. Your benefits will restart automatically the month you turn 70.

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




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State's chief election officer works to head off election misinformation

AUSTIN — Texas Secretary of State Ruth Hughs announced ahead of the 2020 primary and general elections that her office will join fellow members of the National Association of Secretaries of State in #TrustedInfo2020, a social mediabased education effort to prevent misinformation.

Hughs encouraged Texans to look to their state and local elections officials as the trusted sources of election information. "The upcoming 2020 elections will be historic and unlike any before," said Hughs.

Jobless rate stays

Texas Workforce Commission on Nov. 15 reported the Lone Star State's seasonally adjusted unemployment rate held steady at 3.4 percent for the month of October.

This marks the fifth consecutive month of record low unemployment and 3.4 percent is the lowest unemployment rate since series tracking began in 1976.

"October Labor market data is great news for Texas workers," said TWC Commissioner Representing Labor Julian Alvarez. "Their skills continue to be in high demand and more and more individuals are finding employ-ment. These numbers are a wonderful reminder of why I am proud to be a

Leading job growth in October was the Trade. Transportation, and Utilities industry, which added 9.700 jobs, followed by Professional and Business Services adding 6,300 jobs, and Education and Health Services which added 5,300 jobs.

The Midland Metropolitan Statistical Area recorded October's lowest unemployment rate among Texas MSAs with a non-seasonally adjusted

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rate of 2.1 percent, followed by the Amarillo MSA at 2.4. The Austin-Round Rock, College Station-Bryan and Lubbock MSAs each recorded the third-lowest rate at 2.6 percent.

Update: Vaping

As of Nov. 19, the Department of State Health Services had identified 189 Texas cases of severe lung disease in people who report vaping before developing symp-toms, including one death

Patients range in age from 13 to 75 years old with a median age of 22 years. About one-quarter of the people affected in Texas are minors. Three quarters are male, and nine in 10 report vaping THC or marijuana, possibly in conjunction with other substances. Almost all were hospitalized, with many requiring intensive care

Nationally, 2,172 cases have been reported in 49 states. DSHS is working with the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Food and Drug Administration and other states to gather evidence about what the cases have in common and

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller and the Texas Department of Agriculture on Nov. 21 hosted the fourth Annual Texas Agriculture Memorial Day at the state Capitol.

At the event, a crowd recognized men and women who have lost their lives or have been severely injured while engaged in agriculturalrelated pursuits, and those who passed away due to other causes but had a significant role in the agricultural community, according to the department.

State 4-H and FFA youth leaders placed a memorial wreath on the steps of the Capitol and the Texas Department of Public Safety provided an honor guard with musical accompaniment by a lone bagpiper.

"The Lost Feather"

I lost a feather the other day and I understand this does not qualify as news.

But I want to say-for the record—that this was a really nice feather. I paid good money for it and pinned it to my favorite blue hat. I wore that hat out for a walk, one evening, when it was chilly.

This was the last night that my husband, Peter, and I were in Frigiliana, a little town in the south of Spain. I walked to the top of the very steep hill where, four hundred years ago, a Moorish castle stood, guarding the town from invaders. The invaders eventually made it there anyway and the castle was knocked to the ground. Only the amazing view over the Mediterranean remains. And that's where I went walking when I lost my feather.

There was no hope of finding it that night. The sun was already down. So, the next morning I headed out, looking for my feather.

When I got to the foot of the hill (a small mountain, really) I realized what a foolish idea

The ground was covered with autumn leaves that, surprisingly, all looked a lot like feathers. There was a stiff wind blowing and I had no idea when the feather had parted ways with my hat.

Just then, I met a young pair of Germans heading up the hill "Do you speak English?" I asked.

"Yes!" they told me (because all Germans do, it seems). "I've lost a feather. You

haven't seen it, have you?' "A feather?" the young man repeated.

