"Two of my emergency items, along with other important legislation, did not make it to my desk during the regular session, and we have a responsibility to finish the ob on behalf of all Texans. These Special Session priority items put the people of Texas first and will keep the Lone Star State on a path to prosperity. I look forward to working with my partners in the Legislature to pass this legislation as we build a brighter future for all who call Texas home.

BAIL REFORM: Leg islation reforming the bail system in Texas to protect the public from accused criminals who may be released on bail.

ELECTION INTEG-Legislation strengthening the integrity of elections in Texas

BORDER SECURI-TY: Legislation providing funding to support law-enforcement agencies, counties, and other strategies as part of Texas' comprehensive border security

SOCIAL MEDIA CENSORSHIP: Legislation safeguarding the free-

ing social-media users from being censored by social-media companies based on the user's expressed viewpoints, including by providing a legal remedy for those wrongfully excluded from a platform.

ARTICLE X FUND-ING: Legislation providing appropriations to the Legislature and legislative agencies in Article X of the General Appropriations Act.





BakerRipley is holding its **FUN IN THE SUN SUMMER FES- TIVAL** on Saturday, July 10, from 10 a.m. to noon. The outdoor party will include music, food, crafts, face painting, and outdoor water activities.

After a year of remote, at-home schooling, children and parents in the East Aldine area were eager to participate in the <u>SUM-MER CLASSES</u> offered at the BakerRipley community center in the Town Center at 3000 Aldine Mail Route Rd. Classes were in

such great demand that staff had to add a few classes to the more popular offerings, including guitar lessons. And there were plenty of kids who got a kick out of Taekwondo classes.

"I do think that the kids were happy to be in classrooms with each other, after a school year where they weren't together," said Rocio Witte, program director for the BakerRipley East Aldine Center.

Parents may have been even more eager to get kids out of the house. Some parents, however, participated in classes with their kids, since several dads signed up for cardio-boxing to combat postpandemic pounds.

The **GUITAR CLASSES** offered by area musician George Mendez were an especially popular draw for children, with two age groups filling every available space, Witte said.

The classes were offered for





children from 5 to 9 years old, and for pre-teens 10 to 14.

WATERCOLOR INSTRUC-TION was another popular class, as children learned techniques for creating frame-worthy images in an encouraging environment.

BakerRipley, which also offers classes and activities for seniors and adults, will announce its fall schedule of classes at a community **HEALTH FAIR AND OPEN HOUSE ON AUGUST 21**. The center will be open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., and people can register for classes that day,

In the meantime, BakerRipley is offering FREE WIFI SERVICES through a partnership sponsored by Comcast, every Monday through Friday, from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., and from 3 p.m.
to 5:30 p.m. The Comcast Lift Zone also offers free access to
computers during those hours. People who want to use the free
service can visit the Youth Lounge or Café, Witte said.

Dozens of other East Aldine area children participated in the **HIGH MEADOWS BRANCH LIBRARY'S** summer reading program. Because of the advanced planning required for the program, the Harris County Public Library's branches offered a remote, on-line **SUMMER READING PROGRAM** to keep children occupied and engaged in reading during the summer months.

The library building is still a hub of activity, even though it's only operating at 75 percent capacity.

The "Tails and Tales" online summer reading program has included family-friendly videos on Facebook, which range from magic shows to pajama story time featuring librarian Ms. Krystle in her PJs, reading The Three Little Pigs as she curled up next to a stuffed version of Clifford the Big Red Dog.

The Houston Food Bank also is offering **FREE FOOD BOXES** for kids, each Monday at 11 a.m., when readers may visit to retrieve their "prizes" for completing books. Children can get "a little toy" or a free book for a certain amount of reading.

Librarian Jane Holt said some avid readers have already completed the reading program.

"We have some really fast readers," Holt said.

Holt said the staff is "still being very careful" because of the Covid 19 pandemic.

"We really want to take care of the patrons," Holt said.

There is still plenty of time for children to sign up for the reading program, which concludes Aug. 16.

Commitment to Houston Food Bank to Fight Food Insecurity

Harris County Commissioner's Court has approved extending a contract with the Houston Food Bank to provide county workers and funding to purchase and distribute food for Harris County families in need. The contract was originally meant to last until July and will now be extended until September and provide an additional \$2.6 million in funding. Funds provided are reimbursable by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA). From March 2020 to March of 2021 the Houston Food Bank has provided food to an average of 131,683 households each week which is an increase of 85% from the year prior.

Tracking Catalytic Converter Serial Numbers to Prevent Thefts

Harris County will be tracking essential pieces of your car that have become a target for thieves during the past year. Local catalytic converter thefts are up more than 400 percent and have mainly targeted Toyota Sequoias, Tundras, and Priuses because these vehicles have two catalytic converters. Catalytic converters contain precious metals, including platinum and rhodium, and local thieves have been able to get between \$50 and \$875 for converters and converter parts at recycling centers. Last month, Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo and the Commissioner's Court took action to stop this crime wave in our region by passing new regulations requiring metal recyclers to verify the origin of the convert er and upload serial numbers to a law enforcement database, making it much more difficult for thieves to profit from their thefts by selling the stolen converters to metal recyclers in the unincorporated areas of Harris County.

