Aldine ISD schedules community meetings on School Bond Issue

ALDINE - Aldine ISD will hold 6 School Bond Community Meetings to explain the need for the bond funding to the voters. The First Meeting is scheduled on Tuesday, September 26 at Aldine High School, starting at 6:00pm.

The meetings are a chance for voters to hear about the proposed \$1.8 billion bond on the November 7 ballot.

During six community meetings, voters can learn about the Aldine Independent School District's proposed \$1.8 billion bond.

Superintendent Dr. LaTonya M. Goffney said "This bond represents the next chapter in the story of #MyAldine. It is how we fulfill our vision of providing choices and opportunities for future generations. A bond is much more than just transforming buildings and infrastructure. It is an affirmation that, as a community, we are committed to providing our students with the learning environments they need to continue moving forward and be future-ready,"

If the total bond package is approved with the required simple majority (50% plus one), the district plans to spend \$1.8 billion as follows:

The 2023 school bond has three focuses: Safety and Security, Facility EnALDINE ISD

Taxpayers would not see a tax rate increase for the next three years. \$1,622,325,676

Proposition A covers campus rebuilds, campus redesigns and renovations, safety and security, facility improvements and highpriority maintenance, technology infrastructure, and transportation.

Campus rebuilds include Carver High School, Aldine High School, Aldine Middle School, Hambrick Middle School, Orange Grove Elementary School, and Odom Elementary School.

Campus redesign projects would take place at Eisenhower High School and MacArthur High

Campus Facility improvements and high-priority maintenance projects would entail the installation of digital marquees, life-cycle replacements (roofs, plumbing, and HVAC), science lab improvements, and athletic improvements.

Safety and security projects would include a dedicated district police department, updated security technology systems, safety film, site fencing, and lighting and emergency generators.

Technology infrastructure projects would include wireless network system updates (enhanced WiFi).

Transportation projects would include an East Transportation facility rebuild, purchases of new buses and special education buses, and a white fleet.

While the Aggies and Razorbacks go at it in Jerry World, No. 9-ranked Notre Dame hits the road to take on No. 19ranked Duke in what should be an entertaining game. This game will feature two solid QBs in ND's Sam Hartman and Duke's dual threat QB Riley Leonard.

No. 3-ranked Texas hosts the offensive-minded Kansas



Life In Prison for Shooting on Kowis Street

An Humble man was sentenced to life in prison for shooting another man in northeast Houston in 2019, Harris County District Attorney Kim Ogg announced.

"Gun violence, like domestic violence, often escalates, and in this case we see a dangerous man who believed he could kill a stranger for no reason," Ogg said. "This victim's family lost their loved one because a man with a gun thought he could get away with murder."

Larry Rodriguez, 45, was sentenced Friday by the Harris County jury that convicted him of murder in the fatal shooting of 34-year-old Cedric Gordon on August 10, 2019.

Gordon had driven to a home in the 2000 block of Kowis Street late on a Friday night to see a female friend. When he arrived at

the semi-rural property, Rodriguez approached him and shot him. Gordon was able to get back in his car and tried to drive away. He lost control of the automobile and ended up in a roadside ditch nearby.

While Gordon was sitting in his car in the ditch, Rodriguez approached him again and shot him several more times, killing him.

Rodriguez then fled the scene. Deputies with the Harris County Sheriff's Office responded to the incident. They later found

and arrested Rodriguez.

Assistant District Attorney Brett Batchelor, a chief in the DA's trial bureau, prosecuted Rodriguez in a five-day trial with ADA Elizabeth Liberman.

Batchelor said jurors agreed that Rodriguez needed to be off the street for the rest of his life after hearing that he had three additional aggravated assault charges. In one case. Rodriguez hit a man with a large metal bar. In another, he used a pocket knife to stab a man in the face. He also pushed a man into a concrete pole, smashing his head.

"He doesn't value human life and is very dangerous, scary and violent to the people around him," Batchelor said. "He had an extensive criminal history and was absolutely terrorizing this neighborhood."



