Community leaders meet on Public Safety issues

The East Aldine community held a district-wide public forum last Thursday evening, March 24 to discuss their concerns about crime rates and efforts to reduce crime incidents by public officials.

Present at the meeting were about 75 persons, including the public, law enforcement officers, and government leaders.

"Too much crime, and not enough police response" is the statement heard over and over at this meeting and throughout the county.

The purpose of the

meeting was to share information among the parties about crime incidents, and ongoing and new efforts by law enforcement to deal with and reduce the problem.

After listening to each of the public participants give detailed descriptions of the crime problems in their areas, officials responded with details of new efforts to reduce crime.

EAD director Richard Cantu told the group that the District has just voted more money for additional patrols. There will be a

Concrete plant proposal raises concerns in Aldine

Planned concrete plant sparks concern before April 7 public meeting

EAST ALDINE – Raising concerns among many residents, a company based in La Porte proposes to build and operate a concrete-making plant near Little York Road at the Eastex Freeway, next to a county park and a residential subdivision, in the East Aldine Management District.

Residents, community representatives and the Air Alliance of Houston group worry that the plant would endanger the health

of people in the area, reduce property values and create related problems.

The proposed plant is located next to the Tasfield neighborhood and near the recently upgraded and re-equipped James Driver Park.

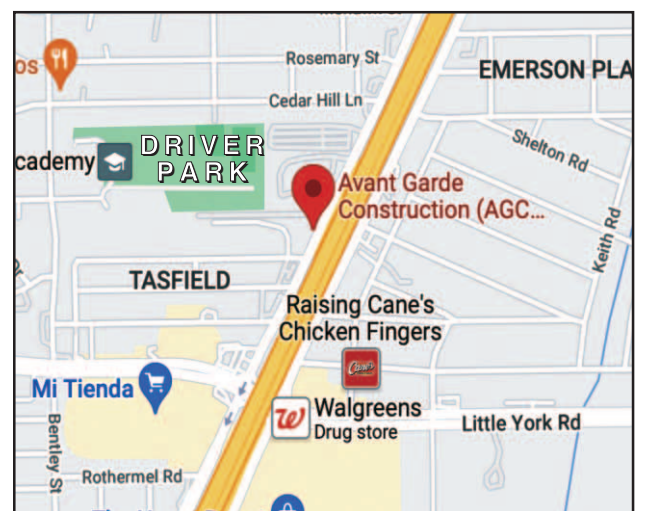
The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) will conduct a public meeting about the proposal at 7 p.m. Thursday, April 7, at the East Aldine Town Center, 2909 East Amphitheatre Drive at Aldine Mail Route Road.

The TCEQ leaves no doubt that the plant would emit particles of cement,

road dust, and other substances. But that doesn't mean the state is convinced the operation could damage the health of nearby residents and park users.

In fact, the agency's executive director has ruled on a preliminary basis that the plant's permit application "meets all of the requirements of a standard permit authorized by (state regulations) which would establish the conditions under which the plant must operate."

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WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

Sylvia Mendez awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom

Women's History Month / One of a weekly series

March 29, 2022 Women's History Month - Sylvia Mendez at age eight, played an instrumental role in the Mendez v. Westminster case, the landmark desegregation case of 1946. The case successfully ended de jure segregation in California and paved the way for integration and the American civil rights movement. Later in life for her continued activism for civil and equal rights she was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the United States' highest civilian honor, on February 15, 2011 by President Obama. Upon receiving the medal Sylvia Mendez smiled through tears when President Barack Obama draped the Medal of Freedom around her neck, overcome as she remembered the desegregation fight her parents waged on her behalf.

"I never could have

imagined as a child battling segregation that I would end up one day meeting the president and receiving such a tremendous honor," said Mendez, 74, of Fullerton, CA. "My parents just wanted what was best for their children. So I have made it my life's work to spread their message."

In 1947 Mendez's parents challenged the practice of school segregation in California. The Mendez couple, joined by the families of Ramirez, Palomino, Estrada and Guzman, filed a lawsuit against the Westminster, Garden Grove, Santa Ana and El Modena (in Orange) school districts on behalf of 5,000 children who had been excluded from attending white-only schools.

