



Aldine planning study seeks Community Priorities

Online survey lets Aldine residents, businesses, groups help set priorities for regional improvements

Harris County is seeking diverse public input for the Aldine Region Comprehensive Study (ARCS), a project that focuses on consolidating several community improvement recommendations and plans that have been developed over the past 20 years to create a prioritized list of infrastructure projects for Harris County to implement.

The project website https://htx-arcs.com – features a survey that lets respondents review and prioritize the draft goals for the study. Accessible in English and Spanish, the survey will be available on the website through the end of February.

The ARCS project area consists of the Airline Improvement, East Aldine, and North Houston management districts. Although the study is being led by Harris County, recommendations will also be included for parts of the study area that are within the City of Houston.

During the first series of public meetings in late January, which were conducted virtually via Zoom in late January, the team of county engineers and consultants leading the Participate in the Survey https://htx-arcs.com Before February 28

study project presented a detailed overview of their analysis of existing conditions in Aldine. Citizens who attended the meetings shared their perspectives on living and working in Aldine and offered several ideas for improving local transportation networks, affordable housing, parks, culture and economic development, safety, public health, and the region's overall quality of life. Instant polls during the meetings also enabled attendees to rank recommended goals for the study in real time.

All public meetings and surveys for the ARCS project are conducted in English and Spanish. The project website — https:// htx-arcs.com - is accessible in English, Spanish, Chinese, and Vietnamese. In addition to colorful visuals that highlight many iconic Aldine landmarks, the website features detailed information such as schedules and registration links for upcoming public meetings (to be conducted in English and Spanish dates pending), video recordings of past public meetings, links to the sur-

vey, as well as maps, a

timeline of the study's phases, and contact information for key members of the ARCS project team.

With input gathered from the meetings and the survey, the ARCS team is expected to come up with comprehensive recommendations for projects, programs, and policies for citizens to review and weigh in during another round of public meetings this spring.

The final report and implementation plan are targeted for completion this summer, and it will be submitted to the Harris County Commissioners' Court for a possible vote of approval.



Dear Aldine Community,

Happy Valentine's Day! I hope each of you is feeling the love today from family, friends, and/or Aldine team members. Today is also my 24th wedding anniversary! However, Valentine's Day isn't just a day to celebrate romantic love, but it is also a day to make an extra effort to show those around you that you care. With that, I'd like to kick this week off by sharing a few of the things I love about our district!

- Our full-day prekindergarten program for all three-year-olds ensures our commitment to student achievement touches all students who walk through Aldine's doors. And our Jump-Start Program aids some of our youngest students in transitioning from home to school by focusing on the skills they need to thrive.
- We are In Year 2 of the implementation of our new literacy initiative. Launched in 2020-2021, we saw growth in students reading at or above grade level at the end of the 2020-2021 school year. We promised in our strategic plan that students would have access to high-quality schools and learning experiences, and I can't wait to see the results this year.
- This school year, we launched a new Multilingual Framework. Our work in equity ensures educational opportunities that represent the diversity of our district. - The district continues to expand its aspiring leadership pipeline of effective educators who embody the AISD leadership definition.



- We also expanded the EMERGE College Prep Program to every AISD high school. The Houston-based college-readiness program prepares high-performing high school students in grades 11-12 to attend and graduate from selective colleges and universities across the nation.
- Our Board of Trustees approved a one-time Retention Bonus for all eligible full-time employees in appreciation of the work they do every day.

Between the launch of new pro-

grams, new school openings

for students new to the country and young women, and the announcement of our latest school for young men, this has been an exciting year for our choice schools. Did you know that Aldine ISD has 25 choice schools for all grade levels within the district? From dual language, magnet schools with themes from Montessori, direct instruction, and STEAM, the International Baccalaureate® program, early college, CTE and P-TECH schools, and a nontraditional school, there is something for just about everyone, ensuring choices and opportunities for all of our students. I hope that many of you will take advantage of the amazing opportunities we have available for our students.

On Thursday, Feb. 9, Aldine ISD Police Department held an extra special swearing-in ceremony for DJ and his younger brothers. Freeport ISD, Humble ISD, Montgomery ISD, and Spring Branch ISD also named DJ as an honorary police officer during the event. Harris County Sheriffs Office SWAT team and bomb squad also attended the event.

Poll Shows Widespread Support For New Texas Voting Law

Last August, the SAM party conducted a survey of its members and other members of the community about their opinions of the major provisions in the Texas voting bill (SB1), which was at the time, grinding its way through the Legislature. Our survey was clearly not a scientific poll but found that at least a plurality of respondents supported all the major provisions of

In October, after SB1 had passed, the University of Houston and Texas Southern University conducted a poll asking voters their opinions about its provisions. The UH/TSU poll found even stronger support for all the major provisions in the bill than the SAM survey did, with support ranging from 58%-86%.

What is particularly surprising about the poll results are the racial crosstabs.1 While Democratic officeholders and their media surrogates constantly argued that the bill would adversely affect minority voters, they did not see it that way. While white voters supported each provision at a higher level than did Latinos or African-Americans, Latinos also supported all the propositions and African-Americans supported six of the nine.

