COVID-19 **Novavax Vaccine** Now Available at **HCPH Sites**

Harris County Public Health (HCPH) is pleased to announce that there is a new option for people to get their COVID-19 vaccine. On July 13, 2022, the U.S. Food and **Drug Administration** (FDA) authorized the Novavax COVID-19 Vaccine for emergency use. Following approvals of the Centers for Disease **Control and Prevention** (CDC) and Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS), HCPH is now offering the COVID-19 Novavax vaccine to residents. Novavax is a two-dose primary series for individuals 18 years of age and older given 3 weeks apart.

Novavax uses a different technique than other COVID-19 vaccines such as those from Pfizer and Moderna. Instead of using mRNA, which provides the instructions for your body to create the COVID-19 spike protein that in turn induces your body's immune response, Novavax's vaccine injects the small protein itself, that your body detects and that triggers your body's immune response. The Novavax vaccine is based on a well-established method of vaccine development that has been used for years for other vaccines such as the Human-papillomavirus, Hepatitis B, flu, and Shingles vaccines.

At their monthly board meeting last Tuesday evening, the East Aldine District received the resignation of its chairman, Joyce Wiley, and also moved to fill one of the two open positions by appointing Luis Lucio to the board.

Lucio is a life-long member of the Aldine community, and serves as dean of the Lone Star College -East Aldine campus.

LSC-EA's dean is Dr. Luis Alfredo Lucio. Himself a native of Aldine and a graduate of MacArthur High School, Lucio launched his career in education right out of high school, when he worked as a paraprofessional, or classroom assistant, at Aldine's Gus A. Oleson Elementary School. After graduating from Sam Houston State University

with a bachelor of arts in academic studies with concentrations in bilingual education and Spanish, Lucio went on to get his Master's from the same school in

education in educational leadership with a concentration in school administration. (Along the way Lucio also banged out some core credits at Lone Star College - North Harris County.) From there it was on to the University of Houston, where Lucio earned his doctorate in education in educational leadership.

Lucio's professional CV includes stints as a senior recruiter for teacher recruitment and talent acquisition for HISD, a position he filled while simultaneously serving as an adjunct professor of bilingual-dual language education at the University of St. Thomas. Before that, Lucio was principal of Aldine's Inez Carroll Elementary.

On announcing the appointment, Executive Director Richard Cantu welcomed Luis and said the board looked forward to his expertise and knowledge of Aldine.

Joyce Wiley submitted a letter of resignation to the

District renews contracts with HCSO deputies, HC Attorney for public safety

Annual contract for 21 Deputies \$1,629,600

At the East Aldine District board meeting last Tuesday evening, the board heard reports from the public safety director, Victor Beserra, and took action on two contracts related to public safety.

Assistant County Attorney Mike Laster presented information on the contract between the district and the HC Attorney's Office for nuisance abatement work. The East Aldine District shares an attorney with six other districts for costs. The renewal would be at the same rate as last year, a total of \$60.833.33. The board approved the contract, subject to final approval by the Harris County Commissioners.

The other contract considered was for contract deputies who spend 70% of their time inside the district, and the rest in other

areas of the county. The contract covers 21 Harris County Sheriff's deputies, which includes one lieutenant, 3 sergeants, and 17 deputies. The contract amount for one year is \$1,629,600 and was approved by the board.

Beserra gave details on he Public Safety report as follows: Graffiti abatement 49 properties; felony arrests 32, misdemeanor arrests 34; calls for service 2364, traffic stops 377, accident reports 20, incident reports 261; ShotSpotter calls 133; sex offender checks 13; stolen vehicles recovered 11; guns located 7; Storefront reports 23.



Moderna, Novavax, and Pfizer are recommended for primary vaccination and Moderna and Pfizer are recommended for booster doses and must be used for the second booster dose. A person's eligibility for a booster dose(s) depends on age, primary series product, and immunocompetence. Fully vaccinated is considered 2 weeks after the final dose in a primary series. People are considered up to date with COVID-19 vaccines when they receive all doses in the primary series and all boosters recommended, when eligible. HCPH urges residents to get vaccinated against COVID-19 if they have not done so aiready or get a boostei shot for those who qualify.

All COVID-19 vaccines and boosters are safe, effective, and provide strong protection against severe illness, hospitalizations, and death. los Silva expressed the District's appreciation for her long service, and said she will be missed.