The Mendez v. Westminster case made California the first state in the nation to end school segregation, paving the way for Brown v. Board of Education. Attorney Thurgood Marshall's amicus brief filed for Mendez on behalf of the NAACP contained the arguments he would later use in the famous Brown case.

Mendez grew up during

a time when most southern and southwestern schools were segregated. In the case of California, Hispanics were not allowed to attend schools that were designated for "Whites" only and were sent to the

so-called "Mexican schools." The school principal when denying Sylvia to attend said, "Her skin is too dark for her to attend here." And told her parents she'd have to attend Hoover Elementary that was a two-room wooden shack in the middle of the city's Mexican neighborhood, along with the other Hispanics.

When Sylvia Mendez was denied enrollment to a "WHITES ONLY" school, that event prompted her parents to take action and together organized various sectors of the Hispanic community who filed a lawsuit in the local feder-

al court. The success of their action, of which Sylvia was the principal catalyst, would eventually bring to an end the era of segregated education.

On May 23, 2018, the school Sylvia was denied to attend the board of Berkeley Unified School District voted unanimously to rename Le Conte Elementary School, Sylvia Mendez Elementary School. The school is a Spanish-English two-way immersion school. Mendez has been a spokesperson at Berkeley schools and her story has been inspirational to Berkeley students, teachers, and parents.

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GFCC Booth had 2 petitions to sign

On Saturday, March 19, members and volunteers of Green Forest Civic Club (GFCC) participated in Bonding Against Adversity's "#Covid 19 Zumba Event at the Park" at James Driver Inclusive Park on Bentley. The civic club was pushing signatures on two important petitions concerning major issues in East Aldine.

One petition was to PROTEST the proposed construction of another CONCRETE BATCH PLANT (CBP) in East Aldine (EA). Marina Flores Sugg, Vice President of GFCC, said that Avant Garde Construction Co.'s plans were to build the CBP on Eastex Fwy near Little York, next door to James Driver Inclusive Park, the Tasfield Subdivision, and a couple of blocks away from Scarborough Elementary and RYSS North East STEM Academy. Marina added that GFCC members were concerned because there were already eight (8) other concrete plants in EA. She said she confirmed the harm concrete dust does to people by conducting a simple search on the

internet. Marina also said that she, civic club president, Ruben A. Salazar, and all of the GFCC members, were strongly encouraging EA residents to protest the construction of this new plant by registering their eComment with the TCEQ at <https://www14.tceq.texas.gov/epic/eComment/>, Permit No. 167453. She said that residents could also register their comment at an in-person PUBLIC HEARING hosted by State Representative Armando Walle. She said the hearing was scheduled for Thursday, April 7, 2022, at 7:00 p.m. at East Aldine Management District located at 2909 E. Aldine Amphitheater Dr., in the East Aldine Town Center.

Marina then said that the other petition they were pushing at the Zumba event was for the EXPANSION of ALDINE-WESTFIELD RD. (AWR), the section that ran through East Aldine. She said that AWR belonged to the City of Houston, NOT Harris County, and that it was the CoH's responsibility to work on this road. She added that most of AWR was in pretty good condition, except the section that ran through East Aldine from

Little York to Beltway 8. She said that GFCC members agreed that expansion and repair of AWR was long overdue!

Marina also said that another project of GFCC was called "Light Up East Aldine." Through this project, GFCC was advocating for streetlights for all of East Aldine. She said GFCC was continuously gathering information from the EA community through social media and providing it to Harris County Pct. 2 and the East Aldine Management District. She said that, so far, GFCC had been involved in bringing streetlights to the neighborhoods of Oakwilde (East), High Meadows (South), Fairgreen, and Eastex Freeway Forest (South).

Aldine ISD Announces Expansion of ADSY to 2 Additional Elementary Schools

Additional Days School Year offers many benefits instrumental in students' growth.