Message From the Superintendent, September 15, 2023



District Shares Bond 2023 Life-Cycle and Priority Maintenance Data

An independent Educational Suitability Assessment (ESA) conducted by PBK Architects, Inc. showed for each school the degree to which the building's physical and educational environments support student engagement and learning as well as staff instruction. The findings showed that:

5% of schools are over 50 years old

\$1.02 billion in current repair needs for all campuses

\$2.7 billion in total repair needs over the next 10 years

39% of schools scored below 70% for the ESA

Delaying further will worsen current infrastructure challenges and only add to the cost of necessary repairs and upgrades.

The 2023 \$1.8 billion school bond would allow Aldine ISD to address critical safety and maintenance needs in our schools:




Life-Cycle and Priority Maintenance Projects

Regular maintenance and repairs are essential for maintaining buildings, requiring materials and labor. The district aims to maintain good shape and avoid negative environmental impacts. Engineers use a life-cycle analysis process to predict maintenance needs and invest time and money in building maintenance.

In short, Bond 2023 would help AISD provide major repairs to additional schools with failing roofs, heat, air conditioning, and plumbing, providing safer and healthier learning environments for Aldine ISD students.

It's Never Too Early to Start **Looking Into Scholarship Deadlines**

Scholarship deadlines occur year-round but are more prevalent during certain times of the year. Parents and students should plan their application process accordingly to avoid potential deadlines.

Fall Semester Deadline

Davis High School junior Aaliyha Edwards Hunter attended the United Airlines Girls in Aviation Day event.

The Ninth Annual Girls in Aviation Day was Saturday, September 23. In observance of the day, United Airlines held an event on Sept. 19 at Bush Intercontinental Airport. About 30 young women from several Houston-area schools participated, including two from Davis High School's aviation pro-

Davis junior Aaliyha Edwards Hunter missed her flight lesson on Tuesday to attend the United event. The 16-year-old has already logged seven hours of flight time behind the controls of small planes with an instructor by her side.

The junior at Davis High School in the Aldine Independent School District is learning to fly at the Texas Flight as part of her regular school day.

She and the other girls attended several presentations, giving them information about all the jobs available in the aviation industry — from flight attendants to airplane maintenance, airport gate work, and other positions.

But for Hunter, there's only one aviation job on her radar screen - pilot-

"Going forward careerwise," she said, "I see myself flying private jets for people who'd like to do that. I would love to fly private jets. And then I'd probably do helicopters too if I have the opportunity and seaplanes."

She's trying to crack into a male-dominated field.

The U.S. Civil Airmen organization reports that, of the more than 600,000 pilots nationwide, only 10% are women.

Hunter says it's time for that to change, and events like Girls in Aviation Day could help.

"There's actually two (female) pilots in my school (Davis High School)," she said. "It's me and this other girl. And I'm trying to get more because we need more women. We need way more women."

How to send \$1 Billion to Texas State Parks

Now that summer's worst heat is waning, Texans' thoughts turn to the outdoors — to escaping the pressures of everyday life and sharing an adventure together as a family. But that can be expensive.

For a family of four, the cost of a vacation out of state or far from home is often too high to justify. As I was growing up in Houston, my family couldn't possibly afford plane tickets for all of us to travel for leisure.

We were, however, able to load up our car and drive the 300 miles to Garner State Park, near my *abuela*'s hometown of Sabinal. There, my *abuela* waded into the river, my uncles fished until the sun went down, and we kids ran around until the summer heat wore us out and we fell asleep under the stars.

Now, I have a family of my own and am fortunate enough to have the means to take my kids on vacation about once a year.

But we still treasure the weekends where we pack the car with sleeping bags and coolers and head to Lake Livingston State Park or Stephen F. Austin State Park — places where my family and I can disconnect from the everyday and reconnect to each other.

We aren't the only ones. Between our state's booming population and the increasing use of public parks in the last few years, Texans desperately need more places to get outside.

During the 88th Legislative Session, I authored bipartisan legislation with Sen. Tan Parker to invest \$1 billion in the newly created Centennial Parks Conservation Fund, which would support the expansion and development of state parks across Texas. We worked hard to pass the bill with a broad coalition of bipartisan support.

Now, the Legislature has earmarked the money for it already. We just need Texans to give us the final stamp of approval.

This November, during the Nov. 6 general election, voters will make decisions on 14 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution. Proposition 14, the last one on the ballot, supports the creation of the Centennial Parks Conservation Fund.


