\$1.82 Billion Bond Issue also on Ballot

ALDINE - The East Aldine District office building was the location for a well attended Candidate Forum for open seats on the Aldine ISD school board for the next term. Originally scheduled to take place at the BakerRipley campus, it was moved to this location when BakerRipley's building was needed by the Red Cross for disaster relief after a huge apartment fire in Cypress Station. The audience of about 75 interested citizens were able to make the move to the new location next door.

The Forum was sponsored by BakerRipley and the Green Forest Civic Club. GFCC president Selina Valdez was the emcee, and Linda Morales, well-known local political activist, was the discussion moderator.

There are four open positions on the ballot, with ten announced candidates for these. Positions 1, 2, and 6 have one challenger to the incumbents who are running, and Position 7 has three challengers to the incumbent who is running for reelection.

For Position 1, Jill Metcalfe is challenging incumbent president Randy Bates, Jr.

For Position 2, Zaheer Malik is challenging incumbent Paul Shanklin.

For Position 6, Araceli Ramos is challenging incumbent Kimberley Booker

For Position 7, incumbent Viola Garcia is challenged by candidates Steve Moore, Belinda Valdivia, and Mikela Levi.

The Forum lasted for about 90 minutes, and was ably moderated by Linda Morales. She limited each speaker to one minute for their portion of a statement or rebuttal.

The Forum started with each candidate presenting

a brief biography, and a statement of their interest in the position on the board.

Next each candidate was asked to respond to specific questions prepared by the host sponsors, (with some questions suggested by the audience).

Questions presented to the panel for response included:

- 1. Why should I vote for you?2. What do you see as
- 2. What do you see as your duties or responsibilities as a board member?
- 3. How do you feel a board member should hold the Superintendent accountable?
- 4. What is your position on passing the \$1.8 Billion bond issue. You may com-

ment on each of the 3 separate bonds, or total.

5. What is your position on the use of Eminent Domain by the School District to acquire property?

6. If elected, what are your 2 top priorities to be accomplished?

Candidate Randy Bates is an attorney for 40 years. He has 25 years experience governing educational organizations including the Aldine ISD and Lone Star College boards. He is currently president of the AISD board. He is for seeking good teachers and better pay for them. He supports the Bond issue, as it sets a higher level of achievement for the district for the future. He seems to be in favor of the

use of Eminent Domain, especially for the Upchurch property, and said the issue will be decided at a board meeting in October. However, some members of the panel disagreed, saying it had already been voted on at a previous board meeting.

Candidate Jill Metcalfe said she was certified as a teacher, principal, and superintendent, and has worked in the Aldine transportation department. Currently she is an administrator at Lone Star College.Her priorities as a board member would be a safe environment, and high academic achievement or skill set for graduates. She says board members should set the vision for the district, have a strategic plan, and monitor its progress. She is against the bond issue at this time, but perhaps later it could be adopted. She is against Eminent Domain use to acquire the Upchurch property or any legacy property adjoining AISD.

Candidate Zaheer Malik is a graduate of Eisenhower High School, has been a teacher in Aldine, a contractor, and is now an Electrical Engineer. His priorities would be improving student achievement,



House Fire in the Northline Area on Julia Street

HOUSTON -- The Houston Fire Department reports a House fire on September 27, 2023, at 5:57 p.m.

The House was located at the 200 block of Julia St. 77022. Estimated damage was \$260,000. There were no reported injuries.

Cause of the fire is under investigation. Firefighters arrived on scene within five minutes to find fire

Houston police are investigating a fatal crash that occurred at 5100 North Freeway (North Interstate Highway 45) about 4:15 a.m. (Sept. 25).

The identity of the deceased male is pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences.

HPD Vehicular Crimes Division Sergeant R. Dallas and Officer C. Moralez reported:

A male driving a silver Nissan Xter-

ra northbound entered the North Freeway near the Airline Drive ramp. The Nissan then crossed four lanes of traffic and struck the concrete median. Both the driver and a second male were ejected from the vehicle. Houston Fire Department paramedics pronounced one male deceased at the scene and transported the other to Ben Taub Hospital in critical condition.

At this time, it is unknown who was driving the vehicle. The investigation is continuing.

For Hispanic Heritage Month, Tuscano promotes the diversity of cultures within his campus. He pushes the staff and students to share their cultures with the others.


