Arbor at Wayforest Housing is meant to replace housing that was flooded during Hurricane Harvey.

Housing Authority, Harris County - Community Services Department (HCCSD), Harris County Precinct One Commissioner Rodney Ellis, the Texas General Land Office (GLO), and development partner - an affiliate of Atlantic Pacific Companies (A | P) announce the grand opening of The Arbor at Wayforest, a multifamily development to replace housing lost during Hurricane Harvey.

The Arbor at Wayforest is financed with Harris County's Community Development Block Grant -Disaster Recovery (CDBG-

The Harris County DR) funds in conjunction with construction financing and tax credit equity from Bank of America and private permanent financing from Citi Community Capital. The \$36M community will create 192 beautiful new apartment homes for families seeking quality housing in the Greenspoint area.

groups from 1-4 years, 5-8 and 9-12.



### Fatal shooting at funeral

Charges have been filed against a suspect arrested in the fatal shooting of a man at 115 West Hamilton Street about 11 a.m. on Saturday (April

The suspect, Queen Smith Jackson, 67, is

charged with manslaughter in the 338th State District Court. A booking photo of Jackson is attached to this news release.

The identity of the victim, 22, is pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences.

An argument occurred among family members at a funeral service in the funeral home at the above address and continued into the parking lot, where Jackson (one of the attendees) pulled a gun and fatally shot a family member.

Jackson admitted shooting the gun, but stated it was her intention to shoot the gun in the air. Paramedics transported the victim to an area hospital where he was pronounced deceased.

Detectives contacted members of the Harris County District Attorney's Office and Jackson was subsequently charged for her role in the shooting.

# **Aldine ISD Trustees Pass** Resolution Opposing Vouchers Girl Power to GIRLS

During the March 28 Board meeting, Aldine ISD Trustees unanimously passed a resolution in opposition to any bill that would allow for public tax dollars to go to private entities via vouchers, educational savings accounts (ESA) and tax credit schemes.

One of Gov. Greg Abbott's priorities during the 88th Texas Legislative session is to push for "school choice," meaning vouchers, educational saving accounts and tax credit tuition.

In the resolution approved by Aldine ISD's Trustees at the March 28 Board meeting, it stated vouchers divert funds from public schools to private, religious and corporate run schools. The resolution also stated that at a time when Texas schools are woefully under-funded, taxpayers cannot afford to pay for two separate school systems one private and one for mover 90% of Texas children who attend public schools. Giving an ESA to 600,000 homeschooled and private school students could cost billions. In conclusion to the resolution, Aldine ISD Trustees opposes any bill that allows vouchers. In addition, the Board authorizes the (Aldine ISD) administration in conjunction with the Southeast Texas Education Coalition (STEC) to take the necessary steps to voice opposition to any bills that contain provisions for vouchers.



Inflation is up, but Homestead ISD Tax Bills are Not! Over 3.5 Million should see savings this Fall

Senator Bettencourt calls on Cities and Counties to adopt the No-New-Revenue-Rate this Fall

Taxpayers should visit the State's New Tax Portal to get their Estimated Property Tax Bill

Austin, TX – Senator Paul Bettencourt (R-Houston) says that while the current National inflation rate is 8.6%, millions of under-65 Texas Homesteads should see their Independent School District (ISD) tax bills cut this Fall.

In May of last year, Texas' Voters overwhelmingly approved Propositions 1 and 2, which provided direct tax cuts to homeowners with homestead tax bills in 2022 and 2023. 2.1 Million over-65 or disabled homeowners will receive the benefits of the state's compressed property tax rate for school maintenance and operations (M&O) in 2023. Proposition 2 increased the statewide school homestead exemption from \$25,000 to \$40,000, meaning that over 3.5 million under-65 homestead homeowners will receive this tax cut this year. My Senate office calculations indicate an actual cut of \$44 on average for an average \$301,000 taxable homestead in Texas despite massive appraised value increases across the state. An office survey of the top 25 ISDs in the state indicates a range of cuts from \$107 to \$8. These calculated cuts comes before Cities and Counties set their tax rates in the Fall, which could save the average taxpayer hundreds of more dollars on their tax bills.

"The Cavalry is coming over the Hill for Texas Homesteads in the Fall, just like in an old John Wayne movie!" said Senator Paul Bettencourt. "Because of the passage of Prop 1 and 2 in May, 3.5 Million homesteads will on average pay less on their school tax bills this year than they did last year. Over-65 homeowners are frozen this year, but will get an actual property tax cut in 2023, too." He added.

