UPDATED - March 6, 2020 - Health Officials con-firmed the second case of coronavirus in the City of Houston, making a total of 8 in Fort Bend, Houston and Harris County areas. (NOTE: This number may change as days go by.)
The female patient, in

the 60 to 70 age range, is part of the same group of travelers to Egypt associated with recent cases announced in Fort Bend County and Harris County. She is currently hospitalized and stable.



Primary Election hits incumbents

Ryan out; Constable Diaz, Eagleton in Run-offs

HOUSTON - The primary election brought a number of surprises on the Democratic ticket. County Attorney Vince Ryan was defeated by challenger Chris Menefee. Ryan could only muster 25% of the votes, and Menefee avoided a run-off with 50.45%.

Several other upsets oc-cured, with Pct. 2 Constable Chris Diaz facing a run-off with Jerry Garcia, and Pct. 3 Constable Sherman Eagleton in a run-off with Ken Jones his former boss. Diaz had only 34.7% of the vote, Garcia got 39%. Eagleton received 47.44%, Ken Jones got 16%.

In the Presidential race in Texas, Donald Trump commanded 93.94% of Re-

publican votes, Joe Biden took 33.6% Democrat votes, Bernie Sanders 30% Mike Bloomberg had 14.7% and Elizabeth War-

ren also ran for 11.6%. In the race for the Senate John Cornyn had just 76% of Republicans. Democratic candidates Mary "M.J." Hegar had 23.12% and Royce West got 14%

TCEO Holding Union Pacific Responsible for Creosote Site **Senator Miles announces**

Senator Miles nounced TCEQ Holding Union Pacific Responsible for Creosote Site

Senator Borris Miles announced the Texas Environmental Quality would be holding Union Pacific's feet to the fire regarding the site, formerly known as the Houston Wood Preserving Works, which used creosote, a substance described the Environmental Protection Agency as a probably cancer-causing substance, to preserve the

"Since before this facility ended operations in 1985, nearby residents and former employees began complaining about a severe decline in their health and cancer diag-noses related to the site, now owned by Union Pacific," said Senator Miles. "It brings me great pleasure to inform this community that the State of Texas is NOT going to allow Union Pacific to ignore this site that has been plaguing the Fifth Ward and Kashmere Gardens for over three decades."

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) joined Senator Miles, announcing they would be mandating the Union Pacific to submit a revised permit renewal

and cleanup plan by August 31, 2020. TCEQ officials also assured the Senator and community that Union Pacific would be held accountable to meet all permitting requirements and continue to make progress on clean-

ing the site.

Upon being elected, Senator Miles first learned about the site and began meeting with the commu-nity and Union Pacific officials. After reviewing Union Pacific's original cleanup plan, and deeming it unacceptable, he sent a letter to the TCEQ voicing opposition and requesting a public meeting.

'We are grateful Senator Miles and other elect-

ed officials have listened and prioritized the needs of the community," said Kathy Blueford-Daniels, Fifth Ward native and community activist. "We look forward to working together as we finally get this site cleaned and end the destruction it has done

to our neighborhoods. "Today is our first victory, and we should celebrate it. But there is still more work to be done to rid this area of what I deem, environmental racism. This will not bring back the lives lost, or heal those who are still fighting for tomorrow, but it is the first step of ridding our community of this environmental hazard," said Senator Miles.

8 tips for avoiding credit card debt

credit card debt totaled \$930 billion in the fourth quarter of 2019, a \$46 billion increase over the third quarter, according to recent data from the Federal Reserve Bank of New York. At the same time, the proportion of borrowers whose redit card payments were 90 days late or later increased to the highest percentage recorded in almost

Credit cards come with a certain amount of risk, and growing debt can cause problems ranging from stress and depression to a poor credit score and reduced retirement savings. But when used wisely, credit cards can be a helpful tool for managing personal finances and building credit.

Here are eight tips for staying out of credit card

1. Create and stick to a budget. This will help ensure you are not spending more money on your credit cards than you can pay off at the end of every month.
2. Remember that your

credit limit is not money in

with a card, you must have money available elsewhere to pay for the purchase.

3. Sign up to receive text alerts whenever your credit card is swiped. These alerts will help you moni-tor how frequently you use your card and remind you that, while not immediate,

money is being spent.
4. Keep your credit card bills organized, be aware of payment due dates and maintain regular payment schedules to avoid ballooning debt, and protect or even improve your credit score.

