Aldine ISD to build new \$50m Stadium

Plan to demolish Thorne Stadium; play in Spring for 2 years

ALDINE - Plans are underway for Aldine ISD to replace Thorne Stadium and build a new state-ofthe-art facility that will open in August 2024. Thorne Stadium opened in

This news means that Aldine ISD football teams, bands, drill teams, and cheer squads will call George Stadium in Spring ISD home for the next two years. Spring ISD has partnered with Aldine ISD's varsity football teams to play their home games at George Stadium.

"We know this news could be surprising to some of our students and families who have called Thorne home, but our new facility will be a place we will all be proud of in just a couple of years," said Dre Thompson Aldine ISD's Executive Director of Athletics. "I thank our neigh-

bors for working with us to make this possible. Playing our home games in Spring will be a small challenge for all of us, but we will embrace providing our student-athletes, performing arts students, and this community the experience they deserve. It doesn't matter where we play. It matters how we play!"

Earlier this year, Aldine ISD utilized a third party, Texas Sports & Civil Engineering, to evaluate the stadium. Texas Sports & Civil Engineering recommend two options for the district. One was a repair option, and the other was a replacement option. The district opted for the replacement option, which

will include a state-of-theart facility designed to enhance both the student and community experience and will consist of a new press box, concession stands, restrooms, a new football field, concrete bleachers, and platforms. The new stadium will also have a front entrance on the West Side of the stadi-

At a June 14 meeting, Aldine ISD Trustees approved the use of \$25 million in the fiscal year 2022 and \$25 million in the fiscal year 2023 to cover the cost of replacing Thorne Stadium.

"I am super excited that we will be able to provide this gift of a showplace for our community and our students," said Aldine ISD Superintendent Dr. LaTonya M. Goffney. "Thorne Stadium served this community for 43

Arrests of six Catalytic theft suspects tied to Aldine deputy's death

HOUSTON - A joint task force raided six locations Thursday, and arrested six persons suspected of involvement in a city-wide wave of catalytic convert-

Authorities said that the raids and arrests were based on information developed after the shooting death of Sheriff's deputy Darren Almendarez. Aldine Deputy Almendarez $was \, fatally \, shot \, last \, March$ while attempting to stop thiefs who were stealing the catalytic converter from his pickup truck. Almendarez was on a shopping trip on FM1960 with his wife and another person. Three men have been charged with that theft and murder.

US offers to swap **Griner for Russian**

WASHINGTON, DC -Secretary of State Antony Blinken said Wednesday that the Biden administration has made a "substantial" offer to Russia designed to facilitate the release of WNBA star Brittney Griner and corporate executive Paul Whelan.

Griner is a Houston and Aldine native, having played basketball for Aldine Nimitz high school. She now is an all-star for Phoenix in the WNBA.

After months of internal debate, the Biden administration has offered to exchange Viktor Bout, a convicted Russian arms trafficker serving a 25year US prison sentence, as part of a potential deal to secure the release of two Americans held by Russia, Brittney Griner and Paul Whelan.

The revelation came during a press briefing,

with Blinken laying out his plans to speak with Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov in the coming days.

"We put a substantial proposal on the table weeks ago to facilitate their release," Blinken said, declining to provide further details about the proposal.

Blinken's remarks come as the Biden administration faces growing calls to do more to secure the release of the two Americans who U.S. officials say have been wrongfully detained.

"Our governments have communicated repeatedly and directly on that proposal and I'll use the conversation to follow up personally, and I hope move us toward a resolution," Blinken added. A senior administration official suggested Moscow has not

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METRO HOV Lanes open Weekends for Summer

The Express Lanes that help you avoid traffic on weekdays will soon be open seven days a week as part of a regional pilot mobility program approved by METRO's Board of Directors today. HOV/HOT (Express) Lanes managed by METRO will be open on weekends beginning Saturday, July 2 through Monday, Sept. 5. This includes the Fourth of July and Labor Day holidays. Weekend and holiday operations will follow the same schedule, occupancy requirements and tolls as weekdays

Lanes included in the pilot program run down the middle of Interstate 45, U.S. Highway 59 and U.S.

Highway 290. The lanes run in one direction, but are reversible depending on the time of day. In the mornings, vehicles travel toward downtown Houston. In the afternoons, they travel away from downtown Houston.

Toll requirements depend on the freeway, time of day and total number of people in vour vehicle.