Property Appraisals are rising amidst a booming Texas economy, but taxpayers can be assured that property tax rates are on the way down to offset these increases. This is attributed to the significant reforms contained in SB 2 and HB 3 that the legislature passed in 2019, and the additional property tax legislation that was passed in 2021. In fact there are 16 cents of property tax relief, overall a \$482 savings compared to last year's tax rate.


"Lawmakers have given property owners valuable protections against rising tax bills in this red hot real estate market, but there is no substitute for vigilance. Taxpayers must be prepared to weigh in with their local taxing jurisdictions if they believe tax rates are too high," stated Dale Craymer, President of Texas Taxpayers and Research Association. Note: TTARA supplied county and city penny rate reduction estimates.

The no-new-revenue-rate is the rate that provides the same amount of money to a taxing entity this year as last year. As Texans are having to be extra careful with their dollars due to very high inflation, government entities should be doing the same thing or go to the voters for adoption. "I am calling on all Cities and Counties to adopt the no-new-revenue-rate, it will save the taxpayers' money!" concluded Senator Betten-



## House OKs \$302 Billion Budget

The Texas House approved a \$302 billion budget last week that included an amendment prohibiting the use of state money on private school tuition — a major setback to Gov. Greg Abbott's plan to establish a school voucher system. The Austin American-Statesman reported that more than 20 Republicans joined nearly all House Democrats to pass the amendment, while 11 lawmakers voted present.

The amendment is seen as a rebuke to Abbott, who has traveled the state pushing what he calls "school choice."

The amendment's sponsor, state Rep. Abel Herrero, D-Robstown, said his proposal to block using public money for private schools boiled down to "public money for public schools."

The House's budget now heads to the Senate, which has passed an education reform bill calling for \$8,000 in state funding a year for a student who attends a private school. Since that funding is not included in the House budget, the issue could lead to tense conference committee negotiations between the two chambers. Some lawmakers have speculated the conflict could lead to a special called legislative session after the regular term ends on Memorial Day.

Among the highlights of the House budget are record funding increases for public schools and highway construction, as well as raises for state employees.

#### CONTROVERSIAL ELECTRIC GRID PLAN PASSES SENATE

The Texas Senate has passed a controversial plan to build more natural gas-powered plants in the state, despite widespread opposition from critics who say the two bills could lead to billions in added costs to customers. The goal of the bills, according to its sponsors, is to avoid another massive power outage such as the one in the winter of 2021 that killed more than 200 peothe Texas ple. <u>Tribune</u> reported.

H o u s t o n Chronicle columnist Chris Tomlinson reported that 22 out of 24 people who testified on Senate Bill 6 voiced opposition. The plants would sit idle at least 97% of the time.

Power Advocates agreed with the South Texas Electric Cooperative. Energy giant NRG joined the consumer advocacy group Public Citizen in declaring SB 6 a lousy idea," Tomlinson wrote.

State Sen. Charles Schwertner, R-Georgetown, the lead sponsor of both bills, said the measures were "in memory of the hundreds of Texans that died and the millions of Texans that suffered."

#### COURT RULES DEGREES CAN BE REVOKED FOR MISCONDUCT

The Texas Supreme Court reversed previous lower-court rulings and ruled last week that Texas universities can revoke previously awarded degrees for academic misconduct. the Statesman reported. The University of Texas at Austin and Texas State University, in separate cases that were consolidated, argued they should be able to revoke doctorate degrees from students who committed academic misconduct to "protect their reputations and the value of degrees con-

ferred upon their students."

Both cases involved students accused of fabricating data that was discovered after the degrees had been conferred. Both students sued their respective universities after their degrees were re-

voked.

"The only difference between expelling a current student for academic misconduct and revoking the degree of a former student for the exact same academic misconduct is one of timing," Justice Debra Lehrmann wrote.

### TEMPS TOPPED 100 DEGREES IN TEXAS PRISONS

The indoor temperature inside at least 15 state-operated jails and prisons exceeded 100 degrees last summer, according to a report by The <u>Dallas</u>

Morning News. The data indicates that both inmates and staff are exposed to dangerous levels of heat in the state's facilities that do not have air conditioning.

A lack of climate control has contributed to the deaths of nearly two dozen inmates between 1998 and 2012, according to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, as well as the heat-related illnesses of dozens of prison guards.

