\$1,200 in COVID-19 relief money available

HARRIS COUNTY -Harris County has issued a new \$40 million COVID-19 relief fund to help residents in need during the pandemic that will be administered by Houston Catholic Charities.

It's set to open on Mon-day, Nov. 2, and will accept

day, Nov. 2, and will accept applications through Fri-day, Nov. 6.

The program will pro-vide one-time payments of \$1,200 to up to 33,333 fam-ilies struggling with finan-cial hardships related to COVID-19. COVID-19.

The payments will be distributed in two rounds. The first round is already underway and is assisting families who applied, but did not receive help from the county's coronavirus

relief program launched earlier this summer. The second "public" round begins on Monday when anyone can apply.

The money can be used for any type of emergency expense, such as housing, food, utilities, healthcare, childcare and transporta-

Families can apply on their own without cooperation from a landlord or

anyone else.





TCEQ have issued four violations about the plant's operations, including "failure to prevent visible emissions from the dust collection system."
State Representative

Armando Walle was at the site recently, listening to the complaints of the residents. He said that part of the problem is lack of reg-ulatory authority. Walle said "I want to change state law to five local counties authority to regulate these facilities." However, Harris Coun-

ty Pollution Control told media representatives that they had inspected the plant 39 times, resulting in air violations over the last several years. In addition, they said "We are well aware of Integrity Ready Mix's long history of viola-

In response, the owner of the plant, Manuel Malupa, said that he is abiding by TCEQ standards and state law. "We've always responded to what pollution control and the

state has asked of us."
As for the dust in the air, Maluna said it is not from his concrete plant, but from a vacant lot next door which was recently vacated, leaving dust and dirt

uncontained.

Malupa claims he is willing to work out a solu-tion with the neighbors, even though they live in a mixed commercial residential neighborhood However, HCPC says that the company has several locations, and "has the most violations for a facility of this type in both air and

Harris County Pollution Control said that due to the complaints, they will schedule another inspec-

tion.
Residents want to shut

the plant down, and remove it from their neighborhood. They plan on organizing a meeting among homeowners, and reach out to the County Judge Lina Hidalgo and Congresswoman Sylvia Garcia for help in dealing with the problem.

No Tax increase for fifth year for Lone Star College System

Houston (Oct. 9, 2020) -The Lone Star College System Board of Trustees voted to hold the LSC tax rate at 10.78 cents per \$100 property valuation for the 2020 tax year.

"This is the fifth year in a row Lone Star College has kept the tax rate unchanged," said Stephen C. Head, Ph.D., LSC chancellor. "We know many families are facing economic burdens during the COV-ID-19 pandemic and are pleased to be in the position of keeping the tax rate

LSC had the tenth lowest tax rate of the 50 community colleges in Texas for fiscal year 2020.

The LSCS board voted to approve the tax rate during its regular meeting Oct. 8 following a public hearing that was held at LSC-North Harris Oct. 1.

An LSC homeowner with a house valued at \$100,000 would pay \$108 annually in taxes based on the 2020 tax rate (not including potential additionlower the taxes further).

Homeowners are eligible for a Homestead Exemption of \$5,000 or 1 percent of the value of the home (whichever is great-

er). Taxes are also frozen for disabled residents and those over 65 years of age residing in the LSC service area as part of the college's \$75,000 property tax exemption and tax freeze where the actual dollar amount owed is frozen as of the date the taxpayer qualifies for the exemption even if the property value increases

"Lone Star College will continue to practice sound financial practices that are accountable to our community and fairly allocate budget and resources,' said Head

Property taxes make up 46% of the funding sources for the 2020-21 LSC budget. Student tuition and fees account for 30%. the state of Texas funds 20%, and 4% comes from other sources.

Statement on State Voter Suppression Efforts

Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo issued the following statement in response to Governor Abbott's executive order closing down 11 mail-in ballot drop-off locations in Harris County 33 days before the general election. Governor Abbott's proclamation reverses previous state guidance allowing counties to provide voters with multiple official ballot drop off locations and leaves Harris County with only one ballot drop-off site.

