GLO responds to criticism, sends \$750 mil to Harris County

After last week's announcement from the state GLO, local leaders in Harris County and the City of Houston were vocal in their unhappiness about the fact that almost no flood mitigation funds had been allocated for these two areas, in spite of the fact that Hurricane Harvey had devastated more homes and businesses than anywhere else in the state. Judge Hidalgo petitioned HUD, the federal department providing the flood funds to the state, to reconsider the criteria and allocate money to the local

needs.
As a result, George P.
Bush director of the GLO, changed his original statement and promised the county that they would receive a block grant of \$750 million without waiting for the second round of allocations. However, as told to

this newspaper by a repre-

sentative of the GLO, this money will come from the \$2.144 billion sent to Texas for flood mitigation from Hurricane Harvey, rather than additional funding. Here is the statement as issued by the

An amendment to the state action plan regarding the administration of Community Development Block Grants for Mitigation (CDBG-MIT) in the State of Texas will be submitted to HUD by the General Land Office to implement these changes. A final mitigation competition will be held for the other 48 eligible counties at a later date.

Although Hurricane Harvey made landfall in August 2017 and Congress appropriated these mitiga-

tion funds several months thereafter, the GLO's hands were tied waiting for HUD to publish the rules regulating the use of these funds until they were published in a Federal Register notice, which did not happen until August 30, 2019 – two years after the storm and 19 months after the appropriation. The scoring criterion required by HUD to be included in the state action plan for distribution of the funds was approved by HUD on March 27, 2020.

Superintendent James Colbert Jr. thanked 2020- $2021 \: Board \: President \: Eric$ Dick for his leadership.

"All the staff has talked about how the spirit, culture, and climate has changed on this board," Colbert said during the meeting. "Certainly, that's a byproduct of a lot of the new board members that we have, but it's also a byproduct of your leader-

ship."
At the Wednesday meeting, the board also approved a resolution to increase the over 65 exemption for the tax year

2021 from \$160,000 to \$229,000. This means that all individuals aged 65 or older will have their property taxes frozen for the 2021 tax year if their property is valued at \$229,000 or less.

Approval of this item aligns HCDE's over 65 exemption with Harris County, which increased its exemption last year. The move will save taxpayers \$3.45 per year on property taxes. Under the change, HCDE would see a loss of approximately \$270,000 in property tax revenues.

The increased exemption is on top of the optional homestead exemption Harris County already offers to all homeowners of \$5,000 or 20%, whichever is greater.



Clearance Rates for Crimes Continue to be Abysmal

The Texas Department of Safety has finally released its annual crime report by jurisdiction for 2019.1 This is the only place I have been able to find data on the number of reported crimes that are "cleared" 2 by individual law enforcement agencies. The clearance rates across the state continue to be abysmal, but Houston and Harris County are particularly pathetic.

Overall

Harris County tied with Dallas County for last place among major Texas counties in solving the crimes reported to their law enforcement agencies at just 11%, compared to the statewide average of 15%. The Harris County Sheriff's Office (HCSO) and the Houston Police Department (HPD) dragged down the countywide average, coming in at 8% and 10%, respectively. These rates are among the lowest clearance rates for larger law enforcement agencies in the State.

Murder

The Houston Police Department (HPD) only solved 40% of the murder in 2019. This was one of the worst murder clearance rates in the state. Its rate was well below the statewide average and other metropolitan areas.

This was just the latest leg down for HPD's murder clearance rate. The 2019 rate was the lowest since I started tracking it in 2000.

Rape

For many years I have been writing about the embarrassingly low rates at which rapes are solved across the board. 2019 was no different Statewide, only 23% of rape cases were solved. It is very difficult for sexual assault victims to come forward and report these crimes. For less than one in four of them to receive justice from our legal system is shameful. Every agency is pretty much equally awful on this one.

HPD is now solving rape cases at about half the rate it was a decade ago (28% vs 53%).

