

ABBOTT TO SIGN PROPERTY TAX RELIEF BILL

ing property taxes.

"I want to express my gratitude to the Lieutenant Governor for his productive negotiations on this matter, to State Representatives Will Metcalf, Morgan Meyer, and Charlie Geren for their relentless work to get these bills over the finish line, and to all the members who voted to give Texas property owners the largest state property tax cut in this nation's history. Their dedication and leadership have been instrumental in making this historic achievement possible, and Texas taxpayers will be the winners because of it."

Highlights of the \$18 billion tax cut legislation include:

- Over \$12 billion will be spent on reducing the school property tax rate for all homeowners and business properties.
 - Every homeowner who homesteads

nificant relief from the burden of escalat- their home (approximately 5.7 million homeowners) will get a \$100,000 homestead exemption.

- Non-homesteaded properties, valued at \$5 million and under, including residential and commercial properties, will receive a 20% circuit breaker on appraised values as a 3-year pilot project.

- In counties with a population of 75,000 or more, three members will be added to the Central Appraisal District board of directors, to be elected in nonpartisan elections. This change aims to bring diverse perspectives and accountability to the decision-making process.

- Legislation will also include savings on the franchise tax for small businesses.

After the Governor signs the bill, it will still need approval from the voters in the general election in November, since it requires a Constitutional amendment to become law.

Leadership TASB provides Trustees from across Texas with an opportunity to become part of a network of school Board Trustees who learn and work together to enhance school governance in Texas, enabling Texas school children to be prepared for a life of work and worth.

During the yearlong program, Mr. Bates and his colleagues heard from nationally known speakers and experts in education and business addressing teamwork, Trusteeship, equity, diversity, and visionary leadership.

The yearlong program consisted of five sessions lasting two to three days. The program wrapped up in June at the Summer Leadership Institute held in Fort Worth.

Doc looked over at Windy, who had initiated this topic, but strangely seemed content to sit there and listen to the leisurely ideas of others.


"What about you, Windy? How do you unwind?"

House Democrat's Tax Plan Would Help Renters

Texas House Democrats unveiled a \$20.9 billion plan for property tax relief that drops tax rates, increases the homestead exemption, gives annual rebates to renters, and includes pay raises for teachthe Austin ers. American-Statesman reported.

The newest proposal comes as the Legislature continues wrangling over the issue in the second special session this year.

The bill, proposed by Rep. John Bryant, D-Dallas, is a combination of previous proposals with the added wrinkle of providing benefits for renters, who do not directly pay property taxes. The proposal also would raise the state's perstudent funding to public schools by \$1,000 and give a permanent annual raise of \$4,300 for teachers.

"Our effort is one that recognizes that you can't talk about property taxes without talking about public education," Bryant said of his proposal to raise the state's basic allotment for school funding by \$1,000.

The Senate has already passed a proposal to increase the homestead exemption to \$100,000 and give a \$2,000 pay hike for teachers in urban districts and a \$6,000 increase to teachers in rural districts over the next two years.

PAXTON WON'T TESTIFY AT

IMPEACHMENT TRIAL Attorney General Ken Paxton won't testify at his upcoming impeachment trial in the Senate, according to his lead defense attorney, Tony Buzbee.

"We will not bow to their evil, illegal, and unprecedented weaponization of state power in the Senate chamber," Buzbee said. The Senate could still try to force Paxton to testify, but Buzbee's statement makes it apparent the defense would fight those efforts,

the Statesman reported. The House impeached Paxton in late May on 20 counts of misusing his office and other alleged crimes. He was immediately suspended from office pending the trial, which is set for Sept. 5. The rules adopted by the Senate give Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick as presiding officer the "power to compel



the attendance of witness-

Paxton was indicted on securities fraud charges in 2015. In 2020, several whistleblowers in his office claimed he had abused his powers to assist Austin developer Nate Paul, who was charged in June with eight felony counts of making false statements to lenders.