Aldine ISD has decided to expand the Additional Days School Year (ADSY) program to Harris and Smith elementary schools in the 2022-2023 school year. After its successful pilot launch of ADSY at Vines Primary and Ermel Elementary schools in the 2021-2022 school year, the district moved to expand. The state-funded ADSY initiative added 30 days throughout the regular school calendar. It was created by the community, for the community, through feedback collection. All ADSY school students and staff will begin the new school year on July 18, 2022, and the school year will conclude on June 16, 2023. Students will attend school for 210 days during the 2022-2023 school year. Staff will attend eight days of professional development for 216 days.

"Based on the amazing year both Ermel and Vines had upon implementing ADSY at their respective campuses, we are looking forward to implementing the initiative here at Smith," Smith Principal Ida Carter said. "We are thrilled to bring the opportunity of carrying the momentum of each school year through to the next for our students while also applying innovative learning practices that

will equip our students with the tools they need to be successful in life."

With the expansion of ADSY, Aldine continues its commitment to providing choices and opportunities to students and families. ADSY offers several benefits for students, staff, and families, including:

- Increased achievement and growth opportunities for Hispanic and African American learners

- More recess and brain breaks during the school day for students, with more class time directed at their individual needs and working on projects with peers.

- Additional time for staff to collaborate (including small-group time), plan for students' needs and participate in professional development.

- More time for families to hear about their child's progress, see what their students are learning and creating, and connect with their respective campuses.

"I am thrilled that Aldine has chosen to keep this initiative in place and expand it to additional schools," Ermel Principal Erik Torres said. "The additional instructional time, project-based learning, and whole child approach we implemented between last school year and this year has been instrumental in our students' growth."

Aldine ISD Names Newest All-Boys Choice School

Impact Leadership Academy at Wilson will be the name of Aldine ISD's newest Choice School. The academy will focus on developing young males of color, slated to open during the 2022-2023 school year.

An extension of the district's five-year strategic plan, A New Way Forward, the academy is geared toward students in grades first through eighth students. The academy's goal is to provide a culture in which students will thrive and opportunities and resources for boys to explore deeper learning, prepare them for high school and college, and ultimately close the achievement gap. The school is part of a collaborative partnership with Prairie View A&M University and will also allow students to learn more about community engagement, social justice, and advocacy work.

"Impact Leadership Academy was born out of our dedication to student achievement," said Superintendent Dr. LaTonya M. Goffney. "Impact Leadership Academy builds on Aldine ISD's strategic plan to give all district students access to high-quality schools and educational experiences that prepare them for school, college, career, and life," said Superintendent Dr. LaTonya M. Goffney.

Impact Leadership Academy at Wilson will open next fall with boys in grades 1, 2, and 6. The campus will eventually serve boys in grades 1-8. The school will enroll 125 students for each grade level. Once the campus reaches capacity, additional students may be enrolled utilizing a lottery system.

The selection of a current Aldine ISD campus was determined to be the best use

of district resources. The district selected Wilson Elementary School as it utilized less than 30% of its building capacity with several nearby campuses that are not at their total capacity and can accept additional students.

The district will rezone students currently enrolled at Wilson Elementary School to neighboring campuses, Carter Academy and Carmichael Elementary School. Current Wilson ES school students in grades 1 and 5 will have priority.

Jonathan Kegler, who currently serves as Assistant Principal of Jones Middle School, looks forward to serving as Principal of Impact Preparatory and is excited to welcome students, staff, and parents in the fall.

"I sincerely believe in a school environment that is collaborative in nature and draws on the strengths of all stakeholders in striving for improving student outcomes," said Kegler. "Working together makes a difference in the lives of our students, and I look forward to working with all the wonderful students, parents, staff, and members of the community to make this year a success."

Cornyn Travels to Poland, Germany

The group of 10 senators visited U.S. troops and met with military leaders, Ukrainian civil society, refugees and NGOs, and U.S. State Department personnel.

WASHINGTON – U.S. Senator John Cornyn (R-TX) returned from a congressional delegation (CODEL) to Poland and Germany this weekend. The delegation included Senators Joni Ernst (R-IA), Kirsten Gillibrand (D-NY), Susan Collins (R-ME), Jerry Moran (R-KS), Angus King (I-ME), Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV), Steve Daines (R-MT), Jacky Rosen (D-NV), and Roger Marshall (R-KS).

