

It's over. After months of anxiety, worry, and a new high blood pressure diagnosis, Travis Upchurch, Jr. can finally relax following a 7-0 vote by the Aldine ISD school board last Tuesday night to stop eminent domain proceedings against the 79-year-old.

Upchurch was relieved following the vote telling KPRC's Bryce Newberry, "I don't know what to say, but I'm just glad it turned out like that."

The Aldine ISD Board of Trustees voted to discontinue negotiations to purchase land from Travis Upchurch at 1810 Aldine Meadows and land owned by the Upchurch family at 1926 Aldine Meadows authorized by prior resolutions dated November 15, 2022, and April 18, 2023.

The land had been in


No. 1, No. 2 picks meet as Stroud faces Young: District 14-6A race coming down to the wire

When the Texans won their final game of the 2022 season, many Texan fans were disappointed that they had lost out on the overall first pick of the 2023 NFL Draft. Houston fans badly wanted the team to draft Alabama QB Bryce Young, considered by many draft experts as the top quarterback in last spring's draft.

The Texans selected Ohio State QB C.J. Stroud with the No. 2 overall pick. I think Texans fans are now happy with the selection.

After their first six games, Stroud has led his team to a 3-3 record and the Texans are serious contenders in the AFC South race and are also in the Wild Card hunt. Things haven't worked out as well for Young and the Carolina Panthers. Young and Carolina lost their first six games and looks like they could very well be drafting first in 2024.

Stroud and Young meet on Sunday in Charlotte when the Texans visit the Panthers. This is a very winnable game for the Texans and if they hope to remain in the playoff hunt, they



can't take the Panthers lightly. Young has done some good things thus far, but has thrown four interceptions in his first six games as a pro. Stroud threw his first interception two weeks ago in the Texans 20-13 win over the Saints. Ironically, Stroud's interception was returned to his team when the Saints defender fumbled and offensive lineman Tytus Howard recoverd it.

Talk about being at the right place at the right time!

While the Texans, who had last week off, take on the Panthers, the Cowboys, who also had their bye last week, host an improved Rams team on Sunday at AT&T Stadium. The Cowboys

need to win this one to keep within range of the Eagles in the NFC East race. Philly saw its undefeated season come to an end two weeks ago when they lost to the Jets.





Fatal Crash at 5100 **North Freeway**

Houston police are investigating a fatal crash that occurred at 5100 North Freeway (North Interstate Highway 45) about 4:15 a.m. Sept. 25.

The identity of the deceased male is pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences.

HPD Vehicular Crimes Division Sergeant R. Dallas and Officer C. Moralez reported:

A male driving a silver Nissan Xterra northbound entered the North Freeway near the Airline Drive ramp. The Nissan then crossed four lanes of traffic and struck the concrete median. Both the driver and a second male were ejected from the vehicle. Houston Fire Department paramedics pronounced one male deceased at the scene and transported the other to Ben Taub Hospital in critical condition.

At this time, it is unknown who was driving the vehicle. The investigation is continuing.

Motorcycle Fatality at 10,000 North Freeway

Houston police are investigating a fatal crash at 10000 North Freeway (North Interstate Highway 45) service road that occurred about 8 p.m. on Wednesday (October 18).

The identity of the deceased man, 58, is pending verification by the Harris County Institute of Forensic Sciences.

HPD Vehicular Crimes Division Sergeant M. Sudduth and Officer C. Brothers reported:

The man was operating a blue Honda VT1300 motorcycle northbound on the service road near the above address when he struck the divider between the entrance ramp of the freeway and the service road. Houston Fire Department paramedics responded to the scene and pronounced the man deceased.

No other persons or vehicles were involved in the crash.

To qualify for the program, students must meet the following eligibility requirements:

Must have a 3.5 GPA or higher at the time they apply. Weighted and unweighted GPAs are considered.

Must have a permanent address in the United States, a U.S. territory or U.S. military base, or attend a DoDEA school. U.S. citizenship is not required.