- Laws of the Lanes * Carpools, vanpools and
- motorcyclists ride for free. * Solo drivers have the option of paying a toll to use the lanes
- * Trailer towing is prohibited.
- * No trucks with more than two axles or a gross weight capacity of one ton or greater.

Houston police are investigating the fatal shooting of two males at 10300 Aldine Westfield Road about 10:05 p.m. on Wednesday (July 27).

The identities of the victims are pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences HPD Homicide Division Sergeant K. Meek and Detective C. Lafour reported:

HPD patrol officers responded to a shooting at the intersection of Aldine Westfield and Parker Road and found two unresponsive males lying in the roadway next to a white Honda Accord. Houston Fire Department paramedics responded to the scene and pronounced the males deceased from gunshot wounds.

A preliminary investigation indicated the unknown suspect(s) fled the scene in a black pickup truck of unknown make or model.

2 Alarm fire destroys 24 **Greenspoint Apartments**

Houston Fire Department reports that a 2-Alarm Apartment Fire on July 25, 2022 at 6:20 p.m. at 13011 Northborough Drive resulted in \$1,500,000 in estimated damage with 24 units burned.

Firefighters arrived on scene to find heavy smoke and fire coming from the eaves and third floor roof of a 3-story apartment building. They made an offensive attack and conducted a primary search; however, the fire began to spread through the common attic and crews initiated a defensive attack.

The fire was upgraded to a second alarm and a collapse occurred on the second floor. Once the fire was controlled, firefighters switched back to an offensive attack and finished extinguishment.

Embers spread to a nearby apartment building which suffered from signif-

icant roof, attic, and damage to the top floor.

Approximately 24 units were damaged, and the American Red Cross responded to the scene to assist the occupants. The apartment building management was also on scene to assist. HFD Arson investigators were requested to determine the cause and origin. been made in connection with a large-scale catalytic converter theft ring which has possible ties to the fatal shooting of a Harris County sheriff's depu-

Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Hous-Harris County Sheriff's Office, Houston Police Department and Texas Department of Public Safety were involved in arresting six people Thursday for their alleged roles in the ring theft.

According to a news release from Texas DPS, the six men arrested are suspected of fencing stolen catalytic converters for the three suspects previously charged in connection with the death of HCSO Sheriff's Office Deputy Darren Almendarez. The deputy was killed while off-duty in a shootout with three alleged catalytic converter thieves, according to the Sheriff's Office.

On March 31, Almendarez and his wife were out grocery shopping in the 2900 block of FM 1960

near Aldine Westfield when he encountered three men allegedly stealing a catalytic converter from his truck. Gunfire erupted, and Almendarez was struck. He was rushed to an area hospital where he later died.

The suspects in the shooting who are each charged with capital murder are Joshua Stewart, 23; Fredarius Clark, 19; and Fredrick James Tardy, 17.

The six suspects arrested for fencing stolen catalytic converters are Jose Martinez, 19; Armando Martinez, 18; Isaac Castillo, 21; Terance Elder, 20; and Armando Martinez Sr., 39; all residents of Houston, and Jose Sanchez, a 21-year-old resident of Dayton, Texas. Six federal search war-

rants were also executed at five Houston-area residences and one storage facility as part of the multi-agency criminal investigation into the orgatheft nized group,

according to authorities. "Our community has been increasingly plagued by these types of crimes,' said Harris County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez. "I am thankful for all efforts made to arrest these dangerous individuals. This operation would not have been a success without the strong collaboration of several agencies within our region.

The investigation into the organized theft group has previously resulted in the arrest of one other individual. In this raid seized were more than \$484,000 in bulk currency, one firearm, and narcotics, according to DPS.

DPS reports organized theft groups frequently target catalytic converters for the precious metals that they contain such as palladium, platinum and rhodium. The precious metals are extremely valuable, and a worldwide supply shortage has created an increased demand for them further driving up the value.