Mayor Turner's 2023 State of the City

HOUSTON - Mayor Sylvester Turner delivered his eighth and final State of the City address Wednesday to a sold-out audience of 1,500 community members and business leaders. The mayor began his remarks by thanking Houstonians for their support and highlighting the work of all City of Houston employees. He gave special recognition to 35 outstanding municipal workers who have demonstrated dedication and passion for serving the public. A highlight of the event included the release of "A Winning Legacy," a book detailing the mayor's achievements and legacy of resilience and transformation during his administration.

"Together, we have faced many storms – seven federally declared disasters in eight years. From floods or a freeze, from a Super Bowl or the pandemic, we rose and met the challenges of the day," said the mayor. "From inequities in neighborhoods investments to billions of dollars in pension unfunded liabilities, from One Safe Houston to One Clean Houston, we confronted each issue head on and set the City on firmer footing."

Speech Highlights:

- During the address, Mayor Turner announced the City of Houston and FEMA have reached an agreement on building a new municipal courts building damaged during Hurricane Harvey.
- His administration will leave a \$420 million surplus to the next mayor's administration. When Mayor Turner was elected, the City faced a \$160M deficit.
- The City's pension liability has been reduced from \$8.2 billion when he became mayor to \$2.2 billion
- Houston will get nearly \$2 billion in the coming years to transform the convention center and the surrounding district, a project that will catalyze further development in that part of downtown.
- The Sunnyside Solar Farm will be operational in 2024.
- Groundbreaking of a new cutting edge Solid Waste Northeast Transfer Station to open in 2025.
- The North Canal Stormwater Project and the Lake Livingston Flood Water-gates in Kingwood are in the design stage.
- The I-45 Expansion Project is moving forward.

Abbott Ties Voucher Passage to Teacher Pay, School Funding

Gov. Greg Abbott, just hours after the Senate initially approved a school voucher measure, said he would add teacher raises and increased public school funding to the ongoing special session agenda if the Texas Legislature passes his voucher plan, the Texas Tribune reporteD.

"I want to make sure we provide a carrot to make sure this legislation gets passed," Abbott said of vouchers. "Once [education savings accounts] are passed, I will put on the legislative agenda full funding for public education, including teacher pay raises for teachers across the state."

However, Democratic and rural Republican legislators remain opposed to vouchers, maintaining vouchers would drain funding for public schools, the Texas Standard reported.

"Every dollar that we spend on a voucher is going to be a dollar that is taken away from being able to invest in public education," Rep. Stan Lambert, R-Abilene, said.

State Sen. Robert Nichols, R-Jacksonville, called Abbott's approach a "political threat." He said most constituents in his district would find it a hardship to send their children to private schools because of the distance and cost.

"Most of my constituents, even with an \$8,000 discount, the private school is probably so far away, they're going to have to travel 30 or 40 miles to get to a private school," Nichols said. "And they still won't be able to afford the balance of what's owed."

The Senate bill initially approved would give families who opt for private schools \$8,000 of public money each year.

PATRICK: NO REASON TO RETURN PAC MONEY

Lt. Gov Dan Patrick says he has no intention of returning \$3 million in political contributions received from a political action committee whose leader met with an avowed Nazi sympathizer earlier this month, the Austin American-Statesman reported.

Former state representative Jonathan Stickland, now head of the Defend Texas Liberty PAC, met with white supremacist Nick Fuentes for several hours, prompting a number of Republican law-makers to donate money they received from the PAC to pro-



Israel charities at the urging of House Speaker Dade Phelan, R-Beaumont.

Patrick and Phelan have been feuding for months, especially over the impeachment and ultimate acquittal of Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton. Patrick called on Phelan to resign after the speaker demanded he return the \$3 mil-

"I didn't think even Dade Phelan would stoop this low," Patrick said in a statement. "He has now absolutely hit rock bottom. His latest stunt is disgusting, despicable and disingenuous."

Phelan pushed back. "I didn't take \$3 million from a PAC that associates itself with Nazis and Nazi sympathizers. That's not my problem," he said

TWO TEXAS CONGRESSMEN OPPOSE BULLET TRAIN

Two Texas congressmen are trying to stop funding for a bullet train from Houston to Dallas, the Houston Chronicle reported. U.S. Reps. Jake Ellzey and Michael McCaul, both Republicans, have asked the federal Department of Transportation to deny federal funding for the project, announced recently as a collaboration between Amtrak and Texas Central Railroad.

The proposed route of 240 miles would have a travel time of 90 minutes – less than half the time it takes to travel by

"At its core, this project is intended to take land from American citizens and put it under the control of a Japanese company, which is itself subsidized using money from U.S. taxpayers," the two congressmen wrote in part.

