

# Lone Star College enrollment hits record high

### East Aldine students increase by 90%

HOUSTON - Lone Star College broke its enrollment record by surpassing its 90,000-headcount goal and welcoming 91,885 students this fall, representing a 3.5% increase from fall 2023. This data is based on Official Day numbers recorded 12 academic days after a semester begins.

## State sues to block County's "Uplift 2.0" subsidy program

### **Harris County Attorney** Christian D. Menefee **Responds to New Lawsuit Over Harris County Guaranteed Income Program**

Houston, Texas — The Office of the Attorney General of Texas has sued Harris County over the county's Community Prosperity Program. The program provides \$500 per month via a preloaded debit card which comes with spending restrictions. Families eligible for this program live below 200% of the federal poverty line.

The program was developed after the Texas Supreme Court froze another Harris County program, Uplift Harris, which would have provided \$500 a month to underserved County residents with fewer spending restrictions. The Community Prosperity Program incorporated guidance from the Texas Supreme Court by limiting the categories of items participants could purchase with the funds, such as housing, utilities, transportation, groceries, medical care, professional development, bill payments, clothing, and other essential needs.

Harris County Attorney Christian D. Menefee, who represents Harris County in all civil litigation, issued the following statement:

"After a lawsuit from Ken Paxton regarding the Uplift Harris program, Harris County created a new initiative that addresses the state's concerns while still offering financial stability to our neighbors who need it most.

If it wasn't clear before, it should be clear now that the opposition to this program is not about concern for the law; it's about using people living in poverty as a means to score political points.

In Harris County, we understand the need to


### **FOOTBALL SEASON WEEK 6:**

## Texas, OU continue rivalry in SEC: Huge weekend for college football

The second week of October hopefully will bring fall-like temperatures and while we wait for that, we do know that the second week of October also features Texas versus Oklahoma in the Cotton Bowl with the Texas State Fair as a backdrop.

No. 2-ranked Texas faces No. 19-ranked OU, which will the first meeting of these two teams as members of the SEC. These two long-time rivals first met in 1900 and the game has been played annually since 1929 (Texas leads the overall series, 65-51-5). They played when OU was a member of the Big 8 and UT was a member of the SWC and the rivalry continued when both were members of the Big 12 Conference and it will continue now that they are members of

Both teams had an extra week to prepare for this game



and Texas could use the extra week after Steve Sarkisian's team struggled a bit against Mississippi St., one of the league's weaker teams, two weeks ago before pulling out a 35-13 victory. OU picked up a nice road win at Auburn, rallying from an 11-point deficit in the fourth quarter to pull out a 27-21

This is the first of two tough games for UT as the 'Horns follow this one up with a visit from No. 5-ranked Georgia on

Oct. 19.

While much of the focus will be on OU-UT, especially in Texas and Oklahoma, there are a number of other big matchups this weekend.

No. 12-ranked Ole Miss visits No. 13-ranked LSU, while No. 7 Penn State heads to LA to take on No. 11-ranked USC and perhaps the game of the week will occur in Eugene, OR when

# **Gang Member Sentenced to Life** in Prison for Killing Five People

A documented Houston gang member was sentenced Friday to life in prison for killing five people in three separate shootings in 2019, Harris County District Attorney Kim Ogg announced.

"So many people, so many families will never have peace because of the indiscriminate violence this man inflicted on our community," Ogg said. "We swore an oath to see that justice is done, and in this case justice demanded that this man be sentenced to life in prison."

Christian Ivan Cavazos, 22, was sentenced to life in prison for his role in a devastating crime spree that began on Sept. 6, 2019, and was investigated by the Harris County Sheriff's Office with assistance from the FBI.

Cavazos was riding in a car with other men when they saw another group of young men in a different car and opened fire. Cavazos fired several shots into the car, wounding the driver, who pulled over in a light industrial area north of Jersey Village. Cavazos



then got out of his car, walked to the stopped vehicle and fatally shot 19-year-old Ryan McGowan, who was in the backseat.

Later that month, Cavazos and other men were driving around late at night on Sept. 25, 2019.

