
EAST ALDINE - The East Aldine District Arts Committee, with Carlos Silva as chairman, has released new artist's renderings of the proposed memorial statue that will be mounted in the esplanade of JFK Boulevard, at the Arline-Bender intersecdtion.

Silva reported to the East Aldine board recently that the statue, which is a bust of the late president John F. Kennedy, is scheduled for construction and installation later this year. However, the consulting engineers, CobbFendley, reported that the cost for the granite base and the surrounding landscaping and pavement development had exceeded the budget, and they were working on a redesign that would cost less money.

A huge bust statue of the late president John F. Kennedy will soon mark the northern edge of the District, and greet travellers arriving from Intercontinental Airport.

The Art Committee of the East Aldine District has recommended to the board the purchase and installation of a unique statue of JFK, sculpted by famed artist David Adickes. Adickes is known for the towering statue of Texas hero Sam Houston, which sits along the highway I-45 in Huntsville. The board agreed, and last year approved the purchase and the cost of engineering the installation.

The statue would be located in the median between the northbound and southbound lanes of JFK Boulevard, at the intersection with Aldine Bender.

According to Silva, the art committee has a number of projects that would bring public art to East Aldine. These include the Big Walls Big Dreams mural recently painted on the wall at the High Meadows library, Mini Murals on utility boxes, the JFK statue, and the

Early Voting starts April 25; **Election Day May 7**

HARRIS COUNTY -The Municipal and Local primary election will take place on Saturday, May 7 with a low voter turnout expected by authorities. No major candidates are on the ballot, only two amendments and a number of bond issues for local districts, and local candidates.

Early voting will start on Monday, April 25 and continue through May 3. Hours in general are M-S 7am - 7pm, Sun 12pm -7pm. Hours on Election Day are 7am - 7pm.

Polling places for Early Voting in this area are BakerRipley campus, Acres Homes Community Center, and Houston Community College North Forest Campus.

Since the main issues on the ballot have to do with two Constitutional Amendments that may lower your taxes, State Senator Paul Bettencourt has issue the following analysis (edited) to aid all

On Propositions 1 & 2:

The public is to vote on Senator Bettencourt's Constitutional Amendments Prop osition 1 and 2 on May 7, 2022.

Many voters have been finding the ballot language confusing, and I want to clarify what these amendments actually do. Homeowners over the age of 65 will see their freeze values for school taxes actually decline, aka, ISD property tax bills if Proposition 1 passes! Also if passed, Proposition 2 will lower independent school district property tax bills by increasing the homestead exemption that will save money for the 5.67 million homesteads in the State of Texas.

Below are some plain language talking points to answer many of the frequently asked questions.

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
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East Aldine to hold MURAL FEST2022 on **May 21 Mural Contest** pays \$5000

Proposition 1 will benefit individuals with an over 65 or disabled exemption on their homestead.

- If an individual has an over 65/disabled exemption on their home and this proposition passes, they will receive a reduction on school district property taxes.
- HB 3 from the 86th Legislature compressed school maintenance and operation tax rates across the board except for over 65/disabled because their rate was already lower than the new compressed rate for everyone
- This amendment will provide for the same percentage reduction in an individual's school district tax rate that everyone else received in 2019.
- There are 1.8 million over 65 exemptions and 180,000 disabled exemptions, on average these households will see a \$110 reduction the first year and \$125 reduction in the second year; the reduction will continue to grow each year.
- If there is additional school M&O tax rate compression provided by HB 3 in the future, individuals with an over 65/disabled exemption will receive the same percentage tax rate deduction automatically if this amendment passes.
- This amendment will become effective as of January 1, 2023, if it passes.

Proposition 2 will increase the homestead exemption by \$15,000.

- If this amendment passes the state homestead exemption for school district taxable value purposes will increase from \$25,000 to \$40,000.
- On average, the 5.67 million homesteads in Texas will see a \$175 savings in their school district tax bill at the current average statewide school property tax rate.
- This amendment will be effective as of January 1, 2022, if it passes, so homeowners will see the savings when they receive their property tax bill this fall.