A number of Texas landowners have expressed concern about the route cutting through their farmland.

"Landowners deserve to

have their land rights protected against the unrealistic and financially infeasible rail project proposed to be funded through these applications," McCaul and Ellzey said in their letter. ONLY TWO TEXAS

UNIVERSITIES CRACK TOP 100

Only two Texas universities managed to crack the top 100 in the Wall Street Journal's annual ranking, the Houston Chronicle reported. Texas A&M was ranked 38th, while Rice University came in at 64th. The University of Texas came in at No. 118, according to the rankings.

"To generate the rankings, the Journal partnered with research groups College Pulse and Statista to analyze a mountain of data, measuring everything from expected student salaries and years needed to pay for attendance to the quality of the school's 'learning-related facilities' and oncampus diversity," the Chronicle reported.

Twenty Texas colleges and universities made the top 400. Princeton University was ranked No. 1 overall.

MORE THAN 50,000 MIGRANTS BUSED ELSEWHERE

The state of Texas has bused more than 50,000 migrants to what Gov. Greg Abbott terms sanctuary cities since the launch of Operation Lone Star, his office announced. The migrants have been bused to Washington, D.C., New York City, Chicago, Philadelphia, Denver and Los Angeles since April 2022.

Enhancing border security is one of the items Abbott has called upon the Legislature to address in the special session now underway. He is proposing a law that allows all licensed law enforcement officers in Texas to arrest anyone who illegally enters Texas.

INCREASED FOCUS ON PEDESTRIAN SAFETY THIS MONTH

Last October marked the highest number of vehicle-pedestrian crashes, which is why the Texas Department of Transportation is pleading with drivers this month to be more aware of "our most vulnerable road users."

"As we shift to fewer hours of daylight, it's up to drivers and pedestrians to adapt and help keep our roads safe," said TxDOT Executive Director Marc Williams. "Motorists need to stay alert and look for people walking, and pedestrians can take measures to be seen by drivers who may be inattentive behind the wheel."

In 2022, 5,764 traffic crashes involving pedestrians occurred in Texas, resulting in 829 deaths and 1,526 serious injuries.

I try not to hold them up too long. I don't stop runners because that seems rude. But most people strolling along with their dog don't seem to mind me scratching their dog's ears and maybe getting a dog kiss.

If the conversation is going well, I sometimes learn the dog's name. Learning his name is Barney extends our meet-and-greet time because then I get to say, "Oh, Barney! What do you think of this weather?"

Barney is even more delighted because not only am I "A Friend," I am "A Friend Who Knows His Name!" which is the very best kind. This seems to work equally well in English and Spanish, in the city or hiking through the woods.


Before we take a look at this week's games, let's review last week's record. A 6-6 week brought the record to 34-28 (55%).

HIGH SCHOOL

MacArthur at Westfield -Wayne Crawford's Generals take on District 14-6A leader Westfield on Thursday night at Planet Ford Stadium. Two weeks ago, the Generals fell to Eisenhower, while Westfield took down Nimitz, 42-28. The Generals will look for a solid game from QB Derrick McNeil (81 yards, 2 TDs). The MacArthur defense will be tested by Westfield QB Miles Dent (733, vards. 9 TDs) and wide receiver Austin Abrams (19 receptions, 212 yards). My pick, Westfield 34, MacArthur 18

Eisenhower vs. Davis: Odell James' Eagles take on Kelvin Chatman's Falcons on Thursday night at George Stadium in an important league game for both squads. The winner remains alive for one of the district's four playoff berths, while the loser could be on the inside looking in. Two weeks ago, lke defeated MacArthur 40-6, while Davis fell to Dekaney in a 49-42 shootout. Eisenhower is led by QB Jared Guter (559 yards, 3 TDs) and wide receiver Ulysses Thibodeaux, (13 receptions, 180 yards) while Davis is led by QB Kamryn Jackson (1,303 yards, 13 TDs/218 rushing yards), and wide receivers J'Marcus Hopes (15 receptions, 282 yards) and Treveon Bossier (14 receptions, 203 yards). My pick, Davis 24, Eisenhower 22