They saw a purple Dodge Charger that they believed belonged to a rival gang member and started following it. In reality, the distinctive automobile belonged to 65-year-old Ramiro Reyes and his wife, Rosalva Reyes, 63.

The couple were leaving an area hospital where Mrs. Reyes' elderly mother had just died.

Cavazos and his group followed the grieving couple to their home in northwest Houston. The couple were fatally shot as they were getting out of their car in front of their house.

Almost three months later, Cavazos was again the triggerman in a drive-by shooting, this time in north Harris County. Cavazos, who was a passenger, started shooting wildly at an outdoor film set where a group of people were mak-

ing a music video on Dec. 27, 2019.

Videographer Gonzalo Andrew Gonzalez, 22, and Jonathan Jimenez, 20, were killed in the shooting, and seven other people were injured.

Cavazos was facing a charge of capital murder before opting to plead guilty to three counts of murder and have his punishment determined by a judge after a sentencing hearing. During the hearing, the judge heard details about all five killings and sentenced Cavazos to life in prison.

Assistant District Attorney Napoleon Stewart, a chief in the District Attorney's Organized Crime Division, prosecuted the case with ADA Garrett Moore.

"Christian Cavazos is a dangerous man who got what he earned, he got what he deserved when he was sentenced to life," Stewart said. "Anybody who was unfortunate enough to cross his path got hit by bullets, and many of them died. He created a lot of innocent victims, and we're glad we were able to get justice for the victims and their families."

After Cavazos was sentenced to life in prison, four people who knew the slain gave victim impact statements in a courtroom packed with family and friends of all five.

Although the victims were not connected before they were murdered, many of the people in court wore custom photo buttons showing all five of their faces together.

### Baby formula shipped to H-E-B and CVS in Texas recalled

Perrigo Company, plc is asking consumers in 12 states, including Texas, to check their baby formula before consuming due to high levels of Vitamin D above the maximum level permitted.

According to the company, the product was shipped to Texas, Florida, California, South Carolina, Virginia, Indiana, Tennessee, New Jersey, Michigan, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Missouri. No other products or retailers are impacted by this recall.

Perrigo said three lots within one batch, or 16,500 cans, of store brand Premium Infant Formula with Iron Milk-Based Powder was recalled on August 8. They have said there have been no reports of adverse events to date attributed to the elevated levels of Vitamin D.

In a report, the company said they initiated the voluntary recall in consultation with the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA)

While the product was shipped to CVS on February 6, 2024, and to H-E-B Grocery

Company, LP on February 2, 2024, the product has a 'use by date of 11NOV2025 so it could still be on the shelves of homeowners.

"For the vast majority of infants, short-term consumption of the affected lot codes is unlikely to cause adverse health implications," the company statement read. "In a small subset of physiologically vulnerable infants (e.g., impaired renal function), there is the potential that consumption of the recalled product could result in health complications. Parents and caregivers who may have purchased the product should look for the lot codes below with "use by" dates, which can be found on the bottom of the package and should contact their health care provider if they have any concerns."

Perrigo has already taken immediate action by notifying H-E-B Grocery Company, LP and CVS directly and asking them to examine their retail and warehouse inventory and isolate the product.



Perrigo said, "If infants experience any symptoms while using the product, report them to the FDA's MedWatch Adverse Event Reporting program online at www.fda.gov/medwatch/report.htm. Additionally, please contact your healthcare provider.".

### A Future with Fewer Children

As my regular readers know, I have been calling your attention to the dramatic decline in the fertility rate across the world, for some time now. A recent report (see p. 2) from the United Nations has pegged the current worldwide rate at 2.25. That is just barely above the 2.1 rate, which is considered the "replacement rate," i.e., the rate which is necessary to sustain a stable population level. The UN now expects the world population to top out at 10.3 billion in the mid-2080s and then begin a long-term, gradual decline.

However, some countries have fallen well below the replacement rate and their populations have already begun to decline. The UN report estimates that countries with about 25% of the world's population are already in decline.

I recently travelled to Italy and Greece and saw firsthand what this future looks like. During my time there, the paucity of children was not only noticeable; it was almost eerie.

