

East Aldine celebrates Constitution and New Citizens on Sept. 17

Constitution Day & Citizenship Day to get big local recognition

ALDINE – The East Aldine Management District and many partners will celebrate the anniversary of Constitution Day and National Citizenship Day in a new way next Saturday.

A patriotic parade on Saturday, Sept. 17 — the 70th anniversary of the "days" — will move from MacArthur High School to the East Aldine Town Center's amphitheater, where



about 300 newly sworn-in U.S. citizens will be honored.

The event, sponsored by the non-profit Bonding

Against Adversity and others, is being billed as the "We The People Celebration" featuring music, stories, games, and voter

registration.

Bonding Against Adversity's programs include classes on how foreignborn residents of the area can become U.S. citizens.

Other sponsors are Univision 45, the New Americans Campaign, and Lone Star College-East Aldine. Parking will be available at the college, and participants are encouraged to bring blankets and chairs to view the event in comfort.

Similar ceremonies will be held across the nation as new citizens take their oath of allegiance to their new home country.



The A&M-Miami game



zens. Through June 15 of this year, 661,500 immigrants became U.S. citizens, according to the federal government.

The East Aldine event will include the parade, a choir concert, a color guard, and musical performances and poem recitations by students from Aldine ISD.

There also will be contests to test the knowledge of Aldine ISD students about the U, S, Constitution and the Declaration of Independence.

Sept. 17 has been recognized as Constitution Day and National Citizenship Day since 1952.

Constitution Day marks the day that the delegates to the Constitutional Convention met for the last time: Sept. 17, 1787. That's when the 39 delegates signed the final document. It has long been also recognized as National Citizenship Day since seven of the Founding Fathers were immigrants from the British Isles.

There had been efforts before 1952 to recognize a national citizenship day. Media mogul William Randolph Hearst began a campaign for such a celebration in 1939. Later, Hearst had become so enamored with his idea that he produced a 16-minute movie, "I am An American," which became a huge hit with American audiences.

Hearst, the grandson of immigrants of Scotch-Irish descent, advocated that "I am an American Day" be celebrated on the third Sunday of May. In 1940, Congress approved his idea, which was signed into law by President Harry S. Truman.

However, an Ohio woman who was often described as "a mother and homemaker," Olga T. Weber, became so concerned that Americans were not aware and appreciative of their history that she began printing and distributing copies of the Constitution to schools and churches in Louisville, Ohio. She advocated that Constitution Day and Citizenship Day be moved to Sept. 17.

The Ohio Legislature approved her idea, which led the U.S. Congress to approve the 1952 resolution signed into law by President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

The little town of Louisville still celebrates Weber's idea with a Constitution Week festival that includes car shows, hot air balloon rides, choir concerts, a beauty pageant and a parade.

Man killed in 2-vehicle crash on Eastex **Freeway at Little York**

HOUSTON – An investigation is underway after a man was killed in a two-vehicle crash in northeast Harris County Friday, deputies said.

Deputies with Harris County Sheriff's Office received a call about a stalled vehicle in the moving lanes of traffic on Eastex and Little York around 1 a.m, Friday September 2.

Moments later, deputies said they received reports of a major twovehicle crash in the same area.

Units said they arrived and located a GMC Yukon that had struck a white Jaguar sedan.

According to investigators, the driver of the Jaguar, which was the vehicle that stalled, was pronounced dead at the scene. Deputies said there appeared to be no signs of intoxication.

The northbound lanes were closed for some time as an investigation ensued.

Margarita Cruz is an English as a second language (ESL) teacher at La Promesa with a big passion for making a difference in the lives of her students from other countries. Cruz was recently named the 2022 ESL/ Bilingual Secondary Teacher of the Year by the Texas Association for Bilingual Education (TABE).

Cruz began in Aldine ISD as a ninth-grade ESOL 1 teacher at La Promesa before serving in her current position as the ESL instructional specialist. The eight-year veteran is currently in her second year with Aldine ISD. Before joining Aldine, Cruz served in Tomball ISD for seven years, where she taught English and ESL and was an ESL specialist for five years.

Cruz knew she wanted to be a teacher since the second grade when she met her teacher, Mrs. Lagos. The La Promesa teacher emphasized the importance of teaching ESL to support students in gaining English language proficiency. Preparing them academically and socially will plant the seed of strong self-efficacy for generations to come.

Becoming the Bilingual/ESL Secondary Teacher of the Year was a long process with several steps for Cruz. It included applying and being selected as a Bilingual/ESL Secondary Teacher for Aldine ISD and then for the Suburban Houston Association of Bilingual Educators (SHABE), an involved writing application, community service hours, an in-person interview, and letters of recommendation from colleagues, parents, and La Promesa's principal, Ana Fernanda Flores-Bolívar.

"Margarita Cruz is a phenomenal teacher," said La Promesa High School Principal Ana Flores-Bolívar. "She can reach every student in her class by building relationships and challenging students. She can scaffold language for newcomers to demonstrate knowledge using their background knowledge. Anybody that knows Ms. Cruz will be amazed by her knowledge of English language learner strategies and passion for all students to be successful."