5. Set up automatic credit card payments from your bank account so you'll never be late. If you're not sure you'll always have enough to pay in full, set an automatic payment for the minimum amount due, which will also remind you to pay the bill in total. You might even consider paying your bill every two weeks to keep closer tabs

on your spending.
6. If you need help minimizing your credit card use, consider contacting a credit bureau to freeze vour credit. You can even freeze your credit via smartphone apps. You can always deactivate the freeze when you truly need to use credit for a big pur-

chase or in an emergency.
7. Delete your saved credit card information from accounts with merchants such as iTunes or Amazon. Taking the time to enter payment information manually means more time to consider a purchase before completing your order, which can reduce the likelihood of overspending.

8. Consider keeping your credit cards in a se cure location that is not your wallet. If you do not carry your credit cards around with you, you are less likely to use them.

with mild symptoms, health officials stated.

Judge Lina Hidalgo

mentioned at a press conference last Thursday that there is no evidence yet of any community spread of the coronavirus.

"All the cases in the Houston area have international travel in common and we've been actively monitoring these individuals since they were identified as being at-risk," Houston Mayor Sylvester Turner said. "I encourage Houstonians to limit international travel for the time being and heed the advice of public health officials about healthy hygiene habits. If you are feeling sick, stay at home. But do not be paralyzed by fear."

The health department has launched an investigation to identify any poten-tial contacts exposed to the virus. The department will provide close contacts guidance about the virus and monitor them for the development of symptoms.

"We expect to see more cases in coming days as we receive test results," said Harris County Judge Lina

Hidalgo.
The fifth "patient knew to monitor for symptoms and quickly sought medi-cal care when he started feeling ill" said Dr. David Persse, local health authority for the Houston Health Department. "His quick action and the response of the public health system signifies that the potential for public exposure in Houston is minimal."

People who recently returned to the United States from a coronavirus outbreak area need to monitor for fever cough and difficulty breathing for at least 14 days and seek medical care right away if they develop symptoms. Before going to a doctor's office or emergency room, symptomatic people with a travel history to a coronavirus outbreak area must call ahead to tell the healthcare professionals about their recent travel and symptoms.

If they recommend testing, go as soon as possible to protect yourself and those around you. Testing is confidential. HCPH does not release information about suspected cases to encourage people to get

tested and many people

test negative.

If a person has not been around anyone with coronovirus or has not visited an ongoing coronavirus outbreak area, they are not

Human coronaviruses most commonly spread from an infected person to others through:
- Respiratory droplets

released into the air by coughing and sneezing;

- Close personal contact, such as touching or shaking hands; Touching an object or

surface with the virus on it, then touching your mouth, nose, or eyes before washing your hands;

WHAT SHOULD

Residents should go about their daily lives, but practice every day preventhe spread of respiratory

viruses:

• Avoid close contact

with people who are sick.

• Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.

• Stay home when you

 Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash. If you do not have a tissue, use the elbow of your sleeve.

• Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces using a regular household cleaning

• Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eating; and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneez-

ing.
• If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand santizer that contains 60%

95% alcohol.

CDC FACEMASK RECOMMENDATIONS:

CDC does not recommend that people who are well wear a facemask to protect themselves from respiratory viruses, including COVID-19. Facemasks should be used by people who show symptoms of Coronavirus Disease 2019 to protect others from the risk of getting infected. The use of facemasks is also crucial for health workers and people who are taking care of someone in a close setting (at home or in a health care facili-

Call your healthcare professional if you feel sick with fever, cough, or difficulty breathing, and have been in close contact with a person known to have CÔVID-19, or if you live in or have recently traveled from an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19.

ORIGIN OF CORONAVIRUS

COVID-19 is a respiratory disease that first emerged in China and has now spread to many countries, including the U.S. While HCPH understands our residents will be concerned, we also know that more than 80% of people who have become infected only experience mild to moderate symptoms and fully recover. Symptoms include fever, cough and shortness of breath. People at higher risk for serious complications are the elderly and those with underlying health conditions.

State Sales Tax Revenue Totaled \$2.9 Billion in February

Comptroller Glenn Hegar today said state sales tax revenue totaled \$2.89 billion in February, 3.5 percent more than in February 2019.

"Growth in state sales tax revenue was led by re-ceipts from the retail trade and information services sectors, while receipts from the construction sector were down from a year ago," Hegar said. "Growth in tax receipts from retail trade was slightly boosted by collections from online

marketplace providers and The majority of Febru-

ary sales tax revenue is based on sales made in January and remitted to the agency in February. Total sales tax revenue for the three months ending in February 2020 was up 5.7 percent compared to the same period a year ago. Sales tax is the largest source of state funding for the state budget, accounting for 57 percent of all tax

revenue from other major

- motor vehicle sales and rental taxes — \$428.9 million, up 2.1 percent from February 2019;

motor fuel taxes -\$301.2 million, up 0.6 percent from February 2019;

- natural gas production taxes — \$136.4 million, down 16.7 percent from February 2019; and

 oil production taxes \$371.8 million, up 38.5 percent from February 2019.