Today there are about 1.9 million Greeks under the age of 20, making up about 19% of the total population. In 1990, there were 2.8 million Greeks under the age of 20 making up 28% of the population. The number of school age children has dropped from 2.2 million in 1990 to 1.5 million today. In Italy, the numbers are proportionally much the same. The number of school age children there dropping from 10.9 million in 1990 to 7.8 million today.1

The decline was evident as I traveled in these two countries. Particularly poignant were the number of shuttered schools. Several of our guides had gone to school to become teachers or professors but were unable to find a job when they completed their education. Most of our guides were in their 20s or 30s. Only two had a single child and the others expressed doubts about whether they ever would. Based on the current trends, there will only be about 750,000 school aged children in Greece at the end of the century.

The low birth rates have already caused both countries to start losing population. Greece is down about 5% from its peak in 2003 and Italy about 4% since its peak in 2010. The effect will be even more dramatic in the future. At the current rate, both countries will lose about a third of their population by the end of century.

In the U.S., the fertility rate has been below the replacement rate since the early 1970s. Earlier this year, the National Center for Health Statistics announced that the fertility rate for the U.S. dropped in 2023 to an all-time low. The only thing that is keeping the U.S. from looking more like much of Europe is immigration. But with the national mood souring on the rapid immigration over the last few decades, that is likely to begin to decline as well.

I call this new demographic reality to your attention not to suggest that it is inherently a good or bad thing or that we should do something to try to reverse it. Countries like Russia and China that have tried to do so, have failed miserably.


It is noteworthy because we need to be making policy decisions based on this new reality and not the misplaced belief or hope that population growth will continue at the pace of the last century.

For example, does HISD really need to spend \$4.4 billion on its elementary schools when its enrollment has already dropped by a quarter over the last decade? Do we really need to spend \$11 billion to redo the freeways around downtown when companies have been moving to the suburbs? Do we need to build a multi-billion-dollar transit system when the population in the city's core has already been stalled for decades?

There may be good reasons to do some of these things. HISD had not renovated its elementary schools in decades. The freeway system around downtown is, and has been for some time, well beyond its original design capacity.

But the critical point is that we need to be sure that our policy choices are based on realistic population projections. I can promise you this: there are not many schools being built in Greece or Italy these days.

### Phelan's GOP Foes Back one Challenger

Texas House Republicans who want to oust Speaker Dade Phelan have coalesced behind a single opponent: state Rep. David Cook, R-Mansfield. A total of 48 representatives are backing the two-term representative, including four who dropped their own bids for speaker.

Phelan's opponents, including Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick, claim he has given too much power to Democrats by naming some to lead legislative committees.

"This vote highlights the growing momentum for change within the Texas House, as members rally behind a shared vision of a decentralized leadership model that empowers all members," Cook said in a statement.

Phelan is seeking his third term as speaker after narrowly surviving a challenge for re-election to represent his district in the GOP primary, winning a runoff election.

"Not only are their actions disappointing and unacceptable, they are futile, as I proudly have the clear majority votes needed to be the Speaker today and will have the clear majority support needed to become Speaker again come January," Phelan said in a statement.

### POLLS SHOW NEAR TIE IN CRUZ-ALLRED RACE

The U.S. Senate race in Texas has tightened, with a poll last week showing Democratic challenger Colin Allred nearly within the margin of error in his race against incumbent Republican Ted Cruz, the Austin American-Statesman reported. A poll released by the Texas Hispanic Policy Foundation shows Cruz ahead of Allred 48% to 45%, nearly within the margin of error of 2.83%.

Cruz is seeking his third term in the Senate. He won his last race against challenger Beto O' Rourke by just 2.6 points.

The tightening race prompted the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee to announce last week that it is sending millions of advertising dollars to Texas to boost his campaign. The committee plants to put its money to-



ward airing more Allred campaign ads. Committee chair Gary Peters said the Democratic candidate needs more funding to get his message out.

"But it is his message," Peters said. "He knows Texas inside and out."

## TEXAS SUPREME COURT RULES ON GUN BAN AT STATE FAIR

The State Fair of Texas opened last week with its newly enacted ban on weapons intact after the Texas Supreme Court rejected a challenge by Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton just 13 hours earlier. The Statesman reported the court ridiculed the state's legal arguments in a five-page opinion, with Justice Jimmy Blacklock writing that "the State's filings do not even attempt to answer" the question at the heart of the case.