State parks aren't only about recreation. The 89 sites in Texas' state parks system have been an economic boon for surrounding communities. Recent studies estimate that for every \$1 in public money spent on parks, the state sees between \$4 and \$12 in economic return. These impacts are particularly felt in rural areas, where counties with state parks see higher GDP and population growth than those without.

With \$1 billion, the possibilities for state parks are nearly limitless. The fund grants the Parks and Wildlife Department the ability to acquire and preserve acres and acres of new land, but it is also designed to reinvest interest earned on the initial capital.

A transformational investment like this in our parks system is a promise to preserve our state's natural heritage for generations to come. But it is also a promise to all Texans that everyone — no matter who they are or where they live — deserves a place to explore and to play.

Another Special Session Slated for October

Gov. Greg Abbott has called a third special session, this time about school choice, for next month. He is promising retribution for lawmakers who oppose his move to enact school vouchers in Texas, the Texas Tribune reported

"There's an easy way to get it done, and there's a hard way," Abbott said on a tele-town hall about the issue. "We will take it either way - in a special session or after an election." Abbott essentially threatened to find primary opponents for legislators who oppose his initiative, which failed to gain traction during the regular session as a coalition of Democrats and Republicans representing rural districts opposed it.

His proposal would give parents taxpayer dollars to send their children to private schools. Opponents say this would harm public school systems, particularly in rural areas where choices for private schools are limited.

PAXTON HINTS AT RUN AGAINST CORNYN IN 2026

Just days after being acquitted on impeachment charges by the Texas Senate, reinstated Attorney General Ken Paxton hit the airwaves of several conservative media outlets and hinted of a possible run against incumbent U.S. Sen. John Cornyn in 2026.

The Houston Chronicle reported on a Paxton interview with Tucker Carlson on X, formerly known as Twitter. Paxton said that "somebody needs to step up and run against this guy that will do the job."

"To me, he's been in Washington too long. He's been there, what, for 14 years or so? And I can't think of a single thing he's accomplished for our state or even for the country." Pouton soid

for the country," Paxton said.

In a separate interview,
Paxton said he will be "on
the campaign trail" to back
GOP primary opponents of
three House members who
were key to his impeachment: House Speaker Dade
Phelan and Reps. Andrew
Murr of Junction and Jeff
Leach of Plano.

"I'm highly motivated," the Austin American-Statesman quoted Paxton as saying.



Paxton still faces state security fraud charges filed in 2015. He is due to go to trial next March and is also under federal investigation.

DEADLINE NEARS FOR REGISTERING TO VOTE ON NOV. 7

Texans will decide the fate of 14 proposed constitutional amendments on Nov. 7. The deadline to register to vote in that election is Oct. 10 for those who are not already registered. The proposed amendments include measures to increase the homestead exemption from \$40,000 to \$100,000, with homeowners 65 and older getting an additional \$40,000 exemption. Other proposals would cap increased in appraised value and expand exemptions for small businesses from the franchise tax.

Abbott and other backers of the bills passed in a summer special session called these measures the largest property tax cut in Texas history.

Early voting begins on Oct. 23 and ends Nov. 3, according to the Texas Secretary of State's office.

TEXAS CALLED 'HOTBED OF HATE' IN RECENT REPORT

A report issued last week by the Anti-Defamation League labels Texas a hotbed for extremism and antisemitism, with a heavy presence of white supremacist and anti-LGBTQ+ groups, according to the Texas Tribune. The report examines three years of "alarming levels of extremist ideology and activity" in the state. Antisemitic incidents in the state rose by 89% and six "terrorist plots" were discovered, along with 28 "extremist events" such as training and rallies, according to the report.

The ADL suggested some nonpartisan policies to stem growing extremism, such as creating a commission to study domestic violent extremism and providing clear statistics on hate crimes.

"Elected officials in Texas have an opportunity to confront this issue to significantly curtail the negative impact that extremism has on the people they represent," Oren Segal, vice president of the ADL's Center on Extremism, said in a statement.

FINANCIAL LOSSES FROM OPIOID CRISIS ARE STAGGERING

In a monthlong series of stories about the fentanyl crisis, The Dallas Morning News determined through an analysis by The Perryman Group that the economic toll of the opioid crisis in Texas includes \$50.1 billion in economic output each year and more than a half-million jobs.

"As large as these numbers are, they likely understate the true impact," economist Ray Perryman said. "It's widely acknowledged that drug addiction is underreported."