· This exemption increase is a permanent and ongoing benefit to homeowners.

If one or both of these amendments passes, no school district will lose any revenue they are entitled to receive from the school funding formulas. State dollars will re place any local dollars that a school district would otherwise lose from the passage of these amendments.

District Educators Receive SHABE Awards, 2 Advance to State Competition, 1 Student Receives a Scholarship

The organization supports individuals who educate students whose native language is not English.

The Suburban Houston Association for Bilingual Education (SHABE) recently held its annual Teacher of the Year Banquet. Several Aldine ISD teachers received honors as outstanding educators.

Margarita Cruz from La Promesa was named the Secondary ESL Teacher of the Year, and César Linares from Black Elementary School was named the Elementary Bilingual Teacher of the Year. Also receiving a top award is Anju Bhalla from Carmichael Elementary School. She received the Elementary ESL Teacher of the Year Award. Cruz and Linares will represent the SHABE district at the Texas Association for Bilingual Education (TABE) annual fall conference in Houston.

SHABE bestowed the honors during its celebration banquet on April 1. More than 150 area teachers were recognized in bilingual education, English as a Second Language, and foreign language education.

Every year, SHABE recognizes Bilingual, ESL elementary, ESL secondary, and teachers of other languages during March and April. Campuses that participate in SHABE either select or nominate teachers. Each Teacher of the Year must then apply. From the submissions, the SHABE Selection Committee selects finalists who are interviewed and asked to submit student products. The Selection Committee selects winners for each

district and the three top winners for SHABE: a Bilingual Teacher of the Year, an ESL Elementary Teacher of the Year, and an ESL Secondary Teacher of the Year.

Bilingual and ESL Secondary
Teachers of the Year may submit
their portfolios to be considered for
the Texas Association for Bilingual
Education (TABE) teacher of the
year. The state winner automatically becomes the TABE nominee for
the National Association for Bilingual Education Teacher of the Year
competition.

In addition, SHABE also awarded a \$500 scholarship to Kevin Fuentes from Davis High School.

A former Aldine ISD teacher, J.C. Harville, created the Suburban Houston Association for Bilingual Education (SHABE) to promote educational opportunities and recognition for bilingual and ESL teachers. For 21 years, SHABE has supported bilingual, ESL, and foreign language educators across the area. SHABE was founded to support teachers, paraprofessionals, and administrators as they educate students whose native language is not English. The Association serves to review and disseminate the state of bilingual education in Texas. Additionally, SHABE members exchange data, studies, ideas, practices, and information with area school districts and educators.

April is a fitting month to celebrate bilingual and ESL educators since it is National Bilingual/Multilingual Learner Advocacy Month.

"A little slow today, Billy," he yelled back. "Isn't it hard to catch fish without water?" Billy



Abbott Halts Border Truck *Inspections*

Gov. Greg Abbott halted the state's aggressive truck inspection at all Texas border crossings after days of bipartisan criticism over the extended delays of goods entering the United States.

According to the San Antonio Express-News and other media outlets, for more than a week Abbott had troopers from the Texas Department of Public Safety stop all commercial trucks passing through Texas ports for safety inspections, leading to waits of up to eight hours. Normally it takes less than 30 minutes for trucks to cross the border.

Abbott announced on Friday the inspections would end after he signed deals with the governors of the four Mexican states that border Texas to provide better security in an attempt to slow illegal immigration into Texas. He was criticized by the Texas Trucking Association and fellow Republicans, including Texas Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller.

"I understand the concern that businesses have about trying to move products across the bridge, but I also know the anger Texans face and have that's caused by Joe Biden not securing the border," Abbott said Friday.

Democrat Beto O'Rourke, who faces the governor in November, slammed Abbott, calling the inspections a "publicity stunt."