TXDOT SEEKS INPUT ON \$100 BILLION PLAN

The Texas Department of Transportation is seeking public input on a proposed 10-year, \$100 billion transportation plan. The Unified Transportation Plan for 2024 is the agency's road map to developing projects

across the state. "It's important to work with our transportation partners and hear from the public to guide transportation improvements that address congestion and enhance safety," Marc Williams, TxDOT executive director, said.

Projects included in the plan seek to ease congestion and improve connectivity. They address all types of transportation, including aviation, rail, freight, maritime and public transportation. The public comment period ends on Aug. 7. To weigh in, go to txdot.gov and click on the public input link.

STATE GETS \$60 MILLION

FROM FEDS FOR GRID The federal government is providing \$60.6 million to the Texas Division of Emergency Management to help utilities strengthen the state's power grid, the Texas Tribune reported. The grant program is funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law passed in late

"These grants will help

modernize the electric grid to reduce impacts of extreme weather and natural disasters while enhancing power sector reliability,' U.S. Secretary of Energy Jennifer Granholm said in a statement. State emergency officials

will decide how to use the money. Possibilities include improving how power-producing equipment performs in extreme heat or cold, or trimming trees near power

Since Winter Storm Uri caused widespread outages in 2021, other storms have also caused power crises. An ice storm in late January and early February sent tree limbs crashing into power lines, particularly in Austin. In June, severe storms swept through East Texas, again knocking out power lines.

A total of \$2.3 billion will be distributed by the Department of Energy across the nation to address power grid reliability issues.

NEW AREA CODE PROPOSED FOR HOUSTON **AREA**

The four area codes serv ing the greater Houston area — 281, 346, 713, and 832 — will run out of available numbers in about two years, prompting the Public Utility Commission of Texas to take public comments regarding a proposal for a fifth area code to be added by the North American Planning Administra-

Counties affected include Brazoria, Chambers, Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Liberty, Montgomery, San Jacinto, and Waller. The phone numbers of existing customers would not be affected, and customers in the current area codes already have to dial all 10 digits to place local calls.

SAHARAN DUST BRINGS HAZY SKIES TO STATE

Dust from Africa's Sahara Desert is once again sweeping across Texas, making for hazy skies, pretty sunsets and a reduced chance of tropical storms forming in the Atlantic, according to KXAN-TV.

The waves of dust are caused by thunderstorms kicking up dust from the desert and sending it several thousand feet in the air, where easterly winds blow it across the ocean and, eventually, into the southern United States.

The dusty air plumes suppress tropical cyclone formation and also slow down the intensity of the storms that do form.



All my children graduated from Pasadena ISD schools, my oldest from South Houston HS, my middle child from Pasadena Memorial HS, and my son from Sam Rayburn HS.

3. What do you love most about the community in Pasadena?

Even though Pasadena is the second largest city in Harris County, this city has a small-town feel to it because the people in this community are very friendly and resilient.

4. What has been your favorite moment or project as a community liaison for Precinct 2?

In 2021 during the COVID pandemic, our community relations department partnered with community organizations to provide rental assistance programs. Small Dog's Aggression Is a Worry

DEAR PAW'S CORNER: I have a small, mixed-breed, mostly terrier named Cookie. He's a darling to me and my son, but to anyone else, he's a terror. He is a rescue, so I don't know what his early life was like or if he was properly socialized. But I'm worried about having company over because he will bark ferociously at any strangers. What can I do to stop this? — Janice L., Trenton, New Jersey

DEAR JANICE: A lack of socialization or an abusive home could be factors in Cookie's aggression. Genetics can also be at play: Some dog breeds were developed to be guard dogs or hunters and may be more aggressive if not trained well.

However, Cookie has accepted you and your son as family, and that is a positive sign. Follow these tips as you begin the process of reducing his aggression.

visitors or strangers on the street. Let him approach visitors on his own, with you supervising.

— Ask visitors (and people on the

Never force Cookie to meet new

street) not to approach Cookie or try to pet him.

— Create a safe space where you

can put Cookie when visitors arrive. A kennel cage with water, soft bed and favorite toys is ideal.

— If Cookie is physically aggressive.