A couple was killed in a 6-vehicle crash after speeding in a Dodge Challenger last Sunday night in northwest Harris County,

officials say. The crash happened around 7:25 p.m. in the 2900 block of W. Mount Houston.

Sheriff Ed Gonzalez said the driver, identified as Juan Molina, and his passenger, Yisel Rucoba, were in an orange 2017 Challenger speeding in an eastbound lane of W. Mount Houston when the Challenger changed lanes unsafely. It was hit by driver Lamberto Vazquez, who was heading eastbound in a gray 2016 Chrysler 200.

When Vazquez hit the Challenger, it spun into on-coming traffic, creating a chain-reaction crash.

The Challenger was then hit by a maroon 2008 Honda Accord going west-bound on W. Mount Houston. A man named Joseph Farrell was in the maroon Accord, which rotated clockwise and was hit by a white Honda Accord carry ing Ut-Em Pham and his passenger Hue Tran.

Saul Torres and his 12-year-old child were also traveling westbound in a black 2006 Chrysler 300 while driver Sarahi Ramos was in a black 2007 Nissan Xterra behind them.

spinning clockwise and was hit once by Ramos in the Xterra. Authorities say that as the Xterra hit Farrell's car, it also hit the Challenger, which spun again before being hit by

Torres' vehicle. Torres and his child had to be cut out of their car. They were taken with serious injuries to Memorial Hermann Hospital in the Texas Medical Center.

Molina and Rucoba died at the scene. Deputies believe the couple was mar-



Security's "earnings

Ask Rusty – Will Taking My Benefit Early Affect My Widow Benefit?

Dear Rusty: My husband is 70 and has been taking Social Security for several years. His benefit is \$2,100 per month. I am 60 and will turn 61 in March. I have very little built up and my expected SS benefit at my full retirement age is \$1163 and \$829 if I choose to take it at age 62. We are comfortable with our current income, but the benefit at 62 is enticing. I want to know how taking it at 62 would affect my situation if my husband predeceases me. Would I then be able to exchange my benefits for his? Please advise. Signed: Planning Ahead.

Dear Planning:

Taking your own SS benefit early (before your full retirement age) won't affect the amount of your survivor benefit should your husband predecease you. The only thing that would affect your survivor benefit is the age at which you claim it. So yes, you could claim your own benefit first and then switch to your survivor benefit later without hurting your eventual survivor benefit. If you have reached your full retirement age (FRA) when your husband passes, your survivor benefit will be 100% of the amount your husband is receiving at his death, instead of your own smaller benefit. But if you take the survivor benefit before your FRA. it will be actuarially reduced according to the number of months prior to FRA it is claimed. To be clear, if your husband were to pass before you reached FRA, you have the option to wait until your FRA to claim the survivor benefit (so you can get 100% of his benefit). In other words, you could continue to collect your own benefit until your survivor benefit reached 100% at your FRA (a survivor mum at FRA)

Be aware, though. that there is another consideration if you claim your own SS benefit before you reach your full retirement age. If you are still working and claim your benefit before your FRA, you'll be subject to Social

limit" which, if exceeded, will cause SS to take back future benefits equal to 50% of the amount you exceeded the limit by (the 2020 limit is \$18,240, but it changes annually). If you have substantial earnings from working, that could mean you will go some number of months without benefits (depending upon your earnings level). In the year you reach your FRA (but prior to your FRA) the earnings limit goes up by 2.6 times and the penalty is less, and once you reach your FRA there is no longer an earnings limit. But, I want to make sure you're aware that collecting early and exceeding the earnings limit will affect your benefits. If you go months without benefits because you exceeded the earnings limit, SS will give you time credit for those months when you reach your FRA, which will result in a small increase in your own SS benefit at that

But the bottom line is that collecting your own Social Security benefit early will not affect your eventual survivor benefit. Only the age at which you claim it, if earlier than your FRA, will affect the amount of your survivor benefit. And, by the way, your FRA as a widow is 4 months less than your normal FRA because SS takes 2 years off of your birth year to determine your "widow's FRA."

Governor gives update on actions to combat coronavirus

AUSTIN worldwide threat of novel coronavirus increased state agencies already were working together to ensure the health and safety of all Texans, Gov. Greg Abbott said Feb. 27.

After a briefing from state and federal health officials on coronavirus (COVID-19), Abbott provided an update on steps the state is taking. He said the Department of State Health Services has activated the State Medical Operations Center to serve as a touchpoint for any requests from local entities. The center also ensures consistent collection, tracking and reportof public health activities and data.