The East Aldine Management District board of directors elected community pioneer Joyce Wiley as its chairwoman on July 20, 2021, making her only the third top leader of the District since its creation in 2001. Wiley succeeded Gerald Overturff, who died in 2021. The original board president, and East Aldine District founder was Clyde Bailey.

"I am so honored to have worked with you and be working with you to make progress in this community. It's like a whole new world in East Aldine." Wiley told the board at the time.

Wiley was a life-long resident of Aldine, and an early proponent of the business chamber. Later she worked with those who wanted a new management district, to improve the quality of life in the Aldine area.

Wiley worked for 18 years in community relations and outreach for Lone Star College-North Harris. She recalled working more than a decade ago on the federally funded Aldine Weed and Seed task force aimed at "weeding out" crime and "seeding" strong, healthy families with at-risk youth. She also worked for the Northeast News and North Forest News for 11 years.

FBI reward of \$25,000 in murder of 8yr-old Khamaya Donelson



The FBI is offering a reward of up to \$25,000 for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the individual(s) responsible for the murder of Khamaya Donelson on July 3, 2022.

On July 3, 2022, Donelson's mother picked up her two children, 5-year-old Khamaya Donelson and an 8-year-old son, from a 24-hour day care. At approximately 12:50 a.m., she and her children were in their vehicle stopped at the intersection of Northborough Drive and Rushcreek Drive in Houston, Texas. As a silver Honda Accord drove through the intersection heading west on Rushcreek Drive, the rear

passenger began shooting out of the vehicle in the direction of a food store. A single shot struck the family's vehicle, entering the rear driver's side door, striking the children. They went straight to the emergency room where Khamaya was pronounced deceased.

Impact Leadership Academy Gives its Students a Red Carpet Welcome for Their First Day



On Wednesday, August 17, Aldine ISD's first all-boys school, Impact Leadership Academy at Wilson, opened its doors for the first time to welcome its students on their first day of school. A red carpet greeting was accompanied by business men and leaders of the community to encourage the students as they start the school year. Prairie View A&M was also in attendance, in celebration of the partnership between PVAMU and ILA.

"It's a unique campus," said Principal Jonathan Kegler. "Most all-boys schools start at middle and they go through high school. We're starting when they're young. We're catching them and training them up when they're young."

Starting with the end goal in mind is how Kegler wants to approach the instruction of the students. That is evident by the partnership with Prairie View A&M, in which campus visits are already scheduled for the young students to go and gain exposure of being on a college

campus

ILA currently holds students of first, second, and sixth grade, with grades scheduled to be added each year until they reach their goal of having students from first through eighth grade.

To round out the morning, ILA held two pep rallies for its students, one for the sixth graders and another for the first and second graders. Hidalgo Urges Residents to Remain Vigilant for Monkeypox

The Monkeypox virus is spreading rapidly across the world and many countries are now facing high case rates. The World Health Organization has now deemed Monkeypox a Global Health Emergency. Texas has the sixth highest case count in the United States with 220 cases. As of July 25, Harris County has confirmed 57 cases. Monkeypox can look like a pimple or blister, or a rash and lesion. In some cases, just a few small bumps can be the first indication of an infection – before any symptoms are felt. If you notice any new rashes, pimples, or blisters anywhere on your body, including in your mouth, it is important to get checked out and tested. While certain groups are at higher risk – we know from nationwide cases that men, particularly men who have sex with men (MSM), have been disproportionately impacted so far – anyone can get Monkeypox including children and the elderly. While cases remain low in the region, city and county officials remain vigilant and prepared, and urge residents to take some simple precautions to curb the spread:

Limit intimate and sexual contact with anonymous partners.

If you have new/unknown lesions, assume it is Monkeypox and get tested.

Get the vaccine, if you qualify.

Texas Gas Prices Lowest in Nation

While gas prices nationwide dropped below \$4 per gallon average last week, the state boasts the lowest prices in the country at an average of \$3.49 — 50 cents below the national average, according to AAA Texas."Retail gasoline prices in Texas fell for the eighth consecutive week, said AAA Texas spokesperson Daniel Armbruster. "While gas prices will likely keep dropping in the near term, it is unclear how long the trend will last. Demand for fuel jumped seven percent across the U.S. this week and regional fuel supplies fell by around three percent."Drivers fueling up in College Station are paying the most on average at \$3.72, while those in the Brownsville-Harlingen area have the cheapest fuel at \$3.19, according to a report by KWTX-Waco.

