WHITMIRE ELECTED HOUSTON MAYOR; CANTU DEFEATED FOR COUNCIL

HOUSTON - Houston voters elected Democratic state Sen. John Whitmire as its next mayor, giving him a victory over U.S. Rep. Sheila Jackson Lee in the runoff. However, in another race closely watched by Aldine residents, Richard Cantu was not able to win a City Council at-large seat, defeated in a very close race by Twila Carter. Cantu received 83,715 votes, and Carter 86,386. In the Mayoral race, Whitmire received 128,908 votes, versus Jackson-Lee's total of 68,633.

The election was not well supported. Only 197,541 or 16.9% of 1,172,118 registered voters bothered to go to the polls, even though a Mayoral race is of great importance locally.

Whitmire, 74, who is one of Texas' most power-

ful Democratic legislators, will now be at the helm of America's fourth-largest city. His campaign focused on reducing crime, improving streets and bringing people together. He heavi-


Texans hit road to take on Titans: Cowboys face tough task at Buffalo

With just three weeks left in the 2023 NFL's regular season, the Houston Texans are firmly in contention for a playoff berth.

When the season began, Texan fans would have been happy with a six-win season, but first-year head coach DeMeco Ryans and his team had grander

Not much was expected of Ryans in his first year as an NFL head coach. The Texans were starting a rookie quarterback in C.J. Stroud and were coming off a three-win season in 2022 and over the last two years had mustered seven total wins.

Well, two weeks ago,
Houston surpassed the sevenwin plateau with a 22-17 home
win over Denver to end the
Broncos five-game winning
streak. Last Sunday, the Texans
played a struggling Jets team in
New Jersey. If they won that
game, which they should have,
they would be looking at eight
wins heading into another road
game this Sunday when they



visit Nashville to take on a struggling Tennessee Titans game in an important AFC South contest for Ryan's team.

Ryans has to be considered for Coach of the Year and Stroud appears a lock for Rookie of the Year, and while individual awards are nice, Ryans is all about the team. Should they win at Tennessee on Sunday, the Texans could very well come home with a 9-5 record heading into their final three games, two of which are at home (against Cleveland and Tennessee). Houston closes out the season at Indianapolis. The Colts defeated the Texans in Week 2 at home, so the season finale in

Indy could be very significant.


The Denver win was costly for the Texans as rookie wide receiver Tank Dell (47 receptions, 709 yards, 7 TDs) was lost for the season when he sustained a broken fibula in the game. Dell is Stroud's deep threat and replacing his speed and big-play ability won't be easy.


Dr. LaTonya M. Goffney Sworn in as the Next NABSE President

She will serve a two-year term as head of the international educational organization. Goffney has been a NAB-SE member for more than a decade. The ceremony occurred during the 51st NABSE Conference in New Orleans, LA, from November 29 through December 3, 2023

In her inauguration speech, Goffney thanked her friends and family who were in attendance. as well as Texas Alliance of Black School Educators (TABSE), Houston Area Alliance of Black School Educators (HAB-SE), and her team from Aldine ISD. Also supporting the celebration was Carver High School junior Alyssa Dorsey, who performed Alicia Keys' Girl on Fire after Goffney was officially named NABSE President. She promised a new tomorrow for NABSE and its members — one filled with hope, possibilities, and endless opportunities- to leave a legacy, allowing future generations of students and NABSE members to thrive.

Those who know my story can see how I identified with the protagonist, Celie. While my story began in abject poverty and abuse, I had points of light guiding and encouraging me. I am grateful

Jones-Koumba Receives NABSE's Mary McLeod Bethune Educator of the Year Award



At an Instructional Leaders Team (ILT) meeting earlier this school year, everyone played the ice-breaker game "Tell Us Something We Don't Know About You." Here, everyone learned that the Chief of Police, Paul Córdova, played chess in school and even won a trophy for

his skills. Upon hearing this, Susan Pelezo, executive director of advanced academics (Gifted and Talented Program), who oversees Aldine ISD's chess programs in schools, invited Córdova to play with students during practice dates.

Córdova was seen recently at the chess practice meet at Blanson Career and Technology High School on Tuesday, December 5. It was an afternoon of "rooks" and "pawns" as Córdova played with students. The Blanson CTEHS chess team, sponsored by Kevin Díaz, was practicing for their next tournament.

In addition to boosting students' confidence, Córdova says chess meetups foster trust.