His group pulled data from the National Institutes of Health, the Centers for Disease Control and prevention and other health agencies for its analysis.

A new law requires all emergency medical responders to report drug overdoses to health authorities in an effort to map overdoses and hopefully identify overdose hotspots. All Texas law enforcement officers are being given NARCAN, which quickly reverses opioid overdoses, according to Abbott's office.

COWTOWN NAMED CITY WITH THE WORST WEATHER

A newsroom meteorologist with the San Antonio Express-News is not likely to win the keys to the city of Fort Worth after completing a study to determine which major city in Texas has the worst weather. The "winner" was Fort Worth, according to Anthony Franze.

Franze looked at hail, tornado, flash flood and wind data since 2000 for the five most populous counties.

"Based on all the different categories we looked at, the major city with the most consistent destructive severe weather is Fort Worth," Franze wrote. "Since 2000, Tarrant County has had the most hail reports and it's in an area most prone to destructive tornadoes. Tarrant County has also had 121 destructive wind reports during that time, the most of any major Texas city."

Talking to Strangers

I got anxious again today. I think I am getting better at leaving anxiety behind, and then anxiety says, "Not so fast! We have more work to dO."

Usually, this has to do with my writing: "Is it good enough? Does she hate it?" But not always. Sometimes I will post something on Facebook, and someone will take offense. Since I make an effort to never post anything controversial or unkind, this always shocks me and makes me wonder if I have any idea how I sound when I write. Since writing is pretty much all I do, this concern starts to bang around in my brain like a kitten knocking things off the shelf.

"What was I thinking?" I wonder. But I don't actually remember thinking anything at all. I will make comments I imagine are helpful or clarifying, and end up offending someone and wondering why I did not just remain silenT.

The best thing to do at this point is to take a walk.

On my walk, I usually encounter a few homeless people. The Catholic Church nearby feeds them and provides other services, so there are usually a handful of folks, who have some kind of problem that I have never had to deal with, waiting in the summer heat or the winter cold for the doors to open so they can get the help they need. I talk to these folks as I walk by. Some of them ignore me. Most of them smile and return the greeting.

But occasionally, I meet someone who just stares at me, like, "What is her story?"

And the funny thing about this is that they assume I have one.

"It's going to be cooler tomorrow!" I announced yesterday to a gentleman sitting on the steps. Only as I got closer did I notice he had his head under his T-shirt. He pulled it out when he heard me.

"It's going to be really cool," I repeated to the confused-looking fellow. "Much cooler than normal!"

He stared at me as if I was speaking in code. I could tell that—whatever he thought of me—he assumed I knew what I was talking about. He thought I had it together. He had no way of knowing how many days I wondered if hiding under my own T-shirt might not be the best strate-

I realized by then that he had some cognitive problem, but I felt I needed to wrap up the conversation anyway—just for the sake of politeness.

"So, you take care, OK?"

I waved and headed off, realizing I had just embarrassed myself in front of a man who was hiding under his own T-shirt.

We are all making up stories for one another without knowing what the real story

The story I make up for myself when I am anxious is that I am failing—somehow, somewhere—and no one has told me how or why. But I have no idea why that man was hiding under his T-shirt, and I'm betting his reasons were a lot better than mine.

By now I know that my anxiety is a mood, that it will pass. As uncomfortable and demanding as it is in the moment, it is almost impossible to remember after the fact. Walking helps. And talking to people—even folks who seem a little confused—helps as well.

It is cooler today—just as I promised the fellow on the steps it would be. I am going to put on my shoes right now and talk to some strangers.

Henderson (239 yards, 1 TD). The Falcons will also be looking for another big day from wide receiver Marcus Hopes (15 receptions, 282 yards, 4 TDs), who led the district in receiving yards in non-district games. My pick, Davis 31, Spring 30

Nimitz vs. Eisenhower: Cornelius Harmon's Cougars will take on Odell James's Eagles on Friday night at George Stadium in Spring ISD. Nimitz won its first three games of the season thanks to a potent offense led by quarterback Albert Brown (664 passing yards, 8 TDS) and running backs Landon Jenkins (147 yards), Miles Brashard (142 yards, 1 TD), Malachi Augustus (278 yards, 1 TD/16 receptions, 278 yards, 4 TDs) and Kaden Phillips (202 yards, 2 TDs/10 receptions, 202 yards, 4 TDs). The Eagles are led on offense by running back Ulysses Thibodeaux (137 yards), quarterback Jared Guter (237 passing yards, 3 TDs) and wide receiver Daylan McHenry (7 receptions, 101 yards). My pick, Nimitz 34, Eisenhower 30