Aldine vs. Nimitz: Cirilo Ojeda's Mustangs take on Cornelius Harmon's Cougars on Friday night at George Stadium. Two weeks ago, Aldine fell to Spring, while Nimitz suffered its



first loss of the year, 42-28 to Westfield. Look for Nimitz to rally behind QB Albert Brown (1,128 yards, 12 TDs), running back Brashard Miles (234 yards) and wide receivers Ke'lyn Washom, (15 receptions, 190 yards), Malachi Augustus (16 receptions, 278 yards)and Kaden Phillips (10 receptions, 202 yards). Aldine will be led by running back Rory Hernandez (210 yards). My pick, Nimitz 34, Aldine 17

NCAA

Duke at Florida State: No. 17-ranked Duke travels to Tallahassee to take on No. 5ranked Florida State in an ACC battle. The Blue Devils hope to have dual-threat quarterback Riley Leonard (912 passing yards, 3 TDs/326 rushing yards, 4 TDs) back for this one and they will need him against the highscoring Seminoles. Leonard sustained an ankle injury in Duke's 21-14 loss to Notre Dame on Sept. 30. He missed last week's game against North Carolina State. If Leonard is out, that could limit big-play wide receiver Jordan Moore (24 receptions, 313 yards, 4 TDs) But it's the Duke defense that will have its hands full come Saturday with FSU QB Jordan Travis (1,198 yards, 12 TDs), running back Troy Benson (496 yards, 6 TDs) and wide receivers Johnny Williams (20 receptions, 357 yards, 2 TDs) and Keon Coleman (20 receptions, 278 yards, 6 TDs). The 'Noels not only want to win the ACC, but also have dreams of a berth in the College Football Playoff. Look for them to roll on Saturday. My pick, Florida State 36, Duke

Penn State at Ohio State: This is a huge one in the Big 10 for both teams as No. 6-ranked Penn State visits No. 3-ranked Ohio State on Saturday. Both teams won their first five games with relative ease and this should be a competitive contest. The Nittany Lions have a balanced offense led by QB Drew Allar (1,092 yards, 9 TDs) and one of the most explosive running backs in the country in Keytron Allen (307 yards, 2 TDs). They also have a big-play wide receiver in KeAndre Lambert-Smith (25 receptions, 372 yards, 3 TDs). The Buckeyes have some weapons of their own in first-year starting QB Kyle McCord (1,375 yards, 8 TDs), veteran running back TreVeon Henderson (295 yards, 5 TDs) and perhaps the best wide receiver in the land in Marvin Harrison Jr. (25 receptions, 499 yards, 4 TDs). OSU proved it can win a tight game as evidenced by its road win at Notre Dame. Look for Henderson to the difference maker in this one as OSU sets it sites on No. 2-ranked Michigan in the final week of the season. My pick, Ohio State 26, Penn State

Tennessee at Alabama: The Vols visit the Tide on Saturday looking for a second straight win over Nick Saban's team. A year ago, the Vols won in Knoxville on a last-second field goal to finish off a wild 52-49 win. I don't think this will be the offensive shootout that it was a year ago, but Tennessee can put points on the board behind QB Joe Milton III (1,164 yards, 9 TDs), running back Jaylen Wright (435 yards, 1 TD) and wide receiver Squirrel White (26 receptions, 276 yards). After a Week 2 loss at home to Texas, 'Bama has reeled off four straight wins and QB Jalen Milroe (1,159 yards, 9 TDs) is improving as a passer week-by-week. Two weeks ago, in a 26-20 win at Texas A&M, Milroe hooked up with wide receiver Jermaine

Burton (17 receptions, 386 yards, 4 TDs) nine times for 197 yards and two TDs. Running back Jase McClellan (371 yards, 3 TDs) is also finding his groove, along with the 'Tide defense that allowed just three points to the Aggies in the second half. Look for a solid effort on both sides of the ball come Saturday as Alabama looks to keep ahold of the top spot in the SEC West. My pick, Alabama 27, Tennessee 18

NFL

Jacksonville at New Orleans: Week 8 of the NFL season kicks off with Thursday Night Football as the Jaguars visit the Big Easy to take on the Saints in what should be a competitive contest. After losing two of their first three games, the Jags won two straight in London (over Atlanta and Buffalo) to move into first place in the AFC South, while the Saints also won three of their first five games. It looks like Jacksonville QB Trevor Lawrence (1,255 yards, 5 TDs) is finding his groove, along with running back Travis Etienne (396 yards, 3 TDs). Lawrence has two solid targets to throw to in wide receivers Christian Kirk (30 receptions, 335 yards, 1 TD) and Calvin Ridley (22 receptions, 333 yards, 2 TDs). The Saints have gotten decent play from QB Derek Carr (946 yards, 4 TDS) and wide receiver Chris Olave (25 receptions, 381 yards, 1 TD). Having running back Alvin Kamara (131 yards, 1 TD in 2 games) back has also been a boost to the NO offense. Look for the Saints defense to be the difference maker in this one as NO picks up the win on Thursday night. My pick, New Orleans 24,