"This was completely unnecessary and did absolutely nothing to improve the security and safety of El Paso, of Laredo, of Pharr, or anyone of our border communities of the state of Texas or of the United States of America," O'Rourke said.

Meanwhile, at least five busloads of migrants were sent to Washington, D.C. at Abbott's behest. Those migrants had already been processed and released by the Department of Homeland Security and volunteered to make the trip to the nation's capital.

DROUGHT CONDITIONS COVER MOST OF STATE

A drier and cooler March for much of the state has expanded drought conditions, which now cover 88% of the

state, according to Dr. Mark Wentzel, a hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board. The drought is most severe in the Panhandle, High Plains and South Texas. Few counties have escaped the dry conditions.

The drought is expected to expand and intensify over the next few months, according to the latest seasonal drought outlook from the National Weather Service. Thanks to a Pacific Ocean weather cycle called La Niña drought is predicted for almost the entire state by the end of June, according to Wentzel.

AGENCY WARNS AGAINST FRAUDULENT ONLINE

Consumers are urged to be aware of a fraudulent website claiming to offer online banking services. The website claims to belong to Palm Springs Bank or PalmSpring Bank, according to the Texas Department of Banking. The fake bank's website does not indicate a physical address but does list a post office box in Fort Worth as a mailing address.

"The website is not associated with any known bank. No bank doing business under the name Palm Springs Bank or PalmSpring Bank has been authorized to provide banking services in Texas, nor is any bank by either name supervised by the Department, the FDIC, or the Federal Reserve," the news release said.

First West Nile case of year reported A Dallas County resident

has been diagnosed with West Nile virus —the first reported case of the year, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

West Nile virus is transmitted through bites from infected mosquitoes. About 20% of people who are exposed develop symptoms such as headache, fever, muscle and joint aches. In rare cases, less than 1%, more serious symptoms can occur, including death.

DSHS officials suggest wearing long-sleeved shirts and pants, applying insect repellent and removing standing water and "not give mosquitoes a biting chance."

There were 112 cases of West Nile disease in Texas last year that resulted in 14 deaths.

TEACHER SALARIES UNCHANGED IN PAST DECADE

The average salary of Texas' public-school teachers has not improved in the past decade, according to a new study called "The Lost Decade."

The Houston Chronicle reported on the new study by the nonprofit policy institute Every Texan and the Texas American Federation of Teachers. The study analyzed salary figures reported to the state from 2010 to 2020. It indicated that when adjusted for inflation there has not been a salary increase overall, and average pay for new teachers has slightly decreased.

"With double-digit increases in home and rental prices and general decreases or stagnation in teacher paychecks, the precarity becomes clear quickly, especially for those teaching in large urban districts," the authors wrote. "If you cannot afford a roof over your head, how can you be faulted for looking for an exit from your demanding job?"

CONTINUED SWING IN COVID-19 CASES IN TEXAS

The number of new COV-ID-19 cases in Texas dropped considerably in the past week, with 11,361 reported by the Coronavirus Resource Center at Johns Hopkins University, along with 98 deaths. The number of labconfirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations dropped once again, with 785 reported in the state.

The number of Texans who are fully vaccinated as of Sunday stands at 17.5 million, or 60% of the state's population, with 6.635 million getting a booster dose.

The nice thing about living in our new condo is that we don't have the responsibilities of a stand-alone home. There is no yard to rake, no snow to shovel. There is someone at the front desk who will take in our mail and even water our plants. We were so pleased that we could leave for an extended trip to Mexico without these worries. But then, we got a notice from our electric company that indicated our electric bill was very low. In fact, it was almost nonexistent

"Well, we're not using any electricity!" I said to my husband, Peter, as he read the

"There must be something wrong with the meter." I try not to invite unnecessary worries. Sometimes this leads to problems. This time, it did.

We were gone a total of 10 weeks. We don't know exactly when the power went out to the refrigerator, but our best guess is that is happened shortly after we left.

We arrived home late at night. "Something smells funny," I told Peter.
"I don't smell anything."