Support for voter identification on mail-in ballots was particularly strong across all groups (whites +57, Latinos +30, African-Americans +17). It was also clear that voters really dislike ballot harvesting, with wide majorities in every group supporting severe criminal penalties (whites +66, Latinos +43, African-Americans

I was surprised that all groups also supported more freedom of movement for poll watchers (whites +28, Latinos +14, African-Americans +14). Most people I talked to did not seem to care much for that idea.

Since the SAM survey and the UH/TSU poll, an $\,$ issue has arisen regarding a glitch in the process for providing identification on mail-in ballots which has gotten widespread coverage. I intend to write more about this as we see how this issue unfolds during the election. But it appears to me that a relatively small number of voters will be affected and I cannot see how any particular group is disproportionately disadvantaged. Seems likely to me to be a case of Hanlon's Razor.


You certainly would not know the new law had such widespread support from the media coverage on it, like this ABC News story that appeared on Monday. It leaves the impression that voters were upset about the new rules. The only story I saw that reported the actual results of the UH/ TSU poll was this story by Jasper Scherer in the Houston Chronicle on October 30.

In all, the poll to me represents the same sort of Texas common sense that we saw in the SAM survey. The vast majority of Texans want everyone to be able to vote and for it to be reasonably convenient to do so. But they also want to ensure that elections are fair and that the rules are followed. And unlike the hyper-partisans on either side, their responses indicate they care more about fair elections than they do about who wins an election.

Mail-in ballots applications rejected at high rate

MAIL-IN BALLOT APPLICATIONS REJECTED AT HIGH RATE

Mail-in ballot applications for the March 1 primary are being rejected by almost 40% - largely because of a missing ID number, which is now required after a new voting bill passed the Legislature last

The Houston Chronicle reported that nearly four in 10 Harris County mail ballot applications had been rejected as of last week. Early voting began Feb. 14, and the deadline for mail ballot requests is Feb. 18.

Other counties across Texas also reported high rejection rates, including Travis, Williamson, Hays and Bastrop counties, the Austin American-Statesman reported. Those seeking to vote by mail must include a driver's license number, a state ID number, or in some cases the last four digits of their Social Security number. If what the applicant provides doesn't match the applicant's individual voter registration information, the application must be rejected.

Texas has one of the strictest vote-by-mail requirements in the country. Registered voters are eligible to vote by mail if they are 65 years or older; sick or disabled; out of the county on election day and during the early voting period; expected to give birth within three weeks before or after election day; or confined in jail but otherwise eligible.

Early voting continues through Feb. 25.

DROUGHT CONDITIONS IMPROVE SLIGHTLY

The latest drought map for the state shows a slight improvement as of Feb. 1, with 84% of the state experiencing some level of drought, down three percentage points from the previous month. Dr. Mark Wentzel, hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board, said there were some improvements in the last month, mainly in East Texas. Additional rainfall in early February, mainly in East Texas and



Data released last week by the U.S. Census Bureau showed Texas as the top exporting state in the nation for the 20th consecutive year. The state exported \$375.3 billion in goods last year, more than California and New York combined. The state also led the nation in tech exports for the ninth year in

FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR CLEAN SCHOOL BUS

lion in grant funding is available under the Texas Clean School Bus Program to replace or retrofit school buses to reduce exposure to their diesel exhaust. The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality is accepting applications from school districts statewide.

Grants are given on a first-come, first-served basis. Districts can be reimbursed for all of the costs to retrofit buses, or 80% of the costs to replace older buses with newer, cleaner

according to TCEQ.

Only buses used daily are eligible. While the deadline is in October, funding typically runs out when enough applications are received. More information can be found at www.terpgrants.org.

POWER GENERATORS UNDER INCREASED SCRUTINY

During early February's winter storm, the state's electrical grid withstood increased demand, with few outages reported. Regulators are crediting increased inspections by the Electric Reliability Council of Texas during December.

The Dallas Morning News reports ERCOT inspected 324 generators and transmission systems in December; the Public Utility Commission handed down \$7.5 million in fines for companies not filing weatherization plans by the deadline.

"We've been working for the last year to make sure that this grid is more reliable than it ever has been in the past — and it is," interim ERCOT CEO Brad Jones said a few days before snow and sleet hit.

In addition to increased inspections, legislation passed last regular session required power generators to winterize their plants. Additionally, alternate fuel sources are required if natural gas isn't available. While this year's storm wasn't nearly as severe as Winter Storm Uri in 2021, thus far the grid has stood up to increased demand.

The state's largest power generator, Vistra, is spending up to \$80 million to ensure its plants keep generating electricity despite whatever Mother Nature throws at them, The Morning News report-

COVID-19 CASES CONTINUE TO DROP **SHARPLY**

It is beginning to look as if the omicron variant of COVID-19 really has peaked, with new cases in the state during the past week dropping to 109,990, according

the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. That's a decrease of 75% in the past month, while new deaths at 1,398 were essentially

unchanged. The <u>Texas Department</u> State Health Services reported a total of 8,140 COVID-19 hospitalizations, down 23.6% from the previous week. The number of Texans who are fully vaccinated topped 17 million, or 58.6% of the state's population. Just more than 6 million Texans have also received a booster dose, which has proven effective in preventing more serious symptoms from the omicron variant, researchers

"Listenin to the Bells"

The bells ring more or less all the time here.