NCAA

Notre Dame at Duke: Notre Dame travels to Durham, N.C. to take on a feisty Duke team that already owns an upset win over Clemson. The Blue Devils are going hunting for another big win when they take on the No. 9ranked Fighting Irish on Saturday. The Duke defense will get a real test against an explosive ND offense, led by quarterback Sam Hartman (1,061 yards, 13 TDS/0 interceptions), running back Audric Estime (521 yards, 5 TDs) and wide receivers Chris Tyree (8 receptions, 216 yards, 5 TDs) and Jayden Thomas (12 receptions, 188 yards, 1 TD). Duke has one of the better dual threat QBs in the country in Riley Leonard (530

passing yards, 1 TD/208 rushing yards, 3 TDs). Riley has some weapons of his own in running back Jordan Waters (240 yards, 5 TDs) and wide receiver Jalon Calhoun (14 receptions, 142 yards, 1 TD). This should be a fun game to watch, but look for ND's overall speed on both sides of the ball to wear down Duke as ND pulls it out late. My pick, Notre Dame 38, Duke 24

Kansas at Texas: No. 3ranked Texas hosts the explosive Kansas Jayhawks in a key Big 12 game for both teams. Two years ago, Kansas shocked the Longhorns and first-year head coach Steve Sarkisian, 57-56 in Austin. Two years later, Sark has built a CFP contender and he knows his Longhorns cannot afford to look past any team from here on out. Two weeks ago, UT scored 21 fourth-quarter points to pull away from a game Wyoming team on the way to a 31-10 win in Austin. UT has gotten solid play out of QB Quinn Ewers (740 yards, 8 TDs) and running back Jonathon Banks (273 yards, 1 TD). But it's the receiving corps that has made the Texas offense a beast, led by wide receivers Xavier Worthy (16 receptions, 221 yards, 2 TDs) and Adonai Mitchell (9 receptions, 134 yards, 3 TDs) and tight end Ja'Tavion Sanders (7 receptions, 158 yards, 1 TD). Kansas has some weapons of its own in veteran QB Jalon Daniels (575 yards, 2 TDs), running back Devin Neal (303 yards, 5 TDs) and wide receiver Lawrence Arnold (14 receptions, 212 yards). Look for the Jayhawks to give Texas a game, but the UT defense will be the difference maker in this one as Texas continues to roll. My pick, Texas 36, Kansas 23

Texas A&M vs. Arkansas: The Aggies and Razorbacks meeting at AT&T Stadium in

Arlington in a key SEC West game for both teams. Two weeks ago, the Aggies took care of business at Kyle Field with a 44-3 thumping of Louisiana-Monroe, while the Hogs lost at home to BYU. A&M has a strong passing game led by QB Conner Weigman (909 yards, 8 TDS) and big-play wide receivers Evan Stewart (19 receptions, 257 yards, 2 TDs) and Anias Smith (13 receptions, 194 yards). Arkansas is led by QB KJ Jefferson (629 yards, 6 TDs), running back AJ Green (190 yards, 2 TDs) and wide receiver Andrew Armstrong (18 receptions, 197 vards, 3 TDs), A&M head coach Jimbo Fisher knows he needs to be competitive in the SEC West this year or his seat could get warm. Look for the Aggies to pull this one out as they pick up a big league win. My pick, Texas A&M 33, Arkansas 20