It struck me that this was the stupidest question I'd ever asked anyone, and I was filled with relief that I would never see these two people again

"Actually, yes," he said. " saw one near the donkeys.' I knew exactly where the

donkeys were. "Right by the donkeys?" I asked, rather incredulous 'Ýes, I saw it when I

stopped to take a photo."
"Thank you so much!" And I raced back down the hill, back to the donkeys.

"It pays to ask for help!" I told myself. "It's worth asking stupid questions!" I added in my little sermon to myself

Except there was no feath-

I searched and searched and could not find it anywhere. Even the donkeys lost interest in the project. I was there so long the Germans came down the hill again and found me.

"Did you find the feather?" the young man asked.

"No, no I didn't," I confessed. He took me to where he had seen it. There was no

"Ah well. Don't waste any more time on this!" I told the considerate German couple

"Well, good luck!" they sai as they headed down the hill.

Since I still hadn't made it to the top of the mountain, I kept climbing. I went all the way to the top, to the place I had looked at the Mediterranean the night before. And there was my feather, lying no more than a foot from where I had sat. I held that feather in my hand, amazed.

Because, you see, I didn't really think I was going to find that feather. I thought the whole idea was crazy from the start. But once I shared the idea with that nice German couple, the possibility of finding it seemed more real, more attainable. Sometimes we just need someone else believing in our ideas to make those ideaseven the crazy ones-seem possible.

It was only because they believed I could find the feather that I did.

Ohio State will face either Minnesota or Wisconsin in the Big 10 title game. The winner of last Saturday game between the Gophers and Badgers earned a chance to take on the powerful Buckeyes in Indianapolis

It appears LSU and Ohio State, along with Clemson, are locks for the College Football Playoffs (CFP), even if each oses its conference title gam Which team earns the fourth and final berth is going to be interesting. If Georgia loses to LSU, but plays them close, does the committee reward the Bulldogs? What if LSU blows out the 'Dogs and Alabama defeats Auburn to finish 11-1 on the season. Would that be enough for Nick Saban's team to get into the CFP? Oregon hurt its chances with a loss at Arizona State two weeks ago and will probably have to settle for a Rose Bowl bid.

Heading into conference title game weekend, there is still a lot of drama as to who the fourth and final team will join LSU, Ohio State and Clemson in the CFP

In the NFL, the Cowboys kickoff Week 14 with a trip to Chicago to take on the struggling Bears. Two weeks ago, the Dallas offense had a rough day against the Patriots and failed to score a touchdown in their 13-9 loss. A questionable tripping call on a third down the Cowboys converted late in the fourth quarter dearly cost Jason Garrett's team. Team owner words for Garrett and his staff following the game and if Dallas fails to make the playoffs, this might be it for The Clapper

Other key games have the 49ers visiting New Orleans with the Saints looking to overtake the 49ers as the top seed in the NFC heading down the stretch. The red-hot Baltimore Ravens play at Buffalo, which can be a tough place to play in December while the Chiefs visit New



They face a loaded LSU offense that is balanced and has put up eye-popping numbers all season long. Quarterback Joe Burrow (4,014 yards, 41 TDs) is the leader in the clubhouse to win the Heisman Trophy, but he's not a one-man show. Running back Clyde Edward-Helaire (1,146 yards, 15 TDs) gets it done on the ground, and wide receivers Ja'Mar Chase (63 receptions, 1,260 yards, 15 TDs) and Justin Jefferson (75 receptions, 1,037 yards, 12 TDs) make plays in the passing game If Georgia is to pull off the upset they will need to control the clock with running back D'Andre Swift (1,130 yards, 7 TDs) and make sure quarterback Jake Fromm (2,131 yards, 17 TDs) protects the football and makes plays when given the chance. LSU's defense has some holes, but I think Burrow and the offense will carry the day as the Tigers set their sights on a national championship. My pick, LSU 31,

Dallas at Chicago - Jerry Jones is not happy with his head coach, which means Jason Garrett is definitely on the hot seat. 

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