“Poland, Germany, and really all of our NATO allies in Europe have been heroic in their response. It was heartwarming to see how they have opened their hearts, doors, and homes to the women and children, the elderly and infirm trying to make their way out of Ukraine for safety,” said Sen. Cornyn. “Ukrainians are showing great courage, but one thing we heard is that they need more humanitarian relief and weapons to defend themselves and their country. We ought to provide the Ukrainians what we know they need, and that was a subject of intense questioning and discussion during our visit.”

Yesterday, Sen. Cornyn joined Fox News’ America’s Newsroom to discuss the trip and future support for Ukraine.

Background:

The bipartisan delegation engaged with military leaders from United States Army Europe-Africa (USAREUR-AF) in Wiesbaden, Germany about the United States’ and NATO alliances’ commitment to freedom over tyranny. Sen. Cornyn had the opportunity to thank Texans serving overseas in Germany.

From there, the delegation met with U.S. officials in Berlin at the U.S. Embassy to get an up-to-date brief on American-German long-term economic and security cooperation goals

In Berlin, the group of bipartisan senators discussed our continued security partnership with German State Secretary of the Federal Foreign Office Andreas Michaelis. The members met with German Parliamentarians over dinner in Berlin.

The next day, the senators had a security briefing with U.S. Army leadership in Poland and learned more about their effort to assist and deter Russia from further aggression. The military leaders then led a roundtable discussion with the senators, NATO allied military leaders, and non-government organizations (NGOs) helping with the humanitarian needs in Ukraine and throughout Europe.

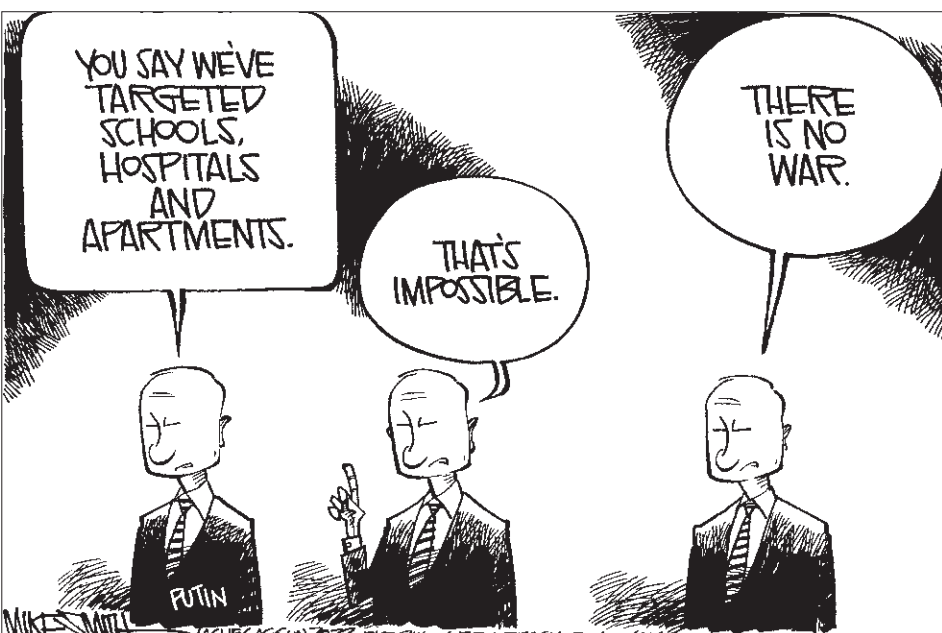
The bipartisan delegation visited a refugee processing center near the Ukrainian-Polish border where they saw firsthand how organizations are working with the Polish military and government to care for Ukrainians who’ve fled their homes.

The final stop in Poland was a discussion with members of Ukrainian civil society. This included a group of passionate women who provided a clear message to the senators: Ukraine needs more military and lethal aid to win this fight. Sen. Cornyn discussed his Ukraine Democracy Defense Lend-Lease Act during this meeting as an additional effort to support Ukraine with military equipment. Included in the meeting were State Department officials originally stationed at Embassy Kyiv.