Aldine's Creates Pathway for **Community to Advance its Equity Goals to Benefit Students**

It is hard to believe that the start of school for many Aldine ISD students is less than a month away. District and campus leaders are actively working and prepping for the 2022-2023 school year. That includes recruiting and creating opportunities to hire highly-qualified teachers. One means to recruit is partnering with different organizations to ensure licensed educators lead class-

The district has been working on several equity initiatives, including increasing the number of community educators of color working in schools. Earlier this year, Aldine partnered with the University of Houston College of Education to recruit community teachers for a new grow-your-own program. Why? Studies show that students of color reach better outcomes when taught by teachers of color. Students have better academic performance, improved graduation rates, and are more likely to attend college. This work is about fulfilling the district's priorities and goals of its strategic plan — All AISD students must have access to high-quality

schools and learning experiences that

prepare them for their futures.

The university's Community Teacher Equity Development (CTED) program seeks to dismantle inequitable barriers that limit marginalized and minoritized groups' access to teacher education programs. It also allows individuals who may have wanted to be in the classrooms an opportunity to invest in their community.

"Aldine has great diversity, and there's already unity and camaraderie between my cohorts and me. There's a network of people that are like-minded for the improvement of the community," said Lewis Echols, an associate teacher at Houston Academy. He enrolled in the CTED program this spring.

Aldine ISD is currently offering a first-year teacher salary of \$61,000. The starting salary for associate teacher hires is \$61,000 (a bachelor's degree requirement) with the possibility of receiving a \$3,000 associate teacher stipend (statement of eligibility requirement). There is also a \$1,000 sign-on bonus for all new teaching positions. The district also has a fast-track teaching initiative.

All Harris County Kids Deserve Quality Childcare

I have long been an advocate and a champion for programs that enrich the lives and secure a brighter future for Harris County children. Since taking office, my staff and I have been expanding the possibilities of what Harris County can achieve to help families. We spoke to parents and early childhood providers and experts and held community conversations in person and virtually, during which access to affordable, quality childcare was brought up again and again. We found that approximately 105,000 children with working parents under the age of three in Harris County live in a "quality child care desert," in which there are few or no affordable options for quality child care. This, despite the numerous studies that show high-quality child care is linked to higher rates of educational attainment and adult employment, and lower drug use and criminal outcomes. To improve the quality of life for Harris County residents, investing in quality childcare for young children was simply something the data obliged us to try.

In June, Harris County Commissioners Court made history by approving a new program investing \$48 million American Rescue Plan (ARPA) funds for childcare and early childhood development in Harris County. It is the largest known investment of ARPA dollars by any county or city in the nation for early childhood education. The program will increase accessibility to high quality childcare and early childhood development by 10% in Harris County and create up to 1,000 child care slots for children ages zero to three, with an emphasis on communities where there are few to no such options. It will help families afford child care, which is the second most expensive household item on average after housing in the family budget. The program will also help childcare centers recover and stabilize financially after the pandemic, support ongoing capacity-building for childcare providers, give a boost to workers by requiring participating childcare centers to pay staff \$15 an hour, and help mothers with newfound childcare return to work.

This historic program is not our first effort to assist families and children. Harris County invested nearly \$9 million in an Early Childhood Impact Fund, which is supporting home-based child care businesses, infant/toddler literacy, and resources for foster children. The county has also established the \$4.7 million COVID-19 Childcare Assistance Program to provide families with learning and childcare opportunities during the pandemic. The County created a Child Tax Credit engagement program that brought in over \$13 million in tax credits for Harris County families, and we also implemented best-in-class familyfriendly workplace policies for County workers, including 12 weeks paid parental leave, additional sick leave and resources for finding child care. And I am proud to say that in July, Commissioners Court approved a \$7.7 million Maternal and Child Home Visitation Health Care Initiative for 300 of the most vulnerable mothers in Harris County (read more about this below).

All levels of government must be willing to assist in nurturing every child that is born. I am proud that Harris County has set a precedent for what local governments can do to support all of their residents and help them make a better future.

Walking Billboards Promote pedestrians Safety

If you happen to visit a high-traffic area in one of the state's larger cities, you might come across some folks wearing sandwich boards, such as one sees during tax season or mattress sales. The Texas Department Transportation has adopted this marketing device to promote its "Be Safe. Drive Smart" pedestrian safety campaign this

Pedestrians account for one in five traffic fatalities in the state. Last year, 5,366 traffic crashes involving pedestrians occurred, with 841 people killed. TxDOT is using the highly visible sandwich boards to remind both drivers and pedestrians to follow the rules of the road and watch out for each other. The boards are being worn by members of TxDOT's street teams.