TABE, celebrating its 50th anniversary, will honor Cruz at the Teacher of the Year awards luncheon on Saturday, October 16. The luncheon occurs during TABE's Conference, set to be in Houston this year.

Cruz will represent Aldine ISD at the national level at the National Association of Bilingual Education (NABE) 2022 Bilingual Teacher of the Year Award in February 2022.

County Tax Revenues were up by 7% Last Year; here's what you can do about it

he Harris County Auditor's Office recently released its monthly report for February 2022, which is the County's fiscal year end. There is a lot to unpack in the report. But the number that jumped out at me was the increase in property tax receipts. From FY2021 to FY2022 property tax receipts jumped to over 7%. During that same time period, inflation for the Houston region was 1% and the County's population was virtually unchanged. Yet the County collected over \$113 million more from its residents than the year before.

You may recall that in September 2019, County Judge Lina Hidalgo and Commissioners Adrian Garcia and Rodney Ellis voted to raise property taxes by 8%. This is a link to the video of that meeting where the discussion and vote took place. The discussion about raising property taxes begins at 26:19 of "Item I, Part 1 of 2." The actual votes are taken beginning at 1:31:00 or you can see just the vote in this clip posted by my friend Charles Blain.

However, in a second required vote, Commissioners Radack and Cagle boycotted the meeting, blocking the increase. In reaction, Judge Hidalgo said, "Unfortunately, today commissioners Cagle and Radack chose to hide rather than face the tough reality of the impact that extreme revenue caps will have on our county," and "called the failure to increase taxes by 8% "dangerous."

Well, those "extreme revenue caps" allowed the County to collect new revenue at seven times the rate of inflation at a time that the County's population barely increased. Had the tax increase proposed by Hidalgo, Ellis and Garcia passed, the County would have collected almost 20% or roughly \$350 million more from Harris County taxpayers last year. Even more significantly, it would have established a base from which the Court would have been able to continue to raise taxes even higher indefinitely into the future.

I would encourage to look at your tax bill last year and calculate what an additional 13% in County taxes would have cost you. And then think about paying that additional amount each year in the future.

There are three positions on the Commissioners Court which are up for election this November: the County Judge and Commissioner Precincts 2 and 4. I plan to ask each of the candidates for these three positions to take a pledge that they will not vote to increase the property tax rate during their term. Any of them who refuse to do so will not get my vote.

TxDOT announces \$85 **Billion Transportation plan**

The Texas Department of Transportation has adopted a 10-year statewide roadway construction plan with a record \$85 billion price tag, officials announced last week. The Unified Transportation Plan authorizes the distribution of construction money that is expected to be available during the next decade. Within that framework, TxDOT works with elected officials and local planning organizations, as well as the public, to pick and fund the state's highest priority transportation projects.

In addition to highways the UTP addresses public transportation, aviation, rail, maritime, and freight and international trade. Many projects in the plan are highways identified on the state's 100 most congested roadways list.

"The UTP reflects a continued focus on improving transportation safety as the top priority, maintaining our current system, addressing traffic congestion, and improving state-

More than 18 months after Winter Storm Uri shut down much of the state's electric grid, the Texas Railroad Commission last week adopted the state's first weatherization rules requiring natural gas facilities to protect gas flow to power plants.

"These new rules ensure our state's natural gas supply chain is prepared for extreme heat and freezing cold," said RRC Chairman Wayne Christian. "These rules will ensure that the natural gas facilities Texans rely on for reliable energy are operational when we need it most."

Fines for administrative violations could reach up

"This segment of the Trinity River has become one of the most popular destinations in the world to catch a large alligator gar, but concerns have been raised about the potential for overharvest and its risks to fishing quality," said Craig Bonds of TPWD. "With this drawing system, we are able to give 150 anglers the opportunity to harvest the fish of a lifetime while also meeting our management goal to conserve this unique resource for current and future generations of anglers."

COMP CLAIMS UPDATED

More than 90,000 COV-ID-19 workers' compensation cases have been reported in Texas, along with 459 fatalities, according to the state Department of Workers' Compensation. Slightly more than half(51%) of the claims and 55% of the fatalities involved first responders and correctional officers.

Most of the benefits paid were for employer salary continuation or indemnity benefits in the cases of fatalities. The information was gathered through a conference call with 74 selected insurance carriers. COVID-19 CASES, FATALITIES SHOW LITTLE

FOOTBALL SEASON WEEK 3: **Aggies host Miami in meeting of ranked teams:** Texans head to Denver to take on Wilson's Broncos

Before we take a look at this weekend's games, let's review Week 1's results, which were average. A 6-6 start to the season (50%), is nothing to gloat about.