Two lower courts also rejected Paxton's attempt to lift the ban, enacted after three fairgoers were injured in a shooting incident last year.

The state fair runs through Sunday, Oct. 20.

### PARTY GAME COMPANY SUES SPACEX FOR

TRESPASSING

Cards Against Humanity, makers of a humorous adult party game, is suing Elon Musk's SpaceX company for trespassing and damaging land the company purchased in Cameron County. The company purchased the land in 2017 to send a political message to then-President Donald Trump's campaign to not build a border wall.

KUT reported that the company raised money to purchase the land by soliciting \$15 donations from 150,000 people. It says the land has been kept in its

A website maintained by the company announced it is seeking \$15 million in damages and displayed photos purportedly showing "before and after" images of its land. SpaceX did not respond for comment from Texas Public Radio.

### GOING LIGHTS OUT FOR MIGRATING BIRDS

Audubon Texas is asking residents to not leave the porch lights on this fall, during peak migration season for millions of birds. The Texas Standard reported the 2024 Lights Out, Texas, campaign is underway, and Texans are urged to turn off unnecessary lights to minimize light pollution. Migrating birds can become disoriented when traveling through densely populated areas.

Up to 1 billion birds are killed each year due to collisions with buildings. Peak migration runs through Oct. 29, with fall migration ending around Nov. 30. One of every four birds migrating through the U.S. passes through Texas, according to Audubon Texas.

Building owners, businesses, developers and homeowners can help protect migrating birds by turning off all nonessential lighting from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m. each night. Lighting shields that direct light downward can reduce bird casualties. More information is available at tx.audubon.org.

### LOOKING BACK ON LAST SUMMER'S WEATHER

The summer of 2024 is in the books, and Dr. Mark Wentzel, hydrologist with the Texas Water Development Board, says it ended up in the middle of the pack when compared to the last 25 summers – the 12th most miserable during that time period.

The amount of the state in drought declined to 28 percent from a high of 88 percent during the summer of 2022, Wentzel wrote. Last summer certainly was an improvement over the two previous, which were considered the second and third most miserable in the past quarter century. But they both pale in comparison to the summer of 2011, which had the worst drought conditions in Texas history, and wildfires swept the state.

Relatively plentiful rain made last summer seem more tolerable, but records indicate it was the fourth-hottest summer of the past 25 years.

Thank goodness for autumn.

### Future Me



I'm usually pretty good about doing things I don't want to do. I've been alive long enough to know that getting starting is always the hardest part. But nothing is harder for me to start than doing weights.

I say "doing" weights because I don't actually lift anything other than myself. I started out with push-ups because a friend suggested a "100-push-up challenge." I had never done any upper-body exercise of any kind. I couldn't imagine I could do 100 push-ups—and it turns out I was right. I couldn't for almost two years.

But I did them almost every day, and I went from 30 to 50 (where I stayed for a full year) to 75, and, finally, to 100. Then I discovered I could do 110 and, by the end, I was able to do 200 push-ups at a time.

Was my form perfect? It was not. I couldn't care less. I did them fast and sloppy and got them over with. But my arms got a lot stronger, and I hoped my genetic inclination toward osteoporosis might be helped. I did them because I thought a me in the future would appreciate my efforts.

But I finally got to a point where I absolutely dreaded push-ups. I stopped doing them for days at a time. It takes a while to do 200 push-ups, and I hated every moment of it.

So, I decided to do something different. There is a small gym in the building where I live, and it has machines in it. I'd never used any of these machines. They terrified me. But my 16-year-old nephew, Beau, started lifting weights two years ago. He is very muscular now and goes to the gym several times a week. Beau came to my gym with me, and we looked at the terrify-

ing machines.

"All you need is this machine," he said, pointing to the scariest one. He sounded sure of himself, and Beau is a fellow who does a lot of research before he comes out with pronouncements.

"Just this machine?"
"Yup. If you want to work

"Yup. If you want to work upper body, this will do it."