I did. There was a very bad smell. That's when Peter opened the fridge. "Oh, NO!"

A giant, noxious wave of smell rolled out of the refrigerator. It was strong enough to make me ill, strong enough to make my eyes water, strong enough to make me run out of the kitchen in a panic.

We had frozen salmon and chicken and shrimp in that freezer. We had bags of corn and squash from the farmers' market, boxes of butter now covered in furry mold, bags of leaking liquid that had exploded from fermentation and poured from the freezer into the refrigerator. Sitting forlornly in the middle of this wasteland were several dozen ginger cookies that Peter had spent hours baking.

Peter closed the refrigera-

I don't think either of us slept much that night. All night, I dreamed I was being chased by a malevolent refrigerator filled with unidentified horrors. Everywhere I went, the refrigerator was waiting for me.

In the morning, my dreams came true.

Peter told the building engineer, Jacob, what had happened, and he gave us a trash barrel on wheels and several heavy-duty trash bags. I put cotton up my nose and a mask over my face, donned gloves, and set to work. We filled the bags, tied them tightly, and Peter brought them downstairs to poor Jacob, who caught a whiff and wheeled the barrel out of the building as fast as he could run.

"He was like a halfback running to the end zone!" Peter said and I got my first good laugh since leaving Mex-

We ran a fan all night. We bought some spray that smelled like lime and sprayed

it everywhere. We kept the windows open. That evening, Peter put some beans in water to soak, and we went to bed—thankfully, at the far end of the apartment. In the morning, Peter got

up and started cooking beans and, when I rounded the corner to the kitchen, finally, I smelled something that wasn't terrible.

"It smells like beans!" I told Peter.

I wasn't even sure I liked the smell of beans cooking. But this morning, they smelled terrific. In fact, I think beans are my new favorite smell.





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
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East Aldine releases JFK Statue renderings

gigantic mural scheduled for the lobby wall of the new East Aldine District office building, that tells the story graphically of the history of the Aldine Area. The public is welcome to visit the lobby of the East Aldine building to see the mural.

Also planned by the art committee is MURAL-FEST22, a day-long event commemorating community art and the repainting of the mural on the side of the High Meadows library.

The EAMD board voted to proceed with engineering work required for the JFK statue. CobbFendley was awarded a contract for \$40,000, and the District plans to purchase the statue for \$25,000. Additional funds would be required for the installation work.

The JFK statue proposal has received wide acclain, bringing high quality art to the district which will enhance our reputation city-wide. Consultant David Hawes commented that in 20 years, the District has spent \$60 million for water and sewer improvements, and public safety, so "it is time to improve the appearance in the District by spending these dollars." The introduction of an art program is consistent with the original intent to enhance the quality of life in the district.

Born 1927 in Huntsville, Texas, David Adickearned his undergraduate degree in physics and mathematics from Sam Houston State College (now University). The summer after graduation, he attended the

Kansas City Art Institute and realized that art was what he really wanted to do. Adickes used his G.I. Bill to study painting in Paris with the modern master, Fernand Leger. He returned to Houston and began painting fulltime.

In 1983, he was commissioned to make his first monumental sculpture, Virtuoso, which now resides at the Lyric Center in downtown Houston. Adickes also created the 76-foot tall figure of Sam Houston that stands on Interstate 45 just south of Huntsville.

He is known for the large statues he sculpts. He sculpted a 67-foot replica of Sam Houston for the city of Huntsville, Texas. In Lead, South Dakota, Adickes created 43 enormousness busts of each American president for display at an educational museum.

His workshop in Houston is open to the public and features many of his most outstanding works. Not intended to be a destination, the workshop/ gallery has turned into a destination, an often surprising site where one can see something out of the ordinary in the middle of an industrial part of Houston, Texas. Giant heads will occasionally sit in the parking lot and huge sculptures of the Beatles and former President Bush can be seen from the street. Occasionally one will find Adickes working in the shop, with his six employees, slowly crafting ever more extravagant work.



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
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