Detroit at Baltimore: This will be a good road test for the Lions. who have been taken control of the NFC North thus far. Two weeks ago, Detroit blew out Carolina. QB Jared Goff (1,265 yards, 9 TDs) and running back David Montgomery (371 yards, 6 TDs) have the offense rolling. Goff has two big-play targets in wide receiver Amon-Ra St. Brown (26 receptions, 331 yards, 2 TDs) and rookie tight end Sam LaPorta (25 receptions, 289 yards, 3 TDs). That offense will be tested by a solid Baltimore defense, but it's the Ravens offense that should have its fans concerned. QB Lamar Jackson (1,030 passing yards, 4 TDs/265 rushing yards, 4 TDs) is pretty much a one-man offense. Baltimore is having trouble running the ball and Jackson has only one legitimate weapon in the passing game in tight end Mark Andrews (20 receptions, 225 yards, 3 TDs). The Lions defense is banged up, so look for Jackson to have a big day running and passing come Sunday. My pick, Baltimore 24, Detroit 20

Cleveland at Indianapolis: A key AFC game for both teams who so far are alive in their respective division races (Cleveland in the AFC North and Indy in the AFC South) and in the Wild Card race. The Browns had a bye week two weeks ago and should have QB Deshaun Watson (678 yards, 4 TDs) back after he missed his team's Oct. 1 home loss to Baltimore with a shoulder injury. If Watson is back, he will look to make plays down field to wide receiver Amari Cooper (18 receptions, 259 yards, 1 TD). The Colts could be without rookie QB Anthony Richardson who injured his shoulder two weeks ago in a win over Tennessee. Indy has a capable backup in Gardner Minshew (553 yards, 2 TDs). Indy also has star running back Jonathan Taylor back after he missed his team's first four games. His backup, Zac Moss (445 yards, 3 TDs) filled in well and the Colts should use both of them to pound the ball. My pick, Indianapolis 23, Cleveland 20

Los Angeles Chargers at Kansas City: A big one in the AFC West pits the Chargers against the Chiefs at Arrowhead Stadium. The Chargers are hoping to have versatile running back Austin Ekeler back for this one after missing three of the team's first four games with an ankle injury. If Ekeler is back, that should only help QB Justin Herbert (1,106 yards, 7 TDs) and wide receiver Keenan Allen (35 receptions, 434 yards, 3 TDs) The Chiefs will do what the Chiefs do, and that's to let QB Patrick Mahomes (1,287 yards, 10 TDs) make plays down field to tight end Travis Kelce (27 receptions, 222 yards, 3 TDs) KC also has found a running back behind second-year back Isiah Pacheco (325 yards, 3 TDs). The Chiefs own the Chargers, especially at home. Look for that trend to continue come Sunday. My pick, Kansas City 33, Los Angeles Chargers 24

Miami at Philadelphia: The

best Sunday Night Football game so far this season pits the Dolphins against the Eagles in what should be an offensive shootout. Miami is led by QB Tua Tagovailoa (1,614 yards, 11 TDs), wide receiver Tyreek Hill (36 receptions, 651 yards, 5 TDs) and rookie sensation running back De'Von Achane (460 yards, 5 TDs). Achane and Hill are two of the fastest players in the NFL, and they should provide a stern test to a sturdy Philly defense come Sunday night. The Eagles have a few weapons of their own on offense with QB Jalen Hurts (1,262 yards, 6 TDs/206 rushing yards, 4 TDs), running back D'Andrew Swift (424 yards, 2 TDs) and wide receiver A.J. Brown (35 receptions, 541 yards, 2 TDs) and Devonta Smith (23 receptions, 290 yards, 2 TDs). Miami struggled at Buffalo on Oct. 1 and was blown out, 48-20 by the Bills. I think head coach Mike McDaniel and his term learned a hard lesson in that one that should keep them focused on Sunday night, but winning at the Link is a tall order. Look for the Eagles to pick up the win in what should be a very entertaining game. My pick, Philadelphia 34, Miami 30 San Francisco at Minnesota:

Week 8 concludes on Monday Night Football when the 49ers visit the Vikings. Two weeks ago, SF routed Dallas 42-10 on Sunday Night Football, while the Vikings lost at home to the Chiefs. SF looks like a total team on both sides of the ball. On offense, they have a young QB in Brock Purdy (1,271 yards, 9 TDs) who has yet to lose a regular season game in his first two years in the league. They have perhaps the best running back in the NFL in Christian McCaffrey (510 yards, 8 total TDs) and a big-play wide receiver in Brandon Aiyuk (21 receptions, 378 yards, 2 TDs). They also have a ball hawking defense that can also pressure the QB. That's not good news for Kirk Cousins (1,498 yards, 13 TDs), who will be without star wide receiver Justin Jefferson (36 receptions, 571 yards, 3 TDs) who will miss at least four games with a hamstring injury after being placed on the injured reserve list. Looks like another win for the 49ers. My pick, San Francisco 31, Minnesota 18

and taking politics out of the classroom. He feels his work experience would make him able to monitor expenditures related to the Bond issue. He is not in favor of use of Eminent Do-

Candidate Paul Shanklin is an attorney and currently a board member, and has been for 10 years. He has taught at the University of Houston. His priorities are about the students, "we are here because we care about the children." He is also concerned about school safety, and advocates for public education, not vouchers. He is in favor of the Bond issue, "we must look ahead." He said the Eminent Domain issue has not been decided. He said a duty of a board member is to help select a superinten-

Candidate Araceli Ramos is a resident of Aldine for 35 years, with children in AISD. Her priorities are safe schools and quality education. She will be invollved in the schools, walking the classrooms. She will monitor the budget to control expenses. She is concerned that the district has lost 8500 students in the last 5 years, and suggested it is because the quality of education is not attractive.

Candidate <u>Kimberley</u> Booker is a professional educator and published author, and a current member of the school board. She has been an 8th grade principal. Her priorities for the students are safety, and academic success. She is concerned about the culture of AISD. She says a board member must know current school policy, help develop a good budget, and work closely with the Superintendent. On the Bond issue, she noted that the public has indicated they want to proceed with the funding, and she is concerned we will lose students if AISD does not have good facilities. On Eminent Domain, she said the whole story will be told at the next board meeting, but seemed to indicate she was in favor of its use when necessary.

Candidate Steve Moore is a local businessman and apartment developer, with a large number of housing units and employees in the Aldine area. He is concerned that Aldine ISD has slipped to the bottom 10% of the area in quality education. He said the classroom environment is not good, according to his personal observations. He wants the budget to move more dollars into classroom instruction. He is infavor of a safe, productive environment. He wants to see more trade classes taught and preparation for life skills, not just academics. He thinks the public should be heard at the start of each board meeting, not at the end. On the Bond issue, he is in favor because we need more resources to cope. On Eminent Domain, he wants to leave the Upchurch property alone, acquiring it at

a later date if necessary. Candidate Viola Garcia is a professional educator, teacher and principal. She is an incumbent on the board since 1993. Her 3 daughters graduated from Eisenhower HS. She holds positions on Texas and National school boards in addition to Aldine. She is in favor of public education, and her priorities are safety and quality education for the students. She is concerned about the loss of students in recent years. She believes the duties of

a board member are to hire

and evaluate a Superintendent, help set a budget, and be a trustworthy member of the board. On Eminent Domain, she said she did vote in favor of using it, but believes the circumstances have changed and the vote in October will be different for all.

Candidate <u>Belinda</u> <u>Valdivia</u> was not present for the Forum, without explanation.

Candidate Mikela Levi grew up in Acres Homes, and is a graduate of Carver High School. She is 27 years old, and believes her youth brings a better view of conditions. "I am your change agent" she said. She said she has a passion for advocacy and accountability. She is in favor of the school bond, saying we need the creative environment that will result. Her priorities are better pay for employees, and getting students career ready. She believes the duties of board members are to set policy, and accountability. On Eminent Domain, she is opposed to its use, saying we don't need it.

The meeting ended with each candidate giving a summary of the reasons to vote for them. About 75 persons attended the meeting, which was also hosted by the East Aldine District. Green Forest Civic Club president Selinz Valdez thanked all the attendees for their interest and civility in the event.

Valdez reminded all that Early Voting was from Oct. 23 to Nov. 3, with Election Day Nov. 7 from 7am to 7pm.

Registered voters can vote at any polliling place in Harris County. Polling locations are listed on the HarrisVotes.com website.