Must identify as Black, African American, Latino, Hispanic, Indigenous, Native, or attend high school in a rural area or small town.

Must have taken the PSAT 10

in spring 2022 or the PAST/NM-SQT in fall of 2022 or at least two distinct AP Exams in the eighth, ninth or tenth grade.

Schools earn this recognition based on a commitment to increasing college-going culture, providing opportunities for students to earn college credit and maximizing college readiness. Blanson CTE High School was won the AP Access Award, which recognizes schools that provide all students with the chance to participate in AP, including students of underrepresented populations.

Foroi also recognized the Houston Food Bank, which was represented by Kiana Anderson, Senior Manager of School Partnerships. The Houston Food Bank has been instrumental in supporting Aldine families and communities with a variety of

programs to meet the needs of feed insecurity. This year, the Houston Food Bank has provided support to hundreds of families in Aldine ISD.

Foroi also recognized FACE Family and Community Specialist Ivan Tamayo for the work he has done with FACE's Family and Community University. Tamayo's work with the program was recently highlighted at the Mayor's Adult Literacy Breakfast. This year, the university has already enrolled 637 parents in just one month, which is 78% of last year's enrollment.

My family and I want to personally thank the community members who rallied around my father in his time of need. Without the strong support of these individuals we could not have overturned the board's decision to take my father's home. Viola was the only board member to acknowledge that my family's pleas were being

Looking back on how this all started, when my father received his first notice about the eminent domain process, we discovered a few things that alarmed us. First off, the school board was informed from AISD staff assigned to this case that no one lived at my father's address. They didn't bother to leave a note, contact the family. go by the residence and notice dogs in the yard or simply look at the tax records to see that his house is homesteaded. The board was told it was vacant. Who presented such terrible, bad information to them? All this undue stress over an administrative oversight. We sure hope these same staff members aren't in charge of the bond that voters are being asked to shell out \$1.8 billion dollars for this week. If so, what other bad/misleading information are they presenting to the board that voted to put this on the ballot?

After pleading with the board for four months the decision was reversed last week at the October board meeting, suspiciously right before school board and bond voting begins. What perfect timing to reverse an egregious decision and to come out looking like heroes. Once my family and I had the chance to speak with school staff we discovered that the district did not want it for parking at all. The stated reason was for my dad's safety and that they had no plans for it as of yet. This is not how eminent domain works. One board member stated after being asked their stance on eminent domain during the Community Forum on 10/14/2023, "The public needs to educate themselves", but now it's clear that Aldine ISD is indeed the one who needs the education.

This has been a harsh, teachable moment for my family and the community. I would also like to thank the Aldine ISD staff who throughout this ordeal have been as helpful as they have been allowed to be. The professionalism of the staff at Aldine, despite the consequences of leadership's decisions, was admirable. I hope that new leadership can get elected soon for the sake of the staff of AISD and community members it serves. This negative attention on the district and turmoil to my family was easily avoidable. I hope the candidates on the ballot who decided to help my family (who, mind you, were in an impossible situation) have proven what they can do for the Aldine community. To our family, it's clear that the Aldine community is in desperate need for new board members who will insert integrity, thoroughness and some humility into their positions as trustees.

Early Voting Now Underway

Early voting is now underway for the Nov. 7 general election. Voters will decide the fate of 14 proposed amendments, including measures to provide property tax relief and raise the homestead exemption to \$100,000.

There are also bond elections for school districts across the state, as well as municipal and school board elections, depending on where you live. Contact your county's election administrator or check the county's website to see what local elections are being held.

HOUSE UNVEILS LIMITED **SCHOOL CHOICE PLAN**

The Republican chair of the Texas House public education committee has filed a bill that increases education funding with one-time bonuses for school employees as well as education savings accounts on a limited basis, The Dallas Morning News reported.