VOTER REGISTRATION DEADLINE IS OCT. 11

Eligible Texas voters must be registered by Oct. 11 in order to cast ballots in the Nov. 8 general election, according to Texas Secretary of State John Scott."Even though we're still two months away from the voter registration deadline, it's never too early to make sure vou're registered, update your registration information if you need to, and prepare yourself to vote in the upcoming election," Scott said.Texas law requires eligible voters to be registered 30 days before Election Day. Since the 30th day before Nov. 8 falls on a Sunday, prospective voters have two extra days to register this year. Voters can visit the state's official voting website — <u>VoteTexas.gov</u>

ALL STATE OIL AND GAS RECORDS NOW ONLINE

Have you been wonderpumpjack in the stripmall parking lot in Longview? (Yes, there is one.) The Texas Railroad Commission has recently completed placing all historic oil and gas production records online. The RRC database covers oil production dating back to 1931 and gas back to 1937. More than 1,300 rolls of microfilm containing about 2.2 million images in the RRC's central records digitized."This is a significant undertaking and a historic moment for the Commission," Matthew Herzon with RRC, said. "Not only does it give the public quick and easy access to the information, but it can also save staff time that's spent researching for public information requests. Requesters can now get historical production information with the click of a mouse if they wish, and our staff can devote time for other tasks."

COVID-19 CASES DIP SLIGHTLY

The number of new COVID-19 cases in Texas in the past week dipped slightly to 72,715 with 194 new deaths reported, according the Coronavirus Resource

Center at Johns Hopkins University. The Texas Department of State Health Services reported 3,174 lab-confirmed COVID-19 hospitalizations on Sunday, a slight drop from the previous week.

The street is quiet and cobblestone, so I don't think Piccolina was in much danger, but I also imagine Marta got tired of running outside to retrieve her.


"You are a naughty little dog!" I informed Piccolina, and Marta agreed.

FOOTBALL SEASON PREVIEW:

Do Texans move closer to respectability in 2022? Texas looks to step up after 5-7 2021 campaign

under center. If Mills proves to Caserio and Smith that he is indeed the man to play QB moving forward, the Texans can concentrate on upgrading other portions of their team in the 2023 draft, where they should have another high pick.

Caserio did have a good draft in 2022, landing LSU cornerback Derek Singletary, Jr. and Texas A&M standout offensive lineman Kenyon Green (6-4, 323 pounds and a product of Attascocita High School) in the first round. They added Alabama linebacker Christian Harris and Baylor safety Jalen Pitre in later rounds. Pitre has already secured a starting safety spot and Singletary should also hold down one of the corner spots. Green has been dealing with a knee injury for much of training camp, but once he's cleared to play, he should improve an offensive line that is one of the worst in the NFL.

The Texans also upgraded at running back by signing Marlon Mack, a former Colt, and drafting Dameon Pierce (16 total TDs his final year at Florida). Both should be a big improvement over last year's running back situation, which was the worst in the league.

Mills still has speedy Brandin Cooks (90 receptions, 1,037 yards, 6 TDs) to throw to, but that's about it as far as big-play wideouts go for the Texans. The Houston brass is hoping secondyear man Nico Collins takes a step up this year.

Defensively, the Texans should be better, but then again, they can't be as bad as they were in 2021, can they?

We shall see.

I think the Texans will be better this year, but will that result in more wins? They do get Jacksonville twice, what could be a bad, bad Chicago and New York Giants teams, and Washington this year. And remember, they did manage to upset the Los Angeles Chargers late in the season, which cost the Chargers a chance of a playoff spot.


I think Caserio made the right move in hiring a veteran with a proven track record in Smith. How that translates into wins remains to be seen.

Texas' other NFL team, the Dallas Cowboys, is coming off a 12-5 season, the NFC East title, and another first-round exit in the playoffs (Dallas fell at home to the 49ers, 23-17, in the Wild Card round).

A number of key players left in the offseason, most notably wide receiver Amari Cooper (68 receptions, 865 yards, 8 TDs). Dallas also lost a dependable wideout in Cedric Wilson, who left for Miami, and defensive end Randy Gregory (6 sacks), who signed with Denver.