The News reported that state standards say county jails and animal shelters should get no hotter than 85 degrees, but Texas prisons are not required to have air conditioning.

While previous attempts to fund air conditioning for the state's prisons have failed, the House budget passed last week sets aside more than a half-billion dollars for that purpose. In addition, two bills to install cooling systems in the prison system were approved in committee.

#### LAND OFFICE AWARDS \$6 MILLION FOR COASTAL COUNTIES

The Texas General Land Office has awarded \$6 million for projects across seven coastal counties with a combination of federal and state funding

The projects are intended in part to improve amenities for greater beach access in a number of locations, as well as developing early warning systems for coastal flooding

"As a Texan who grew up near the coast and lived in Galveston for more than a decade, preserving our state's precious shorelines and their communities is a top priority of mine," said Land Commissioner Dawn Buckingham.

#### TENTATIVE SETTLEMENT IN TEXAS CHURCH SHOOTING

The Justice Department last week announced a tentative \$144 million settlement with the families and victims of a 2017 mass shooting at a church in Sutherland Springs, the Associated Press reported. More than two dozen people were killed when a former U.S. airman opened fire during a church service. It was later determined that the gunman had been able to purchase firearms despite a criminal history. Three years earlier, while in the Air Force, he was convicted of assaulting an ex-wife and stepson, cracking the child's skull. He was discharged for bad conduct.

The Air Force had previously acknowledged it was remiss in not putting the felony conviction for domestic violence in into the FBI database, which could have prevented the shooter from buying guns from a licensed firearms dealer.

The settlement is still sub-

ject to court approval.

"No words or amount of money can diminish the immense tragedy of the mass shooting in Sutherland Springs," Vanita Gupta, associate attorney general for the Justice Department, said in a statement. "Today's announcement brings the litigation to a close, ending a painful chapter for the victims of this unthinkable crime."



#### "Burro in Pants"

I saw the burro wearing pants and carrying a basket filled with paper flowers.

"Oh, my gosh!" I said.
"That poor burro."

There are several burros with this job in this Mexican town and, as burro employment goes, it's a pretty easy gig. The burro wears a rustic basket filled with bright paper flowers and is led by a man in a similarly rustic costume, and they follow wedding processions, providing photo opportunities for the guests. The burro is photographed dozens of times and spends the afternoon in the park, doing her best to look picturesque.

On weekdays, when weddings are less common, the burro and her handler park themselves on a narrow bit of cobblestone street with a beautiful view of the old church in the background. Tourists get their photos taken with the burro for a few pesos. I saw no harm in it until the day the burro showed up in pants.

"Oh, my gosh!" And I felt a sense of indignation rising on the burro's behalf.

I mean, it's one thing to carry around fake flowers all day. It is another thing entirely (according to me) to put the poor burro in trousers. To add insult to injury, the pants were not even on her back legs! She was wearing trousers on her front legs that made her look sort of like a little person with a donkey head.

"Outrageous!" I decided in furious defense of the burro's dignity. Making a burro dress up in a silly costume was somehow intolerable, as far as I was concerned. Her handler was making her look comical, a ridiculous punchline to lure more tourists in. She was a joke burro, and I decided—from my vantage point as the Tourist Who Knows Everything—this was unacceptable.

From that moment on, I made it my mission to restore the burro's dignity. On days when she showed up in pants, I shook my head disapprovingly and said, "No pants!" in Spanish. On days she showed up in her natural attire, I indicated my approval. "I am happy the burro has no pants!" I said—a phrase I am unlikely to need on many other occasions.

My mission was going well, I thought. The burro was showing up in pants far less often and everything was going well—until yesterday.

Yesterday, I actually stopped to talk to the burro's handler

"I'm glad she is not wearing pants!" I reiterated as if, by now, he might not have gotten my point.

"I will show you," he said in English. And he gestured that I should come near.

The burro had large patches on the back of her legs where the flies had been eating her skin. He told me they hurt her, and he could not keep the insects away. He put poison on the spots, but it did not work well, and it cost 500 pesos for a small bottle. The pants kept the flies away and allowed her poor legs to heal.

And I am an idiot.
"I'm so sorry," I said in
Spanish. "I didn't understand.
She should wear pants if she
needs them!"