Robbery & Burglary

Most people are stunned at how few robberies and burglaries are solved. The results for 2019 were pretty similar to what we have seen in other years. The statewide clearance rates for robberies and burglaries were 18% and 9%, respectively. HCSO apparently makes no attempt to solve burglaries, as it cleared only 2% of its cases. I would have thought that more burglars than that would have shown up and turned themselves in. HPD was only slightly better at 5%. I am just guessing that having a 95-98% chance of getting away with a burglary does not provide much of a deterrent to criminals.

Conclusion

To put these percentages is some numerical context, in Harris County there were over 200 unsolved murders in 2019, nearly 2,000 unsolved rapes, over 10,000 unsolved robberies and nearly 25,000 unsolved burglaries. In all, Harris County citizens reported almost 175,000 crimes that were not solved. Lord only knows how many they did not even bother to report.

Law enforcement agency managers and their surrogates, such as the police unions, always have a litany of reasons for how shockingly few crimes are actually solved. They complain about staffing levels, that they are discouraged by prosecutors and judges not prosecuting the criminals they do catch, lack of public cooperation, etc. And there is some merit to their points

But the fact remains that, as a society, we are failing miserably to provide justice to the victims of crimes and we have been failing to do so for a And as time goes by it worse.

There are many negative ramifications from our inability to solve a reasonable percentage of crimes beyond the obvious. For one, when the public does not have any confidence that law enforcement can do their job, they begin to take matters into their own hands - as I suspect is evidenced by the meteoric rise in gun sales.

Instead of everyone trotting out the same tired arguments about why we are not doing better, we need a deep dive into why we are doing such a terrible job. We need the governing bodies which supervise law enforcement agencies to start doing their job. Have you ever heard any member of the Houston City Council ask why HPD only solved 40% of murders or 23% of rapes last year? My guess is that not a single one of them even knows what the rates were.

A good start would be to require every law enforcement agency in the state to publish its clearance rates monthly. One of the basic rules I learned in my business career was that "if you cannot/do not measure it, you cannot manage it." The clearance rate should be a regular agenda item for every governing body that supervises a law enforcement agency, and the media should cover how well crimes are being solved on a regular basis.

Of course, none of that is happening now, which is probably why the numbers are so abysmal. Where there is no accountability, poor performance almost always follows

A Special session of the Legislature coming this fall

Texas lawmakers will adjourn the regular session on Monday — Memorial Day — but Gov. Greg Abbott has already indicated he will call a special session in the fall to grapple with redistricting after detailed census results are finally released.

Last week, Abbott told

lawmakers he would put them in charge of deciding how to spend nearly \$16 billion in federal money the state received for COV-ID-19 recovery efforts. During the first two rounds of stimulus fund-ing, Abbott decided how the money would be spent, which angered some legis-

lators.

The special session comes just months before the 2022 primaries, with Abbott, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, Attorney General Ken Paxton and Comptroller Glenn Hegar all planning to seek re-election.

That raises the possibil-ity of other topics being added the special session that could appeal to the governor's base, according to the San Antonio Express-News. Abbott has drawn one primary opponent, former state Sen. Don Huffines.

MASK MANDATES LARGELY A THING OF THE PAST IN **TEXAS**

Abbott last week issued an executive order banning all government and public entities from mandating the wearing of masks. The order went into effect May 21, except for public schools, which can require masks until June 4.

Local governments or

officials can be fined up to \$1,000 for requiring the wearing of masks, al-though businesses can still require them. Most large retailers, such as Walmart, Costco and Target, announced they were ending mask requirements.

However, state-support-ed living centers, governhospitals, state prison juvenile justice facilities and county and municipal jails



order and can still require masks be worn.

A DAY IN TEXAS WITH NO COVID-19 DEATHS

For the first time since March 21, 2020, the state's Department of State Health Services on Sunday, May 16, said no deaths related to COVID-19 were reported.

The milestone was noted by Abbott and others, though celebrations were tempered at least among some, the Houston Chronicle reported. The hiatus was short-lived, however, as DSHS reported 23 new deaths the following day.

The number of Texans hospitalized who are COV-ID-19 patients is at its low-est level since last June, according to DSHS, with 2,070 cases that were lab confirmed as of Sunday.

The number of new cases in the past week in Texas, as reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University, stood at 12,290, down 17.5 percent from the previous week and continuing the steady decline statewide. A total of 269 deaths were recorded statewide for the same time frame.