The Senate has already passed a voucher plan in this third session but the House has balked, with opposition coming from rural Republicans and most Democrats. State Rep. Brad Buckley, R-Salado, has said he would not call for a committee meeting unless Gov. Greg Abbott includes teacher pay raises and school financing as agenda items for this session. Abbott has maintained he wouldn't do so until the Legislature passed a voucher plan, or what he terms school

choice. 'We continue to have productive conversations with House members," Abbott spokesman Andrew Mahaleris told The News. "The governor looks forward to reaching an agreement on school choice, at which point he will gladly expand the call."

Meanwhile, House Democrats last week released their own plan to revamp school funding, which would provide a \$15,000 bonus for Texas school employees, admittedly a long shot.

"We have this bill today because it is the opposite of



a voucher scam," said Rep. Gene Wu, D-Houston. "We need the money that's in this bill because that is the future of Texas."

The bill would also increase per-student school funding by almost \$2,800. The likelihood of passage is slim in the GOP-dominated House.

VACCINE MANDATE BAN **PASSES SENATE**

A ban on COVID-19 vaccine mandates for employees of private businesses in Texas passed the Texas Senate Friday. The ban includes doctors' offices and other health facilities. though those facilities could employees to wear face

The bill passed 19-12 along party lines, according to the Texas Standard. Supporters said the bill allows individuals to make their own health care decisions without jeopardizing their

"No one should be forced to make that awful decision between making a living for their family and their health or individual vaccine preference," sponsor Sen. Mayes Middleton, R-Galveston, told senators during a hearing.

A state law banning governmental entities from requiring the COVID-19 vaccine passed during the regular session and went

After completing a complex project to remove surface casings on four wells plugged in the Neches River for more than four decades, the Texas Railroad Commission's well plugging program received accolades from the Interstate Oil and

Gas Compact Commission. The casings had posed risks to boaters as the river's depth decreased due to recent droughts.

"The commission has been nationally recognized for our well plugging program and this award is yet another example of the reputation we have gained in our commitment to protecting Texans and the environment," said Wei Wang, executive director.

The RRC has received more than \$300 million from the federal government to plug, remediate and reclaim orphaned wells across the state. The money came from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, passed by Congress during the first year of the Biden administration.

SUMMER HEAT WAVE SLOWS STATE ECONOMY

Besides making outdoor living and work miserable, last summer's record heat wave possibly cost the state's economy \$24 billion, according to economists with the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas. Their analysis found extreme heat reduced the state's gross domestic product by 1 percentage point, the Texas Tribune reported.

Extreme heat reduces agricultural production, slows down construction projects, and keeps people from going out to shop or dine, the analysis indicated. The sectors most affected by extreme heat were leisure, hospitality, and retail.

"The economy will need to adapt," Anil Kumar, an economic policy advisor and senior economist at the Dallas Fed and one of the authors of the analysis, told the Tribune. "Communities may adapt by adopting more technology to be more sustainable and other ways to mitigate the effects of heat waves."

The heat wave was also life-threatening. At least 97 Texans died from heat-related illness, according to the Texas Department of State Health Services.

TEXAS NAMED 'CUSSING CAPITAL' OF THE COUNTRY

An online search of Reddit posts conducted by BonusFinder.com indicates Texans topped all states in using profanity in posts, averaging 6.9 curse words per post, the Austin American-Statesman reported. That amount narrowly beat out Ohio and Florida. Somewhat surprisingly, New Yorkers didn't even make the top 10 in this pottymouth ranking.

In the 691 posts reviewed for Texas, there were 4,743 curse words, according to the survey.



No. 1, No. 2 picks meet as Stroud faces Young: District 14-6A race coming down to the wire

Football with the Raiders visiting the red hot Detroit Lions.

In college action, No. 6-ranked Oklahoma plays at Kansas in what could be a tough environment for Brent Venable's team. No. 9-ranked Oregon visits No. 14-ranked Utah in a key Pac 12 game while No. 1-ranked Georgia takes on arch-rival Florida in Jacksonville in what is dubbed as the world's Largest Cocktail

The District 14-6A season is winding down and a host of teams are battling for the four playoff berths. Westfield leads the league, with Nimitz, Dekaney and Spring are jockeying for the remaining three seeds. Nimitz and Spring meet on Friday night at George Stadium in an important game for both teams. Other games on tap this weekend have MacArthur visiting Dekaney on Thursday night, while Eisenhower will take on Aldine, also on Thursday night. Davis will take on Westfield on Friday night.