And I thought of all the assumptions I make every day, all the opinions I form with no basis but my own ridiculous preconceptions. This man took the time to show me the truth—about one little burro in pants—and I wondered how often I am just so, so wrong.

"Gracias," I told him.
"De nada," he said. "It's

nothing."

But of course, it was something. It was something very

important.

Holistic Approach Invests Resources in Cleaning Up Communities

HOUSTON - Mayor Sylvester Turner released his One Clean Houston initiative today to combat illegal dumping throughout the city. The initiative focuses on

three key areas to address the issue and clean up Houston's neighborhoods, especially areas that have been repeatedly targeted by individuals committing illegal dumping.

- --Rapid cleanup --Better enforcement
- --Prevention and educa-

The plan outlines the City's commitment to work with homeowners, community members, non-profits, industry and other governmental organizations.

The One Clean Houston Plan allocates nearly \$18M in additional dollars over the next two years to comprehensively address illegal dumping; this is an unprecedented investment in this issue that impacts many of Houston's neighborhoods, particularly the most vulnerable..

"'My administration has always prioritized the eradication of illegal dumping, and now One

how we will move forward together to combat a prevalent problem," said Mayor Turner. "Illegal dumping is a blight on our community, threatening the health and welfare of people living in neighborhoods where illegal dumping occurs. It is unlawful for anyone to dump trash in areas where it does not belong. Not only do we intend to clean up Houston, but we will intensify our work to hold offenders responsible for their dirty

The mayor was joined at the news conference by Mark Wilfalk, director of Solid Waste Management, Councilmembers Tarsha Jackson (District B) and Karla Cisneros (District

Clean Houston outlines H), Harris County Precinct One Constable Alan Rosen, Houston Police Sgt. Patrick Morrisey Nichole Christoph, Deputy Director, Crime-Stoppers, Alan Steinberg of Keep Houston Beautiful, Jesse Bounds, director of the City's Office of Innovation, Department of Neighborhoods Director TaKasha Francis, and several community representatives.

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

HOLLYWOOD - Jane Fonda, 85, finally fulfilled her wish to be a warrior queen when she voiced the Warrior Queen of the Seven Seas in the computer-animated, coming-of-age fantasy "Ruby Gillman: Teenage Kraken," due June 30. She'll first hit movie screens May 12 in "Book Club: The Next Chapter," with Diane Keaton, Candice Bergen and Mary Steenburgen. Hopefully, it will be more successful than "80 for Brady," which, despite having the star power of Fonda, Lily Tomlin, Sally Field, Rita Moreno and Tom Brady, cost \$28 million and grossed just under \$40 million.

\*\*\* Twenty-three years ago, "Gladiator" won Oscars for Best Picture, Best Actor (Russell Crowe), Best Visual Effects, Best Sound and Best Costume Design. Now, director Ridley Scott, 85, is finally making his sequel. This time, it'll star Irish actor Paul Mescal (who received an Oscar nomination for Best Actor this year for "Aftersun") and "Banshees Of Inisherin" Best Supporting Actor nominee Barry Keoghan. (Keoghan's up next in "Saltburn," with Rosamund Pike, Jacob Elordi and Carey Mulligan.) You can also expect a Gladiator-style series that is currently in the works, starring Anthony Hopkins, and also a reboot of Starz's "Spartacus" series.

\*\*\* Russell Crowe is back with a vengeance, with "The Pope's Exorcist" (due April 14), co-starring Franco Nero. Crowe also has "Kraven the Hunter," with Aaron Taylor-Johnson and Ariana DeBose due October 6, as well as two films still awaiting release dates - first is "The Georgetown Project," with Sam Worthington, David Hyde Pierce and Karen Gillan. The second film is "Sleeping Dogs," also with Gillan, who will star as Nebula in the upcoming "Guardians of the Galaxy Vol. 3," releasing May 5.

\*\*\* Cheech & Chong were way ahead of their time when they made the pro-

marijuana film "Up in Smoke" (1978) for a mere \$2 million, which grossed a whopping \$104 million. Now 76, Cheech Marin has made about 80 films and starred in many TV series, including "Nash Bridges" (1996-2001). Tommy Chong, now 84, has made 21 films and about a hundred TV appearances. But now, the comedy duo are the subjects of an upcoming biopic. What could be more timely?