On the last day of the CODEL, the 10 senators visited a U.S. Army base in Grafenwohr, Germany. They received a firsthand briefing of the military mission, met with constituents from each of the states represented on the CODEL, and saw the might of the U.S. Army in action.

The bipartisan CODEL returned to the United States late on Sunday, March 20.

Senator John Cornyn, a Republican from Texas, is a member of the Senate Finance, Intelligence, and Judiciary Committees.

A Dog Knows

“What a sweet dog!” I said, in Spanish.

“She is a sweet dog,” the man walking her answered, in English. He had an Irish accent and was walking the young dog down the street as my husband, Peter, and I made our way home from dinner.

“And she has no idea what will happen tomorrow,” he added.

“What will happen tomorrow?” I asked.

“She will get on a plane and fly to California!” he said.

“Really?”
“Really,” He sounded a little sad.

“Are you going with her?” I asked.

“No,” he said, “I am not. I’ve just been taking care of her until she is ready for her forever home.”

“Oh my gosh! She will miss you,” I told him.

“I will miss her!” he answered. Then he added, “Maybe she will miss me, too—for a little while.”

I had heard about this. Peter and I are staying in San Miguel de Allende, Mexico, and they have several dog rescue operations. Street dogs are picked up and fostered until they have all their vaccinations and deworming done. Then they either find homes here in town, or are flown or driven off to the U.S. to be adopted.

I looked at the little brown dog with floppy ears and a concerned look on her face. If she was concerned now, I wondered how she was going to feel when she was put into an airplane full of dogs headed to California.

But it was good she would have a home. One of the many things I like about this town in Mexico is that every dog seems to have a home—or will soon find one.

There is the miniature poodle mix who was a stray three years ago and now has a string of sparkly plastic pearls and a perfect coil as she walks down the street with her owner. There is a black Lab whose owner sells lunches to the folks catching the bus. Keeping his owner company all day while she sells burritos is exhausting work. By afternoon, the Lab has his chin resting on the step, watching the pedestrians go by, too tired to move anything but his eyes.

“You are a such tired dog!” I tell him when I pass. “Pobrecito! Poor baby!” The dog agrees. His owner laughs.

I see all these dogs—some happily in their homes, some seeking new ones—and I know I’m no different from them. A dog needs relatively simple things to be happy, and so do I. The only difference between us is that a dog knows what it needs, whereas I often make the mistake of thinking the things I need to be happy are complicated.

I need satisfying work and healthy food. I need to take my walk every day and I need a safe home. I need to know I am cared for and, sometimes, I need to play.

I’m thinking of that dog on her way to California. I’m wishing the best for her. She’s headed to a new life and a new world filled with experiences she’s never had and luxuries she’s never dreamed of. The people who will adopt her will never know where she came from or what she had to go through before her big plane ride. She’ll probably get a nice bed and good food, and she’ll go on vacations and maybe, in time, even get a little fat. I’m happy for her.

But I’m even happier for the people who will be her new family. I think she’ll have a lot to teach them.

Wildfire risk remains high in much of state

Much of the state remains at considerable risk for wildfires through this week, largely because of higher-than-usual temperatures and drought conditions. More than 40% of the state is suffering extreme drought conditions, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor. Nearly the entire state is in some form of drought, with much of the Panhandle, High Plains and west central Texas most at risk.

Nearly 123,000 acres in Texas have burned in March alone, according to Texas A&M Forest Service. Earlier this month, more than 54,000 acres burned in Eastland County, between Fort Worth and Abilene. A sheriff’s deputy died while trying to rescue others from that blaze.

A fast-moving fire forced Medina County residents near Medina Lake to evacuate on Saturday, according to the San Antonio Express-News. That blaze reportedly started with a vehicle fire and quickly covered nearly 1,000 acres.

Climate change is playing a role in this hot and dry spring, John Nielsen-Gammon, the state climatologist, told the Texas Tribune.

“There are enhanced chances of warmer-than-normal weather for literally the foreseeable future because of the combination of La Niña and climate change,” Nielsen-Gammon said.