"The strength of our democracy and our county is only as strong as our ability to support free, fair, and open elections. Geographically, Harris County is larger than the entire state of Rhode Island. Our population rivals that of the entire state of Colorado. To propose only a single, secure drop-off location for a county of our size during a pandemic is ludicrous. Simply put, mail ballot voters should not be forced to drive 30 miles to drop off their ballot, or be limited to relying primarily on a mail system that's facing cutbacks. Governor Abbott's move is transparently about suppression, not security. It is also part of a broader effort by the Trump Administration to confuse voters, discourage voter participation and degrade public confidence in our elections.

We are working with our attorneys to assess any legal options we have, but in the meantime we want to be very clear: Regardless of who you want to vote for, your vote matters. Do not let the forces of voter intimidation prevent or discourage you from making your voice heard. Voters in Harris County who have already taken advantage of drop off locations in our County to date should know that their ballots will still be counted. Drop-off locations for example, require voters to show ID when dropping off their votes."

Over the past year and a half, Harris County has undertaken a series of improvements designed to make voting easier, safer, accessible, and secure. The county has tripled the number of early voting locations, extended voting hours, implemented county-wide voting centers, and undertaken elections security audits. To provide enhanced safety during the COVID-19 pandemic, the county is taking additional precautions, like providing voters with PPE and standing up drive-thru voting options. This week, the county also launched a ballot tracking system to provide mail-in ballot voters with updates on the status

It's the season for all things scary and I found myself wondering how many people are actually looking for more things to frighten them this year.

There is a new horror movie about Zoom that is supposed to be terrific... and I won't be watching it. I've never been a fan of horror movies. On the very few occasions I've tried to watch a scary movie, I end up both covering my eyes and plug-ging my ears (the ominous music is the worst part of it) and I end up with a pretty limited experience of the

A few weeks ago, I wrote a column about my husband, Peter's war with the rodents, and a friend sent the lyrics to "Ben," a song recorded in the early 1970s by a young Michael Jackson. It was the theme song for the movie, "Ben," which was a sequel to "Willard," which Peter then decided he had to see. The movie is only recently available on DVD and mail, we sat down together to watch it.

"This isn't a horror movie is it?" I asked Peter for the second or third time.

"No! It's about rats!"

That didn't really answer the question, but I agreed to watch until it got too scary and so I sat with him through the opening credits. The movie starred Ernest Borgnine as the mean boss and Elsa Lanchester (who played the bride of Frankenstein a few decades earlier) as Willard's mom, and a 19-year-old Bruce Davison as Willard. But the real stars of the movie were a lot of rats playing themselves

And Peter was right, there was nothing remotely scary about the movie until the last fifteen minutes when Willard turns homicidal and enlists the rats to help him. Then the rat named Ben reads the word 'pesticide" on the box that Willard is pouring into the rat's dinner bowl (or possibly recognizes the skull and crossbones?) That's when Willard is killed by his little rat friends.

Afterward, I watched a few interviews about the making of the movie. This was before the days of com-puter-generated imagery and to get the last scene Bruce Davison was covered with peanut butter and had 600 rats poured on top of him. They said they shot this scene last because the weren't quite sure how it all would all work out.

I didn't learn how much the young Mr. Davison was paid for his role, but I'm guessing it was not enough.

The movie was a huge and unexpected success when it was released, and a slew of killer animal movies followed. There were movies about snakes and killer ants and, of course, "Jaws," a bit parently prompted an uptick in pet rat adoptions.

The idea of horror fascinates me. There are movies and books about dolls and babies and clowns and all sorts of things that wouldn't under normal circumstances, be scary. I can read horror novels only because I can put the book down and reassure myself that I am still in my home, no monsters in

And maybe that's why we need scarv stories right now more than ever.

It's good to leave a scary world and realize that everything is not as terrible as the book or movie. Real life might be less certain than usual, but I can take comfort in the fact that I'm not covered in peanut butter with 600 rats swarming all

Sometimes, you have to take what comfort you can get.



Aldine History

Below you'll find one in a series of articles focusing on the history of Aldine. Our writing staff is exploring local activities, folklore, and documented history in an effort, in part, to ensure Aldine's history is properly celebrated and curated for all to enjoy.