Dallas still has Dak Prescott (4,499 yards, 37 TDs), wide receiver CeeDee Lamb (79 recepitons, 1,102 yards, 6 TDs) and tight end Dalton Schultz (78 receptions, 808 yards, 8 TDs). Dallas will need a bounce back year from running back Ezekiel Elliott (1,002 yards, 12 total TDs) and look for backup running back Tony Pollard (719 yards, 2 TDs) to play a bigger role in the Pokes offense this year. Pollard has blazing speed and could be used more in the passing game. This could be a breakout year for Lamb, at least head coach Mike McCarthy and owner Jerry Jones hope it is. He will have to carry the load while Michael Gallup recovers from a knee

Defensively, the Cowboys will be led by second-year linebacker Micah Parson (13



sacks). Defensive coordinator Dan Quinn will have him attacking from all over the place to take advantage of his rare speed and quickness.

The Cowboys should be a playoff team, but they might be looking up at Philadelphia in the NFC East standing. Philly made a huge upgrade on offense by acquiring speedy wide receiver A.J. Brown (63 receptions, 869 yards, 5 TDs) from Tennessee on draft night. He will be paired with another fast Eagle wide out in second-year man DeVonta Smith (64 receptions, 916 yards, 5 TDs). The key to the Eagles will be the improved play of quarterback Jalen Hurts (3,144 yards, 16 TDs/ 784 rushing yards, 10 TDs). If Hurts does a better job of reading defenses, the Eagles could be scary on offense in

While the Cowboys and Eagles battle for the NFC East title, Tampa Bay should take care of business in the NFC South, as long as Tom Brady (5,316 yards, 43 TDs) his 45-year-old body stay healthy.

In the NFC North, Green Bay QB Aaron Rodgers (4,115 yards, 37 TDs/4 interceptions) will see what life will be like without star wide receiver Davante Adams (1,231 yards, 11 TDs) is like now that Adams has moved onto Las Vegas. Look for the Packers to feature running backs Aaron Jones (799 rushing yards, 4 TDs/52 receptions, 391 yards, 6 TDs) and A.J. Dillon (803 rushing yards, 5 TDs/34 receptions, 313 yards, 2 TDs).

The NFC West should be the most competitive division in the conference. It is home to the defending Super Bowl champions, the Los Angeles Rams. The Rams should be solid again this year led by quarterback Matthew Stafford (4,886 yards, 41 TDs), productive wide receiver Cooper Kupp (145 receptions, 1,974 yards, 16 TDs) and one of the best defensive players in the league in defensive tackle Aaron Donald.

The 49ers lost to the Rams in the NFC title game, and should make another run, but they have turned the offense over to secondyear man Trey Lance (603 passing yards, 5 TDs/168 rush yards, 1 TD in two starts). Lance has enough talent around him to ease into the job. Look for dual threat Deebo Samuel (365 rushing yards, 8 TDs/77 receptions, 1,405 yards, 6 TDs), running back Elijah Mitchell (603 yards, 5 TDs) and tight end George Kittle (71 receptions, 910 yards, 6 TDs) to provide plenty of support to Lance.

Arizona will go as far as quarterback Kyler Murray (3,971 yards, 26 TDs/819 rushing yards, 11 TDs) takes them. Murray won't have star wide receiver DeAndre Hopkins (115 receptions, 1,407 yards, 6 TDs) for the first six games as he serves a suspension for taking a banned substance.

The AFC South should be a two-team race between Indianapolis and Tennessee. The Colts traded for former Falcons QB Matt Ryan (3,968 yards, 20 TDs), which should be a huge upgrade from Carson Wentz. Ryan has perhaps the league's best running back in Jonathan Taylor (1,811 yards, 20 total TDs) and an up-and-coming wideout in

Michael Pittman Jr., (88 receptions, 1,082 yards, 6 TDs. The Titans will be led by QB Ryan Tannehill (3,734 yards, 21 TDs) and running back Derrick Henry (937 yards, 10 TDs in eight games).

The AFC West, like the NFC West, is loaded. All four teams are potential playoff squads. Kansas City is the defending champ but suffered a huge loss when stud wide receiver Tyreek Hill (111 receptions, 1,239 yards, 9 TDs) left for Miami. The Chiefs still have star QB Patrick Mahomes (4,839 yards, 37 TDs) and tight end Travis Kelce (92 receptions, 1,125 yards, 9 TDs). Look for Mahomes to spread the ball around to a host of talented receivers the team brought in during the offseason.