USC at Colorado: No. 5ranked USC travels to Boulder to take on No. 19-ranked Colorado in a key Pac 12 contest for both teams. The Buffs have been the darlings of college football this year led by first-year head coach Deion Sanders. Two weeks ago, Colorado pulled out a 43-35 double overtime win over state rival Colorado State, while USC breezed to their third straight blowout win with a 56-10 thrashing of Stanford. The Trojans are led by 2022 Heisman Trophy winner Caleb Williams (878 passing yards, 12 TDs), running back Marshawn Lloyd (195 yards, 2 TDs) and wide receiver Tahj Washington (9 receptions, 233 yards, 3 TDs). USC is averaging an eye-popping 59 points per game, which means the CU defense will have its hands full come Saturday. The Buffs have a powerful offense led by Deion's son, Shedeur Sanders (1,251 passing yards, 10 TDs), running back Dylan Edwards (136 rushing yards, 1 TD/14 receptions, 160 yards, 3 TDs) and wide receiver Xavier Weaver (25 receptions, 386 yards, 2 TDs). This will be USC's first real test and I think CU hangs with them for a while, but look for Williams to be the difference maker in this one as the Trojans pick up a big road win. Detroit at Green Bay: Week 4 kicks off on Thursday Night Football with a key NFC North contest pitting the Lions against

the Packers at Lambeau Field in Green Bay. Two weeks ago, both teams lost their first games of the year as the Lions fell at home in overtime to Seattle, 37-31, while the Packers fell at Atlanta, 25-24. Packer fans were wondering how Jordan Love would handle stepping into for Packer QB great Aaron Rodgers' shoes and taking over at QB. So far, so good. In his first two games, Love has passed for 394 yards and six TDs. The Lions opened the season by upsetting the Chiefs in KC, but then had their home opener spoiled by the Seahawks. Detroit has a potent offense led by QB Jared Goff (576 yards, 4 TDs) and wide receiver Amon-Ra St. Brown (13 receptions, 173 yards, 1 TD). Detroit eliminated the Packers from the playoffs by winning at Lambeau in the final game of the season and Rodgers' final game as a Packer. Green Bay will get pay back come Thursday night. My pick, Green Bay 31, Detroit 24

Pittsburgh at Houston: The Steelers and their loyal fans come calling at NRG Stadium on Sunday and the Texans had better hope their offensive line plays better or it could be a long day for rookie QB C.J. Stroud. In their first two games, the Steeler defense has nine sacks, with six coming in their 26-22 win over Cleveland two weeks ago. The Steeler "D" also forced four turnovers in the win over the Browns. Their offense is so-so, led by second-year QB Kenny Pickett (454 yards, 2 TDs) and wide receiver George Pickens (9 receptions, 163 yards, 1 TD). Stroud (626 yards, 2 TDs) did pass for 384 yards and two TDs in the 31-20 loss at home against the Colts, and while the passing game did well, the running game was once again stymied. Houston must get running back Dameon Pierce untracked to take pressure off of Stroud. It could be another long day for the young QB on Sunday. My pick, Pittsburgh 26,

New England at Dallas: Bill Belichick's Patriots visit AT&T Stadium on Sunday to take on a Dallas defense that has gotten off to an amazing start. In their first two games, the Cowboys defense has allowed just 10 points, recorded 10 sacks and has forced nine turnovers. The Patriots dropped their first two games, but QB Mac Jones (547 yards, 4 TDs) appears to be playing better after

a sophomore slump. The Dallas offense is led by QB Dak Prescott (398 yards, 2 TDs), running back Tony Pollard (142 yards, 1 TD) and wide receiver CeeDee Lamb (15 receptions, 220 yards). Kansas City at New York Jets: The Chiefs take on the Jets on Sunday Night Football in what many had hoped would be a meeting between two of the best QBs in the league in Patrick Mahomes (531 yards, 4 Yds) and Aaron Rodgers. But Rodgers suffered a season-ending Achilles injury on the fourth play as a Jet in Week 1, to spoil what could have been a very special night. Instead, Mahomes and the Chiefs will now face Zac Wilson, who threw three interceptions two weeks ago in a 30-10 loss at Dallas. While the Jets were losing, the Chiefs picked up their first win with a hard-fought 17-9 win over Jacksonville. Seattle at New York Giants: Week 4 concludes on Monday Night Football with the Seahawks making the cross country trip to New Jersey to face a Giants team that might have saved its season in Week 2 by overcoming a 21point deficit at Arizona to win 31-28. That victory was a costly one as star running back Saquon Barkley (114 yards, 1 TD) sustained a sprained ankle and will be out at least three weeks. That means QB Daniel Jones (321 yards, 2 TDs) will need to step up and take over the offense. Seattle put up 37 points at Detroit behind QB Geno Smith (440 yards, 3 TDs), running back Kenneth Walker III (107 yards, 2 TDs) and wide receivers D.K.