Also, DSHS is preparing state laboratories with testing capabilities for the novel coronavirus and is updating public health response plans in the event of the spread of the virus. Abbott said multi-level and multiagency coordination and communication efforts are practiced daily to ensure up-to-date information is flowing between federal, state and local partners.

Furthermore, DSHS is coordinating with the Texas Department of Emergency Management, Texas Hospital Association, Texas Medical Association and state university systems to pro vide educational materials and the latest developments in research and treatment methods for the virus.

And, relevant agencies will implement disinfecting measures at places such as driver license offices and schools and ensure that high-risk populations such as those in day-care centers, nurs-

ing homes, assisted living associations and health-care facilities are prepared and properly ared for, Abbott said. Meanwhile, the U.S.

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has confirmed multiple cases of COVID-19 in people under federal quarantine at Joint Base San Anto-nio-Lackland. The first was a traveler who returned on a U.S. State Department-chartered flight from Wuhan City, China. The others returned on a State Department flight for passengers from the Diamond Princess cruise ship quarantined in Yokohama, Japan. The individuals will remain isolated at medical facilities until they test negative for the virus and are no longer at risk of spreading it. The CDC has the latest information on the number of people under quarantine who are infected and is updating its national numbers each Monday, Wednesday and Friday.

The DPS said that previously issued driver censes are still valid until the expiration date listed on the card and, beginning Oct. 1, travelers will need a valid passport, U.S. military ID or a REAL ID compliant driver's license (one with the gold star) to travel on commercial airlines or enter federal fa-





Paxton welcomes

ruling Texas Attorney Gener al Ken Paxton_on Feb. 26 applauded a federal district court ruling holding that a 1998 comprehensive settlement agreement with R.J. Reynolds Tobacco Company and other tobacco companies stands and the agreed payments to the state for smoking-related healthcare costs must be en-

The U.S District Court for the Eastern District of Texas rejected Reynolds' argument that selling acquired brands included in the settlement nullified its obligation to Texas taxpayers, declaring that "Reynolds remains as liable today as it was when it entered into the Texas Settlement in 1998."

"I applaud the court for holding tobacco companies accountable to the terms of the settlement to which they agreed. Texas taxpayers are owed sub-stantial back payments and we will not allow any shirk the obligations to the people of this state," said Paxton. "No matter how large the company or how long the fight, my office will continue to fight for the compensation that taxpayers are owed.

Vaping case count: 250

The Department of State Health Services on Feb. 25 reported some 250 Texas cases of severe lung disease in people who used e-cigarettes before developing symptoms. Four of them have died.

Patients range in age from 13 to 75 years old with a median age of 22 years. About one-quarter of the people affected in Texas are minors. Threequarters are male and nine in 10 report vaping THC or marijuana possibly in conjunction with other substances. Almost all patients were hospitalized and the DSHS said many required intensive



If you have a housing emergency (you're about to be homeless), you can call 24/7. Visit its website and look through the drop-down menu across the top.







Young drivers urged to plan sober rides ahead of Spring Break

TxDOT reminds spring breakers about deadly, long-term consequences of drunk driving

HOUSTON - Jamie Chapman was a 20-yearold college student when he made the fateful decision to drive after drinking at a party. He slammed into a tree and suffered a traumatic brain injury. Although he survived the crash, it left him physically debilitated.

"Jamie was no different than any other college kid. He loved a good time with his friends, and he had so much to look forward to in the future," said Katrina Chapman, Jamie's mom. "Jamie's decision to drive drunk has affected our entire family's life, even eight years later. I hope young adults will see Jamie's story and make the right decision to find a sober ride."

The Chapman family is sharing their story through TxDOT's "Plan While You Can" campaign, which aims to save lives and decrease alcohol-related crashes. As many col-lege students enjoy Spring Break in the coming weeks, the campaign focus es on vounger drivers who may engage in activities involving alcohol.

During last year's Spring Break* in Texas, there were 417 crashes in-volving young drivers who were driving under the influence of alcohol. Those crashes killed 26 people and seriously injured another 52.

"Drinking and driving is a dangerous and often deadly choice that can ruin the future of a young driv-er and all those involved in a crash," said TxDOT Executive Director James Bass. "This Spring Break, be responsible and plan ahead for a sober ride." The "Plan While You

Can" campaign will tour the state featuring the "Plan to Win" virtual reality game. The game poses questions related to drinking and driving, and illustrates the consequences of getting behind the wheel through an immersive ex-

Driving under the influence of alcohol not only risks death or serious injuries, but it can also be costly. Drivers can face up to \$17,000 in fines and fees, jail time and loss of their driver's license. In-stead of getting behind the wheel, here are some alternative options:

- Designate a sober driv-

- Contact a cab or ride-

share service.
- Use mass transit.

- Spend the night. "Plan While You Can" is