"I hope to impart some knowledge for the game I enjoy playing. But there is also another layer. Interactions like these, a chess match, will lead to positive interactions between police officers and students in our schools and neighborhoods."

He says it's also a way to know the people he and his officers serve while utilizing the game of chess as the vehicle for engagement. Chess empowers students through respect, responsibility, and relationship-building while teaching how to resolve conflicts cooperatively and constructively.

Chess Clubs *Chess offers many academic benefits. Research and studies have shown a direct connection

between playing chess and developing analytical skills. Chess helps children develop focus, concentration, observation skills. Children learn that if they don't watch what is happening, they won't be able to respond to it, no matter how smart they are. Careful observation also helps children learn to strategize and plan ahead.

*Beyond academic skills, chess helps children develop social skills, learn to respect their opponents, learn how to handle defeat, and build teamwork skills as they compete together as a school team against other schools.

Córdova says the students play to win.

"I always try my best when I play chess. Sometimes I win, sometimes the students win."

Yes, Virginia, There is a Santa Claus

We take pleasure in answering thus prominently the communication below, expressing at the same time our great gratification that its faithful author is numbered among the friends of The Sun:

Dear Editor-

I am 8 years old. Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, "If you see it in The Sun, it's so." Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa

Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this



great universe of ours, man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies. You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if you did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not there. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders there are unseen and unseeable in the world.

You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived could tear apart. Only faith, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

No Santa Claus! Thank God! he lives and lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay 10 times 10,000 years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.

Francis P. Church's editorial, "Yes Virginia, There is a Santa Claus" was an immediate sensation, and went on to became one of the most famous editorials ever written. It first appeared in the The New York Sun in 1897, almost a hundred years ago, and was reprinted annually until 1949 when the paper went out of business.

Virginia O'Hanlon went on to graduate from Hunter College with a Bachelor of Arts degree at age 21. The following year she received her Master's from Columbia, and in 1912 she began teaching in the New York City school system, later becoming a principal. After 47 years, she retired as an educator. Throughout her life she received a steady stream of mail about her Santa Claus letter, and to each reply she attached an attractive printed copy of the Church editorial. Virginia O'Hanlon Douglas died on May 13, 1971, at the age of 81, in a nursing home in Valatie, N.Y.

Legal Challenges to Amendments Appear to be Quashed

A half-dozen lawsuits challenging the 13 approved Texas constitutional amendments appear to be dead in the water, The Dallas Morning News reported. The secretary of state's office last week declared the propositions approved and now a part of the Texas Constitution, while Gov. Greg Abbott canvassed the election and certified the results. One proposition that would have raised the retirement age of judges was rejected by vot-

In addition, the Texas attorney general's office said the lawsuits had improper "citation and return of service." The plaintiffs are unable to correction those citations because the election results have been certified.

The six nearly identical lawsuits claimed the state used uncertified polling machines that exposed the election to voter fraud, and the plaintiffs called for the courts to throw out the Nov. 7 results and hold a new election using paper ballots only, The News reported.

The suits threatened to delay voter-approved property tax cuts and a raise in retired teachers' pensions.

ABBOTT ENTERS PRIMARY BATTLE FRAY, MUM ON FIFTH **SPECIAL SESSION**

The Texas Legislature's fourth special session ended last week with the House and Senate still at loggerheads over Abbott's push to allow the use of taxpayer money to pay for private school costs, commonly known as school vouchers. Last month, 21 House Republicans joined with Democrats to remove the voucher provision from a broad education bill that did

not pass both chambers. Abbott is sticking to his promise to endorse primary challengers to House Republicans who voted against the voucher plan, the Texas Tribune reported. With the holiday season underway, it appears unlikely there will be another special session this year, but Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick said he believed the best day to come back for another session "would be Feb. 5, 30 days before the elec-

measures also died on the vine.

STATE HALTS EFFORTS TO **TAKE FAIRFIELD LAKE PROPERTY**

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has ceased its efforts to seize a 5,000-acre tract of private land that once included a state park and adjoins Fairfield Lake, The News reported. A private developer purchased the property from a utility company for about \$103 million last June and plans to close Fairfield Lake State Park were announced. The land for the park had been leased from Vistra Corp., the utility company for

50 years. Todd Interests, the developer, plans to build luxury homes with a golf course, restaurants and shops, as well as access to a private air strip. Less than two weeks after the developer bought the property, the state voted to condemn the land using eminent domain.

A judge-appointed commission of three Freestone County residents put the fair market value of the property at \$418.3 million – more than four times what the developer paid for it. Fairfield Lake is considered the largest privately owned lake in the state and possibly the nation, The News reported.