\*\*\* Before winning an Oscar for Best Actress for "Everything Everywhere All at Once," Michelle Yeoh was already the busiest actress in Hollywood. June 9 brings just her voice in "Transformers: Rise of the Beasts," while Sept. 15 brings "A Haunting In Venice," with Kenneth Branagh, Jamie Dornan and Tina Fey. Yeoh's also lending her voice to "The Tiger's Apprentice" and starring as Madame Morrible in "Wicked: Part One," due November 2024, and "Wicked: Part Two," due in 2025. Not to mention, she's already filmed "Avatar 3," releasing December 2024, and "Avatar 4," releasing December 2026. Even before she won her Oscar, she was already yo-yoing between multiple movie sets! 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


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

# Growth is in the Air at Compressor Maker in East Aldine

Just southwest of the junction of Beltway 8 and Interstate 69, the global business network Atlas Copco produces specialized air compressors that are pivotal to the success of industries across North America and beyond.

When oil and gas giants and the new players in alternative fuels need specialized compressor systems for operarating in challenging environments, very often those systems come from the company's plant in East Aldine.

Operations Manager Ramsaran Palaniappan said he was a customer of the company before he joined in 2011. In 2012, Atlas Copco Product Company Houston consolidated several acquisitions of other companies into a building on Lee Road. Another company that manufactured low-pressure blowers was later acquired and moved to the location.

Atlas Copco, which started in Sweden, has facilities around the world and across the United States. It is one of the largest non-retail employers in East Aldine Management District, with about 300 workers there in manufacturing and customer service, according to a Data Axle 2022 report.

"These are basically larger industrial air compressors for mostly oil and gas companies, pharmaceutical, food and beverage industry — you name it and our compressors are there," Palaniappan said.

The compressors are not the off-the-shelf kind you can buy at a big box hardware store.

"Each one of our compressors is customized for the oil and gas industry. It can be as simple as just a paint job — the customer will want a different color on the compressor — to a completely customized unit, like changing all the instruments (to be explosion-proof) and changing the motors, changing the canopy, changing the enclosures, the control panels, everything" the operations manage explained.

Several large compressor units were being assembled lately for an order going to Mexican oil production companies. Some being prepared for onshore or offshore use are customized with extra-thick aluminum housing (NEMA 7) for control panels and all stainless-steel canopy and hood.

The drying units remove excess moisture from compressed air. The low-pressure blowers produce slightly pressurized but high-volume air flow, mainly used in municipal water treatment plants, for aeration.

The facility also has bays with sensors where compressors can be tested for output flow rate, pressure, humidity, and temperature, all monitored remotely. Rooftop exhaust pipes and silencers let the high-pressure air to be safely vented off.

Users can monitor all the measurements from an adjacent control room or remotely, including through a live video feed. Those features helped maintain production when travel was limited by the pandemic.

While proximity to the oil and gas industry is the biggest draw for locating the facility in Houston, the Aldine area has the added benefit of being close to Bush Intercontinental Airport so customers from around the country and beyond have easy access. Nearby freeways make shipping convenient, and Port Houston is nearby as well.

Palaniappan said the Houston plant primarily serves the United States, Mexico, Canada and Peru. But it also recently shipped a project to Indonesia where the customer specified the equipment needed to be made in the United States. Other customers are in the Middle East.

While a lot of projects got put on hold during the pandemic, Palaniappan said, a backlog of orders meant the company's engineering and production staff saw little reduction in orders to work on. And it

has gotten busier as projects got restarted. The oil and gas industry is booming and he expects the Houston plant to set a record for production this year.

Atlas Copco is facing a challenge adding staff, Palaniappan said, with job openings in engineering and production. Compared to the oil and gas industry, he said, the company is less subject to boom-and-bust cycles and offers a family-oriented, stable work environment.

Human Resources Manager Sabrina Sierra said the company is working to increase community engagement to help increase its visibility to potential workers. She started with the company during the pandemic after previous engagement efforts had been put on hold.

The company has participated in job fairs and hired interns from area universities, including University of Houston and Lamar University. "We're trying to prepare ourselves for what's to come," Sierra said. "We're promoting diversity and inclusion. Bring in more women — more women in the factory," she added. "We've increased our female population, both blue- and white-collar."

She has created a woman's network within the company to provide support, in addition to working with local organizations to find individuals who would want to be a part of a company that values their employees, opinions, and career paths. The company's mottos are, "We hire to retire" and "A company culture that is caring and supportive."

Sierra worked in an industrial co-op program when she was in high school and has drawn on that experience in her own efforts to reach into local schools.