La Niña is a weather pattern that occurs in the Pacific Ocean. It typically brings colder, wetter weather to the Northwest and drier, hotter conditions in Texas and the South.

INSURANCE TIPS AFTER SPRING STORMS

It’s spring storm season. More than two dozen tornadoes swept through Central and East Texas early last week, damaging about 1,000 homes from Round Rock, north of Austin, to Gilmer in Northeast Texas. The Texas Department of Insurance is available to provide contact information for insurance companies to homeowners and businesses and can also



help with questions about how to file a claim. Its Help Line —800-252-3439 — is staffed from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

TDI advises folks to report property damage as soon as possible to their insurance agent or company. Other tips:

- Take pictures and video of the damage. Don’t throw away anything until the insurance adjuster tells you.
- Make temporary repairs, such as covering broken windows and removing standing water.
- Don’t make permanent repairs before the adjuster sees the damage.

TPW AWARDS \$12.5 MILLION IN PARK GRANTS

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission last week awarded more than \$12.5 million in grants to enhance and expand outdoor recreational spaces at 26 community parks statewide. The money is provided on a 50/50 match and is used to create more nature trails, native gardens, playgrounds, dog parks and athletic fields.

Money was awarded in three categories: cities with more than 500,000 population, cities with less than 500,000 population and towns of less than 20,000 population. A complete list of grant recipients can be found at tpwd.texas.gov/newsmedia/releases.

ARLINGTON DOCTOR GETS PRISON TIME FOR FRAUD, DRUG CRIMES

A federal judge sentenced an Arlington doctor to 12 years in prison after he pleaded guilty to sub-

mitting fraudulent bills for physical therapy and office exams and illegally issuing prescriptions for controlled substances. Dr. Clinton Battle pleaded guilty last July to the charges after an investigation conducted by the Texas Division of Workers’ Compensation’s Fraud Unit and federal investigators.

“Health care fraud impacts everyone in the Texas workers’ compensation system, and thanks to the teamwork between the Texas Division of Workers’ Compensation (DWC) Fraud Unit and federal investigators, we were able to ensure justice was served in this case,” said Debra Knight with DWC.

STUCK IN THE MIDDLE WITH YOU

This tidbit comes from “Game Warden Field Notes,” compiled from TPWD law enforcement reports:

“Val Verde County Game Wardens received information about a fishing boat that ran aground on the Rio Grande River. The area recently accumulated excess silt from the Amistad Dam. Combined with decreasing water levels on the river, the exposed silt became sticky and acted as quicksand. The two boaters were unharmed but unable to vacate the boat without sinking into the mud.

One of the wardens moved to an overlook point and located the boat. The wardens confirmed there was no way to reach them through waterways or on land. A call was placed for a helicopter with hoist capability. A municipal helicopter reached the individuals, and the rescue was completed successfully. The boaters did not require medical attention.”

COVID-19 CASES, DEATHS RISE IN PAST WEEK

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas doubled in the past week compared to the previous week, according to the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University. A total of 37,030 cases and 533 new deaths were reported, both up considerably in what could be a timing issue. New cases, spurred by the omicron variant, have dropped considerably since January.

Reflecting that trend, despite this week’s increase, the number of lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations as of Sunday dropped to 1,245, down 22% from the previous week.