A report issued by the Texas Department of Insurance indicates that the cost of treating injured employees in the state's workers' compensation system dropped considerably from 2012 through 2022. Total health care costs dropped 30%, from \$1.15 billion in 2012 to \$812 million last year, while the total number of claims dropped 20% during the same period, from 319,000 to 256,000.

would like to be in mid-December, but the schedule is what the schedule is and if Dallas wants to remain in the hunt for the NFC East title, they will need to forget about the weather and just play.

The Bills are in danger of not making the playoffs, which will not well with their fans. Should Buffalo fail to qualify for the post season, head coach Sean McDermott's job could be in ieopardy.

This is the time of year when the NFL plays Saturday games just as the college bowl season cranks up. The league gives us a triple header on Saturday as Minnesota visits Cincinnati, Pittsburgh visits the Colts and Denver heads to the Motor City to take on the Lions.

The Sunday Night Football crew has a good one as Baltimore visits Jacksonville, with the winner remaining in the hunt for the No. 1 seed in the AFC. Baltimore, Jacksonville and Miami entered last weekend's games with nine wins each. It's going to be an interesting finish in the AFC.

Week 15 concludes with Monday Night Football with the Eagles visiting the desperate Seahawks. Seattle can't afford to lose any more games if Pete Carroll's team hopes to make the playoffs. Hosting Philly won't be

As the bowl season starts up, college football fans will have plenty of games to watch as they wait for the College Football Playoff semifinals on Jan. 1. Texas (ranked No. 3 in the CFP ranking) fans are ecstatic over landing one of the four CFP berths and they will face No. 2ranked Washington in the Sugar Bowl on New Year's night, while No. 1-ranked Michigan faces No. 4-ranked Alabama in the Rose Bowl. Florida State fans are livid that their 13-0 Seminoles were excluded from the CFP in favor of 12-1 Alabama. While I understand their frustration and anger, the CFP committee got it right. Alabama defeated No. 1ranked Georgia, the two-time national champ and in the



process ended Kirby Smart's teams 30-game winning streak. I think an SEC title outweighs an ACC title, but that's just me. FSU and Georgia will meet in the Orange Bowl and take out their frustrations on being excluded from the CFP on each other.

Before we take a look at this weekend's key NFL games, let's review last week's record. A 6-2 mark upped the season record to 97-45 (68%). Now, onto this weekend's game.

NFL

Los Angeles Chargers at Las Vegas: Week 15 starts with Thursday Night Football as the Chargers and Raiders meet in an AFC West contest. The Chargers are one of the most disappointing teams in the NFL. They have a lot of talent, but always seem to underachieve. Two weeks ago, they won an ugly game at New England, 6-0. This could turn into an offensive shootout as Justin Herbert (3,038 yards, 20 TDs), running back Austin Ekeler (446 rushing yards, 4 TDs/31 receptions, 295 yards, 1 TD) and wide receiver Keenan Allen (102 receptions, 1,175 yards, 7 TDs) look to take out their frustrations against the Raiders. Vegas is once again playing for next year and is giving rookie QB Aiden O'Connell (1,933 yards, 4 TDs) a look. He'll count on running back Josh Jacobs (771 yards, 6 TDs) and wide receiver Davante

Cinci on Saturday as the Vikings visit the Bengals. Both of these team's playoff chances are slim, so look for both teams to play hard on Saturday to keep their fledgling postseason hopes alive. The Vikings need a better effort from QB Joshua Dobbs (832 yards, 5 TDs/5 interceptions). He has some weapons in tight end T.J. Hockenson (80 receptions, 786 yards, 5 TDs), and rookie wide receiver Jordan Addison (54 receptions, 686 yards, 7 TDs). Dobbs should also have star wideout Justin Jefferson (36 receptions, 571 yards, 3 TDs in just five games) back after he missed five games with a hamstring injury. The Bengals have been ravaged by injuries, most notably to starting QB Joe Burrow. The Bengals picked up a big road win two weeks ago when they upset Jacksonville, 34-31 in overtime. Backup QB Jake Browning (649 yards, 3 TDs) is playing well in place of Burrow, but he will need help from running back Joe Mixon (689 yards, 6 TDs0 and big-play wideout Ja'Marr Chase (86 receptions, 1,063 yards, 7 TDs) to keep the Bengals' playoff hopes alive. My pick, Cincinnati