Before we take a look at this week's schedule, let's review last week's record. A 10-2 week (finally!) brought the season record to 44-30 (59%). Now, onto this week's games.

HIGH SCHOOL

Eisenhower vs. Aldine: Odell James' Eagles take on Cirilo Ojeda's Mustangs on Thursday night at George Stadium. Two weeks ago, the Eagles fell to Westfield, while the Mustangs lost to Dekaney. The Eagles will look to QB Jared Guter (559 yards, 3 TDs) to make plays to wideout Ulysses Thibodeaux (15 receptions, 193yards), while the Mustangs will rely on running back Rory Hernandez (210 yards, 4 TDs). My pick, Eisenhower 31, Aldine 18

MacArthur at Dekaney: Wayne Crawford's Mustangs take on Dekaney on Thursday night at Planet Ford Stadium in Spring ISD. Two weeks ago, the Generals lost to Spring, while Dekaney defeated Aldine. The MacArthur defense will try and slow down Dekaney running back Dylan Jones (823 yards, 11 TDs), QB Quinten Foster (852 yards, 9 TDs) and wide receiver David Edmondson (14 receptions, 171 yards.) The Generals will count



on QB Derrick McNeil (81 yards, 1 TD) to make plays downfield. My pick, Dekaney 26, MacArthur

Davis at Westfield: Kelvin's Chatman's Falcons take on Westfield on Friday night at Planet Ford Stadium in Spring ISD. Two weeks ago, Davis fell to Nimitz, 42-28, while Westfield defeated Eisenhower. The Falcons will look to QB Kamryn Jackson (1,303 passing yard, 13 TDs/218 rushing yards), wide receiver J'Marcus Hopes (32 receptions, 529yards) and Treveon Bossier (14 receptions, 203 yards) to make plays downfield, while Westfield will be led by running back Taji Atkins (479 yards). My pick, Westfield 33. Davis 21

Nimitz vs. Spring: Cornelius Harmon's Cougars face off against Spring in a key game for both teams on Friday night at George Stadium. This should be a high-scoring affair. The Cougars are led by QB Albert Brown (1,355 yards, 13 TDs), running back Brashard Miles (334 yards) and wide receivers Malachi Augustus (29 receptions, 521 yards), and Kaden Phillips (16 receptions, 229 yards). Spring is led by quarterback Ahran Ogbar (347 passing yards, 3 TDs/651 rushing yards), and running back Delonte Henderson (571 yards). My pick, Nimitz 34, Spring 31

Oklahoma at Kansas: The Sooners need to be wary of this game. They should enter with a 7-0 record (they played Central Florida last week) and in first place in the Big 12. Kansas is a dangerous team that can put points on the board and you can bet KU head coach Lance Leipold will have his Jayhawks fired up for this one. This could turn into

another Big 12 shootout as the Sooners have a potent offense led by QB Dillon Gabriel (1,878 yards, 16 TDs), running back Tawe Walker (239 yards, 4 TDs) and wide receiver Jalil Farouq (20 receptions, 415 yards, 2 TDs). The OU offense will be without its top wide receiver who suffered a season-ending injury two weeks ago. The Jayhawks have also been hit hard by the injury bug, most notably to dual-threat QB Jalen Daniels (705 passing yards, 5 TDs/74 rushing yards in three games). His backup, Jason Bean (913 yards, 9 TDS) has experience and the Jayhawks also have a strong running back in Devin Neal (659 yards, 6 TDs). Look for plenty of points in this one, but the OU defense will make a play or two down the stretch to keep the Sooners unbeaten. My pick, Oklahoma 34, Kansas 31