— If Cookie is physically aggressive (charging or snapping), he must stay in his kennel when visitors come, and should always be leashed and wear a muzzle when walking outdoors.

Next, talk to Cookie's veterinarian about a combination of antianxiety medication along with a training routine. I recommend working with a trainer so you can implement effective training methods as quickly as possible. With love, training and care, Cookie can become a confident, less aggressive dog.

a photo of your pet. Here's what to do next:

— Call a friend and get their perspective. It's hard to think clearly when you're upset.

— Call the scammer's number back. If they don't answer, or it's a wrong number, it's a scam.

— Report the scam call to the local police department. They can't recover your pet, but they can alert others in your community.



"THEY CLONED TY-**RONE**" (R) - John Boyega, Jamie Foxx and Teyonah Parris play quite the stylish trio in this comedymystery film described as "Friday" (1995) meets "Get Out" (2017). Boyega (the "Star Wars" sequel trilogy) portrays drug dealer Fontaine, who gets killed by his rival, but wakes up the next day in his bed unharmed. Attempting to get to the bottom of this peculiarity, Fontaine finds his way to a government laboratory with the help of Slick Charles (Foxx) and Yo-Yo (Parris). The trio then discovers that, within this laboratory, the government has been secretly experimenting on the Black population within their neighborhood, which means it's up to them to bring this government conspiracy to light. "THE PORTABLE **DOOR"** (PG-13) — Based on the 2003 novel of the same name by Tom Holt, this fantasy film follows two interns, Paul and Sophie, as they're hired by the organization J.W. Wells & Co. Meanwhile, Clark breaks stories at a newspaper, the Daily Planet, alongside a pixyish Lois Lane (Alice Lee) and photographer Jimmy Olsen (Ishmel Sahid). Critics have given the show positive reviews for maintaining a character-driven story and creating a more relatable, younger Superman - in contrast to the confident, undefeatable Superman fans are normally used to watching. The first three episodes are out now, with new episodes

releasing on Fridays.

"SPACE ODDITY" (PG-13) — Alex (Kyle Allen) is the son of a farmer who has his sights set far away from Earth - on Mars, to be exact. Although it might be heartwarming for its romantic aspects, this film could have been better focused — on the believability of its plot, characters and overall message. HOLLYWOOD - Ryan Reynolds and Kenneth Branagh are starring in the AppleTV+ action-adventure film "Mayday." Reynolds was able to make script changes to "Deadpool 3" (due May 3, 2024), with Hugh Jackman, but due to the writer's strike, he's no longer allowed to contribute writing changes during filming. Reynolds has already completed "IF" ("Imaginary Friends") for director and star John Krasinski, along with Steve Carell, Matt Damon, Emily Blunt, Maya Rudolph, Vince Vaughn, Sam Rockwell and Jon Stewart - due May 24, 2024.

Meanwhile, Branagh stars in "Oppenheimer," which opens July 21, and he's completed the third film in his trilogy based on Agatha Christie's works, "A Haunting in Venice." Releasing in theaters Sept. 15, the film also stars Tina Fey, Michelle Yeoh and Jamie Dornan.

Dick Clark Productions has produced many award shows over the years, so buying the Golden Globes from the almost-defunct Hollywood Foreign Press Association (who barely escaped a diversity scandal that lost their telecast for a year) was a good move. Their 310 voting members will vote on the awards, but will not be involved in the telecast.

Audiences are finally seeing Carrie Fisher's last film "Wonderwell," which she completed seven years ago, six weeks before her sudden passing in December 2016. The film co-stars Rita Ora and Vincent Spano. It was released digitally on June 23.

On the heels of Bruce Willis' forced retirement due to frontotemporal dementia (his last two films ever were released earlier this year), Pat Sajak announced his retirement after 40 years of "Wheel Of Fortune."

And following "Spider-Man" Tom Holland's year off from filmmaking comes word from "Breaking Bad" Emmy winner Bryan Cranston, who announced that he'll take time away in 2026 when he turns 70. "I am not retiring," Cranston cautioned in an Instagram post.