My husband, Peter, and I are in San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, a city filled with old churches. Every old church has at least a couple of old bells, and all the bells are rung frequently. Since there is so much I do not understand when I travel to another country, I assumed that the bells rang according to some sort of system that everyone else understood and I did not. (This is an assumption I've made about a lot of things over the course of my life, but that's another story.)

As it turns out, none of the English speakers in town have any idea what is going on with the bells.

"I thought it was military time because it rang more than 12 times," someone said. "But then it rang 34 times!"

"There is no rhyme or reason," someone replied. "They don't ring on the hour and they don't ring any number of times that makes sense!"

"Well, they are all rung by people," someone else added. "It's not automated. Maybe they just ring them when they feel like it?"

So now I'm listening to the

I was right in the center of town, near the largest, oldest church, when the bells started. "One... Two... Three... Four." They stopped. I checked the time on my phone. It was exactly 4 o'clock.

"Well!"

Now I'm thinking the bells are just rung to get our attention. Maybe we would pay more attention to them if we knew they were right all the

The roosters in town operate on a similar principle. Every town in Mexico I have ever spent a night in has had multiple roosters alerting me to the first hint of sunrise. But at our temporary home here, we have one who has decided to up his game. He lets us know that it is 4 o'clock in the morning and that sunrise is only a couple hours off. in case we were interested.

None of the other roosters are following his lead. I suspect the other roosters think this guy is a showoff, crowing his head off in the dark. But he keeps it up. It gets our attention, and I guess that is the point. He's letting us know that he is keeping track of the time. It's not morning yet, but morning is on the

We have lots of ways to keep track of time and, honestly, I'm not sure why it is so important that the bells ring at any particular time. Peter and I are not meeting anyone at a given time. We have no appointments to keep. This idea that we need to keep track of time is a little odd, given the circumstances.


And yet, nearly every day, Peter or I will say, "Can you believe it's 2 o'clock already?" as if 2 o'clock had some special significance. As if we had something special we had to prepare for at 3 o'clock.

I am rather pessimistic that I will ever solve the mystery of the bells. I think they will keep ringing when I least expect, at odd intervals, for an indeterminate amount of time. But every time they ring, I will be reminded of the time—even if it's not the actual time. Even if I have nowhere to go.

They'll remind me that time is passing and will pass. They remind me that sometimes the very best thing I can do with my limited time is to stop whatever I'm doing and listen to the bells.

The district leadership team is committed to doing all we can to increase the safety and health of our students, staff, and families while implementing measures to mitigate the spread of COVID-19 in our community. We want all our students healthy, learning, and thriving in our classrooms. I ask for your continued support as we prioritize safety without sacrificing learning.

- Face Masks: As we have done throughout the pandemic, we continue implementing COVID mitigation protocols. While we had hoped to lift the mask requirement after the midwinter break, we decided to maintain the mask requirement until further notice with rising numbers of COVID-19 cases in the Houston area. The district requires students, staff, and visitors to wear face masks at all district facilities schools, buildings, facilities, school buses and events.
- **Symptoms:** We strongly encourage you to please keep your child home if they have COVID or any other communicable disease (.e.g., flu, whooping cough, measles, chickenpox) symptoms. Have your child tested if you suspect it is COVID-19. Here is a link to our Health Alerts web page regarding keeping your student/child home.
- Reduce Spread of Any Communicable Disease: Please continue to protect yourself and others by taking precautionary measures to prevent infection of all viruses, including COVID-19: wash your hands often, cover your coughs and sneezes and keep a safe distance from others.
- **Protocols:** Our district administrative leadership team remains in constant communication.

Based on CDC recommendations, we updated our protocols and guidelines. Our COVID reporting procedures have not changed. We will continue to monitor local and school cases to further adjust health and safety protocols as appropriate.

- **District Dashboard:** Families can always check the COVID-19 dashboard for an overview of the active cases by school.
- Testing Sites: Please get tested if you exhibit symptoms, have been exposed to someone with the virus, have been with groups of people, or travel. Click here for a list of testing sites and to register online. Additionally, each campus has a testing opportunity weekly or biweekly. A parent/guardian must consent for testing.
- Vaccinations: The district continues to work with local officials, including Harris County Public Health (HCPH), to communicate the availability of the COVID-19 vaccine. The COVID-19 vaccine is available to individuals five and older. On January 3, 2022, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) expanded the emergency use authorization for Pfizer's COVID-19 booster vaccine in adolescents from 12 to 15 years. Booster doses are now available to everyone over the age of 12. The FDA also shortened the time to receive the booster after completing the two-dose schedule. It went from six months to five months. The FDA also authorized the third dose as part of the primary series for certain immunosuppressed children between 5 and 11. The CDC announced on January 10 that at-risk Americans (immunocompromised) are eligible for the fourth COVID dose.