Oregon at Utah: Another tough road test for the No. 9ranked Oregon Ducks as they take on a defensive-minded Utah team on Saturday. Two weeks ago, Oregon lost a tough, 36-33 decision at Washington. This week, they face a Utah defense that allows just 9 points per game. Oregon has an explosive offense led by QB Bo Nix (1,796 yards, 17 TDs), running backs Bucky Irving (520 yards, 5 TDs) and Jordan James (360 yards, 8 TDs) and big-play wide receiver Troy Franklin (40 receptions, 689 vards, 8 TDs). Utah is hoping to have Cameron Rising (3,034 passing yards, 26 TDs/333 rushing yards, 1 TD in 2022) who has missed most of the season recovering from a torn ACL he suffered in the Rose Bowl in January. If Rising is back, he could be a difference maker in this game, but that's a big "if." The Utes will try to control the clock with the running game led by Ja'Quinden Jackson (333

yards, 1 TD). Oregon will provide a real test to the Utah defense. Look for the Oregon offense to roll in Utah on Saturday. My pick, Oregon 31, Utah 18

Georgia vs. Florida: These two long-time rivals meet once again at a neutral site in Jacksonville in an SEC East battle. The No. 1-ranked Bulldogs will be without their best offensive player for the rest of the regular season as tight end Brock Bowers (41 receptions, 566 yards, 4 TDs) sustained an ankle injury two weeks ago against Vanderbilt that required surgery. Bowers should return for the College Football Playoffs (CFP) should the Dogs advance to it. With Bowers out, sophomore QB Carson Beck (2,147 yards, 12 TDs) will have to rely on his running game led by Daijun Edwards (460 yards, 6 TDs) and wide receiver Marcus Rosemy-Jacksaint (18 receptions, 333 yards, 2 TDs) will need to step up his game. The Gators have been up and down this year, but they will be up for this one. If they hope to pull off the upset, QB Graham Mertz (1,872 yards, 12 TDs) will need to play his best game of the season. He will need help from running back Montrell Johnson Jr. (438 vards, 4 TDs) and Ricky Pearsall (43 receptions, 624 yards, 3 TDs). Look for the Georgia defense to step up and be the difference maker in this one. My pick, Georgia 30, Florida 16

Tampa Bay at Buffalo: Week 8 of the NFL season kicks off with Thursday Night Football with the Bucs visiting the Bills. Two weeks ago. TB lost at home to Detroit. while Buffalo rallied for a win over the Giants. The Bucs have been one of the surprise teams this year and are squarely in the hunt in the NFC South. QB Baker Mayfield (1,088 yards, 7 TDs) has been steady and he has two quality targets to throw to in wide receivers Mike Evans (24 receptions, 386 yards, 3 TDs) and Chris Godwin (27 receptions, 332 yards). The Bills will go as far as QB Josh Allen (1,576 yards, 13 TDs/131 rushing yards, 3 TDs) and wide receiver Stefon Diggs (49 receptions, 620 yards, 5 TDs) take them. The Buffalo defense has been playing well thus far and look for them to force a turnover or two as they get the win on Thursday night. My pick, Buffalo 24, Tampa Bay 20

Houston at Carolina: C.J. Stroud (1,660 yards, 9 TDs) and Bryce Young (967 yards, 6 TDs/4 interceptions) meet for the first time as the No. 2 overall pick (Stroud) and the No. 1 overall pick (Young) faceoff in Charlotte on Sunday. Stroud has been more consistent than Young has thus far in their young careers. Stroud is a big reason the Texans are 3-3 and in second place in the AFC South. Houston had a week off to prepare for this game and heal up. They should have a number of players back who missed the early portion of the season with injuries. Stroud has done a good job of spreading the ball around, especially to his top two targets, Nico Collins (29 receptions, 547 yards, 3 TDs) and Tank Dell (19 receptions, 324 yards, 2 TDs). DeMeco Ryan's defense has been a pleasant surprise and was a big reason why Houston upset New Orleans 20-13 two weeks ago. Young and the Panthers have had a rough start, losing their first six games. Wide receiver Adam Thielen (49 receptions, 509 yards, 4 TDs) has become Young's go-to guy, so look for the Texans secondary to try and take him out of the game. Houston is young and can't afford to take the Panthers for granted. If they hope to remain in the AFC South and Wild Card race, they must win games like this one. My