"Only 1% of traffic crashes in Texas involve pedestrians, yet pedestrians account for 19% of all roadway deaths," said Tx-DOT Executive Director Marc Williams. "That's because pedestrians lack the protective equipment—airbags, seat belts and bumpers—common to vehicles. To keep our most vulnerable road users safe, we urge motorists to always be on the lookout for people walking. Pedestrians also have the responsibility to be aware of their surroundings and follow the rules of the road."

JULY 31 DEADLINE FOR **NEWBORN ENROLLMENT IN TTPF**

The deadline to open a Texas Tuition Promise Fund college savings account for a child younger than 1 year old is July 31, according to state comptroller's office. Participants can lock in 2021-2022 tuition and fee prices for their loved little ones at Texas public colleges and universities by establishing an account by then.

The comptroller's report states: "According to the 2020 edition of Sallie Mae's Higher Ambitions: How America Plans for Post-secondary Education, planners save two



times more for college than non-planners. Planners are also more likely to start investing for college when their child is young, which is associated with less expected student loan debt.

Contributions to what are known as 529 plans, such as TTPF, are partially exempt from the federal gift tax. Up to \$16,000 annually (\$32,000 for married couples) can be given without triggering the gift tax.

WILDFIRE RISK REMAINS HIGH ACROSS STATE

As the nearly statewide drought shows no signs of abating, wildfire danger continues to spread across the state. The Chalk Mountain Fire in Somervell County and the 1148 Fire in Palo Pinto County caused local officials to urge residents to evacuate. Several lakefront homes were destroyed around Possum Kingdom Lake last week as a result of the 1148 Fire, which involved 457 acres and was about 50% contained as of Sunday, according to the Texas A&M Forest Service.

There were 16 active wildfires across the state, the largest being the Chalk Mountain Fire involving 6,705 acres. It was 10% contained as of Sunday. A total of 215 counties in Texas now have burn bans in place.

TREE-KILLING BEETLE SPREADS TO MORE **COUNTIES**

The invasive emerald ash bore has been confirmed in two additional counties this month, according to the forest service. The invasive wood-boring pest is now confirmed in 11 Texas counties, with the addition of Morris and Rusk counties. It has killed millions of trees across 35 states since its arrival in the United States 20 years ago.

"The pest is a major threat to urban, suburban and rural forests as it aggressively kills ash trees within two to three years after infestation," said Demian Gomez, with the forest service.

Counties where the emerald ash bore has been detected have their ash timber and lumber quarantined to prevent the spread of the pest. The beetle was first detected in Texas in 2016 in Harrison County. Since then, EAB has been confirmed in Bowie, Cass, Dallas, Denton, Marion, Morris, Rusk, Wise, Parker and Tarrant counties.

STATE AGAIN SHOWS LARGE JOB GAIN

Texas added 82,500 nonfarm jobs in June, the largest gain this year. The state again set new employment highs, as total nonfarm employment reached. 13.43 million, according to the Texas Workforce Commission.

'This type of sustained economic success is only possible when employers and job seekers have maximum opportunities to reach their full potential, and TWC works hard to support those opportunities," Bryan Daniel, TWC chairman, said.

Jobs in the oil and gas industry led the increase with 4,900 new jobs, while the construction sector lost 3,000 workers. The state's unemployment rate dropped a tick to 4.1%, down from 4.2% in

NEARLY 90,000 TEXANS HAVE DIED OF COVID-19

Approximately twoand-a-half years after COVID-19 began to sweep the country, nearly 90,000 Texans have died as a result of the disease, according to Texas Department of State Health Services, with more than 6 million cases reported since 2020. The BA.5 variant is now causing most of the infections, with a rolling seven-day average of 11,905 cases reported daily. The number of lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations on Sunday in Texas totaled 3,454, according to DSHS, which is up slightly from the previous week.

I've decided that I'm good enough.

But this year, I found myself making lists of all the ways I liked my life and, surprisingly, all the ways I liked myself—just as I am. In fact, I woke this morning, this morning of the big birthday, and felt that I was good enough.

Of course, I'm not perfect. There isn't a day I don't waste valuable time, or miss an opportunity to be kind, or generally fall short of being the person I could be. But perfection is a terrible goal to set for oneself. I was never meant to be perfect and really, now that I think about it, perfect sounds a bit dull. Instead, I'm going to be grateful that I am good enough.

"Good enough" encompasses everything.