Beau showed me three exercises I could do on the one machine, and I became determined to use this machine every day. And I did. For a while. Then I began to hate it almost as much as push-ups.

I had to get dressed to go to the gym (even if it was just downstairs). I had to put on my shoes (and we all know how hard that can be). Sometimes I had to do my exercises in front of other people. (They were not the least bit interested, but still.)

And I started avoiding it, just as I had the push-ups.

"Maybe I don't have to do weights at all," I told myself. "Maybe I've done enough!" But I didn't feel good. And I knew Future Me would be disappointed in Past Me.

So, I've started up again.

I'm not pretending I love doing weights, but I'm not complaining as much, either. Because even if I only do one short set, I feel better afterward. I feel stronger and more confident—but not really because my arms are stronger. I feel stronger when I do something I truly detest, even for a short time, because I decided to do it and did it. I did something just because it was the right thing to do.

I remind myself that I'm doing a favor for Future Me. I sure hope she appreciates it.

## Texas, OU continue rivalry in SEC: Huge weekend for college football

No. 3-ranked Ohio State visits No. 6-ranked Oregon in a big Big 10 contest.

In the NFL, the Texans head to Foxborough to take on a struggling New England team, while Detroit heads to Jerry World to take on the Cowboys in a rematch of last year's Week 17 meeting where the Cowboys survived the Lions with a controversial 20-19 win at home. In that game, the officials took away a two-point conversion from the Lions that could have been the winning points when it was determined offensive lineman Taylor Decker was called for an illegal touching penalty for not reporting as eligible, which wiped out what might have been the gamewinning play of the game with 23 seconds left. The Cowboys ultimately denied the Lions' 2point retry and won 20-19. You'd better believe Detroit head coach Dan Campbell won't let his team forget about that play.

Week 6 starts with a key NFC West meeting when San Francisco visits Seattle, Week 6 concludes with Monday Night Football with a big AFC East contest as the Buffalo visits the New York Jets.

Westfield returns four offensive and six defensive starters from a team that finished 11-3 and reached the Region II finals. The Mustangs are led by QB Miles Dent). My pick, Nimitz 26. Westfield 23

MacArthur vs. Aldine – Aldine ISD's oldest football rivalry renews on Friday night at 7 p.m. in Thorne Stadium as Blake Ware's Generals take on Cirilo Ojeda's Mustangs. Two weeks ago, the Generals lost to Nimitz, while Aldine fell to Dekaney. QB Lance Nero (295 yards, 2 TDs) leads the Generals. My pick, MacArthur 23, Aldine 17

Spring at Eisenhower – Odell James' Eagles host Spring on Saturday evening at 6 p.m. in Thorne Stadium. The Eagles lost a tough one in their district opener to Davis, while Spring lost to Westfield, 42-7. Eisenhower is led by running back Elijah Dixon (347 yards, 5 TDs) and QB EJ Durst (226 yards, 1 TD). My pick, Eisenhower 31, Spring 23

NCAA

Ole Miss at LSU - The Ole Miss Rebels were rolling after their first four games of the season, averaging a whopping 55 points per contest, but then Lane Kiffin's team dropped an unexplainable 20-17 loss at home to a two-win Kentucky team. If the Rebels are going to remain alive in the College Football Playoff picture, they will need a big win at LSU on Saturday. Good luck with that. Ole Miss has a potent offense led by QB Jaxson Dart (1,815 passing yards, 13 TDs/112 rushing yards, 1 TD), running back Henry Parrish Jr. (489 yards, 8 TDs) and big-play wide receiver Tre Harris (49 receptions, 804 yards, 5 TDs). The Tigers can light it up on offense as well behind QB Garrett Nussmeier (1,652 yards, 15 TDs), running back Caden Durham (244 yards, 3 TDs) and wide receivers Aaron Anderson (27 receptions, 371 yards, 2 TDs) and Kyren Lacy (25 receptions, 352 yards, 2 TDs). The Tigers are tough at home, which Mississippi will discover come Saturday. My pick, LSU 33, Mississippi 31