pick, Houston 26, Carolina 20 Los Angeles Rams at Dallas: The Cowboys come off their bye week and host a muchimproved Rams team on Sunday at AT&T Stadium. Two weeks ago, Dallas picked up a big road win with a 20-17 win over the Chargers on Monday Night Football. That was a big win considering the week before the Pokes were embarrassed on Sunday Night Football by the 49ers. The win over the Chargers, coupled with the Eagles loss to the Jets, left the Cowboys just one game behind Philly in the NFC East race. Dak Prescott (1,333 yards, 6 TDs) had a solid game in the win over the Chargers (227 passing yards, 1 passing TD, 1 rushing TD). If he will take what the defense gives him and not force things, the Dallas offense will be better off. The Cowboys need to get running back Tony Pollard (370 yards, 2 TDs) going. It appears wide receiver CeeDee Lamb (34 receptions, 475 yards, 1 TD) is poised for another big year. The Dallas defense will have its hands full with QB Matthew Stafford (1,677 yards, 6 TDs), running back Kryen Williams (456 yards, 6 TDs) and wide receivers Puka Nacua (50 receptions, 598 yards, 2 TDs) and Cooper Kupp (15 receptions, 266 yards, 1 TD in 2 games). Look for the Dallas defense to get after Stafford and be the difference maker in this one. My pick, Dallas 26, Los Angeles Rams 18

Cincinnati at San Francisco: This should be an interesting game as the red hot Bengals (winners of three of their last four games) visit the 49ers. Two weeks ago, Joe Burrow (1,240 vards. 7 TDs) led Cinci to a home win over Seattle, while the 49ers lost at Cleveland. Burrow appears fully healed from a calf injury that slowed the start of his season. He and wide receivers Ja'Marr Chase (50 receptions, 556 yards, 3 TDs) and Tyler Boyd (30 receptions, 204 yards, 1 TD) by a good SF defense. The 49er offense led by QB Brock Purdy (1,396 yards, 10 TDS), running back Christian McCaffrey (553 rushing yards/23 receptions, 177 yards, 10 total TDs) and wide receiver Brandon Aiyuk (25 receptions, 454 yards, 2 TDs) should be able to make plays against a so-so Bengal defense. Look for Purdy to have a big day as the 49ers get the win at home. My pick, San Francisco 30, Cincinnati 26

Las Vegas at Detroit: Week 8 concludes on Monday Night Football with the Raiders visiting the Lions. Detroit is playing as well as any team in the NFL and are serious Super Bowl contenders led by QB Jared Goff (1,618 yards, 11 TDs), wide receiver Amon-Ra St. Brown (35 receptions, 455 yards, 3 TDs) and rookie tight end Sam LaPorta (19 receptions, 341 yards, 3 TDs). The Lions might be without leading rusher David Montgomery (385 yards, 6 TDs) who suffered a rib injury two weeks ago in their win over Tampa Bay. The Raiders should be 4-3 when they visit the Motor City behind QB Jimmy Garoppolo (1,079 yards, 7 TDS), running back Josh Jacobs (312 yards, 2 TDs) and wide receiver Davante Adams (39 receptions, 471 yards, 3 TDs). Ford Field will be rocking as the Lions get some prime time love. Look for a big win on Monday night for the Lions. My pick, Detroit 31, Las Vegas 17

this matter is concluded. and all negotiations have ceased," read a statement by the district following the vote.

He specifically thanked Dr. Jill Metcalfe a former classmate and teacher in Aldine, community organizer Araceli Ramos, AISD school board member Viola Garcia, Chairman Carlos Silva of the East Aldine Management District, and old family friend and real estate broker Todd Edmonds who helped the family navigate the uncertain waters of eminent domain.