The Las Vegas Raiders made one of the biggest moves of the offseason by acquiring one of the league's most productive wide receivers in Adams from Green Bay. He will be reunited with his college QB, Derek Carr (4,804 yards, 23 TDs). The Los Angeles Chargers upgraded their defense with the acquisition of edge rusher Kahlil Mack. The Chargers have plenty of offense with QB Justin Herbert (5,014 yards, 38 TDs), running back Austin Ekeler (911 rushing yards, 12 TDs. 70 receptions, 647 yards, 8 TDs) and productive wideouts Keenan Allen (106 receptions, 1,138 yards, 6 TDs) and Michael Williams (76 receptions, 1,146 yards, 9

Denver upgraded at QB by acquiring Russell Wilson (3,113 yards, 25 TDs in 14 games). If young wide receivers Courtland Sutton (58 receptions, 776 yards, 2 TDs) and Jerry Jeudy (38 receptions, 467 yards) progress, the Broncos could be a playoff contender.

In the AFC North, the Cincinnati Bengals shocked the world by winning the AFC and took the Rams to the wire before losing the Super Bowl. Cinci is loaded on offense led by QB Joe Burrow (4,611 yards, 34 TDs), running back Joe Mixon (1,205 yards, 16 total TDs) and wide receivers Ja'Marr Chase (81 receptions, 1,455 yards, 13 TDs) and Tee Higgins (74 receptions, 1,091 yards, 6 TDs).

Baltimore Ravens fans are hoping for a bounce back season from QB Lamar Jackson (2,882 passing yards, 16 TDs/767 rushing yards, 2 TDs in 12 games), while the Browns are hoping they have Watson for at least half the season this year. While he serves his suspension, look for Cleveland to give running backs Nick Chubb (1,269 yards, 8 TDS) and Kareem Hunt (386 yards, 5 TDs) plenthy of work. Cooper should upgrade the wide receiver posi-

In the AFC East, Buffalo is the team to beat led by QB Josh Allen (4,407 yards, 36 TDs/763 rushing yards, 6 TDs) and wide receivers Stefon Diggs (103 receptions, 1,225 yards, 10 TDS) and Gabriel Davis (35 receptions, 549 yards, 6 TDs). Davis had a breakout game in the Bills' 42-36 loss to KC in the Divisional Round with eight receptions for 201 yards and four TDS.

Miami vastly improved its offense with the pickup of Hill. He will team with fellow wideout Jalen Waddle (104 receptions, 1,015 yards,

6 TDs) and tight end Mike Gesicki (73 receptions, 780 yards, 2 TDs). The key to the Dolphins quest for the playoffs will revolve around the progress of QB Tua Tagovailoa (2,653 yards, 16 TDs).

There will be 10 new head coaches when the 2022 season begins. Matt Eberflus takes over in Indv. while Nathaniel Hackett takes over in Denver, Todd Bowles in Tampa Bay, Mike McDaniels in Miami, Brian Daboll is the Giants new head coach, Doug Pederson is the new head man in Jacksonville, Josh McDaniels takes over in Vegas, Dennis Allen is the new man in charge in New Orleans, Lovie Smith tries to rebuild the Texans and Kevin O'Connell takes over in Minnesota.

The 2022 season will conclude with Super Bowl LVII on Feb. 12 in Phoenix.

At the college level, teams will be vying for a spot in the College Football Playoff (CFP) National Title game, slated for Jan. 9 in Los Angeles at SoFi Stadium.

The national semifinal games will be held on Dec. 31 (Fiesta Bowl and Peach Bowl).

Georgia is the reigning national champ and while they lost 15 players to the NFL (five defensive players were drafted in the first round alone), head coach Kirby Smart will just reload and field another strong contender.

His former boss, Alabama

head coach Nick Saban, reached the CFP title game in what was considered a rebuilding year in Tuscaloosa. The Crimson Tide still won 13 games in a rebuilding season and could be scary good this year. 'Bama is led by Heisman Trophy winning QB Bryce Young (4,872 yards, 47 TDs) on offense and linebacker Will Anderson Jr., (17.5 sacks) on defense. The Tide lost a lot of production at the skill positions, but got a boost at running back when Jahmyr Gibbs (1,211 yards, 6 TDS) transferred in from Georgia Tech. Young has plenty of

young and talented wide receivers to throw to.

Texas A&M and head coach Jimbo Fisher should be 'Bama's biggest threat in the SEC West. Fisher has a veteran team back, led by running back Devon Achane (1,171 yards, 10 TDs) and wide receiver Ainais Smith (47 receptions, 509 yards, 6 TDs). Fisher has to choose a QB and has three talented signal callers to choose from in LSU transfer Max Johnson (2,815 yards, 27 TDs), former starter Haynes King and true five-star freshman Conner Wegman.