Pittsburgh at Indianapolis: Two weeks ago, the Steelers were embarrassed at home by the then two-win Arizona Cardinals, 24-10. They also lost starting QB Kenny Pickett to an ankle injury. If Pickett is unable to play this week, the Steelers are going to be in deep, deep trouble. Running back Najee Harris (661 yards, 4 TDs) will need to pick up the slack. Two weeks ago, the Colts defeated the Titans 31-28 in overtime behind backup QB Gardner Minshew (2,284 yards, 10 TDs) and wide receiver Michael Pittman (87 receptions, 889

yards, 4 TDs). Look for the Colts to defend their home turf on Saturday as they look to remain in the AFC Wild Card race. My pick, Indianapolis 24, Pittsburgh

Denver at Detroit: The Saturday triple header concludes on Saturday night as Russell Wilson (2,385 yards, 21 TDs) and the Broncos visit the Lions. Two weeks ago, Denver saw its five-game winning streak come to an end with a loss to the Texans, while the Lions offense got rolling in a 33-28 win at New Orleans. Denver has a solid defense and should make Lions QB Jared Goff (3,288 yards, 20 TDs) earn his yards. Goff has a lot of talent to turn to in running back David Montgomery (704 yards, 10 TDs), wide receiver Amon-Ra St. Brown (84 receptions, 1,042 yards, 6 TDs) and rookie tight end Sam LaPortta (64 receptions, 677 yards, 6 TDs). Detroit is tough to beat at home and head coach Dan Campbell can smell a division title. Look for the Lions to fire on all cylinders on Saturday night. My pick, Detroit 31, Denver 23

Houston at Tennessee: The Texans can expect the Titans to pull out the Luv Ya Blue uniforms on Sunday, which should serve as motivation heading into this key AFC South contest for Houston. Stroud (3,540 yards, 20 TDs) has thus far proven he is up to the task either playing at home or on the road and he will face a Titans team that would like nothing more than to put a wrench in the Texans playoff hopes. With Dell gone, Stroud will rely on fellow wide out Nico Collins (59 receptions, 991 yards, 6 TDs), tight end Dalton Schultz and Noah Brown to make plays in the passing game. The Houston defense will need to slow down their nemesis, running back Derrick Henry (he has rushed for more than 200 yards four times against the Texans). Henry has 841 rushing yards and eight TDs this year. Look for the Houston defense to get after rookie QB Will Levis (1,266 yards, 7 TDs) as that unit steps up and helps lead the Texans to a key road win. My pick, Houston 26, Tennessee 23

Dallas at Buffalo: After playing three straight home games, the Cowboys face a stern test when they visit Western New York on Sunday to take on a desperate Bills team. Dallas QB Dak Prescott (3,234 yards, 26 TDs) is having perhaps his best year as a pro and he has plenty of weapons to help him out in running back Tony Pollard (737 yards, 5 TDs), wide receiver CeeDee Lamb (90 receptions, 1,182 yards, 7 TDs) and tight end Jake Ferguson (46 receptions, 498 yards, 5 TDs). The Dallas defense will need to bring it's "A" game when it faces Bills QB Josh Allen (3,214 passing yards, 24 TDs/342 rushing yards, 9 TDs), running back James Cook (731 yards, 1 TD) and big-play wide receiver Stefon Diggs (83 receptions, 969 yards, 8 TDs). Two weeks ago, Seattle torched the Dallas secondary for 334 yards and three TDs. If that unit doesn't tighten things up, Dallas could be in for a long day against Allen. My pick, Dallas 30, Buffalo 27

Baltimore at Jacksonville:

A good one on Sunday Night Football pits two of the best teams in the AFC. Both teams are alive (along with Miami) for the top seed in the AFC, so look for a tight, competitive game on Sunday night in Jacksonville. The Ravens are once again led by QB Lamar Jackson (2,618 yards, 13 TDS/574 rushing yards, 5 TDS). He's getting help in the running game from Gus Edwards (590 yards, 10 TDs) and in the passing game by rookie wide receiver Zay Jones (58 receptions, 613 yards, 2 TDs). The Jags suffered a big blow two weeks ago in their 34-31 overtime loss at home to Cincinnati when starting QB Trevor Lawrence (3,004 yareds, 14 TDs) suffered a right ankle sprain. It's not known how long Lawrence will be out, but if he's unable to go against the Ravens, the Jags could be in for a long night. The Jags will need a big night from running back Travis Etienne (771 yards, 9 total TDs) and wide receivers Christian Kirk (57 receptions, 787 yards, 3 TDs) and Calvin Ridley (51 receptions, 689 yards, 5 TDs to make life easier for backup QB C.J. Bethard if Lawrence is unable to play. The Jags are tough to beat at home and the Ravens will discover that on Sunday night. My pick, Jacksonville 26, Baltimore 23 (if Lawrence plays); Baltimore 24,