"Mrs. Garcia was the only board member that acknowledged our letters and phone calls we sent to all the board members, and we appreciate it," Upchurch said.

He also thanked the staff at the district who worked with him. "They were all very professional," he said.

One of the disappointments of the whole process for Upchurch and his siblings who all worked together to save their father's home, was board members who said they didn't know anyone lived at the property.

"They kept saying 'we have new information that's come to the board's attention and we're going to have another vote on it. You want to take a guess what that new information was? Someone lives there!" Upchurch said.

Upchurch had been before the school board with his siblings repeatedly and he found it incredulous that they wouldn't know his father was still living there.

'That also meant that nobody bothered to call him, send him a letter, knock on the door, leave a postcard on the gate or even notice the dogs running around in the yard!" he said.

'They didn't even look in the county records to see that the house is homesteaded."

Since July, Travis, his siblings, and strangers had come before the board and telling them to let him continue to live out

his life on the property. "I've been telling the board to their faces," he

He was stunned.

"I hope my father hasn't been used as a political pawn in all of this," he said.

Upchurch and his siblings weren't done with the district but have returned the favor to help some of their friends in their bid for board seats.

Apparently, the district also sent out an email to those who spoke on behalf of the Upchurch family announcing the board's

"We are thrilled to have this behind us," said Tara

Upchurch, the daughter. She said they did a lot of research and digging to find out how the board was operating and get the necessary details to defend their father and his

"No one really watches school boards and how much power they have. Now it makes me want to watch my own local board to find out what's happening with them," she said.

She said she wouldn't feel better about things in Aldine until after the elec-

"We can't vote, but we can get the word out and tell people what we've learned in our experience," she said.

Tara said they had fallen in love with the Aldine community again because they came out and supported her dad.

"It really feels like a win for everyone, not just

address. Voters are encouraged to review or print their sample ballot before heading to the polls. Voters can take their printed sample ballot into the voting booth for reference.

"Voters are encouraged to vote during one of the 12 days afforded by the early voting period and not wait until Election Day," added Clerk Hudspeth. "As usual, voters can vote at any one of the available Early Voting Centers in Harris County, near home, work, school, or wherever is most convenient."

The following forms of photo ID are acceptable when voting in person:

- Texas Driver's License issued by the Texas Department of Public Safety
 - Texas Election Identi-

fication Certificate issued by DPS

- Texas Personal Identification Card issued by DPS
 - Texas Handgun License issued by DPS
- United States Military Identification Card containing the person's photograph
- United States Citizenship Certificate containing the person's photograph
- United States Passport (book or card)

Voters who do not possess and cannot obtain one of these forms of photo ID may fill out a **Reasonable** Impediment Declaration (RID) at a Vote Center and present another form of ID, such as a utility bill, bank statement, government check, or voter registration certificate.

The deadline to request a ballot by mail for the November 7 election is Friday, October 27 (received, not postmarked). To be eligible to vote early by mail in Texas, you must:

- be 65 years or older,
 - be sick or disabled • be out of the county on
- election day and during the period for early voting by personal appearance
- be expected to give birth within three weeks before or after Election
- be confined in jail but otherwise eligible.

Part of East Aldine History: Hardware Store reaches 50 years, but still no Jed

For 50 years, residents of East Aldine have purchased everything from chicken feed, plumbing fixtures, screws, bolts, pipe and extension cords to gardening supplies, lumber and propane from Jed's Hardware.

At the intersection of the Eastex Freeway and Aldine Mail Route Road, the neighborhood institution was founded in 1973 by brothers Weldon and Clyde Bailey, who

grew up close by. That's right. There is no "Jed" at Jed's

Hardware. The name is an acronym for the kind of old-fashioned hardware store that Weldon Bailey used to visit with his dad, where customers would go in with a list of their needs and a clerk would "jot 'em down," recalled



Clyde Bailey, the younger of the brothers. Weldon came up with the idea for the name, "Jot 'em Down Store," but the cost of a sign led them to shorten the name to the first letters of the three words.