Ohio State should be the class of the Big 10. Ryan Day has a plethora of returning starters led by star QB C.J. Stroud (4,435 yards, 44 TDs), running back TreVeyon Henderson (1,560 yards, 19 TDs) and wide receiver Jaxon Smith-Njigba (95 receptions, 1,606 yards, 9 TDs). Smith-Njigba had an amazing performance in OSU's 48-45 Rose Bowl win over Utah with 15 receptions for 347 yards and 3 TDs.

Texas fans are hoping second-year head coach Steve Sarkisian is ready to take the 'Horns to the Big 12 title game after finishing 5-7 in his first season. He has a talented QB in Ohio State transfer Quinn Ewers in the fold. Ewers was a five-star $\,$ QB from Southlake Carroll. Sark has one of the best running backs in the nation in Bijan Robinson (1,127 yards, 15 TDS). But Texas must get better play from its offensive line and defense if it hopes to contend in the Big 12.

The conference is wide open. Baylor is the defending champ and returns a veteran until, while Oklahoma welcomes in a new head coach in Brent Venables, the former Clemson defensive coordinator. Oklahoma State has the best returning QB in Spencer Sanders (2,839 yards, 20 TDs).

When it's all said and done, look for Alabama and Ohio State to meet for the national title, with Saban winning his eighth national title.



Public Safety progress and lingering fears dominate public talk

At a recent meeting with Harris County Sheriff Ed Gonzalez and Precinct 2 Commissioner Adrian Garcia, an East Aldine woman spoke up.

"I am afraid to go out of my house at night" because of gunfire in her neighborhood, she told the lawmen.

Gonzalez and Garcia, a former sheriff, had convened the meeting with area residents to explain how more than \$2 billion in recent crime-fighting resources and manpower are bringing more safety to the East Aldine District in northeast Harris County.

Those improvements include:

*More than \$780,000 for the high-tech "ShotSpotter" system that allows police to track the exact locations of gunfire.

*More than \$200,000 invested by Garcia for a workforce development program for homeless residents of Precinct 2.

*Road and streetlight improvements in East Aldine.

*Nearly \$200,000 spent by the East Aldine Management District for extra patrol services by 21 sheriff's deputies.

*An additional \$110,000 from the District for adding streetlights in residential neighborhoods and about \$150,00 for electricity to power those lights.

*The higher visibility of law enforcement officers due to the loca-

tion of the Harris County Sheriff's Department's new, state-of-art 911 Call Center at the Town Center. The center is located on land donated by the East Aldine Management District.

But, as Gonzalez acknowledged, the push against lawlessness in the area doesn't end.

Apparently, the woman who complained about gunfire lives just outside the boundaries of new ShotSpotter system, which has aided police efforts to apprehend criminals who are involved in shootings or to track the weapons used in crimes.

Also, the ShotSpotter system is in a three-year trial period.

Regardless, the sheriff expressed regret that the woman was hearing gunfire, and he encouraged her to report it by calling 911.

"It's unacceptable," Gonzalez said. "We know somebody firing a weapon is serious. It's not a toy, someone could get hurt or killed. So, if you hear it, call 911."

He also urged the woman to contact the East Aldine District's Town Center storefront office, where Lt. Michael Santos spearheads round-the-clock shifts of deputies fighting crime.

The officers are making a dent in northeast Harris County's criminal activities, Santos said: "Residents are telling us that we are making a difference. I think, personally, the

community is happier. People can now call us directly."

Another woman posed a question to the sheriff: What can the county do to stop speeding drivers in her neighborhood?

"Unfortunately, here in Harris County, we have a very dangerous driving culture." Gonzalez said. "People speed. They drive drunk. They drive distracted. Unfortunately, it's our own neighbors who are doing it."

Statistics, meanwhile, show the deputies have made arrests, seized illegal drugs and guns and run dangerous trespassers near residential neighborhoods.

The District's deputies even put a stop to grave-robbing vagrants who were stealing copper urns from a local cemetery at night.

Cemetery owners had called to complain that the urns, used to hold floral displays on graves, had been rapidly disappearing at night, when the cemetery is closed. But thieves were sneaking in with the intent to later sell the urns to metal recyclers.

The deputies also participated with the Aldine Independent School District in an "active shooter" drill at an area elementary school. Deputies were not aware that it was a drill until their training was completed, Santos said.

"We are spending more than \$2 billion on public safety, the community and the courts to make sure we are doing as much as we can, to make sure you are as safe as possible," Garcia said. "There is promise that our efforts are working."