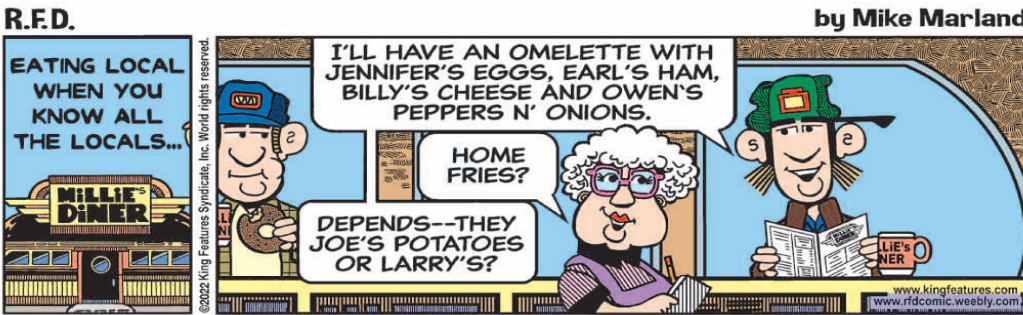

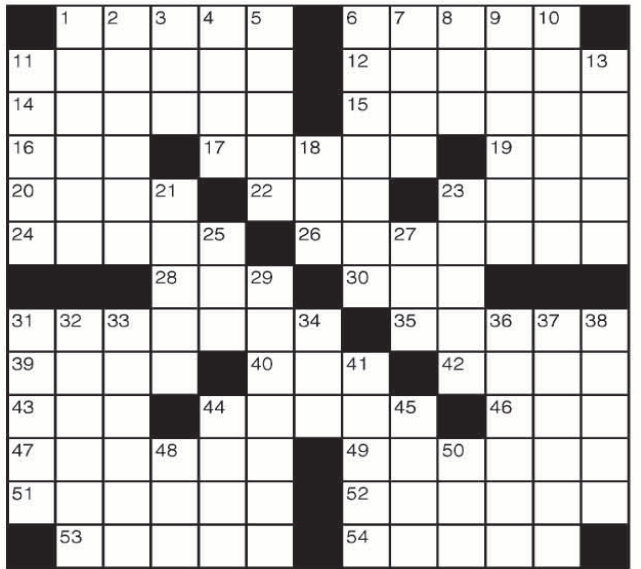

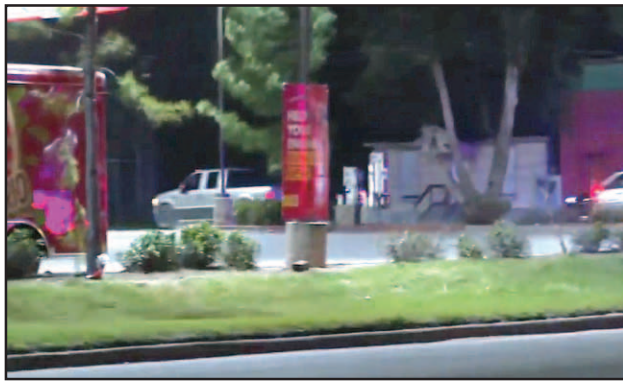
The Major League Baseball/Houston Astros Urban Youth Academy at the Park will hold youth baseball games on three of the park's fields beginning at 12 noon.

North Harris County, March 26—Houston police said they tried several pit maneuvers to stop a pickup truck in a chase they were led on for 30 minutes, but in this case those tricks did not work on the suspected robbers.

The chase started near Little York Road and Shady Lane. It ended at about 1:40 a.m. Saturday at Chrisman and Aldine Mail Route in north Harris County.

Police said the chase started because the truck had been reported stolen out of Conroe and believed to have been used in multiple robberies.

During the chase, video shows officers trying to ram the pickup several

times to get it to stop. That is called a pit maneuver. It did not work.

"They did try several pit maneuvers during the car chase. The truck was very heavy. There was a lot of stuff in the back of the truck, so it wasn't successful," said Lt. R. Willkens.

Officers said the driver ran after stopping but was caught behind a trailer. Three people, including a woman, were taken into custody, according to police.

Police said they are looking into whether the suspects fired shots at someone around I-45 and Little York before the chase started.

No one was reported hurt during the chase.

new night shift unit, consisting of a Lieutenant, Sergeant, and four deputies available to answer calls and patrol the district. Lt. Mike Santos was introduced as the new supervisor of the night shift. He urged citizens to contact him and report problems. The HCSO phone is 713-221-6000 or 911 if life threatening. He can also be reached at michaelsantos@sheriff.hctx.net.

In addition, the district has a staff member, Victor Beserra, who is in charge of public safety matters, and is a former police officer. He regularly interacts between the community and officials on safety matters.