It covers the moments of overwhelming bliss that blindside me; walking down the street and seeing a shop filled with yellow flowers, or a small girl dancing in a dirty green onesie, or a giant furry dog pounding its feet on the ground, or the sun reflecting perfectly on a shiny piece of stone on the sidewalk. It's all the moments I catch—just in time—that cause my heart to swell and make me wonder how so much beauty could be around me so much of the time, and I am lucky enough to see it.

"Good enough" also covers the times when I feel alone and ignored. When friends don't write back and no one seems to notice my writing and I wonder if I might be delusional, typing away every day with no one reading my novel. It covers when I am tired and a little sore and I don't feel like taking my walk or doing my pushups or finishing the cleaning or the paperwork that seems overwhelming at that moment. "Good enough" covers it

And while I have always enjoyed articles about selfreinvention, I discovered with surprise, on this big birthday, that I'm not really interested in reinventing myself, because I like the self I've invented pretty well. Sure, she's got a few issues. But I'm used to her issues and none of them will get her arrested. She's good enough for me.

I realize (with a little disappointment) that this philosophy will probably not allow me to write a self-help blockbuster. "You're Good Enough: Get Over It" probably wouldn't make its way up the NYT bestseller list. And that's OK too. I used to think I had a lot more advice for other people than I have today. Today, I think it's good enough to manage my life as best I can and let others do the same. They are good enough as well.

It will be interesting to approach a new decade with fewer lofty goals and more kindness toward myself. I wanted to finish this column with words worthy of the occasion. I've decided this is good enough.

County to study Youth Gun Violence

2020 marked a grim milestone - gun-related injuries became the number one cause of death for children. By June 1st of this year, 19 children had died as a result of gun violence in Harris County. That is unacceptable. Our recently established Gun Violence Interruption Program and Youth Reinvestment Fund programs are an important start to tackling this issue, but we need a comprehensive picture of who this is impacting, where in the County they are, what the root causes are, and what are the best, smartest, ways to tackle this crime.

Last month, Harris County Judge Lina Hidalgo and Commissioners Court directed the Commissioners Court's Analyst's Office to work with the Justice Administration Department, the Harris County Juvenile Probation Department, and any other government or research entities to evaluate and draft a report on the frequency, location, and causes of youth gun violence in Harris County from 2015 to the present. The report will include the most effective, evidence-based policy solutions to address and prevent youth gun violence and deaths of children due to gun violence and will require County researchers to consult with relevant stakeholders and consider the creation of a youth council or gun violence task force. While this doesn't replace the need for gun reform, it is an essential step in protecting Harris County residents - particularly youth - from gun violence. Harris County will continue to push our state & federal leaders for meaningful and common sense gun laws, we in Harris County will continue to do everything we can to protect our residents and our children from gun

County to reduce Nuisance Properties

Harris County Public Health (HCPH) will begin a sweeping effort to create safer, healthier and more sustainable neighborhoods across the County. Harris County Commissioners Court approved the initiative in July to abate or demolish properties deemed nuisances that pose a risk to public health. Examples of neighborhood nuisances include accumulated rubbish, standing water, conditions that harbor insects and rodents, abandoned swimming pools, high weeds and dilapidated struc-

'We've heard from the community that, too often, abandoned structures can be havens for criminal behavior," said Harris County Judge Hidalgo. "I'm proud to support this initiative, as part of our historic, multifaceted approach to tackle crime and work toward a more vibrant Harris County."

The Court approved HCPH to address 18 nuisance properties as part of a \$3 million American Recovery Plan Act (ARPA) fund to support HCPH's Neighborhood Nuisance Abatement (NNA) Program. The Court's approval of these properties is the first step of a four-year plan to abate 1,100 nuisances in the county through the ARPA funds, which were awarded to the NNA program last February.

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
Aldine se asocia con Bel Furniture para donar camas a nuevo estadio en agosto de una familia de la comunidad





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HCC and **TSU** agreement allows student transfers into Industrial Technology

HOUSTON (July 27, 2022) — Houston Community College (HCC) and Texas Southern University (TSU) have signed a memorandum of understanding that will help graduates from HCC's Drafting and Design program transfer seamlessly into TSU's College of Science, Engineering and Technology to obtain a bachelor's degree in Industrial Technology.

The agreement aims to provide a seamless transfer for students who enroll at TSU following the completion of their two-year degree at HCC.