Harris County Honors George Floyd Day on June 9th

As a nation, we have collectively grieved for the loss of George Floyd and were outraged at the injustices committed against him. Though nothing can change the tragic circumstances of his murder, Harris County Commissioners Court last month passed a resolution supporting his posthumous pardon for a 2004 drug conviction concerning the alleged sale of \$10 of crack cocaine. The primary evidence in the conviction of this drug case solely relied on singular testimony by former Houston Police Detective Gerald Goines. The Harris County District Attorney's Office has since reviewed and dropped hundreds of cases linked to former officer Goines' involvement and testimonies, and court investigation of cases involving former officer Goines' testimony have already resulted in vacated convictions. Due to his death, Floyd is unable to advocate for himself in this case and file a post-conviction writ of habeas corpus issuing a false evidence claim, and, therefore, the Harris Public Defender's Office submitted an application for a full pardon on behalf of Mr. Floyd and his family. The County District Attorney agrees that these circumstances warrant a posthumous pardon. We will continue to fight for justice and fair treatment by our legal system for every Harris County resident.

This month in Harris County we honor the memory of Mr. Floyd and the movement against racial discrimination and police brutality sparked by his tragic death. Last year, Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo declared June 9th George Floyd Day. The date marks the one year anniversarv of Mr. Flovd's memorial service.

Resolution in Support of Transgender Youth

Despite pressing concerns like Texas' faltering energy grid and a global pandemic,

Texas lawmakers have recently focused their efforts on limiting the rights of transgender bills were considered in the Texas Legislature this past session targeting young transgender people, part of a wave of anti-transgender bills across the country. Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo last month presented Commissioners Court with a resolution opposing any such antitrans bills, and will continue to support inclusivity for all people in Harris County.

Resolution to Urge Medicaid Expansion in Texas

Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo and Commissioner's Court last month approved a resolution encouraging the State of Texas to expand access to Medicaid to individuals who don't qualify for either Medicaid or Obamacare. While Obamacare expanded access to Medicaid for people who have incomes above their state's eligibility threshold but still below the poverty line, the Supreme Court ruled that states could choose to not expand Medicaid. Medicaid eligibility for adults in states that did not expand their programs is very limited —the median income threshold for parents in these states is the equivalent of an annual income of \$8,905 for a family of three in 2020. Nearly all childless adults remain ineligible. About 1.4 million more Texans would become eligible for Medicaid coverage if the state were to expand its program, and about 75% of them would be people of color, according to a recent study by the Kaiser Family Foundation. Almost 20% of Texans lack health insurance.





Democrats sue over defunding of legislative branch

House Democrats filed a petition with the Texas Supreme Court on Friday, seeking to overturn Gov. Greg Abbott's veto of funding for the legislative branch.

As the Austin American-Statesman and other media outlets reported, House Democrats were joined by the AFL-CIO and caucuses representing Black and Latino lawmakers in asking the court to determine the governor's actions were unconstitutional.

Abbott used his line item veto power to abolish funding for the legislative branch in the next biennial budget, which takes effect Sept. 1. He was angered by the last-minute walkout of House Demo- $\begin{array}{c} crats \ to \ stop \ consideration \\ of \ various \ voting \ law \end{array}$ changes pushed by the gov-ernor and Republican leg-

"Abbott's veto is an abuse of power, an act of legislative coercion and a threat to democracy, the result of which is clear and immediate harm to the people of Texas," said Chris Turner, D-Grand Prairie, chair of the Texas House Democratic Caucus.


'The Legislature is a coequal branch of govern-ment and the separation of powers is enshrined in our state constitution," Turner said. "The governor doesn't get to simply cancel another branch of government when he doesn't get his

Abbott's veto struck \$410.2 million allocated for the Legislature and numerous agencies that provide support to lawmakers.

Besides state lawmakers, who make \$600 a month, Turner said the veto could affect up to $2,000\,\mathrm{employees}$ of the Texas Senate and House and those agencies

July 8, his office announced last week. He said in a press release that the items to be addressed "will be announced prior to the convening of the special session."

Abbott had said previously that he would ask legislators to work on two priority election bills that died when the Democrats walked out, as well as a bail bill that also failed.

On Friday, Abbott urged county judges across Texas to submit their two-year projected budget for expenses related to what he terms the "ongoing border $\,$ crisis." The projections, submitted online, will be used by the state to request additional border security funding during the upcoming special ses-

On Friday, the governor also urged jailers statewide to assist border sherwith operating detention facilities and providing jail beds for people arrested on state charges related to crossing the border illegally.



And, while I am excited,

I wonder how many more new homes, if any, I will have in my life.

I was there when my grandmother moved into her final home. She was 99, and her health had finally begun to slip. She moved into a place that, while it was not called a nursing home, certainly was. There was a bed and a dresser, a handful of personal items, a couple of chairs for visitors, and little else in her room. She had to know (as ve all did) that this was the last place she would

live.

I felt the sadness and feeling did not have long to settle because, as my grandmother was wheeled into the room, she looked out the window at a brilliant red maple tree.

"Oh!" my grandmother said, "Would you look at that tree!"

Our eyes left the drab little room, and we looked out at the tree, caught in the afternoon light, a brilliant blaze of red outside her window

I think that is how she got to be 100 years old.

My grandma always looked for the good in change, even at the end, even when the change could not be a harbinger of anything but the end. Because even at the end, there was a brilliant red maple tree to look forward to. There was something beautiful. There were still good memories to be made.