Attendees voiced a litany of crime problems and nuisances, including random gunshots, robberies, vehicle crimes, speeding, drugs in schools and on the streets, gun violence among teens and adults, catalytic converter thefts, homelessness, elderly violence, road rage, porch thefts, noise, extortion, sex trafficking and more.

Lt. Santos explained that successful crime fighting depended very much on cooperation from the community. The old adage "SEE SOMETHING SAY SOMETHING" works, he said. He reminded the public that officers speak Spanish, and he is an Aldine/MacArthur native.

Besides reporting problems, he asked residents to have house numbers visible, and not to leave guns in cars or accessible.

Director Cantu ended the meeting by thanking the large crowd for attending, and noting that "It will take working together" to solve the crime problems.

Concrete plant proposal raises community concerns,

A final decision will come sometime after the meeting, which will include an informal question and answer session and a public comment period, according to the TCEQ.

However, members of the public who wish to make comments for the TCEQ to formally consider should submit them in writing during or before the public meeting. Go online to <https://www14.tceq.texas.gov/epic/eComment/>, fill in the project's pending permit number, 167453, and enter a comment, or send it by mail to the Office of the Chief Clerk, TCEQ, Mail Code MC-105, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087.

The La Porte-based Avant-Garde Concrete Co. started seeking the state's permission to create the plant at 10945 Eastex Freeway in December.

Company owner Meliton Gomez said he has been distressed by opposition to his proposal. By living in La Porte, he said, he has seen that residential neighborhoods can co-exist safely with industrial facilities.

"I am all for regulation," Gomez said. "I have lived in La Porte long enough to see that it can make a real difference."

In fact, Gomez said that he and his son are hoping to buy a home in the East Aldine area to avoid a long commute to their proposed new business.

Gomez said he plans to attend the public meeting.

"We will strive to be good community partners," Gomez said. "Responsible compliance with environmental and safety requirements is paramount to our operations. We will have onsite compliance and re-

porting logs."

"In addition to adhering to numerous state and federal regulations, (the company) will incorporate best management practices to mitigate airborne emissions, noise control and truck traffic," Gomez said.

But Flor Zarzosa, a Tasfield subdivision resident, said she is very unhappy about the proposed plant.

"Having a cement plant will bring in a lot of dust," she said. "We already have problems with people burning trash; we've complained about that."

"Everybody in my community is concerned," Zarzosa said. "Mainly, it's because of the kids who play outside. Our neighborhood isn't the best, but we are fighting to keep it clean and keep it decent."

"And what's going to happen to the value of our homes? It's going to affect us on so many levels," Zarzosa said.

State Rep. Armando Walle requested the public meeting and "has become the flag-bearer" for residents in his district who have raised concerns about the proposed plant, said Richard Cantu, executive director of the East Aldine Management District.

The District plans to file a letter with TCEQ opposing the proposed plant.

The project also has drawn the concerns of state Sen. Carol Alvarado and Harris County Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia. He led the redevelopment of James Driver Park, which was designed specifically to be an "all access park" to accommodate people with physical challenges or disabilities.

Air Alliance of Houston has raised concerns about the proposed plant's poten-

tial to contribute to air pollution in East Aldine. In a Feb. 14 letter to TCEQ, Air Alliance opposed the approval of a permit for Gomez, and the management district plans to send a similar letter.

The area is already home to four concrete plants, Cantu noted.

Because the proposed site is in unincorporated Harris County without municipal trash removal, some East Aldine residents frequently burn trash, which can contribute to air pollution.

"It wouldn't surprise me to find that there is a higher rate of breathing problems, such as asthma, in the community," Cantu said.

In addition to dust and air pollution, Cantu said heavy trucks and equipment used by the concrete plants in the area contribute to damage to roads and other infrastructure.

Gomez, the president of Avante, listed in writing some actions he said the plant will carry out:

A barrier to control dust, noise, and light suppression around the site.

Concrete paving of the high-traffic areas on the site, along plant-bunkered aggregate, to minimize potential dust.

Sloping truck loading and truck washing areas to collect water run-off in basins.

A sprinkler system and wheel truck wash areas to minimize dust and dirt leaving the site.

Minimal plant lighting to prevent creation of a visual nuisance at night.