Penn State at USC – No. 7
Penn State visits No. 11 USC in an important Big 10 game for both teams. The Nittany Lions have a balanced offense led by QB Dew Allar (864 yards, 8 TDs), running back Nicholas Singleton (408 yards, 3 TDs) and tight end Tyler Warren (20 receptions, 260 yards, 2 TDs). USC has offensive weapons as well led by QB Miller Moss

(1,198 yards, 8 TDs), running back Woody Marks (334 yards, 3 TDs) and wide receiver Ja'Kobi Lane (19 receptions, 221 yards, 5 TDs). This will be a good road test for PSU and I think they have the better defense, which should be the difference maker in this one. My pick, Penn State 26, USC 23

Ohio State at Oregon – A

big one in the Big 10 as No. 3

Ohio State heads to the Pacific

Northwest to take on No. 6 Oregon. The winner of this one will get a huge CFP resume enhancer, while the loser will probably need to win out to be considered for an at-large bid. The Buckeyes offense has averaged 48.7 points in their first four games (all wins), while the defense has been outstanding allowing just 27 points (6 points per game). Oregon has struggled a big, but did win its first four games heading into last Friday's game against Michigan State. The Oregon defense will have its hands full with a potent OSU offense, led by QB Will Howard (1,039. Yards, 8 TDs), running back Quinshon Judkins (390 yards, 5 TDs) and TreVeyon Henderson (276 yards, 4 TDs) and wide receivers Jeremiah Smith (19 receptions, 364 yards, 5 TDs) and Emeka Egbuka (21 receptions, 362 yards, 2 TDs). Oregon can move the ball as well behind QB Dillon Gabriel (1,192 yards, 9 TDs), running back Jordan James (386 yards, 4 TDs) and wide receiver Tez Johnson (33 receptions, 311 yards, 4 TDs). This will be a tough, and long trip, for the Buckeyes, but I think they pull out a wild, high-scoring game on Saturday in Eugene. My pick, Ohio State 34, Oregon 31

Texas vs. Oklahoma - No. 2 Texas and No. 19 OU meet up in the Red River Rivalry and there's a lot more at stake than just bragging rights. Texas wants to keep its undefeated season going, while the Sooners would like nothing more than to throw a monkey wrench in those plans, just as it did a year ago when it upset then No. 3-ranked Texas 34-30. Sarkisian can't let that happen again this year, not with Georgia on tap the following week in Austin. Texas should have starting QB Quinn Ewers (691 yards, 8 TDs in 3 games) back for this one after he missed two games with an abdominal

injury. If Ewers is sidelined, UT



September 6, 2024 ~ September was National Suicide Prevention Month - a time to remember the lives lost to suicide, acknowledge the millions more who have experienced suicidal thoughts, and the many individuals, families and communities that have been impacted by suicide. It's also a time to raise awareness about suicide prevention and share messages of hope.

More than 49,000 people in the United States died by suicide in 2022 that's one death every 11 minutes, and more than any other year dating to back at least 1941, according to the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. On top of that, 13.2 million people seriously considered suicide, 3.8 million planned it and 1.6 million attempted suicide. It's the third leading cause of death among 15- to 29year-olds.

One never knows what they could have done to prevent a family member or friend from taking their own life, but here's some suggestions.

Being educated about suicide can help you be more supportive for your loved ones. Being informed about suicide and knowing that you don't need to be a mental health provider to lower your risk of suicide or support your loved ones is as important as ever.

Sometimes but not always those who commit suicide do so after some event in their life made them depressed. These individuals may need someone (POSSIBLY YOU) to talk to and express themselves to as to what's causing their depression.

"Any time you notice a family member, friend or anyone acting and or speaking unusual give notice of it and inquire as best vou can what the reason for their unusual behavior."

It's possible if a depressed person discusses what's causing their depression this by-itself can be a relief to where they can get over it and move on with their life in a positive way.

Here are two ways you can help:

If your love one seems to be at risk of suicide, be supportive and intentional about asking them what's going on, experts said. Here's an example: "Hey, I've noticed life's gotten overwhelming these past couple days. Do you want to tell me about it?"

Listen to them, express appreciation for their openness and offer to help figure it out together, encourage them about all the wonderful reasons they should stay alive.