Jacksonville 17 (if Lawrence does not play)

Philadelphia at Seattle: Week 15 concludes on Monday Night Football as the Eagles travel cross country to take on the Seahawks. Two weeks ago, the Eagles were dominated at home by the 49ers en route to a 42-19 thrashing, while Seattle lost a shootout at Dallas, 41-35. The Eagles defense must play better than it did against SF and should be able to force a turnover or two from Seattle QB Geno Smith (2,918 yards, 15 TDs/9 interceptions). Seattle should get running back Kenneth Walker III (613 yards, 6 TDS) back after he missed a couple of games with an injury. Smith will look to make plays in the passing game to wideouts DK Metcalf (49 receptions, 812 yards, 6 TDs) and Tyler Lockett (59 receptions, 622 yards, 4 TDs). Philly will need a big game from QB Jalen Hurts (2,995 passing yards, 19 TDs/430 rushing yards, 12 TDs), running back D'Andre Swift (783 yards, 4 TDs) and wide receivers A.J. Brown (81 receptions, 1,164 yards, 7 TDs) and DeVonta Smith (64 receptions, 834 yards, 6 TDs). The Eagles have the Cowboys breathing down their necks in the NFC East, so look for Philly to pick up a big road win on Monday night. My pick, Philadelphia 31, Seattle 24

Charges have been filed against a suspect arrested in the fatal shooting of a man found at 832 West Greens Road about 10:50 p.m. on November

The male suspect, 16, has been referred to Harris County Juvenile Probation authorities on charges of murder and aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Juvenile suspect information is not releasable.

He's accused in the death of Jeffry Martinez Menjivar, 18.

HPD Homicide Division Detectives W. Huff and J. Nguyen reported:

HPD patrol officers responded to a person down call at an apartment complex at the above address and found the victim unresponsive sitting

in the driver's seat of a vehicle. He had suffered apparent multiple gunshot wounds. Houston Fire Department paramedics transported the man to HCA Houston Healthcare Northwest where he was pronounced deceased.

Further investigation identified the juvenile as the suspect in this incident. He was arrested on Tuesday (Nov. 28) and admitted to investigators his involvement in the incident. He was subsequently charged on Wednesday (Nov. 29).

The investigation is ongoing.

Medical imaging students gather at intercollegiate radiologic consortium

HOUSTON - Hundreds of medical imaging technology students from Greater Houston attended the 2023 Houston Area Radiologic Consortium (HARC) today for a day of academic enrichment and professional networking.

Houston Community College, San Jacinto College, Lone Star College, Galveston College, and MD Anderson Cancer Center all participated in this intercollegiate event held at HCC Coleman College for Health Sciences in the Texas Medical Center.

At HARC, students engaged in breakout sessions taught by imaging professors from the participating colleges. The sessions covered a wide range of imaging modalities, including X-ray, mammography, computed tomography (CT), sonography, and magnetic resonance imaging (MRI).

Between sessions, students were also able to meet with human resource representatives from several healthcare systems, including Memorial Hermann Health System, HCA Healthcare, Texas Children's Hospital, CHI St. Luke's Health, and Baylor Scott and White Health.

According to Elizabeth Ho, DHSc, ARDMS, diagnostic medical sonography program director at HCC Coleman College and HARC coordinator, the consortium began in 2016 with the common goal to expand the knowledge and opportunities of imaging technology students.

"The wonderful thing about HARC is that students are also learning from professors from other colleges. It gives the students more insight and

even allows the professors to learn from each other.' Ho said. "The students also meet recruiters from hospitals and other students who may be their coworkers one day."

Medical imaging continues to become increasingly important for doctors to diagnose and treat diseases, so the job and earning potential for imaging technologists is strong.

"Perhaps the best part of this field is that general radiologic technologists can make a good starting salary," Ho said. "Then they can expand their knowledge and certifications and specialize into different branches, like sonography, CT, or nuclear medicine. There's a lot of opportunity for growth, especially as technology continues to evolve."

"I'm learning about different jobs and modalities in the field, as well as discovering various cancer treatment options," Marshall said.