A big 50th anniversary party is in the works for 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 27. There will be good food, music, displays and many, many prizes at the store.

Weldon graduated from Aldine High School; Clyde was one of the first students to attend MacArthur High. For years, the siblings ran the business together with a familiarity and fondness for the particular and peculiar needs of their East Aldine neighbors.

"Weldon understood that people would always want feed," Clyde said, so the store still stocks a wide variety of livestock and chicken feed, not to mention a vast array of pet supplies and food.

Clyde, who said he "always enjoyed working the floor," was the hands-on brother who lunched with neighbors, joined the Rotary Club and stayed in touch with the needs

In 1994, after several pedestrians were struck by vehicles while walking along Aldine Mail Route, Clyde and his friends started trying to come up with a solution. Clyde was familiar with the then-new East Montgomery County Management District through his Rotary membership.

Not long after, he met with then-State Rep. Kevin Bailey and proposed the creation of

the East Aldine Management District.

Clyde Bailey was the first president of the District, which was initially housed in the same building complex as the hardware store.

"I haven't been following closely, but I know they are trying their best to bring really positive solutions in the area" now, Bailey said.

(To which the District staff and board would say, "Thank you, we are working hard,

listening to the community and succeeding!")

When the brothers retired, they turned the business over to Weldon's son-in-law, Eric Hall, who met Megan Bailey while they attended Texas Tech University.

Hall, who has a degree in finance, happily gave up his career in banking to run the business. The couple moved to Houston in 2015. Megan Bailey Hall works for a Galleria-area bank and

Eric coaches their daughter's soccer team. "What I really, really love about this is every day is something different," Hall said. "And I still do get calls,

just about every day, for people who want to talk to Hall is busy planning the anniversary celebration, which will include special 50-cent prices on many

hardware items, booths from many of the business' major suppliers, and the food, including a snow cone vendor, a taco truck, and hot dogs and hamburgers. There also will be free raffle tickets for prizes ranging from a microwave to a Stihl power saw.

The young businessman has put his own touches on ERIC HALL

the long-standing institution. Jed's is a member of the Do It Best Co-Op, which gives independent hardware stores the advantage of larger

purchasing power. Hall also decided to "open" up the middle of the store to prominently feature seasonal items that customers would be likely to purchase on impulse, as well as a variety of toys to tempt youngsters tagging along on errands.

Hall also made the decision to purchase a certain brand of lighting fixtures for the store because the brand's box labels (and accompanying instructions) are written in Spanish a feature aimed at East Aldine's largely bilingual population.

A native of Dallas, Hall even begrudgingly carries Houston Astros' trinkets and memorabilia. And, although he roots for the Texas Rangers, Hall has been known to don a big, foam Astros hat. But only at his employees' insistence.

Because many homes in the East Aldine community are older, Hall ensures that supplies are available for repairs to older plumbing and electrical fixtures. And, because many customers are long-time do-it-yourselfers, the business will do custom cuts on lumber, glass and sharpening of blades for power equipment.

Instead of renting turn-it-in propane cylinders, Hall has kept the business' more economical policy of refilling customers' own cylinders.

Although Hall and his family don't live in the neighborhood, he is committed to preserving the business' strong ties to the community.

After Hurricane Harvey in 2017 and during the Winter Storm Uri in 2021, Hall said, "I slept here in the store. I needed to be here, because I knew the people of this community were going to need us."

He proudly displays a 2017 award from the East Aldine Management District that named Jed's a Strategic Business Partner. He also makes every effort to offer part-time jobs to students at MacArthur High School. Sometimes, that means working around their sports teams' schedules, which Hall is glad to do. One valued long-time employee recently started college, and Hall allows him to schedule work around his classes.

"It is still a family business," Hall said. "If anybody has a problem, they can come and

talk to me. It's a very stimulating experience."

"I knew what I was getting into," he said, with a laugh. "But there are those days where I think 'if I didn't have any customers or employees, I could get some real work done." — by Anne Marie Kilday