NCAA

Despite losing 15 players to the NFL, Georgia did not miss a beat in their season-opening 49-3 pasting of No. 11-ranked Oregon in their season opener. The Bulldogs looked strong on both sides of the ball as quarterback Stetson Bennett IV threw for 368 yards and two touchdowns in the route of the Ducks. Running back Kenny McIntosh hauled in 9 passes for 117 yards, while the defense came up with two interceptions. This week they face a South Carolina team that has high hopes this year behind OU transfer QB Spencer Rattler (227 yards, 1 TD in the Gamecock's season-opening win). Look for the 'Dawgs to roll in this one. My pick, Georgia 34, South Carolina 17

Oklahoma at Nebras**ka**: Back in the day, this was one of the most anticipated games when these two met in the Big 8. The winner usually won the conference and headed to the Orange Bowl. My, how times have changed. While OU has been a consistent winner since these two teams were in the same conference, while Nebraska has struggled since its move to the Big 10. Cornhusker head coach Scott Frost's seat is blazing hot after losing the opener to Northwestern in Ireland. Nebraska did pick up a 38-17 win in Week 2. UT transfer Casey Thompson (548 yards, 3 TDs) and running back Anthony Grant (290 yards, 4 TDs) will both need to bring their "A" games on Saturday if they hope to pull off the upset. OU opened the season with a 45-13 win over UTEP as new QB Dillon Gabriel threw for 233 yards and 2 TDs, while running back Eric Gray rushed for 102 yards and fellow back Marcus Major scored two rushing TDS. Look for the Sooners to make things even more miserable for Frost and his team come Saturday. My pick, Oklahoma 31, Nebraska 23 UTSA at Texas: Texas opened its season with a convincing 52-10 over Louisiana-Monroe as new starting QB Quinn Ewers passed for 225 yards and two TDs and found a new weapon in tight end Ja'Tavion Sanders, who caught six passes for 85 yards and one TD. Running back Bijan Robinson added 71 yards on the ground and a score. While the 'Horns were rolling, the Roadrunners put up a quality effort against Houston before falling 37-35 in triple overtime. UTSA QB Frank Harris proved he's a dual threat as he rushed for 63 yards and a touchdown and passed for 337 yards and three scores. Texas had better not look past the Roadrunners, because if they do, they might get embarrassed at home. This should be a competitive game, but look for Robinson's legs to make the difference in this one. My pick, Texas 33, UTSA 28 Penn State at Auburn: For the second time in three weeks, Penn State hits the road and this time they travel to the SEC to face Auburn. PSU opened the season with a thrilling 35-31 win at Purdue, while Auburn took care of Mercer, 42-16. The Nittany Lions were led by QB Sean



Clifford, who passed for 282 yards and four TDs in the win over Purdue, while wide receiver Mitchell Tinsley hauled in 7 catches for 84 yards and a score and tight end Brenton Stranger caught two passes for 77 yards and a TD. Auburn will count on running back Tank Bigsby (147 yards, 2 TDS in the Mercer win) to lead the way for an Auburn team that needs a marquee win. My pick, Auburn 23, Penn State 21

Miami at Texas A&M: If the Aggies are going to be serious about contending for a spot in the College Football Playoff (CFP), a win over a ranked Miami team could be a huge resume enhancer. A lot of experts believe Miami could be a very dangerous team this year led by Van Dyke at QB, who should play at the next level. The 'Canes are under the direction of firstyear head coach Mario Cristobal, a no-nonsense head coach who returned to his alma mater after a stint at Oregon's head coach. Miami also has a strong running game led by Henry Parrish (108 yards, 3 TDs in season opener). A&M's run game was nonexistent in the season opener as star running back Devon Achane was held to just 41 yards. Quarterback Haynes King had a nice game passing for 364 yards and three TDs. Wide receiver Ainas Smith hauled in six passes for 164 yards and two touchdowns, while Yulkeith Brown grabbed two passes for 68 yards and a score. Fisher needs Achane to get untracked if his team is going to come away with the win on Saturday night at Kyle Field. Something tells me Achane will be the difference maker against Miami on Saturday. Bronco fans are hyped about the prospects of Wilson returning Denver to the playoffs and he has some nice, young weapons to work with in second-year running back Javonte Williams (903 yards, 7 TDs) and wide receiver Courtland Sutton (58 receptions, 776 yards, 2 TDs). The Texans will need a big day from rookie running back Damien Pierce, the star of training camp, to take pressure off of QB Davis Mills (2,664 yards, 16 TDs). If the Texans hope to pull off the upset, Mills and WR Brandin Cooks (90 receptions, 1,037 yards, 6 TDs) will need to make plays in the passing game. This will be Wilson's first home game so look for him to have a big day against the Houston defense. My pick,

good AFC matchup in the early Monday Night Football game pits the Titans against the Bills in Buffalo's home opener. Many are picking the Bills to win the AFC and the Super Bowl this year and taking down a quality AFC foe in Tennessee could do a lot for the Bills confidence. The addition of Brown to pair with speedy secondyear WR Devonta Smith (64 receptions, 916 yards, 5 TDs) should help in the passing game. 
ship with faculty allowed me to flourish and figure out what I wanted to do next."