Meanwhile, the number of Texans who are fully vaccinated reached nearly 9.8 million.

The Texas Water Development Board reports a total of 44% of the state's area is now under moderate or worse drought con-ditions. By comparison, we reported on April 4 that drought conditions existed in more than two-thirds of

TEXAS OPTS OUT OF FEDERAL JOBLESS **ASSISTANCE PLAN**

Abbott last week announced the state will no longer accept federal jobless assistance funds after June 26, including the extra \$300-per-week ap-proved earlier this year by Congress.

The state is also leaving a federal assistance program that provides aid to self-employed and gig workers not normally covered by unemployment insurance. The move is intended to encourage people to return to work, as estaurants and other businesses say it is diffi-

cult to attract workers.
"The Texas economy is booming, and employers are hiring in communities throughout the state," Abbott said. "According to the Texas Workforce Commission, the number of job openings in Texas is almost identical to the number of Texans who are receiving unemployment benefits. That assessment does not include the voluminous jobs that typically are not listed, like construction and restaurant jobs.


The state's jobless rate was 6.7% in April, according to the Texas Workforce Commission. down from the record high of 12.9% in April 2020.

SECRETARY OF STATE HUGHS TO STEP DOWN

Texas Secretary of State Ruth Ruggero Hughs will step down at the end of May, she announced last week. Hughs was appointed by Abbott in August 2019. However, the Texas Senate never formally confirmed her nomination. Abbott will now be free to appoint a new secretary of state, who could be confirmed during the upcoming special session.

The old wooden folding table belonged to my grandma. I don't remember her ever using it.

After she moved out of her house and into a retirement home, my sister inherited the table, but she didn't use it much either. The table has four wooden folding chairs that tuck beneath it and the whole thing rolls on casters. My husband, Peter, and I are moving to be clos er to family and we don't have a serviceable table for our new place.

"Bring the folding table when you come," I told my sister. "We'll use it until we

find a new table!"
Peter and I were ready to move our furniture when we learned the moving truck had broken down on the way to our house, delaying the move. So Peter stayed behind to help load the truck when it finally arrived, and I flew ahead to meet the movers. I spent four nights in a sleeping bag on the floor, but when my parents and my sister came to visit, they brought the table.

Peter and I did not spend Christmas of 2019 with my family, but rushed home to see his sister, Lori, who was very ill. We thought it might be her last Christmas. We were wrong. We celebrated the next Christmas with her before she died. And I did not see my family again until this past week, 17 months later, when they ar rived with my grandma's old

"It's been so long!" everyone kept saying.

I got lost leading them out of the parking garage and we ended up taking the heavy wooden folding table on a tour of the neighborhood. The table rattled along on its 75-year-old casters and made a heck of a racket as we rolled by the Church of Scientology.

My dad was laughing.

"Do we even know where we're going?!"

"Do you think someone is catching this on a security camera?" my sister asked. I felt as if I had not been

away for 17 months—or even a day.

On Saturday, our furniture finally arrived, and on Sunday morning, still surrounded by boxes, I discovered we were within earshot of three churches with bell towers. I sat out on our little balcony in the sunshine and called Peter.

"All the bells are ringing!" I told him.

My parents and sister came to visit one more time before I left, and this time they brought along my brother-in-law, niece, and nephew. My niece is now completely grown up and my nephew went from being a child to a teenager while I

I had tied brightly colored seat cushions onto the old wooden folding chairs and my mother didn't reognize them.

"Those aren't the same chairs!" she said, amazed.
"They are!" I told her.

"They just perked up when they got a change of scen-

Peter still hasn't seen this new place we bought during the pandemic, and I know he still has some trepidation. But I am feeling so much better. It is good to be closer to family. We will be able to see more of our old friends and both Peter's relatives and mine. We're looking forward to trying new staurants and riding our bikes and doing a lot of things we haven't done in a long time.

Of course, there will be things we will miss. But right now, I'm feeling like one of my grandma's old wooden folding chairs, all decked out in a fancy new seat cushion.

I'm thinking a change of scenery will do us both a world of good.

Aldine ISD is Bringing Summer Meals Back