Two 1990s Major **League Pitchers**

Earlier this year, the Houston Chronicle compiled a list of the greatest pro athletes from every Houston-area high school

Two 1990s Major League pitchers head those lists for East Aldine's two largest high schools: Aldine High's Roger Pavlik and for MacArthur, it's Brian Bevil.

We'll start with Bevil. A 1990 graduate of MacArthur, the 6'3" righthander was a 30th round draft pick of the Kansas City Royals. Bevil opted to pitch first for the Roadrunners of

Lufkin's Angelina College, which delayed his signing on with the Royals for a year. Bevil enjoyed his finest minor league season in 1996, dividing up a 16-7 record between AA Wichita and AAA Omaha. That punched his ticket to the bigs, where in 1996 he won his first and only Major League decision that year. Bevil remained in the Royals bullpen for the next two seasons and retired after the 1998 season with a 5-3 record and a

single save. Ravaged by shoulder injuries, Bevil's career ERA was a stratospheric 6.28, but bear in mind, this was the pinnacle of the era of Peak Roids, when each team on average scored five runs per game.

On retiring Bevil signed on as a deputy with the Harris County Sheriff's Office and has spent much of that time contracted to patrolling the East Aldine District in the "bike" patrol: a squad that keeps the district's trails, parks, and parking lots safe not just on bicycles but also aboard ATVs and horseback.

While he's known today for unenviable landmarks — becoming the first pitcher in American League history to walk the first four batters in a game — and mixed achievements, such as his inclusion on the 1996 AL All-Star team in a season

in which his ERA would end north of the 5.0 mark, Aldine High School's Roger Pavlik still accomplished enough in his six seasons in the Texas Ranger pitching rotation to earn him a spot among the top 50 players to have ever suited up for the Arlington nine.

Or at least he had as of 2006, and Ranger superfan Adam J. Morris was leery of ranking him that high even then.

And yet Morris makes a compelling

Yes, yes, I know...I'm sure that some folks (I'm not going to name names) are probably scoffing, laughing derisively, asking how someone like Roger Pavlik could have made the cut. And yes, part of him making the list owes to the fact that the Rangers history is not the most illustrious...barely 30 years of existence, and a lot of those years dark ones.

But nevertheless, Pavlik had some nice seasons in the Rangers rotation, something that seems to be forgotten when people remember him. Pavlik seems to be remembered as the guy with the bad mechanics who couldn't stay healthy, and who went to the All-Star game with a 5+ ERA because the Rangers scored a ton of runs for him and pumped up his win total. Pavlik's name is one of those thrown out, along with Darren Oliver and Kevin Gross and John Burkett, to illustrate why those great Rangers offenses of the mid- to late-90s couldn't ultimately get the team over the hump....

But the more I looked at it, the more I considered, I finally decided he had to make the cut. He had a couple of very good seasons as a Rangers starter, in 1993 and 1995, plus a decent half-season in 1992 and a decent full season in

[T]here's something uniquely "Ranger" about Roger Pavlik. The guy had 125 career starts, a 101 ERA+...and yet, he had a whopping 6 starts where he didn't even make it out of

That, to me, epitomizes Roger Pavlik...a good pitcher, sometimes great, but sometimes unbelievably bad. And uniquely "Ranger."

Pavlik, known for his knee-buckling curve ball, signed to play for the Texas Longhorns but chose instead to go pro when the Rangers drafted him in the second round of the 1986 amateur draft. Among the few pitchers selected ahead of Pavlik were Sharpstown's future Astro Greg Swindell (a future Astro) and six-time all-star Kevin Brown, a future Astro nemesis. An injury-riddled senior season for the Mustangs likely caused Pavlik to slide to the second round, and it was injuries (many believe brought on by his herky-jerky delivery) that played an outsized role in his equally erratic MLB career.

And not all his landmarks were qualified or simply bad: teaming with fellow Ranger pitcher Ken Hill in 1996, Pavlik became half the first pitching tandem to hurl consecutive one-hitters in the AL since 1919.
